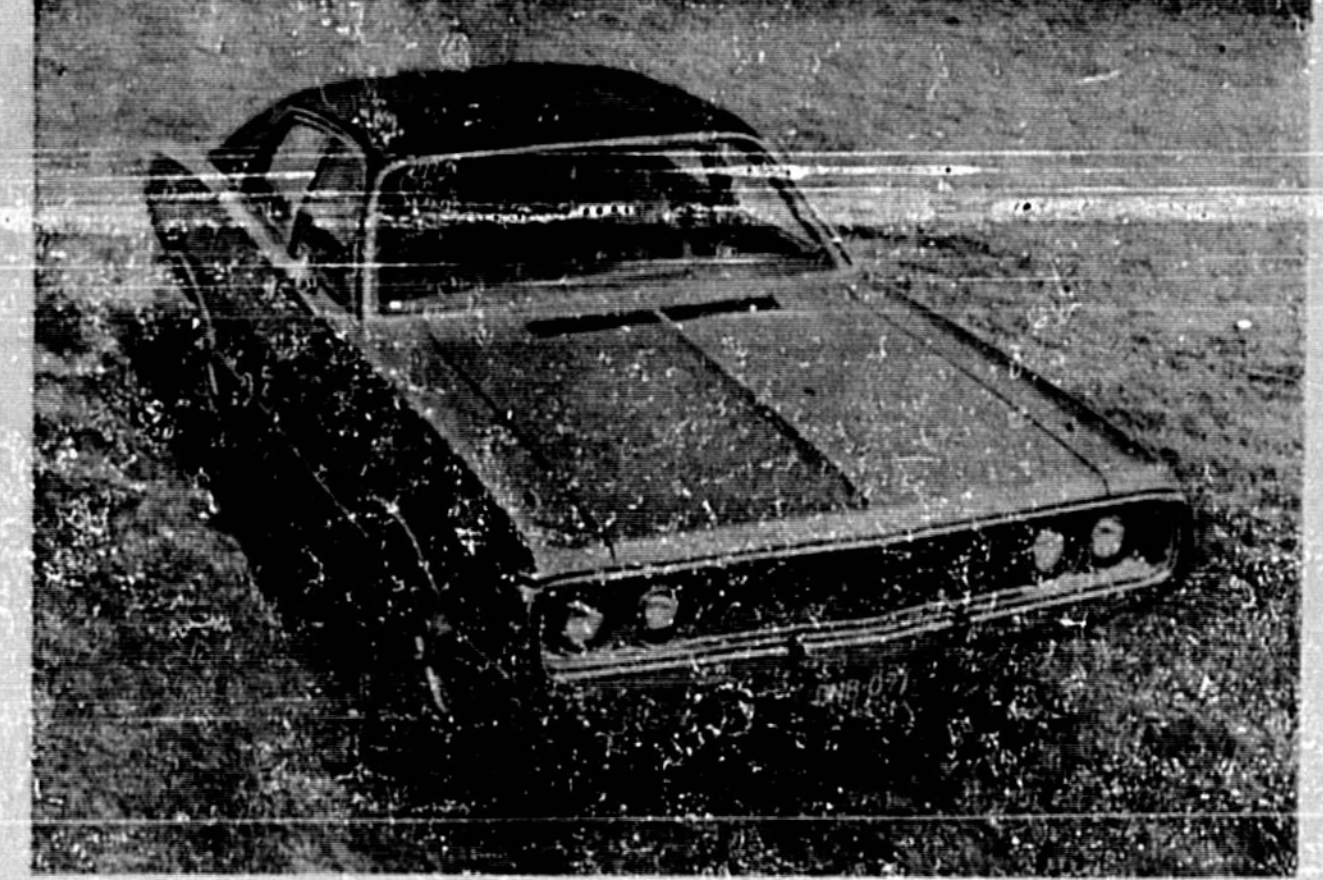

Association Against Incorporation

In the latest newsletter sent out by the Rolling Hills Civic Association, it speaks of its general concern about the incorporation of certain individuals or groups in the area pushing its incorporation of the Rolling Hills. The newsletter, which is distributed to all members, states that there would be no additional tax values taken over by incorporation. Calling such statements irresponsible, the newsletter pointed out that no one can predict accurately how elected officials will react in the future. "A promise made today that city imposed an 'ad valorem' tax will not be levied in the future is tantamount to an admission that someone expects to control the mayor and council. We do not believe citizens of this area would serve as public officials under such conditions," it said.

On the same grounds, the newsletter called "irresponsible" statements by proponents of incorporation that incorporation will provide complete protection for unwise commercial or multi-family zoning, since all zoning would be done by council members or their appointees.

War Amendment Causes White House To Call

White anti-war senators were given little chance of passing their amendment. Republican supporters, reported the White House launched a telephone campaign Monday in an attempt to sway some who were wavering toward a vote for the limitation.

Attorney Challenges Just-Passed State Act

Seminole County School Board Attorney Douglas Stenstrom "dropped a bombshell" at yesterday's board meeting when he requested Board authorization to seek a State Attorney-General's opinion on the Just-Passed Act by the legislature, which forbids the expenditure of appropriation funds for use in achieving racial balance in schools.

Stenstrom said he could not understand why none of the state's 67 county school boards had sought opinions regarding the possible liability of the boards to replace these funds if the U.S. Supreme Court should rule that busing is not required to achieve racial balance in schools.

The attorney stated that audits from the state could then require the boards to pay back all funds spent in forced-busing lawsuits solely on race. "This could run into thousands of dollars," Stenstrom added.

He stated he wanted this in the school records for the auditor and further explained that "if the attorney-general says we are violating the law by using these funds, then that places us in direct conflict with the state and federal laws."

This is indicated since state law forbids the use of funds for racial balance expenditures by the boards and the federal government's enforcing forced busing to achieve racial desegregation of schools.

Board approved the Stenstrom request for an opinion and further asked the attorney to get the State Education Board to request an opinion from the attorney-general also.

Concerning another legal matter, Stenstrom brought out a hearing into a suit filed by Mrs. Katherine B. Pipkins, a Lyman High School teacher, against the Board and Carlton Henley, Lyman High School principal, would probably be heard next week in Orlando's U.S. District Court.

Stenstrom said he expected Judge George C. Young to preside in the case and Henley, John Angel, county superintendent, and John Brown, Board Chairman, to accompany him for the court session.

On a motion by A. F. Keith, it was decided that Stenstrom would also represent Henley in the case brought after Mrs. Pipkins claimed she was being denied access to Lyman High School after being assigned by Henley that she would be allowed to remain at Lyman to teach English.

Seminole County's long-awaited Food Stamp Program, which was approved by the County Commission last December as a "Christmas present to the needy" and which received the stamp of approval from the U.S. Department of Agriculture this spring, appears to finally be "off the ground."

County Commissioners were advised yesterday that the state cabinet had authorized funding for the program yesterday. This now makes the program a state rather than county responsibility, which had previously been the plan, and which was responsible for the delay in decision of who would fund the program.

Commissioners were advised by state officials that they anticipated having the program implemented within the next 30 days. There will be state employees who will shortly move into the county to set up operations.

Commissioner Chairman John Alexander noted that there might be a delay in procuring quarters and offices for the program, which the county has had available since Jan. 1, its continuation. He advised state officials that the county would be amenable to being the facility for the county's program, to assist with earlier implementation. The facilities are, in effect, surplus to the county, Alexander said that the officials had him that they would like to explore this possibility since it would save time.

Senate Vote Gives President Control Of War

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate voted today to give the president complete control over the conduct of the Vietnam war, a move that critics say will strip Congress of its constitutional responsibility to place the nation's troops in harm's way.

The amendment, which would give the president the power to order the withdrawal of troops from Vietnam, was defeated by a vote of 53-42.

The President, McGovern, said he was "relieved and gratified" by the decision when he learned it was being made.

The amendment was born in McGovern's office in late April — just before the invasion in Cambodia. Four versions of it came to the Senate — all of them bearing the initials and seal of the senator from South Dakota.

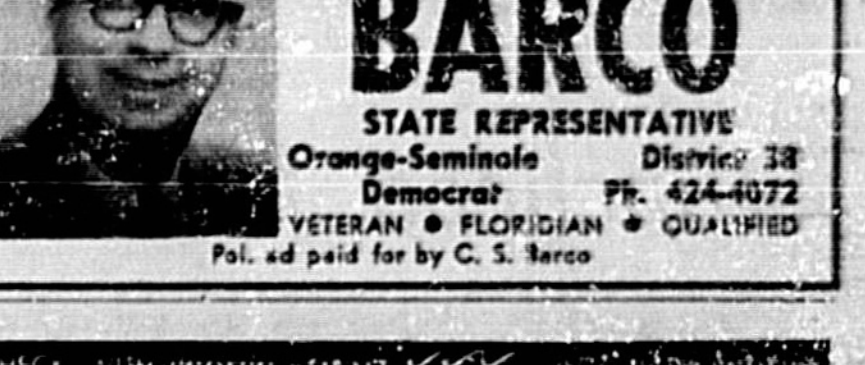

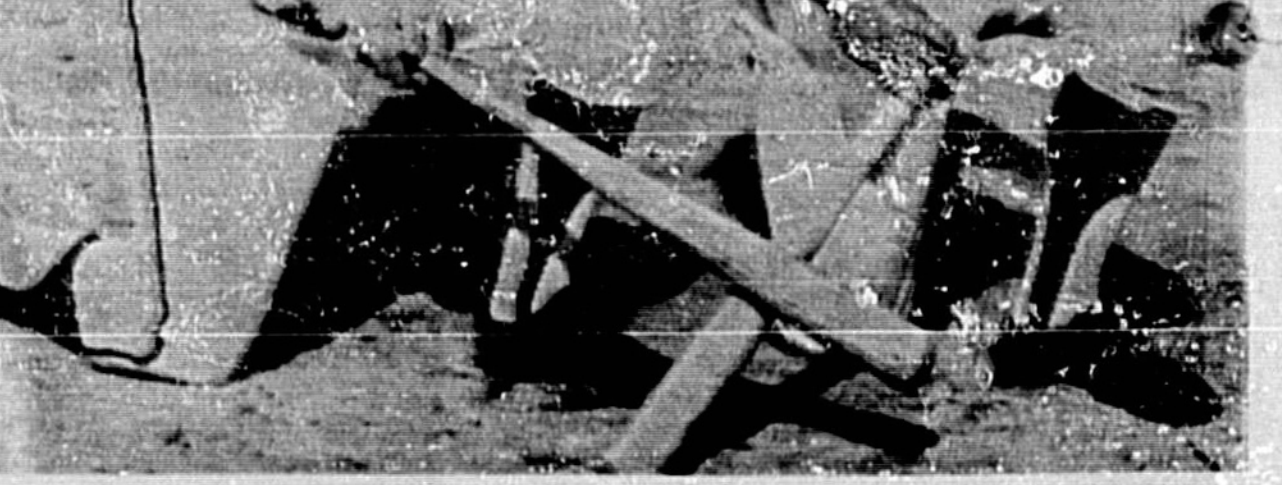

A National Convention

Police Getting Set For Panthers

 PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The Black Panthers say they will hold a national convention in Philadelphia this weekend whether the police like it or not — in the streets if necessary.

Police Commissioner Frank L. Rizzo, who carried all leaves for his 7,600 men and put them on 12-hour shifts, said his department was "loaded for battle" and that he would lead the police to the streets if necessary.

His action followed dawn raids Monday on three Panther centers where police said gun and ammunition were found. Three police raiders were slightly wounded by shotgun fire.

A Panther spokesman said the raids were an attempt by Rizzo to "squash our convention, but it won't work."

Zayd Shakur, who identified himself as Panther information minister for New York State, told a sidewalk news conference in front of one of the raided centers Tuesday.

"We will meet here Saturday and Sunday and Monday as scheduled and no one will stop us."

"If it is necessary to hold it in the streets, we will hold it there. Bet on it, baby."

"I think we will have trouble from the police, but so what?" Shakur added.

Fourteen persons found in the Panther centers were being held in \$100,000 bail each on charges of conspiracy.

Rizzo said he had no power to prevent the convention. The suit was up to the mayor, governor or the courts.

The gathering, which the Panthers call their "Revolutionary

People's Constitutional Convention," is scheduled to open Saturday night in the 4,500-seat gymnasium of Temple University by several state legislators for permitting use of its state-owned facilities by the Panthers.

UAW To Discuss Offer

 DETROIT (AP) — Top officials of the United Auto Workers union meet with representatives of the union's rank-and-file today to discuss new contract proposals from the Big Three automakers.

The union leadership was expected to recommend the rejection of the offers to three employees' councils representing 730,000 workers at General Motors Corp., Ford Motor Co., and Chrysler Corp.

The 25-member UAW International Executive Board also was scheduled to meet today and may pick a strike target.

Negotiations are concentrated on the target firms and if no agreement is reached, the union says it will strike that company when the current pact expires at midnight Sept. 14.

Any settlement reached with the target company traditionally becomes a pattern for settlement with other automakers.

The heads of the UAW bargaining teams at all three companies described the contract offers as "ridiculous" and "insane." Union negotiators said the offers would have to improve greatly to avoid a strike.

Carl Bramblett, vice president in charge of labor relations at GM, replied:

"I regret that the union has seen fit to ridicule our \$1.4 billion, increased wage proposal, the largest economic offer in the history of General Motors."

"We hope the union will make a more realistic appraisal when it meets with us on Sept. 14."

The automakers said they proposed increases in wages amounting for the three-year period of 13.5 per cent, adding that this would cost around \$2.3 billion.

The average worker earns \$4.02 an hour in wages under the expiring contracts. Automakers estimate they also pay \$1.75 hourly in fringe benefits per worker.

Union leaders criticized the management offers for not meeting key union demands for removal of a ceiling on the cost-of-living wage escalator and for the option for workers to retire after 26 years service, regardless of age, at a monthly pension of \$500.

The automakers pushed to increase the retirement pay of employees at age of 60 or over with 30 years service from \$400 to \$500 monthly.

Defense Budget Spared Against Any Trimming

WASHINGTON (AP) — Five weeks of debate on the weapons and cost of war and the ways and means of peace have left scars on the Senate but few dents in President Nixon's armor.

In 12½ hours of debate the Senate probed some of the most controversial proposals of the year, rejected most of them and left intact the buying power of a \$19.2 billion procurement bill.

In the last hours of debate Tuesday, it crushed, 55-39, an unprecedented drive to cut off funds for the war in Vietnam and set Dec. 31, 1971, as the deadline for withdrawing all U.S. troops from Vietnam.

Alonso immediately after that vote, a coalition of eight Republicans and six Democrats urged President Nixon to propose at the Paris peace talks a Vietnam cease-fire.

Rejection of the "amendment to end the war," sponsored chiefly by Sens. Mark Hatfield, R-Ore., and George McGovern, D-S.D., was hailed by Republican leaders as a vote of confidence in the President and viewed by war critics as leading to the election challenge of many of the President's defenders in November.

That amendment was the most hotly debated of a long series of proposals. Other votes defeated three attempts to limit the Safeguard antimissile system, and a strong bid to begin equipping the draft with an all-volunteer army.

The Senate voted down several attempts to curb what critics branded as waste in military spending — attempts which included an ill-fated move to trim \$5.2 billion from the \$70.2 billion Defense Department budget.

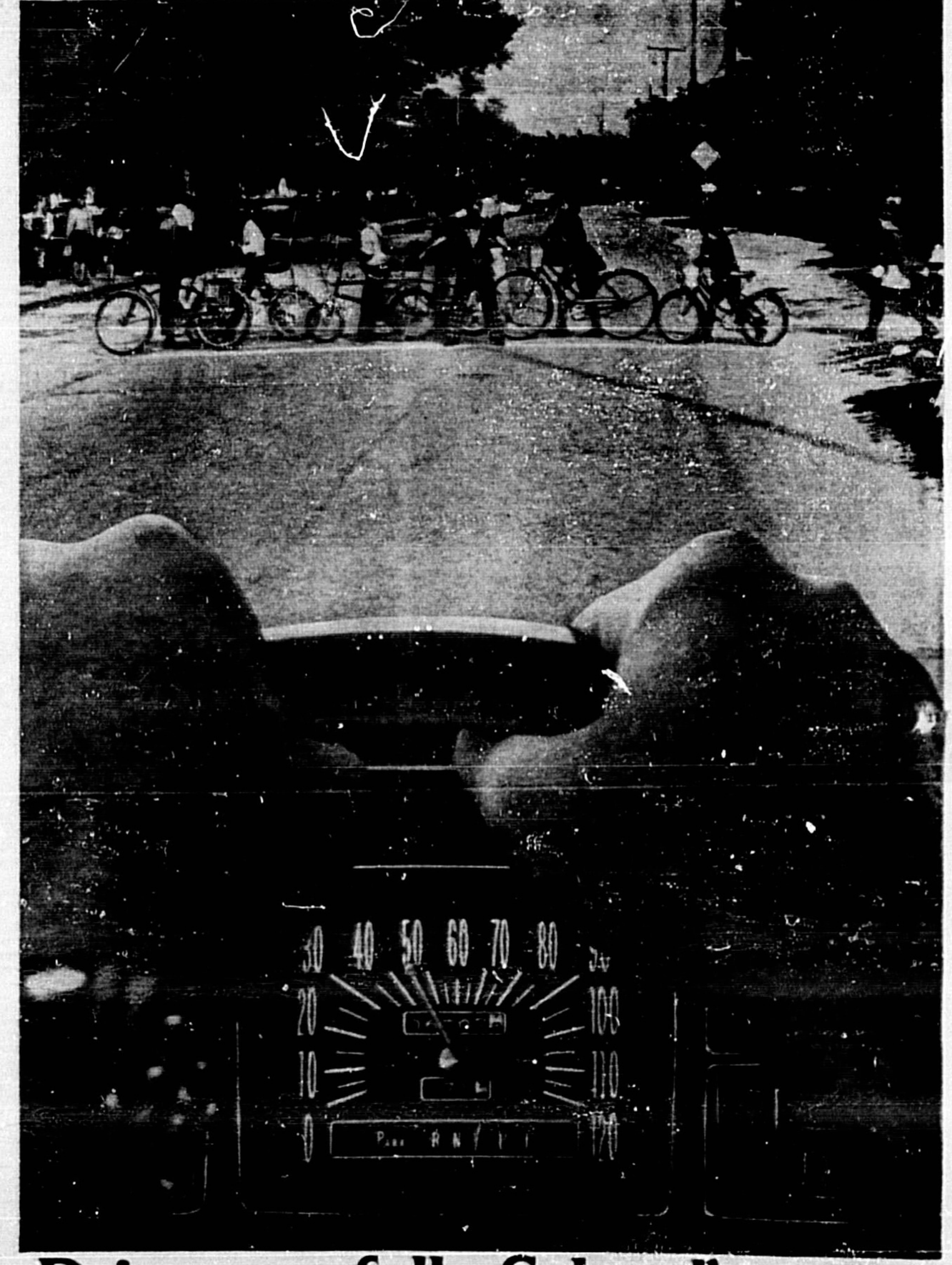
Also turned back were attempts to forbid the use of crop and forest-killing herbicides in Vietnam, and compel the Pentagon to abide by its "fly before you buy" spending guidelines.

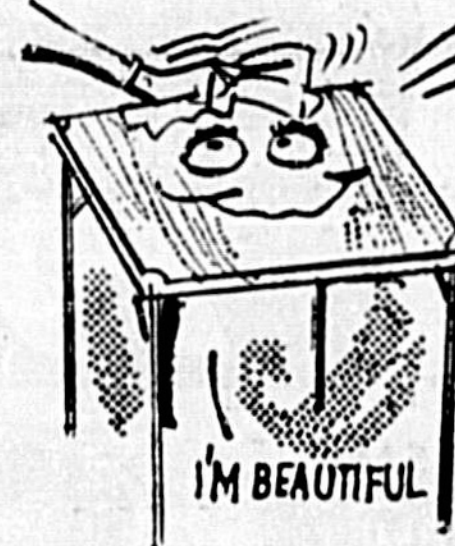

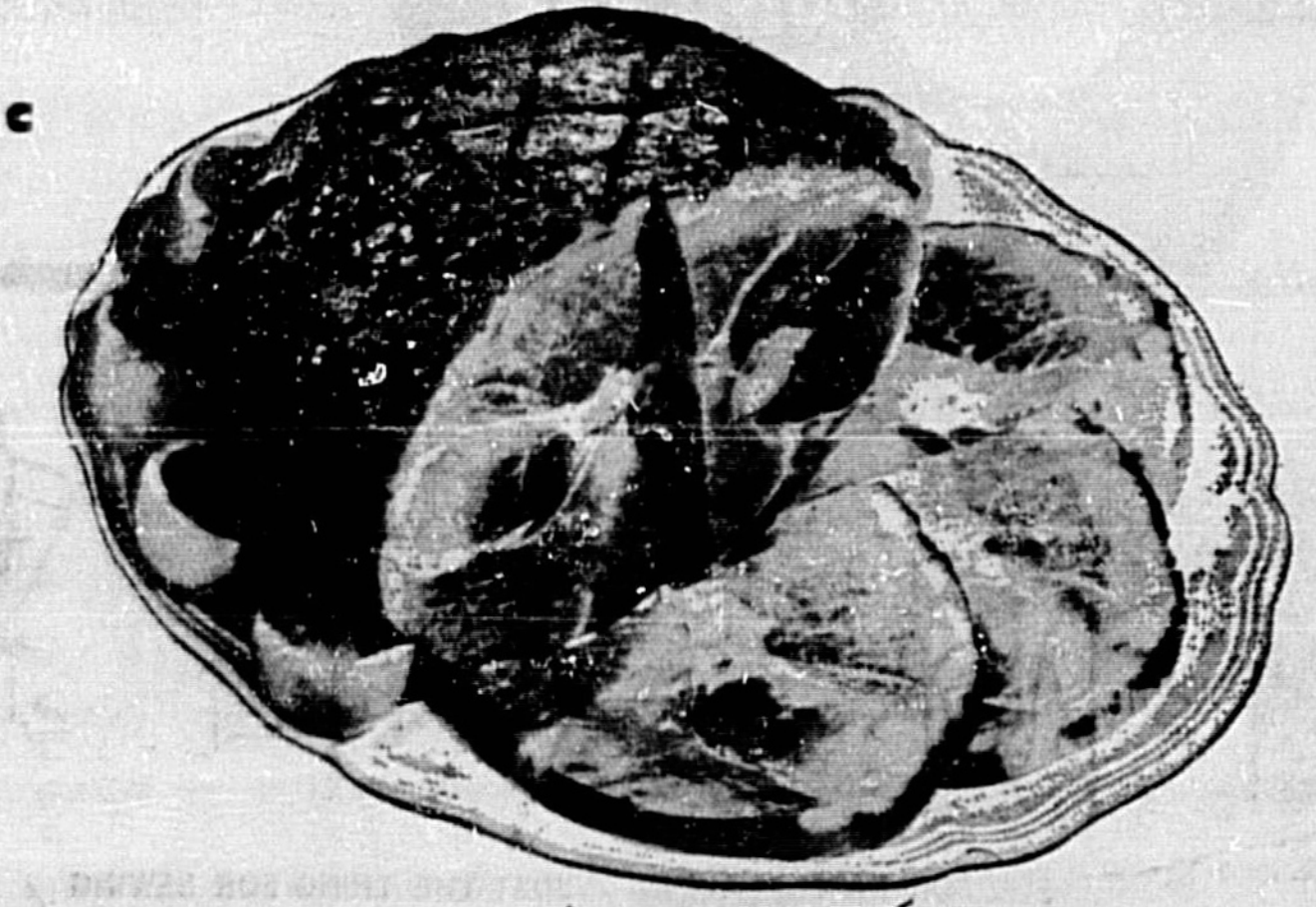

Festive Baked Chicken

There's a festive baked chicken that you can make ahead and then reheat after your company comes. And for most women those words, make ahead, are good news.

For this dish you use two small broiler fryers and prepare an elegant curried pineapple sauce. Rice is the perfect accompaniment. But remember there are several kinds of rice to choose from: regular long grain rice; converted-type rice; brown rice; wild rice mixed with regular or converted-type rice. If you are in an extravagant mood, wild rice all by itself.

When we tested this recipe all our tasters liked it so much they said, "Try it again!"

One hint: the recipe suggests combining the chicken and sauce with slices of cold curried pineapple, and that's a good-eating cue. But if you want to heat the pineapple slices just throw them in the oven with the chicken.

BAKED CHICKEN WITH CURRIED PINEAPPLE SAUCE

2 small broiler-fryer chickens, each 2 to 2½ pounds
 1 tablespoon butter, at room temperature
 ¼ pound (6 slices) bacon
 ½ cup minced onion
 1 tablespoon curry powder
 1 tablespoon flour
 1 can (8½ oz) crushed pineapple
 ¾ cup condensed consommé, (well) undiluted (from a 1½½ ounce can)
 1 tablespoon light cream
 ¼ cup flaked coconut
 ¼ to ½ cup curried pineapple
 3½ cups cooked rice

Wash chickens and pat dry; truss. Rub with butter. Place in shallow roasting pan (without rack). Bake in a 400-degree oven until tender—about 1 hour.

Cut bacon into 1-inch crosswise pieces; in a 16-inch skillet, gently cook bacon and remove until bacon is browned; drain of excess fat. Stir in curry powder and flour. Stir in crushed pineapple and consommé. Cook gently for 15 minutes, stirring often; sauce will thicken. Stir in cream. Set aside off heat.

Remove chickens from oven; with poultry shears cut in half vertically or cut in quarters; place skin side up in shallow baking-serving dish. Cover with transparent plastic wrap and set aside until ready to serve.

At serving time heat sauce and spoon over chickens. Bake in pre-heated 400-degree oven until chickens are hot—15 to 20 minutes; sprinkle with coconut and bake until coconut browns slightly—another 5 minutes or so.

Garnish with 6" pineapple slices and serve. *Makes 4 to 6 servings.*

TO TRUSS: Hook wings back skinnin' fashion and use string to tie them close to body. Tie ends of drumsticks close together and then tie to tail.

CUCUMBER SAUCE
 1 medium cucumber
 1 small scallion (green onion), minced (include green top)
 1 container (½ pt) commercial sour cream
 1 tablespoon prepared white horseradish, just as it comes from the bottle
 1 teaspoon salt
 ¼ teaspoon white pepper

Peel the cucumber; cut in half lengthwise; with a teaspoon scoop out seeds and discard; chop cucumber fine—there should be about 1 cup. Mix well with remaining ingredients. Cover and chill for a few hours or overnight to blend flavors. Makes about 2 cups. Refrigerate any leftover and use as a dressing for salad.

Mix a quarter-cup of butter with a couple of teaspoons of anchovy paste and Worcestershire sauce to taste. Spread the mixture over fish steaks and serve with scrambled eggs and grilled tomatoes. Delicious for brunch.

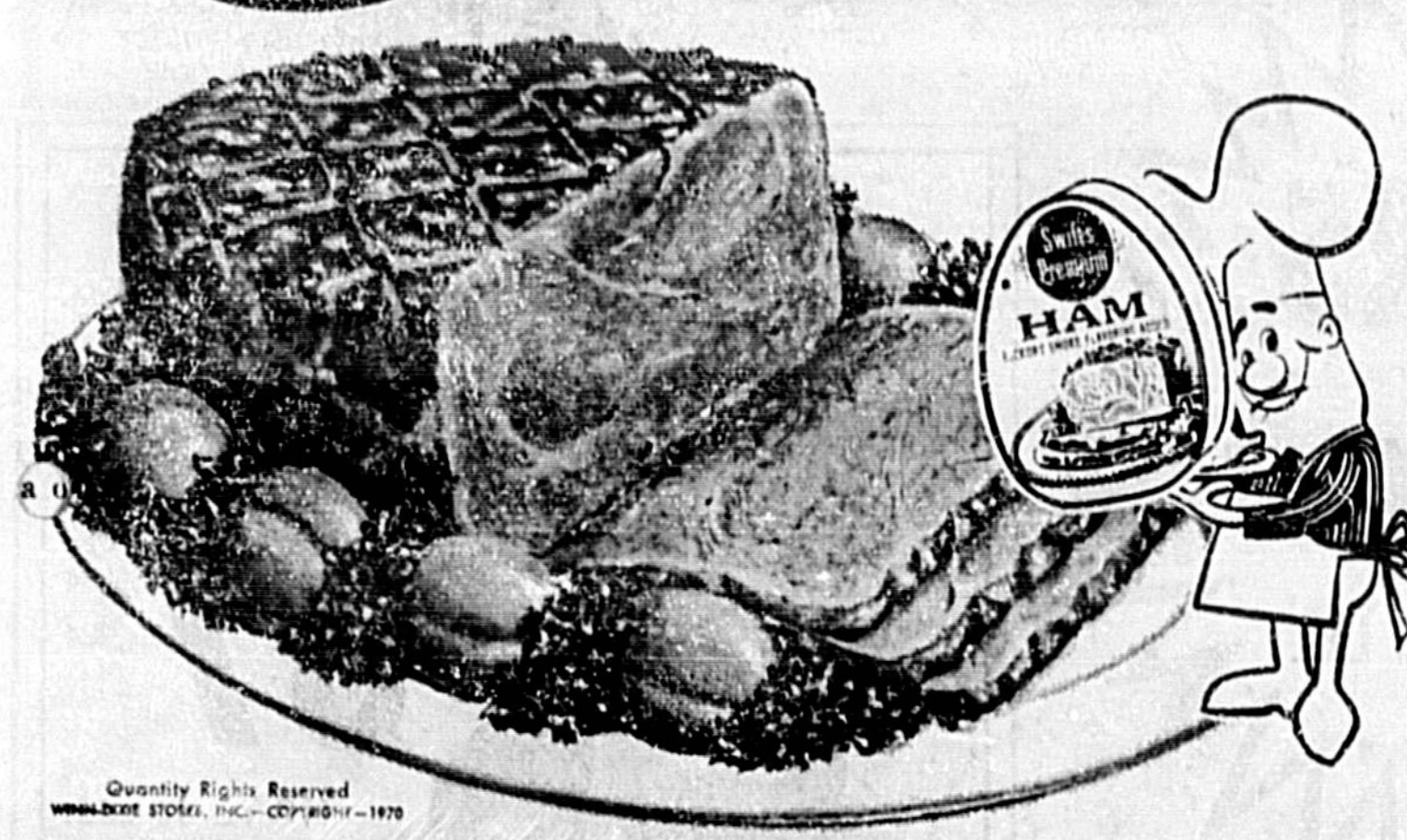

Tasty Tuna Souffle

Souffles are airy creations that can be made to taste hearty. The heartiness comes from the ingredients added to the white sauce that forms the souffle's base.

To accompany the souffle we suggest that you serve a creamed vegetable—perhaps green peas or spinach. The creamed vegetable can act as a sauce.

In preparing the souffle be careful when you separate the eggs to keep the yolks and the whites well apart. The moist speck of yolk in the whites may prevent their being beaten to their largest volume.

When you fold the beaten whites into the tuna mixture, use a wide rubber spatula. The use of a souffle dish, with its straight sides, helps the souffle to rise.

TUNA SOUFFLE
 ¼ cup butter
 ¼ cup flour
 ½ teaspoon salt
 ½ teaspoon Tabasco sauce
 1 cup milk
 2 teaspoons minced onion
 ¼ cup finely grated Swiss cheese
 8 egg yolks
 1 can (9½ or 7 oz) tuna in vegetable oil, drained and flaked
 ½ cup minced parsley
 1 can (3 oz) broiled chopped mushrooms, well drained
 6 egg whites
 In a 2-quart saucepan over low heat, melt the butter. Stir in flour, salt and Tabasco; remove from heat. Gradually stir in the milk, keeping smooth. Return to moderate heat and, stirring constantly, cook until sauce thickens and comes to a boil; remove from heat.

Add onion and cheese. With a whisk beat in the egg yolks, one at a time. Stir in tuna, parsley and mushrooms. Cool for 15 minutes.

Beat egg whites until they hold stiff straight peaks when beater is slowly withdrawn; fold into tuna mixture. Turn into an ungreased 2-quart souffle dish.

Bake in a preheated 350-degree oven until top is rounded and golden-brown and a cake tester inserted in center comes out clean—45 to 50 minutes. Serve at once.

Makes 4 to 6 servings.

In a double boiler heat a can of condensed tomato soup (undiluted) with a pound of coarsely grated process cheddar cheese. Season with Worcestershire sauce, celery salt and curry powder to taste. Serve over crisp toast or crackers.
