

WILL SPEND 18 DAYS IN THE STATE

ITINERARY FOR EDITORIAL TRIP TO BE CONSIDERED SOON.

Orlando, Sept. 1.—A meeting of the committee named by the Florida Press association to take up the entertainment of the National Editorial association was held yesterday. All the members of the committee were present except Chairman Stoneham, of the Miami Herald.

Secretary George Hosann presented definite statements from the executive committee of the National Editorial association that they would spend 18 days in the state. Three or four days of this time will be given over to the business meeting at St. Augustine during which there will be no entertainment, or but very little. The balance will be taken up with a trip through Florida beginning at Pensacola and winding up at Miami. The expense will be from \$35,000 to \$40,000, but it will result in the greatest publicity that Florida has ever had and should change wrong impressions of the state held in minds of millions of people in the middle west.

The question of raising funds by issuing a book on Florida was discussed and turned down, the newspapermen present not believing it would be proper to advocate any such form of "advertising." Committees will be appointed in every county of the state to raise the money. A meeting will be held at Jacksonville within the next two weeks, when it is expected that railroad men will be present with a plain itinerary for the trip. Whether it will be possible to adopt it at this meeting or whether it will be necessary to meet more than once remains to be seen.

FLORIDA TOWN USES "MOVIE" PASSES TO GET STREETS CLEAR

Panama City, Fla., Aug. 30.—The chamber of commerce of this place hit upon a novel plan to rid this place of tin cans by offering free admission to the movie picture show for five cans and a small sum, about one-half the usual price for admission. There was no limit placed on the ages of those who presented the cans and a result it required several large containers to hold the large lot of cans returned to the theater from all parts of the city. This plan was so successful that there is talk of it being repeated, with another angle to the inducement, and in this way it is argued about the city, in the alleys, on the hundreds of unsightly tin vessel water front and in abandoned lots, will soon be collected.

RICHMOND TAKES FOURTH PLACE IN CITIES OF SOUTH

Washington, Sept. 1.—Richmond, Va., with the largest numerical growth of population in its history during the last decade, takes rank as the thirty-seventh largest city of the country, the census bureau announced its population today at 171,667. Ten years ago Richmond ranked thirty-ninth, and in a decade has outgrown Syracuse, New Haven, Memphis and Scranton. Omaha and Akron have outgrown the Virginia capital.

Richmond's numerical increase was 44,039, 34.5 per cent. Its previous best increase was in the decade ending with 1910, when it was 42,378, or 50.1.

Among Southern cities Richmond takes rank as fourth largest, displacing Memphis, which held that rank ten years ago and which now has about 9,600 people than Richmond. New Orleans, Atlanta and Birmingham rank as the first three Southern cities.

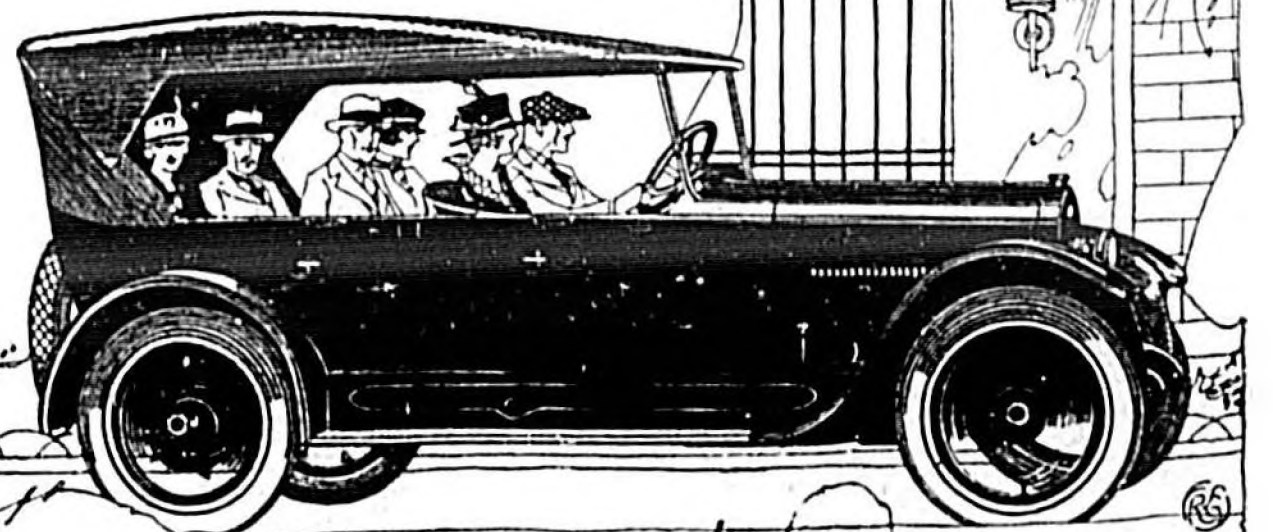

GEORGIA BILL LIMITS BATHS TO ONE A WEEK

Swimmers Must Submerge Up to the Neck and Wear Fringe Around Neck and Feet

Atlanta, Ga.—The joyful Glenn, Georgia's Senator "wit," has mixed another of his famous legislative cocktails.

Regulations for the conduct and costumes of bathers and "sand lizards" and a code of practices for those addicted to the Saturday night bath habit are provided in his bill.

The Glenn substitute attempts to make effective the segregation of the sexes contemplated in the Wilkinson bill by requiring that men shall bathe in the Pacific ocean, women in the Atlantic ocean and children in the Mississippi river and Gulf of Mexico.

quire all bathers, both men and women, to be covered from armpit to knee Senator Glenn is shocked at the amount of epidermis this would leave uncovered, and his substitute requires a fringe of lace to be attached to both top and bottom of all bathing suits.

But gather around and harken to the regulations for tub bathing. Briefly, they are:

1. Tub baths at any time, except on Saturday nights, are declared unlawful, except for newly born infants.

2. Baths must be taken in a cave, cavern, tunnel or deeply darkened room; bathers must always be partially clothed, and any person who exposes himself or herself entirely in the nude to his or her own gaze shall be considered guilty of a misdemeanor.

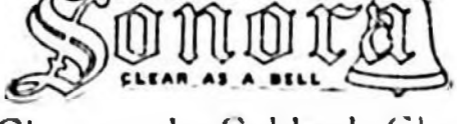
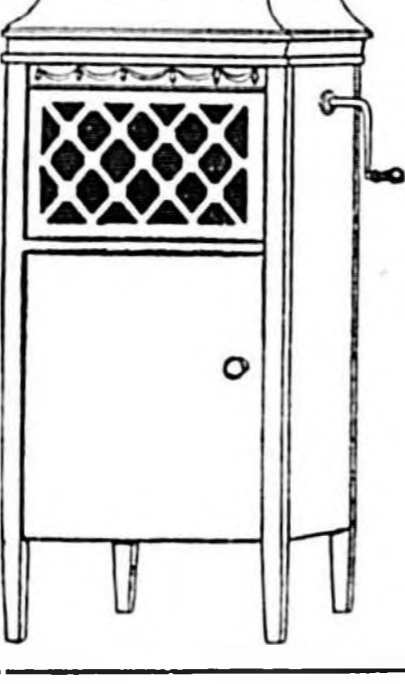

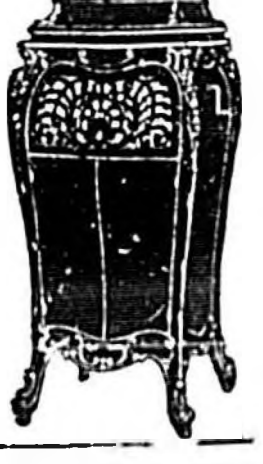

MILLERS BAKERY MAKING IMPROVEMENTS

Bread Mixing, Loaf Making and Paper Wrapping Machinery Up to Date

J. L. Miller is keeping his bakery right up to the minute or just a few minutes ahead of the times by installing new and up to date machinery that will not only save labor but will give the patrons the cleanest and most sanitary baking that modern methods can devise.

Added to a plant that was already the last word in baking machinery Mr. Miller has just installed a loaf machine that chops out three loaves at a time, dumps them into a rounding machine and delivers them to the baking pans and all the man needs to do is to put them in the oven.

The dough is poured into one end, the machine scales it into the proper size and does all the rest. About the only task left to the bakers in the Miller Bakery is to place the loaves in the oven and take them out. After they come out of the ovens they are passed to the packing department where a new machine takes them places a nicely printed sheet of tissue paper around them puts the ends down pastes them on and the loaf is ready to deliver all nice and clean and tasty and human hands have hardly touched the bread at all.

Mr. Miller has several other innovations that will be installed soon for he finds that machinery is the thing to solve his troubles and turn out the best products and turn them out with less fuss and in a manner that would pass muster from a government inspection. The Miller Bakery is doing a big business in this section of the state and Mr. Miller says he must either keep up with the procession or get out and let some other fellow do it.

TOMATOES 30c A BUSHEL. WHOLESALE AND 50 CENTS A PIECE WHEN SLICED

Baltimore, Sept. 3.--The tomato deal this season has been very unsatisfactory to growers inasmuch as canners have been unable to take care of their contracts in many instances, which has resulted in a heavy volume of fresh tomatoes being offered on the local produce market with resultant low prices. They have sold in the wholesale market as low as thirty cents a basket. Notwithstanding their low price in wholesale way, the consumer has not received the advantage of this condition and according to local daily newspapers single tomatoes are selling to the hotels as high as fifty cents each--more than the cost of a bushel.

SHORTAGE OF CARS

Louisville, Ky. Sept. 7.--Several southern states are in the grasp of a very acute car shortage, and producers of coal, lumber, agricultural, and manufacturing products have been

unable to fill shipping orders, the Southern Railway Company has announced.

An appeal may be made to the interstate commerce commission for relief if the situation does not abate soon.
