



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WIN AT BRIDGE

Looking for a younger partner

It is fun playing in junior events. But eventually you become too old. Well, Morton Lund Madson isn't too old, but last year his brother, Lars, edged past the cutoff point. Fredrik Brundman, who moved into the vacant chair, found a nerve-tangling play in this deal from the Danish Junior Pairs Championship.

The original auction followed my route until three no-trump. (Two hearts was fourth-suit forcing, just showing game-forcing values — a standard agreement in the tournament world. Three hearts asked South to bid three no-trump with at least half a stopper in hearts — an unusual treatment.) After that, Madson made several artificial bids before selecting

seven no-trump. At first glance, there are 13 top tricks: one spade, two hearts, four diamonds and six clubs. Even if an opponent has all four missing clubs, the jack can be captured. Moreover, the heart lead made a dent in South's communications.

Not being blessed with X-ray vision, Brundman led a low club to dummy's ace at trick two, getting the lead back. Now Brundman needed two heart entries: one to permit a finesse of dummy's club 10, and a second to get back to cash the last three club winners. But he had only one: the diamond king. What would you have done?

Brundman might have cashed the spade ace, in case the king was a singleton. Instead, he called for the diamond four, and when that played low (Madson says it was early Sunday morning), Brundman put his right into the table! When it was, he claimed.

ASK DR. GOTT

How many doctors does a woman need?

DEAR DR. GOTT: In my community, gynecologists take care of women's health, including problems not related to the reproductive tract, whereas men go to internists. Should a woman have both?

DEAR READER: Customs vary from region to region, depending on the availability of doctors and the preferences of their patients. In underserved areas, general practitioners usually take care of most of the family's routine problems and check-ups. In contrast, urban centers, who are not always urban, tend to have a division of specialties; for example, I once treated a visitor from New York City who refused to take a cold remedy until she had checked it out with her gynecologist. On a less elevated level, many women simply feel more comfortable, for one reason or another, using their gynecologists as primary care physicians.

As a general internist, I prefer to see gynecologists as consultants. In my view, they should limit their practice to the female reproductive system — and leave the rest to us, the internists and family practitioners.

I doubt that a woman needs both a gynecologist and a general medical doctor. One or the other will do. In the long run, I believe you will obtain more balanced primary care from an internist or family doctor, either of whom should be well-equipped to perform annual gynec exams and other routine gynecological tasks.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I am a healthy 50-year-old mother of two. Every time I have an orgasm, I get a random, sharp headache that lasts for two days, complete with nausea. Should I see a doctor? I have been told that by four different doctors and each one looks at me as though I

came from outer space. What do you think?

DEAR READER: I think that your doctors are from outer space. Sexual excitement and orgasm can trigger migraines, headaches or dizziness in susceptible individuals. Find a doctor who is an ear, nose and throat doctor for a prescription for propranolol, a beta-blocker that often prevents migraines. You will probably have to take it daily, during your periods of sexual activity, until you've had your problem. Let me know what happens.



Under Florida law, a person may be arrested and charged with possession of a number of things which range from drugs or a concealed firearm to alcohol by a person under 21 or an altered driver's license. Possession crimes may be classified as first, second, or third degree felonies or misdemeanors depending mainly on the item possessed. In some cases, however, the classification of the alleged crime depends on the quantity of the item also, as in the case of drugs.

Possession of an item or items may be actual or constructive. A person is in actual possession of an item if the item is in the hand of or on the person, or in a bag or container in the hand of or on the person. Actual possession also exists when an item is so close as to be within ready reach of the person and is under the control of the person. Constructive possession, on the other hand, exists when, even if the item is

not in the hand or on the person, the person has dominion and control over the item, knows that the item is within the person's presence, and knows of the illicit nature of the item.

In constructive possession cases, whether the state's case will succeed or fail usually depends on whether the accused is in exclusive or joint possession of the premises in which the item is found. Whether the accused is in exclusive or joint possession of the premises is critical because if possession of the premises is exclusive,

knowledge of the presence of contraband may be inferred or assumed. In other words, if a person is found by him or herself in a car or apartment and contraband is found, a jury or judge may assume that the person had dominion and control of the item and that the accused knew of the presence of the item absent any other evidence. Subsequently, if the state proves beyond a reasonable doubt that the person knew of the illicit nature of the item, a conviction for constructive possession will stand.

However, if a person does not have exclusive possession of the premises, knowledge of the presence of contraband may not be inferred or assumed. The state must present other incriminating evidence to support the inference; mere proximity to the contraband, standing alone, will be insufficient to establish constructive possession. This incriminating evidence may include statements made by the

accused, the fact that the contraband was in plain view, or the fact that the accused fingerprints appear on the contraband.

Constructive possession exists when a person has dominion and control over an item, knows that the item is within the person's presence, and knows of the illicit nature of the item. Whether the state will be able to prove these elements usually will depend on whether the accused is in exclusive or joint possession of the premises where the contraband is found because of the legal inference which may be prohibited. In the coming weeks we will discuss other aspects of criminal law.

DEAR ABBY: Although you were right that "Emotionally Braided" should tell her mother how she feels, it may not resolve the problem. I followed that advice, and what followed was Mom calling me for several days, crying and saying I had "misunderstood" what she had said. The same pattern occurred again and again. If I spoke up, the crying began.



Sometimes you have to protect yourself from your own mother. You may have to accept that she will never change, so distance yourself. No one should have to take abuse. Continue to visit, but when she starts her lectures, say, "Sorry, Mom, I have to go," then make your exit and don't look back.

FEELER AND HAPPIER NOW

DEAR FREEE: Call me an optimist, but I thought confronting the offending parent and explaining how the criticism made her feel might be enough. There is no "one size fits all" answer to a problem like this, because each family are more dysfunctional than others. However, I would recommend avoiding the parent only as a last resort. Read on.

DEAR ABBY: My mother also constantly insulted me. I never

lived up to her standards. She disliked my friends, one in particular because her brother had gotten into trouble. My girlfriend never got into trouble. I never did, either. I never even smoked or drank.

I was always told that I'd be a failure and would never graduate from high school. Not only did I graduate, but I went on to two business schools, and was on the President's List and the honor roll.

When I met the man I eventually married, Mom hated him and made no bones about it. She tried to break us up whenever we visited her, and called on the telephone and tried to start something. When I learned it



The city had two water tanks, in the downtown area. The last one was torn down several years ago.
The tank will 100 feet tall. "It will definitely be visible from I-4," said Diaz. The height is necessary to match the pressure needed for the system.
The total budgeted cost of the project is \$800,000 and Diaz said the tower should be completed by December of this year.

The city commission will hear the request at its regular meeting tonight, beginning at 7 p.m.
Prior to the regular meeting, a joint work session will be held with the Local Planning Agency and the Planning and Zoning Board to make determinations on several planning and zoning issues.
The work session begins at 5. Both meeting will be held in commission chambers, Lake Mary City Hall, 100 N. Country Club Road.

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The way we were: Who's who in Sanford

Here are some additional biographies of those listed in "Who's Who in Sanford, 1933", a special edition of the *Sanford Herald* published April 29, 1933.

H.C. DuBose

H.C. DuBose, former county supervisor of registration, came to Sanford in 1909. He was continuing in real estate and insurance with an office on North Park Avenue.

Mr. DuBose was born in Shelby, Ala. and attended schools there and in Calomblana, Ala. He also studied at Anniston College.

He was a Rotarian and a member of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce and First Presbyterian Church.

The former Annie Walker was his wife and they resided at 600 Oak Ave. Their children were Mrs. R.C. Kinan, Hampton C., Jr., Mrs. Robert Axt, Frank and Marjorie.

In his leisure hours he read and he also enjoyed quail hunting.

(Mr. DuBose was also a charter member of the Fernald Laughten Memorial Hospital board in 1919 and served there in many capacities for several years. I taught his

grandson, Jimmy Dodson, son of his daughter, Marjorie DeBose Dodson.)

G.A. Speer, Jr.

George Algenon Speer Jr. was probably the youngest practicing attorney in Sanford in 1933. He was a member of a pioneer family who had only recently been admitted to the Bar. His office was located at 111 Magnolia Ave. and he was living with his parents at 700 Park Ave.

Algie Speer was born and raised in Sanford and was considered one of its most popular young men; he was as yet unmarried. His dad was an ardent hunter of game and Algie was also an enthusiastic hunter and lover of the outdoors.

He was a graduate of Seminole High School and later of Washington and Lee University

where he was an outstanding athlete in track and field.

He was a member of Phi Delta Phi, Pi Kappa Alpha and Omicron Kappa Delta and attended the Episcopal Church.

Mayor V.A. Speer

Vivian A. Speer, brother of George Algenon Speer Jr. mentioned above, had been associated in business with his father, G.A. Speer Sr., since he received his discharge from the navy in 1919. The Mayor and his father owned a local clothing store known as Speer and Sons.

Mayor Speer was born in Sanford and received his education here and later attended the Pan American Business College.

He was married to the former Daisy Betts; they and their son, George Andrew, age 9, lived at 511 Park Ave. He was a member of the American Legion, Sanford Kiwanis Club and Holy Cross Episcopal Church.

His political career began in 1928 when first elected to the city commission. He had recently been chosen mayor for the second time.

Mr. Speer enjoyed hunting and fishing and also attended football games regularly.

(I have known several of the members of the Speer family all my life, but was a little hazy on the relationships as their names are so similar. After a little research, I have straightened it out.

Dr. Algenon Sidney Speer was one of the first settlers in the area, receiving a homestead from the government in 1843. He had owned and operated a steamship line which ran from Jacksonville to Enterprise in the 1830's; he met his future wife, Mary Ginn, in Enterprise.

His homesteaded property later became Crow's Camp; he also had a home at Meltonville and 20th Street which became known as Speers Grove. He was drowned in 1857 during a storm in his boat "Tom Thumb."

Dr. Speer had four children, the oldest being Algenon S. Algenon's son was George Algenon Sr. who operated the above mentioned steamship with his second son, Vivian A. (the mayor), G.A. Speer, Sr. married May Edith Holmes. He died in a hunting accident in 1936.

George Algenon Speer Jr. (Algie) must have married Rose Hurt soon after the newspaper biography was written. They had two children, Tommy and Mary Rose. I was in school with both Tommy and his wife, Patty Walker. Tommy was in law practice with his dad and continues as an attorney in the same office on Magnolia Avenue. Many of you knew that Patty was diagnosed with heart cancer about a year ago and was not given much hope. After surgery and aggressive treatment, she was declared in remission in December. Truly a miracle.

You see that there were three attorneys in this family- Algie and his son, Tommy; George Andrew, son of Vivian and first cousin to Tommy.)

S.O. Shinholer

City commissioner, S.O. Shinholer had recently been elected to fill the unexpired term of Clyde A. Byrd, and operated a crate manufacturing mill at Grapeville. He had also had considerable experience as a building contractor both in Sanford and other sections.

During the building boom which had begun nine years before, he supervised the building of a number of structures located in the city's principal business district.

He was a past president of the Sanford Rotary Club and was a member of the Methodist Church and Chamber of Commerce.

He was married to the former Lily Farnsworth and they had four children: Clifford, Steve, Antonette and Edwin. Their home was at 1408 Oak Ave.

Mr. Shinholer was born near Macon, Ga. where he attended school. He also studied at Georgia Tech and Boston Tech. He came to Sanford in 1908 and for several years maintained his mill between the two railroad tracks just south of First Street. Later he moved into buildings on the lakefront and in 1933 operated the large mill southeast of the city.

His travels, principally on business, had taken him onto practically every state many times. His favorite sport was fishing for tarpon.

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



"So far, we have not received more animals than what we would consider normal," Whitmer said. "What may happen is that on Saturday, there may be an increase in adoptions at our shelter, from people who would normally go to the Humane Society. In that way, this may be a case of some good coming from something bad. Our animals may get more exposure."

Veterinarians are working to determine the cause of the illness.

A New Jersey-based long
distance company was or-

ny's network.

In a separate case before
the PSC, Long Distance Net-
work, Inc. was accused of
failing to pay its regulatory
assessment fees and failing to
respond to PSC inquiries.
Commissioners voted to can-
cel the company's long dis-
tance certificate.

Humane Society closes after dogs become sick

SANFORD - The Humane So-
ciety of Seminole County im-
plemented a self-imposed
quarantine this week after sev-
eral dogs became sick.

The shelter on County Home
Road closed its doors in a
move to guard against the pos-
sibility the dogs may have an
infectious disease, officials
said.

According to director Jeff
Cashatt, 17 of the 154 dogs at
the Humane Society compound
have become ill. Three pup-
pies, that were sick when they
arrived, have died.
During the quarantine, no

animals will be accepted or
adopted out. Instead, Semi-
nole County Animal Control at
232 Bush Blvd. will be accept-
ing and adopting animals that
would otherwise go through the
Humane Society.

The Humane Society hopes
to reopen in 10 days to two
weeks. Veterinarians trying to
determine the nature of the ill-
ness.

Two animals have tested
negative for the potentially
deadly Parvo virus, although
veterans have not ruled the vi-
rus out, Cashatt said.

Mike Whitmer, director of
Seminole County Animal Con-
trol, said the quarantine at the
Humane Society has not yet

New water tower on horizon for Lake Mary

LAKE MARY - A water tank
is on the horizon for Lake
Mary, literally.

City Manager John Litton
will ask the mayor and city
commissioners to approve a
work order with CPH Engi-
neers, Inc., in the amount of
\$80,930.50, for design, con-
struction inspection and en-
gineering fees for an elevated
water storage tank.

The 1-million gallon steel
tank would be constructed on
land the city recently pur-
chased from Seminole
County, between Lake Emma
Road and Skyline Drive.

In the work order docu-
ment, Rick Diaz, director of
public works, said continued
commercial and residential
growth in the southwest por-
tion of the city.

"The city desires to in-
crease system reliability by
providing an alternate supply
source, as well as to provide
increased fire flow for the
growing commercial and resi-
dential areas," Diaz states in
the work order.

Diaz said the elevated water
storage tank would also help
maintain system pressures and
reduce wear and tear on the
pumping and electrical
equipment, because of longer
cycle times at the water
treatment plant.

"This elevated storage tank
will benefit all customers of
the city wants to ensure
continuous service for the
area in times of crisis, such
as a water main break," said
Diaz.

Lake Mary water customers
are currently served by the
water plant on Rinehart Road.

Sanford man confesses

Suspect being held for two local robberies

SANFORD - A Sanford man
who tried to rob two area con-
venience stores in less than two
hours late Tuesday, was ar-
rested at his home on Sunny
Side Avenue just after 7 p.m.
Wednesday.

Although he initially denied
any guilt, Richard Thomas
Hamelin, 29, eventually told in-
vestigators he was responsible
for the robbery attempts at the
Lil Champ Store at 1119 E.
25th Street and at the 7-11 lo-
cated at 100 North French Ave.

Hamelin is in custody at the
Seminole County Jail on
charges of robbery fire-
arm/dangerous weapon and
petty/grand theft. Investigators
said that the weapon, which
was implied, has not been re-
covered.

They said that Hamelin at-
tempted to make the clerks be-
lieve he had a gun in his right
front pocket and that he would
shoot them if they didn't "Give
me all the money."

Shelly Betances, a clerk at
the 7-11, said that when Ham-
elin told her to give him all the
money she asked Are you jok-
ing? She gave him the money,
saying she feared for her life.

Hamelin wore a white base-
ball cap, a green jacket and

light colored pants. He was
positively identified by a confi-
dential informant as being the
white male in the surveillance
photos from the Lil Champ
store. Hamelin pointed himself
out in the photos from the Lil
Champ store. The surveillance
tape was recovered by crime
scene tech. officer Bill McMur-
rer. Investigator John Ramsey
made the arrest.

"This was a team effort by the
SPD's new investigative staff,"
Sanford Police Investigator Kris
Ziegler said.

She said that Hamelin had
several previous arrests but
had not been in trouble for sev-
eral years. The SPD's file on
Hamelin included a mug shot of
him smiling soon after being

apprehended.
Ziegler said that Hamelin got
\$57 at the Lil Champ store -
that a three packs of Marlboro
100's. Prior to the robbery,
Hamelin purchased a box of
candy and paid the clerk 30
cents. It is not know how much
he got at the 7-11, where he
also allegedly robbed a cus-
tomer.

The robbery at the Lil Champ
occurred at 11 p.m. on Tuesday,
and the one at the 7-11 at
12:30 a.m.

SPD Acting Chief Ray Bron-
son credited the investigative
staff with an "excellent" per-
formance in solving the two
robberies and getting Hamelin
behind bars. "This is an exam-
ple of the pro-active work that
is being accomplished here."

Donors needed at area blood banks

SEMINOLE COUNTY - The
area's blood supply - as the
nation's - is getting better after
a major scare at the start of
1999. Donors are very much
needed, however.

Mike Pratt, executive vice
president of tech services for
the Central Florida Blood Bank,
said Tuesday that a "serious
shortage" remains. In many
cases the hospitals have less
than a day's supply of blood.
"Hospital blood inventories are
extremely low," he said.

The American Red Cross and
American Blood Centers (such
as the Central Florida Blood
Bank) provide virtually all of
the nation's blood. They have
been doing so since the early
1940s when safe methods to
save blood were introduced.

The nation's blood supply
was so low that some cities re-
cently had to cancel elective
surgeries so that blood was on
hand during emergencies.

"This happened here, too,"
Pratt said. "Some elective sur-
geries - fixing this joint or that -
but nothing critical had to be
put off awhile."

Pratt said that those in
Seminole County wishing to
donate blood do not have to
come to the Central Florida
Blood Bank in Orlando. They
can donate at collecting
branches in Sanford, Longwood
and Altamonte Springs.

The Sanford branch is at
1302 East Second Street. It is
open Mondays and Wednes-
days 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and on
Thursdays from 11 a.m. to 7
p.m. Call (407) 322-0822.

The Longwood branch is
open Mondays, Wednesdays
and Fridays from 9 a.m. to 5
p.m. and on Tuesdays and
Thursdays from 11 a.m. to 7
p.m. Call (407) 280-9477.

The Altamonte branch is
open Tuesdays from 9 a.m. to 5
p.m. and Thursdays 11 a.m. to
7 p.m. Call (407) 831-6373.

"The response from these areas
has been good," Pratt said.
"We have a blood shortage this

time almost every year because
people get so busy around the
holidays we don't get the blood
we do at other times. Once ev-
eryone knows the gravity of the
shortage, we get back on track."

American Red Cross official
Michael Fulwider called this
year's blood shortage "the worst
we have experienced."

He said Atlanta, Washington,
D.C., Baltimore and Pittsburgh
had to postpone surgeries and
that other big cities were in the
same fix.

Bruce Lemes, medical director
for the Community Blood Cen-
ters of South Florida said that
in the midst of the crisis more
than 400 or 500 people needed
to give blood or the supply
would be so low that "somebody
would die because there was
not enough blood."
