Martin Firm Growth Is Described

Broader and more sophisticated communications systems, greater use of lasers, wide application of space development to civilian use were some of the future potentials of Martin Company and described its many accomplishments. Out of a total personnel force of 8,700 persons, nearly 30 per cent are engineers, with more than 20 per cent engaged in production; 25 per cent in administration and 35 per cent in technical work, Fetrov said. He noted that the average employee is less than 35 years of age and nearly 30 per cent of the employees are enrolled in higher educational courses. Out of total disbursements of \$57 million in 1965, \$16 million was spent in Florida, not counting the \$7.9 million payroll, plus general business and expenses and taxes of \$11 million. Fetrov emphasized that 40-50 missiles have been built by Martin with 11,214 other aircraft constructed. Eleven spacecraft or satellites have been placed in orbit by Martin's boosters. Describing the Sprint intercept missile, Fetrov commented that the missile, only 34 feet long, is faster than the most high-powered rifle bullet. He also described the ramjet across address communication system which uses light beams instead of wires or cables and is jam-proof, for greatly improved communications in space or in the field. He noted that Martin's work is primarily that of tactical warfare, application of missiles and rockets, as well as the space program. He estimated it takes seven to ten years to get an item from the drawing board to production, by which time it is often out-dated by new discoveries. Last year 17,000 visitors toured the Martin plant, a majority of them military officials.

Shaded Tobacco Cancer Cure
MADISON, Wis. (AP) — Two well-known scientists at the University of Wisconsin say unpublished research shows tobacco plants may be an answer to a possible cause of lung cancer. Chester W. Francis and Gordon Chester said Monday tests show that rain saturates leaves with two substances found in natural radioactive fallout—lead 210 and polonium 210. They said polonium 210 vaporizes at the temperature of a burning cigarette and enters the lungs. Although there is only "about one ounce of polonium 210 in every trillion tons of tobacco," Chester said, "rain-exposed tobacco is at least 100 times more contaminated than rain-protected tobacco." Tobacco industry spokesmen say there has been no scientific evidence that smoking causes cancer.

Part 2 In A Series Bus Driver Moans -- 'It's Murder'

The school bus situation in Seminole County (part 2) By DONNA ESTES

"The first school bus fatality in Seminole County will happen right here at Sanford Junior High if they don't make the kids riding the second run stay behind the fence until after the first run loads and leaves," one school bus driver predicted Wednesday.

"We have begged and begged officials to do something about this situation, but they just ignore us. Everytime I pull out from the school, I hold my breath for fear some child will dart into the path of my bus," she complained.

Another said, "I don't like to pack these kids into my bus like sardines. Sometimes they stand in the steps even after I tell them it is dangerous. It's not safe. We complain, but what good does it do us? We are practically told by the school officials that if we don't like it, we can quit. I can't afford to quit. I need my job."

The drivers of 14 of the 18 buses are smartly attired in uniform blue blouses and white blouses with patches on their sleeves denoting the number of years of safe driving of each of the women. The lone male driver is also handsomely dressed in blue trousers and white shirt with the familiar school patch.

The drivers who transport the students on the first run park their buses on Eighteenth Street and chat with one another while waiting for school to "let out."

When the bell rings, their smiles remain, but each says she is taking a deep breath in preparation for the "trial ahead."

The drivers tell readily of experiences with their more adventurous passengers who try to smuggle everything from pet snakes to puppets aboard the buses despite the rule prohibiting "pets" on the vehicles.

As at Lyman, the first run buses at Sanford Junior High leave at 7:45 and the second run buses at 8:00.

Students said they really didn't mind "queuing in the bus at first. It's kind of fun, but it sure gets tiresome after a few blocks."

After the last bus left, a few stragglers who live close enough to walk to school were making their way.

"I don't have to ride the bus. City Hall looks good freshly painted. But the city sticks out like a sore thumb. When is the city gonna paint it?"

2 Sanford Banks Tied In McNulty Holding Plan OK'd

Expansion of the McNulty group of banks including Sanford's Florida State Bank and United State Bank of Seminole was pictured today with approval of a plan to acquire majority interest in 11 Florida banks.

In permitting the parent company of the McNulty group — First Florida Bancorporation of Haines City — to become a bank holding company, the Federal Reserve Board decision held there would be no monopoly.

The 11 banks had total deposits of \$92 million as of last Dec. 31 and total assets of \$108.5 million as of last June 30. Assets are: National Bank of Melbourne, \$34.6 million; Florida State Bank of Sanford, \$17.3 million; Bank of Zephyrhills, \$12 million; State Bank of Haines City, \$10.9 million; DeSoto National Bank of Arcadia, \$10 million; Okeechobee County Bank of Okeechobee, \$8.3 million; First State Bank of Fort Meade, \$7.9 million; Bank of Mulberry, \$6.8 million; Bank of Lake Alfred, \$6 million; United State Bank of Seminole, \$2.8 million, and National Bank of West Melbourne, \$1.6 million.

Further, shareholders in the individual banks will exchange their stock for shares in the parent corporation.

T. E. Tucker, Sanford chairman of the board of First Florida Bancorporation, said this morning the approved plan, under the Bank Holding Company Act of 1956, will permit the corporation to expand, either through the purchase of existing banks or establishment of new banks.

Homemaker's Corner

We have a request for a repeat of several recipes requiring honey. They are both very good as I have tried them. Here they are.

GINGERBREAD MEN
2 1/2 cups flour
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. baking soda
1 tsp. cinnamon
1/2 tsp. ginger
1/2 cup shortening
1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar
3/4 cup molasses
2 eggs, vinegar
1 egg
2 tbsps. lard and green confecturers frosting
4 ingredients. Set aside. Cream butter and sugar. Add brown sugar, molasses and eggs. Mix well. Add flour and baking soda and salt. Stir until well mixed. Dough will be stiff. Cover; chill until firm enough to roll out. Set oven for 375 degrees. Grease cookie sheets. On a floured board, roll out dough, a little at a time, about 1/4-inch thick. Cut with a floured gingerbread man-cutter. Bake on cookie sheets 8 to 10 minutes. Cool slightly, remove from sheets to wire racks. Cool, decorate with frosting, sugar candies and dragées. Makes about 4 dozen five-inch tall men.

TRIX LOLLIPOPS
(For the smally)
20 marshmallows
2 tbsps. butter
1/4 tsp. salt
4 cups Trix
Melt marshmallows, butter and salt over low heat in saucepan. Stir until smooth. Pour mixture over Trix in buttered bowl and mix gently. Shape into ten 2-inch balls. Insert peppermint sticks or other candy sticks into balls. Allow to harden slightly before serving.

BROCCOLI WITH LEMON BUTTER
3 lbs. broccolis
1 pkg. (10 1/2 oz.) frozen broccoli
2 tbsps. butter, melted
1 tsp. lemon juice
Fry bacon until crisp; drain and crumble. Cook broccoli as directed on package; drain. Combine melted butter and lemon juice; pour over broccoli. Top with crumbled bacon. Makes 2 generous servings.

BROWNIE PIE
1 envelope Lucky Whip dessert topping mix prepared according to package directions
2 tbsps. cream cheese, softened
2 tbsps. butter, melted
1/2 cup panache mix
For the orange sauce, simmer orange juice and sugar until slightly thickened, about 15 minutes. For the cream, place milk and eggs in a shaker or glass jar. Add panache mix and shake vigorously 30 times or until butter bubbles. Pour in enough batter to coat bottom of pan with a thin layer. Bake until delicately browned on under side; turn and bake on other side. Remove from frying pan. Roll up and serve with orange sauce. Garnish with orange slices if desired.

Approximately 3,000 people are expected to watch the performance of the Navy's famous flight demonstration team, the Blue Angels, at 11 a.m. Saturday during the Open House held at Sanford Naval Air Station.

Gates open for the Navy Day celebration at 9 a.m. and the spectators will begin to stream in.

Guests of the station will have an hour before the Blue Angels' show to view the many exhibits and displays.

Aircraft on static display will include an RA-5C "Vigilante," a TA-28 "Skywarrior" and a TF-47 "Cougar."

Some of the exhibits set up in the east bay of Hangar 4 will include ordnance, ejection seat, survival equipment, meteorological instruments, fire and crash vehicles and a Marine Corps weapons display.

Amply parking space will be provided for the many visitors. The gates to the Open House, Friday, the Navy is sponsoring a Civilian/Navy golf tournament at the Mayfair Country Club.

All of the events planned are in honor of Navy Day which actually falls on Oct. 27.

Oct. 22 was selected as the date for the Naval Air Station's Open House since the Blue Angels were able to appear that day.

The Blue Angels are the seven Navy pilots flying the F-4 "Phantom" and demonstrating precision techniques of Naval Aviation to naval personnel and to the public.

The 1966 Blue Angels line up is Cdr. Bob Aumack No. 1, leader; Capt. Fred Craig, flying No. 2 on the right wing; Lt. Clarence (Bud) Hubbard, flying No. 3 on the left wing; Lt. Frank Mazzardi, flying No. 4 in the slot of "Tail-End Charlie" position of the Blue Angels Diamond formation. Lt. Norman Gandia flies No. 5.

Lt. Dave Bottgering, the Blue Angels' public information officer, narrates the show and flies the two-seat TF-47 "Cougar" on jet orientation flights for newspaper, television, and radio-media representatives. Lt. Cdr. Jack Gougar, the team engineering officer, flies the C-54 transport, which carries the maintenance crew and support equipment.

Among all flight demonstration teams the Blue Angels fly the world's tightest Diamond formation with almost complete wing overlap between aircraft, while their speed varies from over 500 miles per hour to just above stalling speeds of 170 miles per hour in their Diamond slow pass.

The Blue Angel formations several times during the show. These are done so smoothly and rapidly that some are incorporated in the maneuvers and done before the eyes of the spectators.

An Accident Hunting Place To Happen

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP)—Are there people who are accident prone? Here are three.

According to an expert in the field, you are one of them.

Dr. Oswald Fine, assistant professor of psychology at the University of Kentucky, explains that everybody can be accident prone under certain pressures.

For example: Just before leaving for work, a man finds out that he is overdrawn at the bank. While driving his car, his mind is centered on money matters, not traffic. He is in an accident looking for a place to happen.

"We're made vulnerable at certain times during our lives, too, such as times of transition, change or stress," Fine said.

"For example, when a student leaves school and goes into the outside world."

This type of accident proneness, for most of us, is a temporary thing, Fine said. But there are some for whom it is more or less permanent.

"There are people who by their very character invite accidents," Fine told business and industry representatives Monday at a discussion sponsored by a local mental health group.

Generally, he said, these people fall into one or more of these categories:

—Those seeking self-punishment. This might be a person who has committed what he or she felt was a great wrong and unconsciously wants to punish himself or herself for it.

—Those seeking self-injury to ward off disaster. Fine used an example of a student headed for an examination he knows he will fail. An auto accident will keep him from getting there.

—Those seeking cure or pity. Fine noted that a plain-looking secretary who has been injured in an accident receives flowers and attention from men who otherwise might not notice her.
