# Panhandling ordinance for Sanford?

## Planning and zoning commissioners watching Orlando's proposal

**SANFORD** — A proposal to ban panhandling in sections of downtown Orlando is drawing interest in Sanford. Orlando Mayor Glenda Hood is pushing the proposal, which would restrict panhandling and other types of solicitation to approved "exempt zones," as part of a revitalization plan for her city's downtown.  
Hood's plan has caught the attention

of Ross Robert, a member of Sanford's Planning and Zoning Commission. Robert said it is too early to tell whether such a proposal will be made in Sanford, however, planning commissioners are closely watching the debate in Orlando.

"It's something that if it is successful in Orlando, I believe some one on the board, maybe even me, will ask the city staff to look into it," Robert said. "I think there are some issues we need to look at regarding downtown."

Reaction to such a proposal is mixed in downtown Sanford. While most business owners agree they don't want panhandling and solicitations occurring near their shops, several note there's not a substantial problem in downtown.  
"I just don't remember that being a big problem in Sanford," said Bill Painter, owner of the Colonial Room Restaurant. "One reason may be that there hasn't been that much walk-by traffic down-

## Ready, willing and able

### Sanford Corps of the Salvation Army purchases new trucks to respond to disasters

**SANFORD** — Since its inception in 1865 by William Booth, The Salvation Army (a branch of the Christian Church) has been saving souls and serving the humanitarian needs of communities around the world.

Each Christmas, volunteers manning kettles to help raise funds is a familiar sight to holiday shoppers. And when disaster strikes, the welcomed arrival of The Salvation Army Emergency Disaster Services Canteen can always be counted on.

Heading the Sanford Corps is Major Bruce Williams, Corps Officer. According to Williams, the Sanford Corps will be serving the needs of emergency crews, volunteers, and the community in a shining new canteen. In February the Army

purchased three new vehicles for the sum of \$100,000 each. The Army's revenue, he said, comes from public and internal support, Heart of Florida United Way, and government support. The total income for the Corps in

Seminole County during 1999 was \$938,512. Williams said the canteen's are capable of serving around 900 meals a day.

Florida, he explained, has about 44 canteens and is considered the best in the world for responding to a disaster. Response time to any emergency situation is between 6 to 8 hours.

"We'll be there as long as the people need us," he remarked. The fires during the summer of 1998, he said, was a very stressful time.

"We had three canteens working 24-hours a day for 72 hours," Williams explained. And last September when Hurricane Floyd arrived, the Salvation Army served 1,310 meals within a 72 hour period.

According to Williams, during a major disaster the canteen will serve breakfast, lunch, and dinner each day for as long as they are needed.

The Sanford Corps is staffed by 12 full-time employees and a large number of volunteers. Williams pointed out that the food is more than coffee and doughnuts. He said that a member of one disaster crew remarked that "we raised disaster feeding to a new level."

At the Sanford Corps, Carol Earley is the person responsible for the exceptional cuisine. The holiday season is another special time of giving for the Salvation Army. Last year between Thanksgiving and Christmas over 1,600 needy

## Term limits brings 65 freshmen to state house

**LAKE MARY** — State Representative Tom Feeney isn't worried about the effect term limits will have on the state legislature.

In fact, the speaker designate for the Florida House of Representatives spoke with an air of excitement when he discussed the subject during a speech he presented Thursday to members of the Seminole County/Lake Mary Regional Chamber of Commerce.  
"I'm not worried at all," Feeney said. "And, the good

news is we have some good senior leaders like Pat Patterson ... who will help the new members."

The Chamber invited Feeney, who represents District 33, to its Legislative Luncheon to discuss the effects of Florida's new

restriction on how many years an individual can serve in state government. Feeney, who was first elected in 1990, is an attorney who resides in Oviedo when he isn't in the state capital.

## Commissioners need longer to approve 2001 budget

**SANFORD** — It is going to take an additional work session by the Board of Seminole County Commissioners to adopt the 2000/2001 budget.

On Friday, it completed three days of budget talks with the department heads and the county's constitutional officers.

Sheriff Don Ealinger, followed a successful vice raid by his office and three other law enforcement agencies, with a renewed effort to procure a 14-percent hike in starting salaries for sworn deputies and for a number of other sheriff's office personnel.

County Manager Kevin Grace said Friday that the budget workshop extension may be held next week. The Board has more than 100 items on its hearing agenda

Tuesday. Other than the inclusion of payroll adjustments for deputies, county officials need to resolve a decision on a \$1 million purchase of Winter Miles Park. Grace said payments would be split on a three-year basis — some \$333,000 per year.

Another item that needs approval is a senior citizen tax break for low-income individuals.

"It would be similar to the Homestead exemption," Grace said. Grace said discussions will continue on the purchase of additional property near the Sheriff's Office off U.S. Highway 17-92.

The total budget of \$470,454,786 stays in place, however. "This means a slight decrease in taxes," Grace said.

**SANFORD** — Any Seminole County residents not running for a commissioner's seat in Election 2000 might want to have their pulses checked. A record 17 candidates qualified Friday, truly establishing Seminole County as Florida's choicest jurisdiction.

Incumbents Grant Maloy (District 1), Dick Van Der Weide (District 3) and Daryl McLain (District 5) are being challenged by everyone but their wives and children.

Don Ealinger, the county sheriff for 10 years, seeks a third re-election against Richard Beary, who is leaving his job as Lake Mary Chief of Police. Ealinger has the backing of the Seminole Republican Party; Beary is running without a political party affiliation.

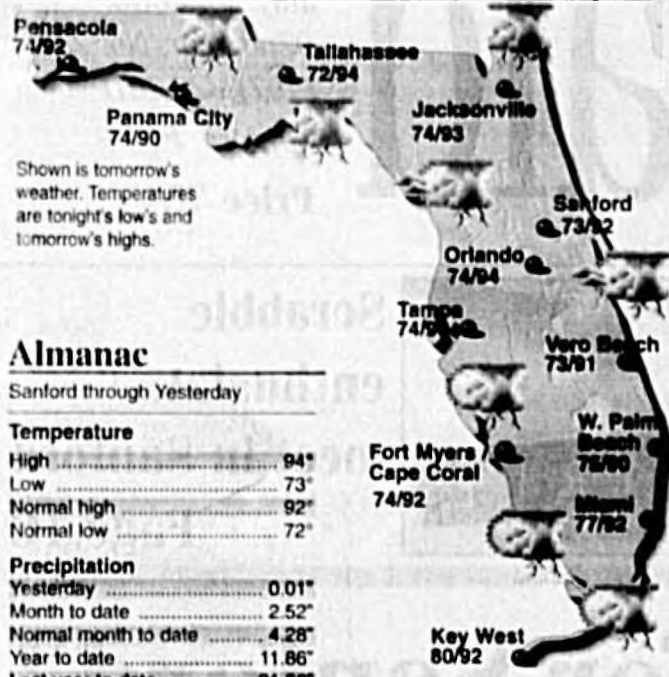
What makes the 2000 Election field so crowded — and diverse — is that a number of Democrats, Libertarians and not-partisan candidates have infiltrated the Republican stronghold. New rules and voter interest could result in big election turnouts.

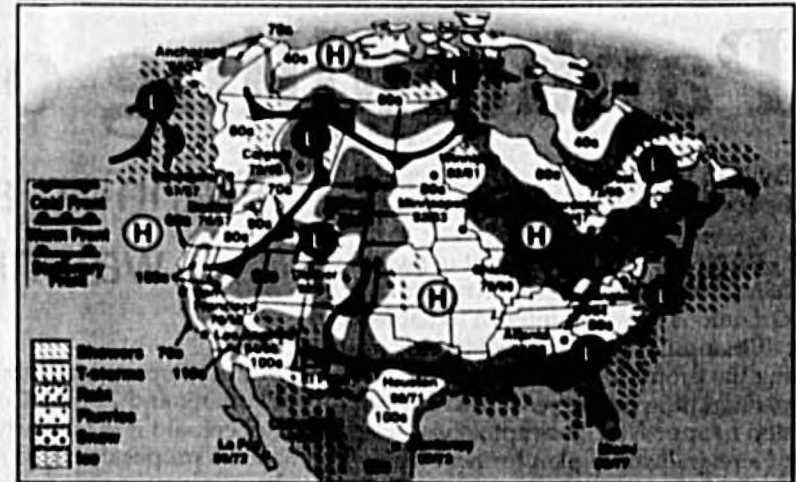

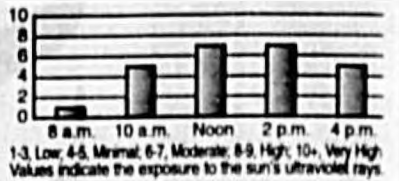

## Stealth attack Federal government tears away at privacy

First, there were the British officials who searched, whenever they chose, the homes and businesses of the American colonists. The helpless fury these searches caused led to our Fourth Amendment to the Bill of Rights. That amendment requires that law-enforcement agents, to obtain a search warrant, must show that there is probable cause that a crime has been or will be committed. They must also list in the warrant the specific persons or things to be searched.

Then the imperious J. Edgar Hoover authorized what were called "black-bag jobs" — secret, warrantless searches by FBI agents in the name of national security. According to the Senate's Church Committee report, there were hundreds of "black-bag jobs."

Now, Sen. Orrin Hatch of Utah, or his staff, has slipped into a methamphetamine bill — which passed the Senate on November 19, 1999, by unanimous consent — a provision that brutally undercuts the privacy protections of the Fourth Amendment. I've asked the staff members of the few senators who support civil liberties whether those senators knew what they were voting on, and I'm told that it went right by them — except for Sen. Patrick Leahy of Vermont.

Hatch's provision would allow federal law-enforcement agents to search your office, home or apartment while you're away, seize or copy things, and not tell you what they've taken for 90 days. Indeed, they could ask a judge to extend the period during which you're not notified for many more days.

You would only find out what they've taken or copied if they decide to prosecute you. The way the provision is worded tells you how sneaky it is. It's called "Notice Clarification." The clarification is that the raid is secret, carried out while you're away, and you don't get any notice of it until 90 days or more later.

There's more. If the federal agents take something that is "intangible," they don't even have to inform you about what they have seized. For instance, they can read what is on your computer screen and copy it. That's "intangible" material.

What happens if they make a copy of the hard drive of your computer? Georgetown University law professor Paul Rothstein tells *Lawyers Weekly* that "that's also probably intangible."

I am told that the president and the Justice Department support this assault on the Constitution, but the Department says it has reached no decision yet. In any case, defense attorney Stephen Glassroth notes, "Those behind the provision are trying to get in the back door something they couldn't get in the front."

The "Notice Clarification" provision has not yet passed the House. As of this writing, it's still before the Judiciary Committee chaired by Henry Hyde of Illinois. Bob Barr of Georgia — the most vigilant defender of privacy in Congress — is trying to get it killed.

But even if the House does not approve this provision, Hatch or another member of the Senate can slip it into an omnibus Senate-House conference report on appropriations bills for multiple federal agencies. Because a conference report is an agreement between the two chambers, it cannot be amended on the floor of the House or the Senate.

Benjamin Franklin said, "Those who can give up essential liberty to obtain a little temporary safety deserve neither liberty nor safety." Tell that to your representatives and senators before it's too late.

## Civil-rights party line not for all black Americans

The scornful rhetoric had a familiar tone and rhythm: "weak-kneed, shifty-eyed, back-bending legislators." Those were the insults that the president of the NAACP, Kweisi Mfume, heaped upon black South Carolina lawmakers who had agreed to a compromise that moved the Confederate flag from atop the state capitol earlier this month.

Because the compromise with flag defenders kept the Confederate battle flag on the grounds of the South Carolina statehouse, the NAACP remains disapproving and says it will continue its boycott against the state. Mfume didn't use the words "Uncle Tom" or "oreo" or "handkerchief head" to describe black lawmakers who agreed to the compromise, but the inference

was the same. He meant to suggest they were fools and lackeys doing the bidding of powerful whites.

How disappointing. Mfume, a former Maryland congressman who has been the organization's president for four years, was expected to bring to the NAACP a style of leadership that was visionary and inspiring but also moderate and pragmatic. His response to the flag compromise was anything but.

There are good reasons to criticize a Southern state that cannot let go of the Confederate battle flag, which is nothing more than a symbol of white supremacy and Southern resistance to the Union. As such, it represents not only racism but also treason. It has no business flying above the capitol

of a state government that supposedly respects the U.S. Constitution.

It might also be argued that the Confederate battle flag doesn't have any business anywhere on the grounds of a state capitol. After all, the grounds still represent the state of South Carolina and the people — all the people, black, white and brown — who are its citizens.

But Mfume did not stop at criticizing the compromise. He ascribed to the black legislators those traits assigned to the least heroic blacks in American folklore — the hapless buffoons who accommodate any demand made by powerful whites. Underneath his litany of insults was an echo of an old canard: Any African-American who dares disagree with the civil-rights party line has betrayed the race.

South Carolina's black legislators were in an unenviable position. Their state was losing tourist dollars because of the

NAACP-inspired boycott and becoming a national laughing-stock. Concerned with the prosperity and general welfare of all the state's citizens, South Carolina's black lawmakers could not have helped wanting an end to the controversy.

Yet as African-Americans, they were also painfully aware of the history of the Confederate flag, which was only hoisted above the South Carolina state capitol in 1962, as the civil rights movement was gaining ground. It flew there for 38 years as a gesture of defiance in the face of the struggle for black equality.

A similar quandary faces Georgia's black lawmakers, who may find themselves engulfed in a flag controversy during the next legislative session. Georgia's state flag incorporates the St. Andrew's cross and stars, which is the insignia on the Confederate battle flag as well. The Georgia

## The real Hillary question: Is she a superior American?

She thinks she's better than us.

That's the decisive issue in this year's New York Senate race. It's not policy or politics or personality. It's how voters react to how Hillary Rodham Clinton views herself.

The first lady does not offer herself — both ally and critic agree — as one of the people, another kid-made-good from the neighborhoods. "One of the top hundred lawyers in the country!" declared her earliest notices. A graduate of Wellesley and Yale law, she entered the White House as the most educated first lady in history. We were getting, the new first lady herself let us know, two leaders of presidential stature for the price of one.

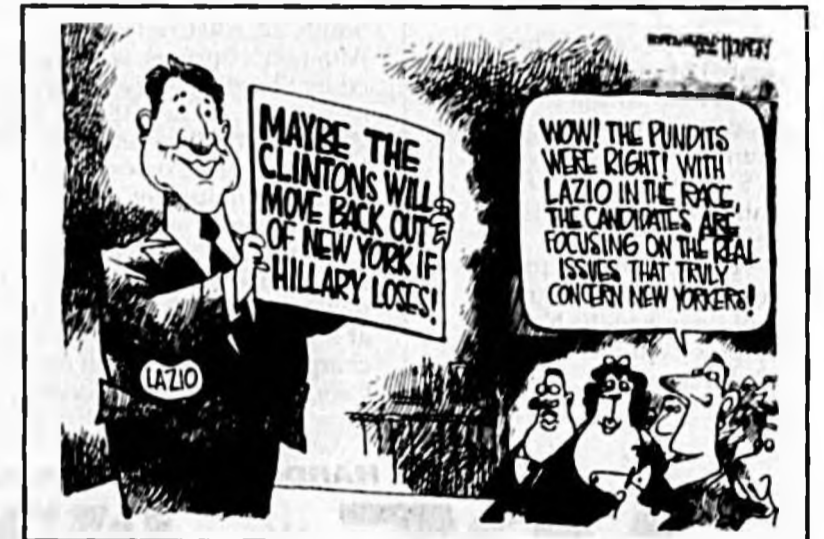
We're talking about more than diplomas and IQ here. As a Senate candidate, Mrs. Clinton has brandished an image of unquestioned moral superiority. Who can forget her first sighting as a New York politician — that smart, gutsy barnstorming for '98 Senate candidate Chuck Schumer? Far from being a player in the Clinton cover-up, here was its

prime casualty, a woman carrying on the fight amid the mortification wrought by her own husband's outlandish misconduct.

Many people, including some close to me, see Hillary entirely in this light. They look up to her as their champion, smart enough to be future president, strong and downright good enough to put up with a current president's weaknesses. What other woman have they known with such spunk, such panache, such nerve, such pristine, state-of-the-art political goodness?

This is the stellar premise that will decide the contest for those not bound by unblinking party loyalty. It explains as much as anything the uproar this week over what Mrs. Clinton said or didn't say on election night in Little Rock a full 26 years ago.

I'm sorry, but most Americans, and that includes most politicians, do, on occasion, get angry. Whether it's on the highway after having someone cut you off or in the heat of a hard-fought political campaign, real people do let loose



with every verbal arrow in their quiver. Only a politician claiming an extraordinary moral and cultural stature would claim to be above such explosions of expletives, not excluding the ethnic variety.

Yet this is the message that President Clinton delivered the other day by phone to the editors at the New York Daily News. He told them that Hillary is innocent, not just in this pathetic claim of 26 years ago, but that she is totally innocent: She has never, at any time, ever voiced a negative thought about any ethnic, religious or racial group. If we believe her

claim, no such thought has even entered her head. Ever!

This is the enduring, dominating question of this campaign. If Hillary is truly a superior American figure, she may well deserve to be the United States senator from New York. If she isn't, but thinks she is, that may be a presumption even this liberal, welcoming state may be unwilling to ratify.

# Having it all but still coming up short

Peggy Orenstein knows things about my life that I would never in a billion years tell her, which makes having lunch with her both unsettling and compelling. We're eating Thai food in Berkeley and talking about her new book, "Flux: Women on Sex, Work, Love, Kids, and Life in a Half-Changed World" (Doubleday Books).

She interviewed 200 women over the last four years, hoping to make sense of the "conflicted voice" she kept hearing from women. What she found was a chorus of unspoken secrets, the things women (for as much as we talk) don't tell each other — either because we think we're the only ones who feel or think such things or because the stories don't fit the neat, politically correct vision we want to have of ourselves. Orenstein's interviewees talk about what it's really like in our marriages once we have children.

How we judge other women who make different choices from our own. How we fear undermining our careers if we get married and have children — yet fear being alone if we don't. How we struggle to reconcile the promise of our teen years — women can and should have it all! — with the guilt and confusing disappointment of falling short as adults.

"Beneath the boundless optimism," Orenstein writes, "lies a sneaking suspicion that the rhetoric of 'choices' is in part a con job, disguising impossible dilemmas as matters of personal preference. As these young women look forward, they see 'choices' threatening to morph into cruel trade-offs... that could ultimately trap them in the narrow roles they're expected to escape." For me, the book was like reading my own diary projected through the prism of

dozens of other women. "The fear of being a bad mother is like kryptonite," Orenstein is saying at lunch, touching on a particularly vulnerable topic for many women. "The impossible standards women set for themselves reminded me of the teen-aged girls I used to interview who, no matter what they weighed, saw themselves as fat.

"There should be a 'perfect mother' equivalent to an eating disorder. I kept wondering as I talked to women, 'How good does a mother have to be before (she) feels good enough?'"

"We 'micro-manage like crazy' and 'go to superhuman lengths' to allay our fears of being the bad mother, to 'prove our devotion to an invisible chorus of critics.' As much as we talk about wanting an egalitarian relationship with our husbands, we tend to guard jealously our control over child-rearing, treating husbands as assistants to our chiefs.

As one 31-year-old filmmaker told Orenstein, "It's like I'm caught in this whole dynamic. I want to put the baby to bed, and

yet I want him to do it. I want to be in charge of the bills, but I want him to do it. It's like I want power over all these things. And I try to give them up, I do. But it's hard for me. I guess I want to have control over everything."

I asked Orenstein how she changed while writing the book. She's 38, married and hoping to start a family. In the midst of her research, she was diagnosed with breast cancer (for which she underwent a lumpectomy and radiation). But she says her reporting work changed her more than her brush with death.

She says she understands now that there's no easy villain anymore for women. She understands that sometimes the choices women make — the ones we often stand in judgment of — are not really choices at all.

"I was looking for a road map for myself," Orenstein says, "and I realized there wasn't one. Today, we have to define for ourselves what's success and what's failure."

Legislature adopted that flag in 1956, in a similarly confrontational gesture toward the budding civil rights movement.

Ultimately, only 10 of South Carolina's 33 black lawmakers voted for the flag compromise, which had the effect of removing the Confederate battle flag from the state's most prominent pinacle. For that, they deserve, if not wholehearted applause, at

least respectful disagreement. Mfume obviously believes that the defenders of the Confederacy ought to get over their old ways of thinking. He's right. But Mfume needs to get over the notion that any African-American who doesn't mouth the party line is somehow not really black. The time is past for that as well.

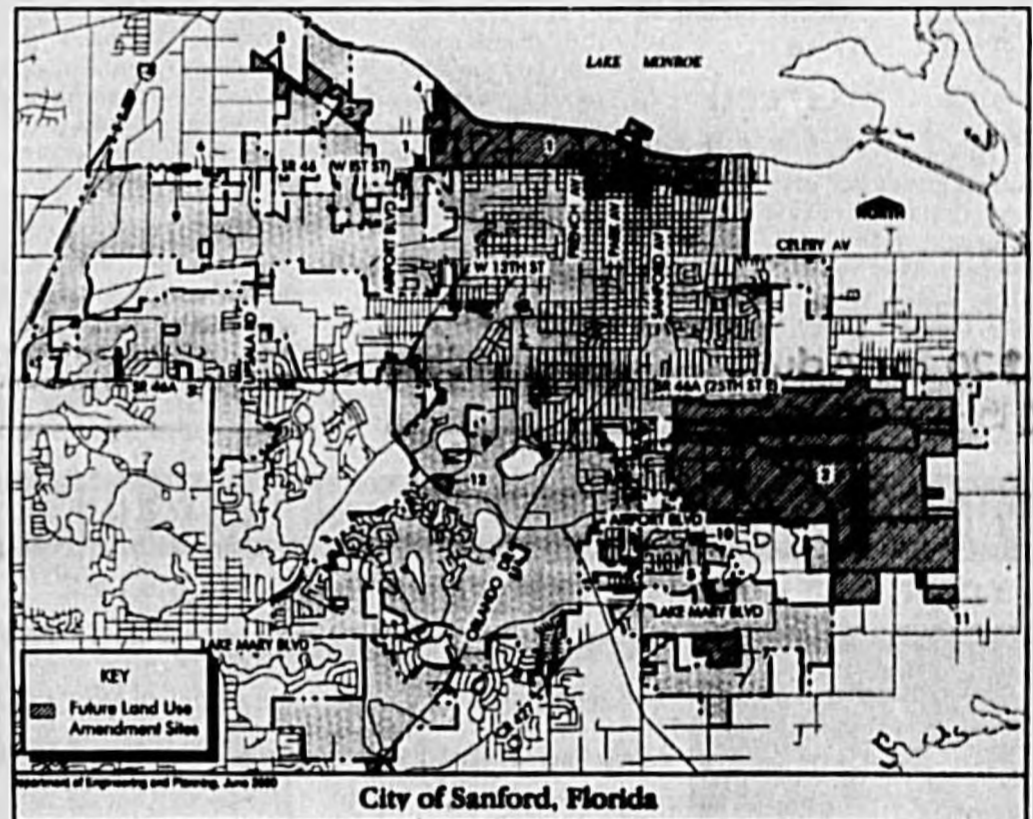

There will be a long list of new names on the House's roster following the upcoming election. According to Feeney there will be 65 freshmen representatives heading to Tallahassee next year as a result of term limits.

The term limit regulation was

first approved in 1992 when 77 percent of Florida voters changed the state constitution to limit state politicians to eight years in office. Term limits also apply to the state's elected Cabinet officers.

Although the amendment was challenged, the state Supreme

Court recently upheld the decision, which means more than one-third of the 160 members in the House and Senate are barred from seeking re-election in November.

"Of the 120 members of the House, 18 to 20 were freshmen following the last election," Feeney said. "This time, there will be 65 freshmen."

Although it is hard for a "freshmen" to be effective in all areas of the House during their first few years, Feeney said many new representative will find an area where they may excel with the help of senior legislators.

"A majority of the members will be brand new, but we will match them up to where they have talent," Feeney said. "There is no reason to worry. The ride ahead is going to be fascinating."

## New way of paving better for environment

Anyone who lives or works in East Pasco County knows the problem of dust. Just drive down one of the many dirt roads and see how the corridor has the appearance of a winter wonderland. The trees and whatever else happens to be along the road are white, but not with snow, this is 90-degree Florida. They are white with dust.

There's no doubt that dirt roads are a problem. In addition, increased population and the corresponding increased traffic continue to make the problem worse.

Beyond the obvious problems, the rain also causes the loose materials to runoff into our water systems, polluting our water supply and especially creating a hazard for fish and other wildlife depending on pure water.

To make matters worse, if you are an asthma sufferer or have any other breathing problems, dust can be a killer. What can be done?

Enter Zephyr Stripe and Seal Inc. This Zephyrhills hometown business has been testing an environmentally friendly way to solve the problem of dust. For about three years Zephyr Stripe and Seal has been investigating

the use of a petroleum emulsified resin-based product called Pennzsuppress D.

Pennzsuppress D was developed in Johnstown, Pa., by the Pennzoil company. It works by bonding aggregate materials - that is, the small rocks and particles that grind into dust - together so that dust is suppressed and the soil is stabilized.

Tad Wheeler, vice-president and son of President and founder Don Wheeler has headed up the project to develop a safe, environmentally sound way of defeating dust. Wheeler is an asthma sufferer himself. He was concerned about health issues. "Because of the growing number of asthma cases from the dust and everything in the air," he said, "we looked for a solution."

After researching several methods, that solution turned out to be Pennzsuppress D. A large amount of time and effort has been put into finding a solution. Test plots at The Zephyr Stripe and Seal plant site were used to see how other ideas held up. The senior Wheeler said "it's got to please us before it pleases the customer."

"Pennzsuppress has met up to our standards," Tad said.

Pennzsuppress D looks like chocolate syrup in its undiluted form and smells like motor oil and while it wouldn't do well on ice cream it does wonders on dusty road.

It contains no asphalt or solvents. It is non-hazardous and non-carcinogenic. It is not corrosive to metals (that means it won't stick to your car and ruin the paint job like other dust-suppressing measures.)

While Pennzsuppress D is mixed with water at a 4:1 ratio for application, once it bond with the materials, the water evaporates and it becomes "non-hygroscopic," that is, it won't mix with water and wash away, but what does get into the runoff through wear is environmentally safe. A treatment lasts about six-months.

Zephyr Stripe and Seal is attempting to convince Pasco County to try out their product. They've got a good argument. Maintaining one mile of dirt road cost \$14,000 a year. Using Pennzsuppress D is cheaper and you don't have wear and tear on machinery and the morale of the road-using taxpayer improves.

Seminole County called them and they have treated one mile of road in two different soil conditions. The Wheelers are happy to do business with anyone, but," Tad said, "We would like to target the City of Zephyrhills,

because it is home."

The Wheelers are very community conscious and want to be able to give back to the town that helped them to grow. From the beginnings in 1990, Zephyr Stripe and Seal has grown to be ranked No. 22 in the nation in the sealing industry and No. 45 in the nation in the pavement marking industry. Once located in the middle of town, they outgrew their location and built a bigger plant now located at 4103 Mowrey Rd. across the street from the Pasco County library on SR 54W. They moved in 1999.

"I know that sounds harsh. I'd like to see these folks get some help, but the street is not the place to get it."

Carey Ferrell, owner of Arts and Ends Antique Shop, said panhandling has decreased in recent years, and he doesn't want to see it return.

"Use to, you couldn't go outside without someone hitting you up with a hard-luck story," Ferrell said. "One guy came up to me and told me he was passing through and had run out of gas. I told him, 'You sure run out of gas a lot. You gave me that same story a couple of days ago.'"

Ferrell agreed with Knight that the problem lies not with the truly needy, but rather the

"professional" panhandlers.

"Somebody who is in a bad way, I feel for them," Ferrell said. "But there are a lot of these guys who are professionals, and they're annoying."

"It's not like there's not help for people who really need food or clothing," he added. "We've got churches in the area who feed people. We've got the shelter over on 13th Street. We've got the Salvation Army. There's help out there."

Without any data, City Commissioner Brady Lessard said he questioned whether such an ordinance is needed, or even if it would be effective in Sanford.

"I think Orlando has got problems significantly different

than Sanford," said Lessard, whose district includes the downtown area. "I know some merchants have experienced problems with panhandlers in the past, but I don't think it's as bad as it was. I also think it's a seasonal thing. If it's a harsh winter up north, then Sanford, just like cities throughout the South, will see an increase in this type of activity."

"Is it something we need an ordinance for, or can it be solved some other way? I don't know yet."

# The Way We Were: Expressway Authority forms in 1975

I recently came across a Friday, January 10, 1975 copy of the "Seminole Sentinel," a section of the "Orlando Sentinel Star" and thought some of the information there would be of interest.

## Seminole County Expressway Authority Formed

The newly formed Seminole County Expressway Authority held its first meeting January 8, 1975 at which time County Commissioner Mike Hattaway was elected chairman and commission administrative assistant, Betty Simcoe was elected Secretary-treasurer. The group included the five county commissioners and two city representatives from Winter Springs and Lake Mary. The commissioners were Dick Williams, Harry Kwiatkowski, John Kimbrough, Hattaway and Sidney Vihlen, Jr., chairman. The other representatives on the authority were not named.

During the meeting there was controversy over the hiring of Tom Freeman as legal counsel as it was charged that this might be a conflict of interest if he represented different government bodies at the same time. Freeman explained that if there were the slightest suggestion of conflict he would seek advice from the ethics committee of the Florida Bar. The authority elected the firm on a 3-2 vote.

Freeman was then asked to research legislation to determine if the authority could use county stationery and other facilities in its business. He was also requested to determine what city and county funds could be used by the Authority if a budget was needed prior to initiation of a major project.

The next meeting was scheduled for February 19 at which time the discussion would center around the Orlando area beltway, whether it was practical and logical and if so, where it would be going. DOT officials would be asked to attend.

Many of you remember that Charlie Reese was the regular columnist in the "Seminole Sentinel" for many years. In this addition, he was touting the Sanford Airport, and much of what he reported is similar to what we're hearing today—just the figures today are larger.

Raines and Kelly will now work to stay in shape and wait to see if Team USA manager Tommy Lasorda, the former Los Angeles Dodgers long-time skipper, will give them an opportunity to make the squad and give Raines the chance to win a Gold Medal which would be another feather in the cap of Sanford's favorite son.

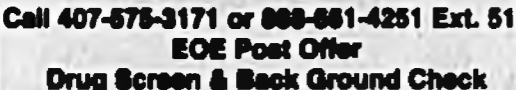

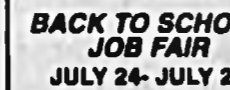
