

The Worst Is First

In a recent article printed in The Atlantic Monthly, Elmer Davis calls the newspaper profession to task for several growing evils which threatens to water down the effectiveness of our free press. This is because of the preference given "The truth and nothing but the truth," rather than 'the whole truth."

The veteran radio newsman blames the spirit of rampant competition among newswire syndicates which puts a high premium on getting there first with the worst-beating the competition to the punch, even boasting of a few seconds time -- differential on a scoop. This leads to reporting without analysis and printing news that has not been compared with sources for sub-surface implications.

By printing statements of Senator Jos. McCarthy without taking time to check statistics mentioned by the senator several weeks earlier, contradictory facts have been offered an unsuspecting public. A specific example offered by Davis points to the fact that one excerpt from a document used against Owen Lattimore turned out to be two sentences eleven pages apart.

These ugly ramifications of "objective" reporting of speeches, from the lips of "important" people by competing reporters, without time to check back on the facts, can cause greater harm in the future. The race to be first with the worst is not likely to slow down. It will increase unless a new concept of the reporter's obligation to his readers is realized.

in an editorial which is both informative and sound, the New York Daily News takes a commendable position on the civil rights question.

The News quotes the declarations of the two presidentla candidates on the aubject—Elsenhower's statement to a delegation of Negro leaders that he "cannot at this time urge an FEPC with computery powers," and Stevenson's declaration, in a New York with some hedging and numbling," for a compulsory FEPC. At long last, a satisfactory way of using Florida's most famous product in the manufacture of America's favorite dessert has beendeveloped by two scientists of the Florida. of the University of Florida. Thei ce cream developed by Walter A. Krienke and Leon E. Mull of th Experiment Station Dairy Laboratory tempts the eye and the palate with its contrasting bright gold and rich cream colors and its flavor comgination of tangy orange and vanilla.

Pure natural orange juice, with its high Vitamin C content, fresh milk, with its high calcium and Vitamin A, and the ever-popular vanilla are used. Already someone has said the ice cream would be ideal for junior's breakfast in that he would get calcium, vitamins, and energy foods in one tasty dish. For years folks in the ice cream and citrus industries have been talking about citrus ice cream, and numerous attempts have been made to develop a satisfactory recipe. Up until now, none had turned out satisfactorily for commercial production, but Krienke and Muli and those who have tampled their product believe

theirs will turn the trick. The big difficulty in the past has been the tartness and acidity of orange juice and the fact that it doesn't naturally combine with milk, but Krienke and Mull have developed a fruitjuice that is altogether compatible with cream when introduced by their special process.

Not only have the two scientists worked out a way for making or-produced flavorsome and colorful lime, tangerine, and lemon ice creams by the same method. Krienke has been invitedby the international Association of Ice Cream Manufacturers to tell about it at the organization's annual convention in Chicago Sept. 23.



Survivors Foundered Tanker Saved

earch Continues For 8 Shipmates Still Missing In Angry Waters Of Atlantic

NORFOLK, Va. wh-Two more survivors of the hurricane-smashed tanker Foundation Star were picked up today by a Navy trans port, the USS Hollis.

Nineteen other survivors were en route to New Lork as search continued for eight shipmates stil missing in the rough Atlantic wa ters off Charleston, S. C. The USS Hollis radioed the Coast

Guard in Norfolk it rescued two of the Foundation Star's men 40 miles south of Cape Hatteras. The mea sage was very brief, and there was no indication as to whether the survivors were found in a life boat or were clinging to the smanhed tanker's wreckage.

The other 19 survivors were aboard the vessel which rescued them, the Norweglan Emu, which was bound for New York instead of for Norfolk as originally

The master of the Emu informed the Coast Guard he had decided to proceed to New York instead of entering the Virginia capes. The Emu rescued the 19 men after the Honduran Foundatior Star broke in two Saturday. The Coast Guard cutter Cherokee reached the side of the Emu about twas planned to transfer the survivora from the Emu to the Cherokee, but sea condition were unfavorable for attempting

the transfer. Some survivors were reported to be in need of medical attention.
One seaman—the ship's cook—is known to have died in the wreck


