And that I am qualified to vote under the Constituton and laws of the state of Florida. Both men and women must posesr the following qualifications viz:

Must be 21 years of age or over. Must be citizens of United States of Junerica.

Just be residents of Florida for 12 months, or more and of Seminole. outly 6 months or more.

Those men who live in the city of Sanford and have registered this year must not register again, as they are in line to vote in the general election and elections that may follow.

Those men already registered in tountry districts will not be permit ted to register again.
