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Farm Agencies

In an illuminating talk before the American Farm Bureau Federation, Edward A. O'Neal, its president, recently declared that so many separate and distinct government agencies are now trying to cope with farm problems that they cause "unnecessary duplication of effort, waste, extravagance and confusion."

Indicating that with all its various farm bureaus, boards and commissions the government has succeeded in doing precious little for the farmers, Mr. O'Neal made an appealing address which should have been heard or read by our local growers, many of whom realize that something has been wrong. He concluded by proposing that a small non-partisan board be set up to co-ordinate the whole farm program.

Listing the many agencies now dealing with farm programs, Mr. O'Neal said they employed 83,558 "permanent employees" last year and spent \$99,233,429 on administrative costs. Most administrative costs, he asserted, were deducted from funds which otherwise would go to farmers as benefit payments, loans or grants.

"Administration has become too concentrated in Washington, and the evils of a developing bureaucracy have become all too evident," he continued. "We believe that unless various phases of the program are administered with efficiency and economy, and without duplication of effort and conflict among the various agencies now charged with administration of these different phases, that eventually the bulk of the farmers will reject the program, which will then fall of its own weight."

As an example of increased costs, he said the expenses of county associations required only 2.47 percent deductions from benefit checks between 1933 and 1935, then rose to 8.33 percent in 1937, and had exceeded 8 percent in succeeding years.

In an outline of his criticisms, Mr. O'Neal said: "There are seven agencies that have direct relationship to and contacts with farmer committees in the states."

"Five agencies that are assisting farmers with farm management problems."

"Five agencies dealing with landlord-tenant relationships."

"Seven agencies engaged in land-use planning."

"Four agencies engaged in demonstrations of farming methods."

"Four agencies directly engaged in promoting programs to conserve the soil and improve fertility and to encourage terracing."

"Five agencies assisting farmers with woodland planting and forest conservation."

"Six agencies are engaged in water conservation."

"Assistance with marketing problems is given by five agencies."

"Five agencies helping farmers carry out grazing improvement programs."

"At least three agencies are assisting farm women with home management problems."

Crime And Defense

What with fifth column activities increasing all over the country, with explosions occurring with all too much frequency in our defense factories, and with strikes being constantly fomented where there is occasionally evidence of sabotage, it is not surprising that the government is spending millions of dollars to expand its defense forces.

Chief J. Edgar Hoover has recently asked for an immediate appropriation of \$75,000 to expand the work of the FBI, enabling him to hire 200 additional men for defense work and 200 more men for the investigation of selective service act violations. "If we are going to have a comprehensive defense program," says the Miami Herald, "Mr. Hoover's agency fits naturally into the picture, should expand to meet increasing demands made upon it."

"There is nothing alarming in the request," continues the Herald. "What does disturb is that part of Mr. Hoover's testimony before the house appropriations subcommittee that, apart from national defense requirements, his department needs more men to cope with the crime situation, that there was an increase of two percent in crime last year over 1939."

"Crime is a hydra-headed monster. Just when we think we have it controlled it grows two heads where one is lopped off. It is a continuing fight. It is so in every community as well as in federal jurisdiction. It's a fight that must be waged relentlessly if society is to maintain its peace and stability."

"We need more police in the Metropolitan Miami area. Wide-scale burglaries and holdups here this winter testify to that. Unfortunately we have not the seemingly inexhaustible United States treasury to draw upon. The time is fast approaching, however, when conditions will convince the taxpayer that he had better take on the costs of a larger police force for self-protection and the good name of this area."

"TOO LATE TO CLASSIFY"

With the next session of the Legislature less than a month away, a lot of folks are beginning to worry about what is going to happen. Just about every organization in the state has appointed its Legislative Committee and a great many have held preliminary sessions at which those legislative problems which directly affect their own individual interests. They are governed by fear and selfishness and are prepared to go to almost any length to protect themselves, without regard to what may happen to the other fellow.

With the state insolvent as far as the general revenue fund is concerned, with ad valorem tax abolished and legislators pledged to repeal other taxes, with school funds low and road funds depleted, it is apparent that there must be a general revision in tax structure. While all groups and all individuals recognize this need, they don't want to accept the burden and they don't care what happens to the other fellow, just as long as nothing happens to themselves.

The federal government, pouring millions into the state with a defense program, is demanding the immediate construction of roads to connect these military activities. At the same time sixty-seven counties are demanding roads which they say are "imperative." Schools do not intend to be pushed aside and expect to make themselves heard during the session. The "big" and "little" county situation remains a problem. Sales tax proponents see a golden opportunity in the present situation and are hopeful that such a tax can be put over at the coming session. Bond holders want their money and are prepared to fight for it. Advocates of old age assistance are searching their files for pledges of legislators who, during the campaign, promised to "do something" for them—and so it goes.

The lot of the legislator is not a happy one. Never has a legislature faced more trying or difficult problems and whatever progress they make must be made by tramping on somebody's toes. I am confident that as a whole the 1941 Legislature is made up of honest, able and sincere men who are eager and anxious to do a real job. They deserve all the help and encouragement they can get and the voters of the state should realize that they are given an opportunity to see and hear their problems with as little interference as possible.

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Florida Is Tenth In Value Of Home Mortgages Insured

TALLAHASSEE, Mar. 14.—(Special)—Ranking ten in the nation, Florida was among the 15 states in which the dollar volume of home mortgages insured by the Federal Housing Administration during 1940 exceeded \$10,000,000, M. M. Parrish, FHA State Director, reported today. The Florida 1940 total of \$44,152,000, ranked the state first in Zone 11, which is composed of 10 southeastern states.

The average amount of the home mortgage insured in Florida last year by the FHA was \$3,520. Parrish predicted the 1941 average home mortgage insured by the FHA in Florida would be less than last year due to the increased interest being evidenced throughout the state in low-cost homes. But he said he expected the dollar volume of insured mortgages this year to exceed that of 1940 because of a substantial increase in the number of new homes in the lower priced ranges.

"Already this year builders and contractors have begun to lay plans for the construction of these low-cost homes which will be offered to the home buying public for approximately \$3,000," he asserted. "And real estate developers throughout the state are showing increased interest in the development of new subdivisions, meeting FHA standards, for these low-cost homes."

"Both the volume and momentum of home construction achieved in Florida last year is continuing, but that volume mostly is in the higher price ranges. There is every reason to anticipate the level of construction of these higher priced homes will equal or even exceed that of 1940, and we expect the volume of low cost homes this year to make his total volume for the year considerably in excess of the 1940 total."

NEW YORK, Mar. 14.—(AP)—Raw materials and refined products, price fluctuations of which normally would determine future changes in living costs, yesterday evidenced the upward wholesale price spiral over a wide front. Sharp advances affected sugar, cotton, rubber, wool tops, cotton seed oil and all. It was in future dealings of these staples the widest gains were recorded—that is, the trades were on paper but calling for delivery at specified periods over the next 12 months.

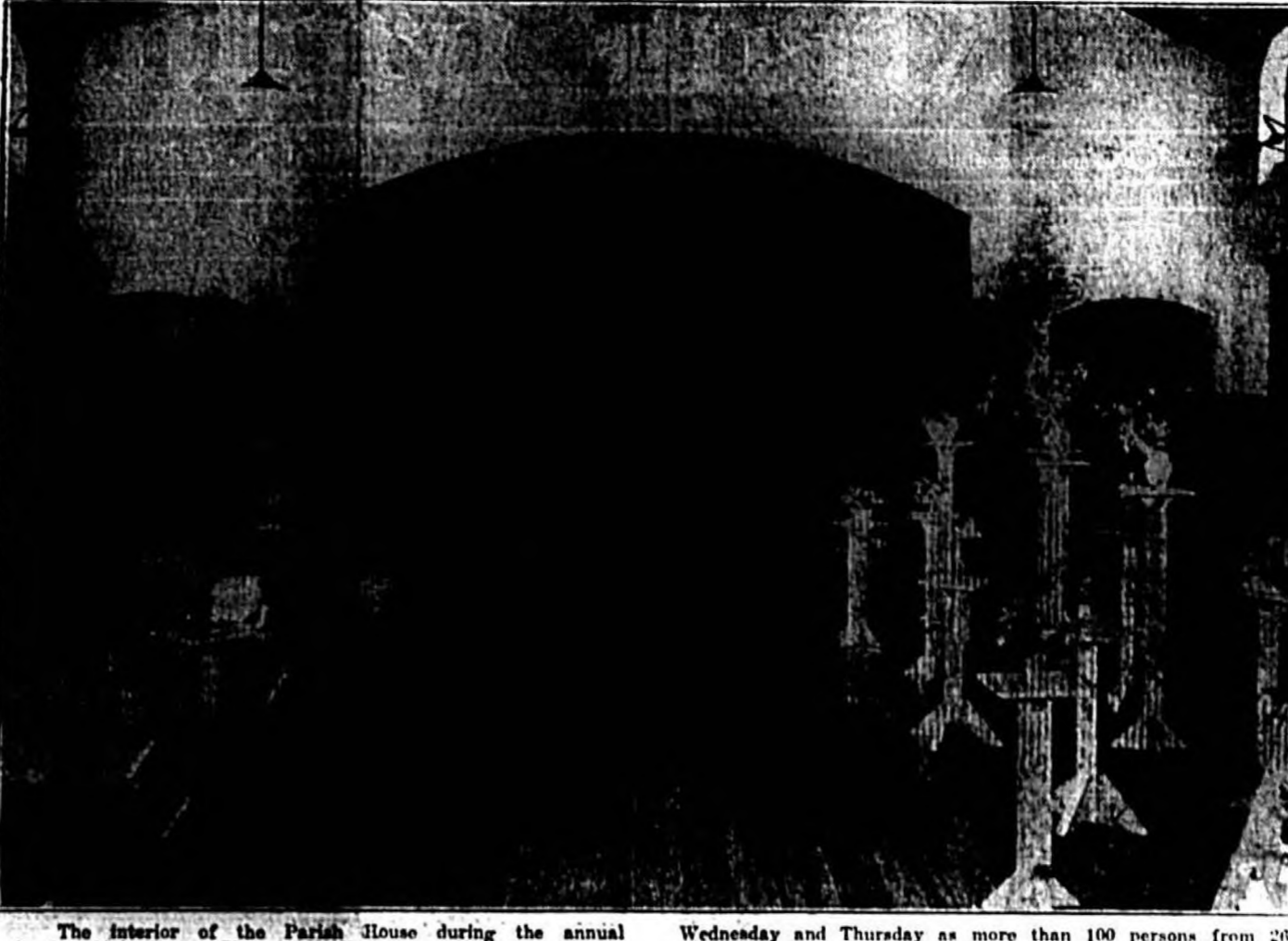

House Group Okeys Large Aid Measure

Way Is Cleared For Debate By Tuesday On 7 Billion Dollar Appropriation

Final Vote Seen Wednesday Night

Fastest Spending In History Of Nation Is Predicted

WASHINGTON, Mar. 15.—(AP)—A House subcommittee today approved the \$7,000,000,000 appropriation for aid to Britain and cleared the way for the debate on the legislation to begin next Tuesday.

The full appropriations committee will meet Tuesday morning to report on the measure formally. Subcommittee Chairman Woodrum (D-Va.) said that plans call for a final House vote not later than Wednesday night.

Predicting one of the fastest spending programs in history, responsible officials forecast today that the \$7,000,000,000 lease-lend appropriation would be spent and the weapons delivered to Great Britain and other friendly nations within the next 18 months.

These persons indicated that this was the goal of those who drafted the program, and they believed it could be achieved.

They said it would swell the Federal Budget for the next fiscal year to more than \$20,000,000,000, making it easily the biggest in United States history, and heading by more than \$2,000,000,000 the budget for the year 1942.

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
