

### British Are Attacked By Air Raiders

Initiative and get up steam what may be a renewed attempt to attack Finland in half at the 185-mile-wide "wasp" waist between the Russian border and the Gulf of Bothnia.

There were reports that Vilho, Finland's second largest city, 80 miles north of the Karelian battlefield, had been set on fire by Russian long-range guns but no official confirmation was available.

It was pointed out, however, that Vilho had been an almost daily target of the Russian big guns since Christmas, resulting in numerous fires.

A Finnish spokesman denied last night, in commenting on foreign reports of Finnish "reverses," that the Russians had broken through the Mannerheim line at any point.

The Russian assaults against the line at Summa, preceded by mortar, artillery fire and led by more than 200 tanks and armored "Trojan horse" sledges, were said to have been shattered by the sure fire of Finnish artillery and machine-guns.

With each fresh onslaught, it was stated, the Finns moved back among the frozen bodies of several thousand of their comrades killed in previous attacks. Russian planes attempted to come to the aid of the attackers but were driven off by Finnish planes, military reports said.

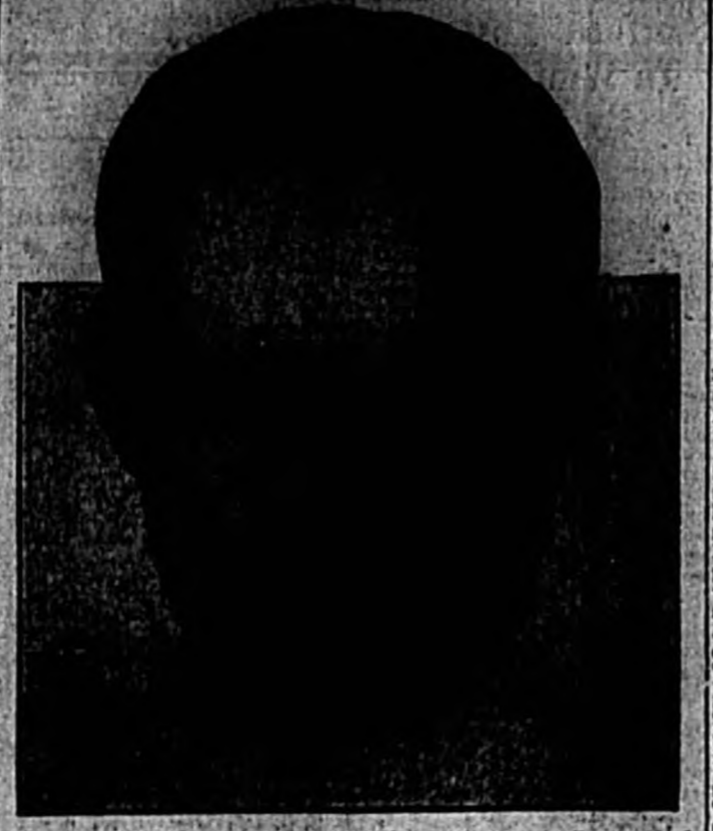
Scandinavian dispatches told of heavy losses on both sides in heavy fighting southeast of Kuumo where the Red army's 54th division was said to be thrusting toward Nurmes vital terminus of railroad lines running south to Helsinki and Karalis and westward to the Gulf of Bothnia.

Several thousand of the Communist soldiers were said to have been killed during the Christmas holidays. The Finnish command announced the defeat of an enemy battalion—about 1000 men—which tried to cross the border south of Kuumo where the 44th division met.

About 250 Russians were killed in the Suomussalmi battle and great quantities of war materials were taken by the Finns, it was stated.

In the direction of Kuumo our troops improved their positions, last night's communique said.

### Chickens, Eggs Aid Farm Living, Income

In good times and bad, eggs in the basket and chickens in the market coop are cash for farmers. That's what the Agricultural Marketing Service says in pointing out that the chicken-and-egg industry has a significant influence on the living standards of farm families.

According to the Service, chickens and eggs have long been a principal source of cash income for meeting current household expenses. Just how important is indicated by the fact that approximately 86 percent of all farms in the United States produce eggs and chickens. In each of the past 4 years families living on these farms received close to a billion dollars of cash from the sale of eggs and chickens.

The farm poultry industry has a reputation as a relatively stable industry. The depression years emphasized its importance in the farm economy, for they were years in which poultry and eggs did more than their full share in supplying cash income to farm folk.

In 1937 and 1938 poultry products ranked fourth as a source of farm income. In those years they were exceeded only by milk, cattle and calves, and hogs in their returns to farmers. They ranked not only above every other major agricultural commodity but above the combined income from large groups such as all grains, all vegetables and all fruits.

## U.S. Peace Moves Meet Restrained European Reaction

### Cautious Eyes Cast On Forthcoming Factfinding Tour Of Summer Welles

### Finns Repel Red Attacks

### Soviet Shortage Of Munitions Seen In Use Of Grenades

Europe today cast cautious eyes on Washington's new peace moves, the forthcoming fact finding tour by the State Department's number two man and discussions with neutrals on problems of a future world peace.

The restraint of reaction was quickly explained on a basis that the war aims of belligerents have been outlined several times while the full aims of the tour of Undersecretary of State Sumner Welles were rather vague.

One of the small neutrals, the Netherlands, decided to hold three battalions for the defense of her colonies in the East Indies. Their demobilization kept in readiness after a series of Russian military moves in the west to help and head movements to force back furious onslaughts on the Karolinska Islands.

The British said they saw evidence of a definite Russian military move also in the use of military shells of all sizes and hand grenades instead of bombs in the attack on the city of Leningrad.

Today British fighters took to the air when an unidentified plane appeared off the coast. The aircraft turned out to have been a false alarm.

## Federal Judge Holds Wage Law Constitutional

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Feb. 10.—Federal Judge Frank J. Murphy today upheld constitutionality of the federal wage-control law.

The federal wage-control law, which restricts the freedom of contract between employer and employee in industries deemed to be "essential to the health, safety or interest of the community," was upheld by Judge Murphy in a decision rendered today.

## WPA Project For Road Widening To Cost \$122,958

### Williams Prepares Application For Orange Boulevard

A WPA project providing for an expenditure of \$122,958 for the widening of Orange Boulevard and the Markham Road has been prepared by Engineer Fred T. Williams and will be forwarded to the area office next week.

Orange Boulevard connects Lake Monroe with State Road No. 44 at Wilson Corners while the Markham Road runs from Paola to Markham. Both of these projects are in District No. 2.

The road from Lake Monroe will be widened from the present nine-foot to 15 feet for 2.4 miles and two concrete culverts will be constructed—one over Bell Ditch and another over the Mike Smith ditch.

The drainage ditches along this road will be dug to the St. Johns River in order to prevent overflow on the prairie land which is being used as pasture land along the river.

While the present nine-foot road which comprises Orange Boulevard will be made into an 18-foot macadam road, the project provides for the widening of the Markham road by making clay shoulders. This road will be widened to Markham and thence north to State Road No. 44, a total of 3.14 miles.

There will be no new rights-of-way required for the road improvement but in some instances easements for cutting ditches across the private lands of the County, Mr. Williams pointed out.

The County's share of this project, according to the application prepared by Mr. Williams, is \$77,914.14, while the federal contribution for the work is \$45,038.84.

## Surveys Indicate Citrus Loss Is 14,714,000 Boxes

### Report Says Florida Fruit Damaged More Than That Of Texas

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—(AP)—The agricultural department reported yesterday that preliminary surveys indicated the total citrus loss from the freeze in Florida and Texas was around 14,714,000 boxes.

Careful checking, it said, will be necessary to determine actual damage in the two states.

"Damage was most severe in Florida where present indications, the report added, point to approximate losses of 1,000,000 boxes of oranges, 1,400,000 boxes of grapefruit and 600 boxes of tangerines.

"In Texas it appears that about 2,500,000 boxes of grapefruit and 200,000 boxes of oranges were lost."

The department estimated that the United States orange crop for the 1939-40 season, as a result of the freeze, would be cut about 10 percent under its January estimate, and grapefruit 10 percent.

The department said the country's orange production for marketing last season was 1,400,000 boxes.

## FDR, Garner Enter Races In 2 States

### Names Of Each Have Been Entered In Primaries In Wisconsin, Illinois

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—(AP)—Two great tests of political strength between President Roosevelt and Vice President Garner were virtually assured yesterday for early April.

In both Illinois and Wisconsin, the names of each were entered in preferential presidential primaries which many expect to prove the most critical tests of an intensive pre-convention campaign.

The results political experts thought, would prove of great importance, not only in that they would show the feeling of a vast sector of the middle west, but because they might indicate the relative vote-getting abilities of the two.

The Illinois primary is merely advisory, but that in Wisconsin is binding on delegates to the Democratic convention.

Apparently, only a conclusive statement from President Roosevelt withdrawing himself from consideration could avert the contests and some were of the opinion that even that could not stop them, so determined are the leaders of the draft-Roosevelt movement.

While Washington was discussing these developments, declined again to answer a question on his 1940 plans, and also renewed a controversy with Thomas E. Dewey, a leading Republican aspirant, on the extent of the public and private debt in the United States.

Roosevelt insisted the total debt figure had declined as much as \$2,000,000,000 since the end of the war.

"The material other countries are supplying is equally good and possibly even more up-to-date than that coming from the United States."

"Finland's two great needs are aircraft and heavy guns. Our delegation is convinced that if the Finns can get delivery in the next two months on aircraft and heavy guns, they will be able to fight off any foreign invader, it is quite in the cards for them to become masters of the air."

"The United States could perform a very great service if it would send more planes than it intends to send."

Garner announced on Monday his entry in the Wisconsin election, while yesterday Julius F. Smetanka, a Chicago attorney, said he was ready to file a petition bringing the vice president's name into the Wisconsin contest.

At Chicago, yesterday former Governor Landon of Kansas criticized the President, saying he was taking "an irresponsible, adolescent attitude toward perhaps the most important question before the country today."

Landon made this comment on the President's sharp remark last week that he was getting tired of attempts to sound out his intentions and that he would choose his own time to disclose his course.

## British Aid Finns With Volunteers

### More Than Eight Thousand Foreigners Are Enrolled In Fighting Ranks

LONDON, Feb. 10.—(AP)—Several hundred British volunteers have arrived in Finland to fight against the Russian invaders and have swelled the number of foreigners in the Finnish ranks to about 8,000, it was reported yesterday.

Simultaneously it was disclosed that Great Britain and the United States are in consultation on means of bolstering Finland's resistance with shipments of supplies.

The 8,000 foreign volunteers in the Finnish fighting ranks was said here to include more than 5,500 Swedes and 1,000 Norwegians with the remainder mostly Danes, Dutch, French, Belgians and Poles.

The question of foreign aid for Finland became more acute with two developments: 1. London and Washington were exchanging information regarding assistance to Finland, which is using United States credit for the purchase of non-military supplies while relying mainly on Great Britain and Sweden for armaments.

Sir Walter Gifford, head of a British labor mission to Finland, called a press conference yesterday after his return to announce that the United States was lagging far behind other nations in the supply of arms.

He said he had been told by high Finnish authorities that the highest grades of gasoline were being shipped to Russia, at least until recently, from the United States.

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Attorney-General Jackson last night told the much-criticized American Youth congress, which Republican National Committee Chairman Hamilton refused to address, that the "world of today lives in a glass house and is not privileged to throw stones at those who are to follow."

He spoke at the first session of the congress' four-day citizenship institute, which will be addressed tomorrow by President and Mrs. Roosevelt and President Lewis of the Congress of Industrial Organizations.

The institute was called for the purpose of studying means of securing better citizenship and to lobby against cuts in appropriations for youth-aid programs such as the Civilian Conservation Corps and the National Youth Administration. It also will urge the American youth act, sponsored by Senator Murray of Montana, to provide \$200,000,000 for jobs and vocational training for young folk.

## Tornado Hits Georgia Town, Killing Many

### Estimates Of Property Damage Range Up To 85 Percent Of City's Buildings

### Eight Persons Are Known To Be Dead

### Hospital Is Crowded; Four Emergency Stations Opened

ALBANY, Ga., Feb. 10.—(AP)—Between 12 and 15 persons were killed and several hundred injured by a tornado which smashed the business section of this southeast Georgia city this morning.

Chairman L. R. Ferrell of the Albany Red Cross chapter made an estimate of the dead in a telegram to the national Red Cross headquarters and told newsmen that it was "impossible" to say exactly how many had been killed.

Estimates of property damage ranged up to 85 per cent of the business buildings.

James H. Blair of the Americus Times-Recorder said indications were that the death list would run higher as several buildings, including one hotel, had not been checked since they were damaged.

Managing Editor W. M. Payne of the Albany Herald estimated property damage at three million dollars. He said he knew of eight dead, and that rescue workers "still were finding bodies. He estimated at least 250 persons were "hurt seriously". The city's one hospital was so crowded with patients some had to be laid on the floor. Four emergency stations were opened.

One locomotive was blown off the track and the railroad station was unroofed. Two tourist trains were derailed and high water from Florida waters which by the work clearing debris which blocked streets and sidewalks. Almost every store in town suffered some damage. The negro section near the railroad station was hit by a heavy blow. Scores of flimsy buildings were down.
