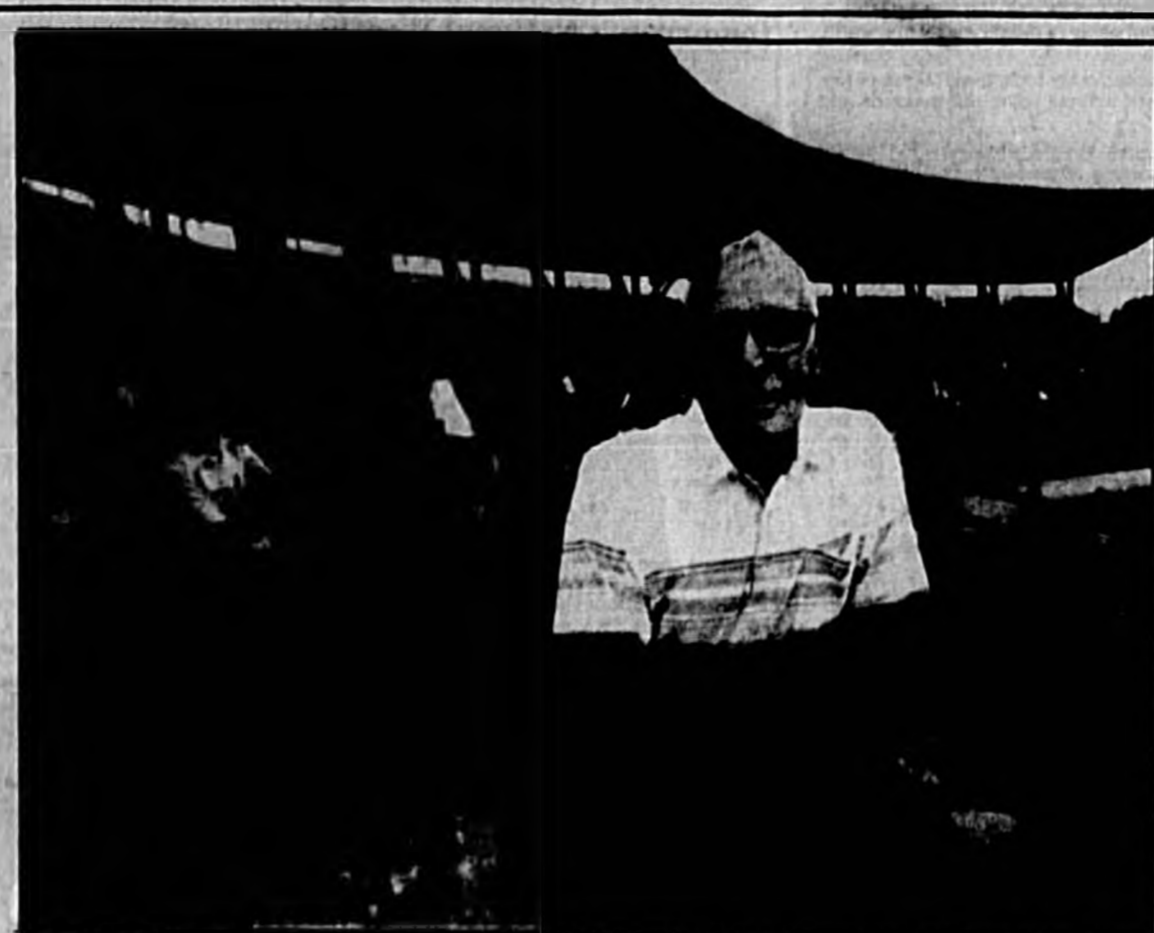

Sanford stadium is the place of legends

SANFORD - Imagine more than 80,000 people attending baseball games and other events at Sanford Memorial Stadium every year.

Local baseball legend Buddy Lake remembers playing for Sanford's Florida State League teams in the 1940's that packed more than 80,000 in attendance for a 140-game season at a time when the city's population was only 10,000.

As city officials and business leaders kicked off a fund raising campaign Wednesday to help raise \$1.7 million to renovate the stadium, Lake could see the days coming when the now-rusty stadium is again filled with cheering crowds.

"Sanford was a great sporting town back in those days," Lake said. "Attendance for the year was eight times the population of the town. The officials should be complemented for trying to bring back the tradition."

City officials and area chambers of commerce hosted a Business After Hours event Wednesday prior to a high school baseball game at the stadium. Seminole High School, ranked No. 3 in the class 5A state baseball polls, beat the Oviedo Lions 7-3. Oviedo is ranked No. 3 in class 6A in state baseball polls.

The city of Sanford has committed \$500,000 toward renovations for the stadium. The City is requesting \$600,000 in Seminole County Tourist Development Council funding for the stadium. The rest of the funding will come from state and private sources, officials said.

"We're continuing to renovate the field," Sanford Mayor Larry Dale said. "It's in great shape. The field is one of the best in the country. Now, we need to renovate the stadium itself, and that takes money."

City officials and members of the Central Florida Sports Commission say the renovated stadium could host baseball and softball tournaments, as well as concerts and

other events.

The plans for the renovated stadium call for 1,472 seats in the bleachers, with additional seating available along the foul lines. There would be 133 total parking spaces.

Seminole County Commission Chairman Carlton Henley said he hopes to see the city's plans for the stadium succeed. But he said he was uncertain whether the county funding would be approved when it comes before the County Commission in May.

"There are a lot of other things competing for TDC money as well," Henley said. "Such as the hotel/conference center (proposed for Sanford's waterfront)."

During the event, the City dedicated the stadium's Dugout Club to Lake. Lake played at the old Sanford Municipal Stadium as well as Sanford Memorial Stadium.

Sanford Memorial Stadium was completed in 1951, replacing the municipal stadium that stood just to the north of the current stadium, where Hamilton Elementary School is now located.

Sanford was the spring training home of the New York Giants from 1948 through 1951, until the team moved to San Francisco, according to the Sanford Museum.

Lake is remembered for winning a Florida State League batting title and pitching a perfect game in the same season, but he said his favorite memory of 1946 was scoring the winning run against St. Augustine to give Sanford the Florida State League championship.

"It was the ninth inning with two outs," Lake said. "I stole home, and we won the playoffs. The stands were packed with over 3,000 people. The reaction they had to scoring that run is my favorite memory from here."

Dale said that several years ago, the stadium came too close to being torn down.

"The stadium wouldn't even be here today if it wasn't for (City Commissioner) Whitey Eckstein," Dale said.

Tim Raines, a Seminole High School graduate now playing with the Oakland A's, is donating more than \$50,000 toward the stadium renovations.

Commission will consider jail expansion

SEMINOLE COUNTY - The Seminole County Commission is considering a request for funding to expand the county jail, as well as proposed zoning amendments.

The Commission reviewed a request Tuesday from the Seminole County Sheriff's Office to expand the John E. Polk Correctional Facility. County staff will study the costs of housing 236 federal prisoners and purchasing land for the expansion.

"One of the questions we had was that the cost for additional land was not figured into the proposal," Commission Chairman Carlton Henley said.

The sheriff's office is requesting \$5,581,000 in federal assistance for the construction of two new jail buildings. If approved, the state funding would reduce the amount of required county funds.

Seminole County Sheriff Don Ealinger said that inmate population at the jail has increased from 670 in 1995 to a projected 1,080 in 1999.

Ealinger said the sheriff's office has attempted to reduce the jail's population by erecting tents to house weekenders, sending low risk inmates to a Work Release Center, and working with various jail alternative programs.

Despite these efforts, Ealinger said the jail population continues to grow, and that the overcrowding necessitates expansion of the jail.

The county jail was built 19 years ago with a capacity of 240 beds. In 1967, it was expanded to its current capacity of 612 beds at a cost of \$14 million.

Ealinger is requesting two new buildings, each with a capacity of 236 beds. It is anticipated that 146 of the new beds would be allocated for housing federal prisoners, making a total of 236 beds used by federal prisoners.

Officials estimate that construction costs of \$17,500 per bed add up to \$8.26 million. There are additional costs for design architecture, site work, utilities, cabling, and equipment.

The County is budgeted to receive \$1.4 million this year in federal inmate per diem revenue.

Henley said the measure will come before the Commission again in late-April or May.

The commission also discussed proposed land development code amendments on Tuesday. One proposal before the Board to change required side yard setbacks from 10-feet to 7 1/2 feet. The Board did not take action on the measures.

The Board is considering re-

Awareness program will fight consumer phone fraud

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Today marks the beginning of BellSouth's Neighborhood Watch awareness program to combat consumer fraud.

Featuring an internet site, instructional brochures and a toll-free phone line, the initiative was created to address the

more than 14,000 illegal telemarketing operations currently in place around the country. Cheating an estimated one of six consumers, telemarketing fraud costs the public \$40 billion annually, according to BellSouth spokesman Larry Strickler, a resident of Longwood.

"It's only fitting to announce this consumer fraud initiative on April Fool's Day," Strickler

said. "We believe the best defense against fraud is consumer action." The top two choices for purveyors of telephone fraud are slamming and cramming.

Slammers switch phone service to another, unauthorized, long distance company without the consumer's knowledge. Crammers place unauthorized charges on a

Bringing the Bible down to earth

I once had the idea to write a book titled "The Intelligent Man's Guide to the Bible for Harvard MBAs and Other No-Nonsense Believers."

But around that time sexism in all its forms became politically incorrect and the title had to be changed to "The Intelligent Man's and Woman's Guide to the Bible..." This took some revision in the text and the book was never written.

Now it HAS been — by someone more competent than I and with a title that is less of a tongue twister.

William Hollis Tegarden has published an attractively designed and instructive paperback call "The Bible Nobody Knows" (Princeton Resource Publications, Princeton, NJ 08540, 1997).

In his introduction, Tegarden writes: "The scholarly study of the Bible, begun in earnest by the late 19th century, has made tremendous strides in the past one hundred years, bringing about a revolutionary change in our understanding and perspective of the Bible. Based on these findings, the Bible has become a new and different book altogether and which, I believe, has become more enjoyable to read."

Tegarden says there are several reasons why this "new" Bible has not made itself more readily known to laymen and laywomen today, something his book sets out to correct.

One reason, he says, is that most modern Bible readers do not want to struggle with the Scriptures. The Bible, to them, is for inspiration. They

want to leave the scholarship to the scholars.

Then, says Tegarden, much as we love the Bible, a little bit of it goes a long way with most of us. He tells the story of the little girl who went to her mother with a question. Her mother was busy with other things so she told

her to ask her father for the answer. "But Mommy," the child replied, "I don't want to know THAT much about it." In other words, our interest in the Bible, as in most other subjects, is limited.

Tegarden has also found that most Bible scholars present their findings in such technical language that it takes another scholar to write a book explaining what the earlier one had written.

Tegarden thus set himself another task. He says, "I endeavored to interpret the new scholarly language and thought with sufficient clarity that you do not need to attend a theological seminary (Tegarden studied his theology at Harvard) to understand and enjoy the new 'Bible Nobody Knows.'"

One of the most innovative ideas in Bible studies is a four-page newspaper called *Chronicles* that uses the vehicles of modern journalism to tell the Bible story. The tabloid was on sale in Israel the last time I was there.

The banner headline on the front page blared, "Sodom and Gomorrah Wiped Out in Worst Disaster Since the Flood."

The paper has many features of present day newspapers, including *Late Bulletins*, *Letters to the Editor*, *Fashions*, classified ads and even a gossip column.

A "Situations Wanted" ad was placed by an Irrigator. "Part- or full-time. Wages in barley or silver. Contact at East Gate in Ur every morning."

The gossip column ("This 'n' That")

in one edition told of attending a banquet at Isaac's tent ("gorging the food pipe," the writer calls it).

"Take it from me," he says, "I've eaten at Laban's up north. I've feasted at the palace of Apopi in Zoan, and I've filled my belly at the sumptuous Hotel Zon in Jericho. But never have I enjoyed a meal so much as in Isaac's tent last night."

The reporter writes of eating "goat's cheese and cake made of pure white flour... young goat fried in butter... all washed down with several licks of cold honey. This, Isaac explains, prevents intoxication."

With a little imagination like this and Tegarden's deft handling of the Scriptures, we may soon have a "Bible Everybody Knows."

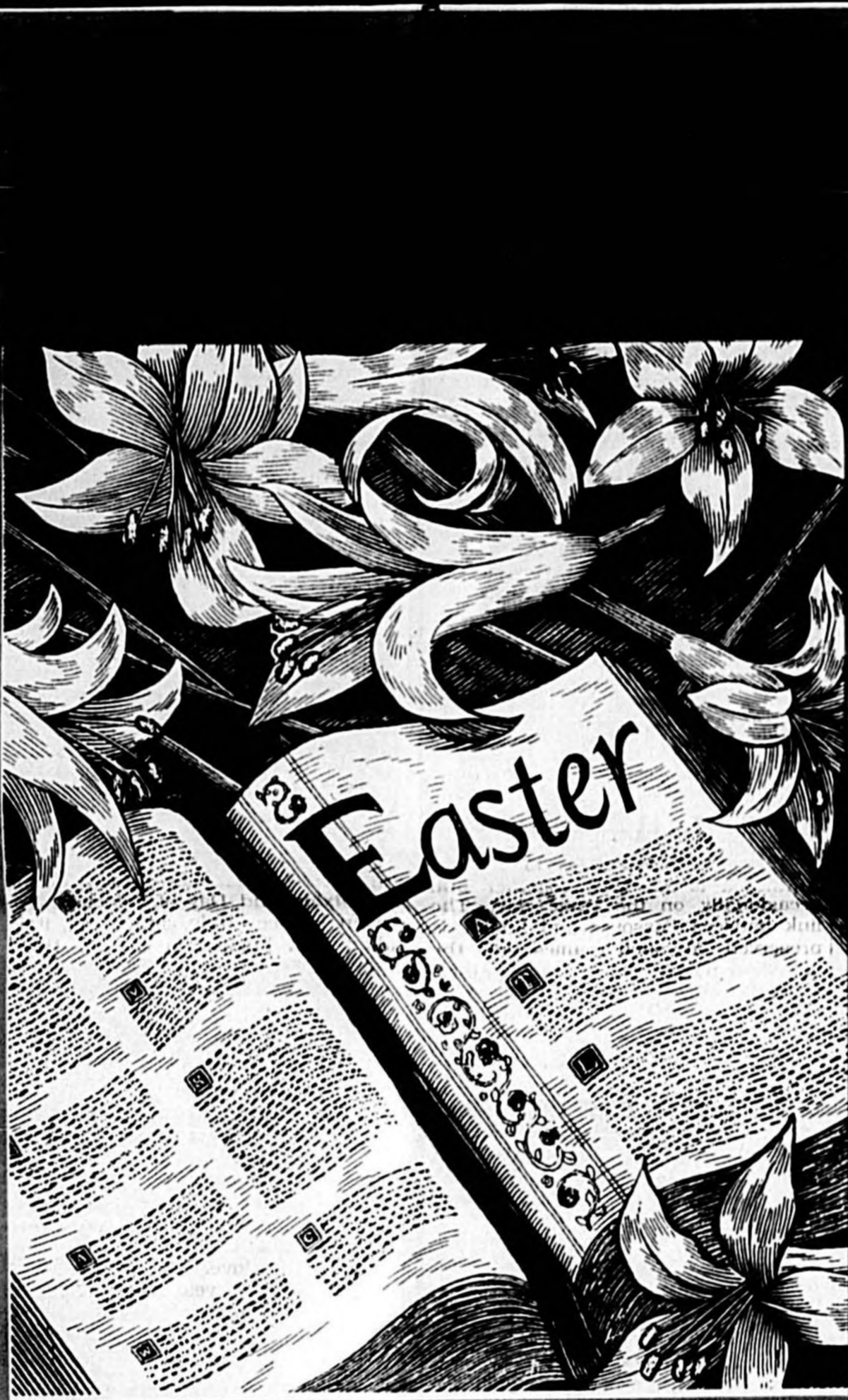

Are bigger churches better?

With everything due to change in the coming millennium, will the churches change as well? Some predict that we will see bigger churches taking the place of "the little brown church in the vale" in 2000.

Take the McLean Bible Church outside Washington, D.C. Founded in 1981 with 1,000 members, the church now attracts between 4,000 and 6,000 worshippers to its Sunday and weekend services (including Ken Starr of Monica Lewinsky fame, and other top dogs in the nation's capital).

Some believe that creative programs and active church groups become possible only with size. Others contend that a big church can actually be warmer and

more personal than smaller churches.

Because there are more people, there are more opportunities to make friends, points out the pastor of a 2,000-member Baptist church. His church, he says, brings together between 70 and 80 married couples in a Sunday-school class of their own each week.

"As long as you meet the needs of your people, you are not too large," says the minister of this church.

Yet there are city dwellers who like the family feeling of a small church.

"It was wonderful. Even the dogs knew me," says a retired big-city minister, looking back over the early years of his ministry in a rural parish. "I knew who had arthritis. I knew the children's names. It was a time of great joy."

Not that the larger churches don't often fill an important role in the personal lives of their members.

McLean Bible Church has "caring teams" which help particularly the elderly with their chores. Some churches hang sign-up sheets in the foyer where people can request a ride to the supermarket or get a church member to install a smoke alarm. You can even get your car repaired by one of these caring teams.

The main drawback of the big church may be its lack of family feeling, laments the rabbi of a large suburban synagogue. "I don't know my congregation anymore. The people feel they are lost in the system," he says.

The smaller churches may lack elaborate services and big choirs, and the

flowers on the altar may come from Elsie's back-yard garden instead of the florist downtown.

But one would be hard-pressed to find words more eloquent than those spoken by the pastor of a storefront Pentecostal church in St. Louis on the occasion of a memorial service for a group of teen-agers who died when their church bus was washed away in a flash flood.

Many of the largest churches today are Roman Catholic, but it is not because the church considers bigness to be a good thing.

It's more a case of practicality, says a Catholic diocesan official. "We might like to put up more parishes, but where would we get the priests to put in them?"

Easter's history & traditions

Easter history

Easter and Pentecost, two of Christianity's most important holy days, have their origins in the Jewish festivals of Passover and Shavuot. Indeed, many early Jewish Christians continued not only to observe the Sabbath, or Saturday, as a holyday, they also continued to celebrate the Jewish festivals. In time, however, these festival observances were transformed into commemorations of New Testament events.

When the church began to celebrate Easter in the second century, there was disagreement over whether it should be kept on Passover or consistently on a Sunday. But the Council of Nicea in A.D. 325 fixed the date as the Sunday after the first full moon following the vernal, or spring, equinox. Thus, the Jewish and Christian holydays were separated, though they continued to fall close together and occasionally on the same day. The link between Passover and Easter is preserved in such names for the Christian holyday as Pasqua (Italian), Pascua (Spanish), and Paques (French).

Holy Week

How are the days from Palm Sunday to Easter Sunday linked to Jesus' story? Hearing that Jesus was coming to Jerusalem (JN. 12:13) Passover pilgrims "took branches of palm trees and went out to meet him." Mark relates that on Jesus' arrival (MK. 11:8-9) "many spread their garments on the road, and others spread leafy branches which they had cut from the fields," and cries of "Hosanna!" filled the air. So began the first day of Jesus' last week, observed today as Palm Sunday. Gradually, the commemoration of Jesus' death and resurrection expanded to an entire holyweek that starts with Palm Sunday, Maundy, or Holy Thursday, marks the Last Supper; Good Friday,

Jesus' death on the cross; Holy Saturday, a day of vigil; and Easter Sunday, His resurrection, the joyous confirmation of Christ's divinity. Good Friday

Why is the Friday before Easter called Good Friday? There is no single, widely accepted explanation of why the most solemn day of the Christian liturgical calendar-the commemoration of Jesus' death on the cross - came to be called Good Friday. Some claim that good is a corruption of God and that the name was actually God's Friday. Others hold that good refers to the belief that Christ died for the good of mankind, for human salvation from sin. A third theory states that good is an archaic term for holy; a fourth, that good was a euphemism for bad. Not until the fourth century was Good Friday observed apart from Easter. Early names were the Festival of the Crucifixion and Day of Salvation. Today in France, Italy, and Spain, it is called Holy Friday; in Greece, Holy, or Great, Friday.

Easter traditions

Many Easter customs come from the Old World. The white lily, the symbol of the resurrection, is the special Easter flower which stands for purity. Artists for centuries have pictured the Angel Gabriel coming to the Virgin Mary with a spray of lilies in his hand, to announce that she is to be the mother of the Christ Child. The lily is also the sign of the Resurrection. The lovely white Madonna lily was used for years as the Easter lily. It often failed to bloom in time for Easter, however, and so Bremuda lilies were substituted.

Rabbits and colored eggs have come from pagan antiquity as symbols of new life. Easter Monday egg rolling, a custom of European origin, has become a tradition on the lawn of the White House.

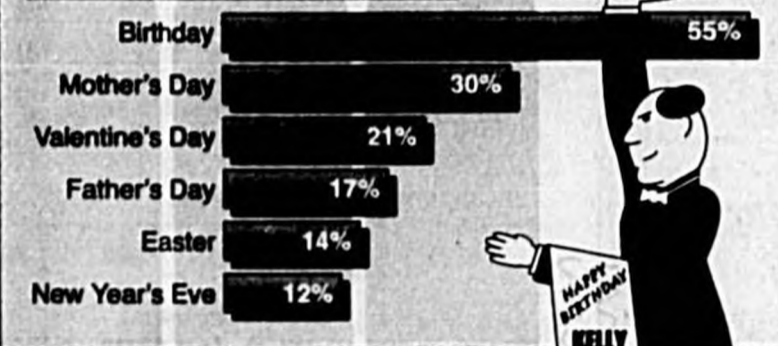

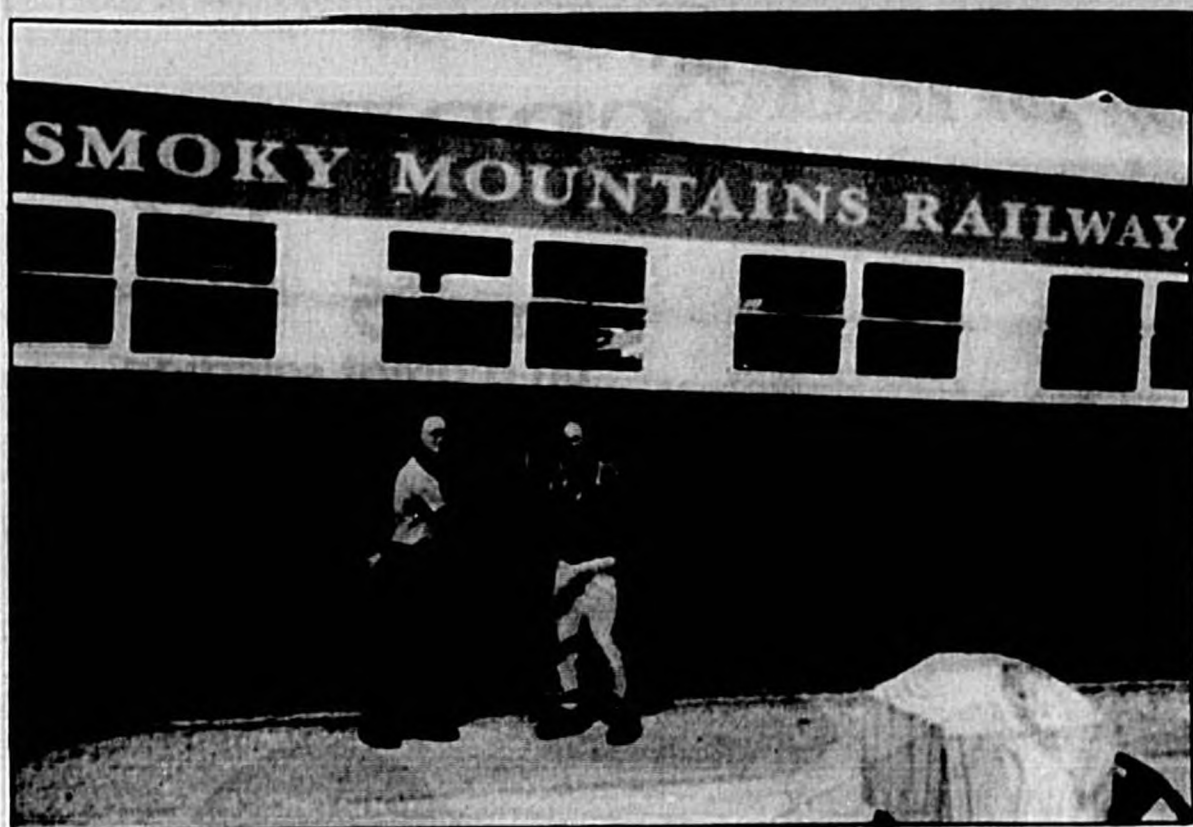

Sanford 1930s biographies

The following are additional biographies from the April 29, 1933 edition of the Sanford Herald.

Alex Vaughn

Alexander Vaughn's parents were natives of Virginia who had moved to Fort Reed several years before the Civil War where they operated a farm. Their son Alexander was born there in the family home in 1850. His father was A.J. Vaughn who had married Louise Katherine Lee, a first cousin of General Robert E. Lee. Her father and General Lee's father were brothers.

Alex Vaughn assisted his father on their farm for about 20 years and then in 1905 he was elected to the office of County Tax Assessor. He had consistently been re-elected to this position which he held at the time.

Mr. Vaughn was an Elk, Moose and an Eagle and was also a member of the Knights of Pythias, Masonic Order and Holy Cross Episcopal Church.

For almost half a century, Mr. Vaughn had resided at 2002 Park Avenue. Before her marriage, Mrs. Vaughn was Mrs. Eliza Doudney who had also lived in Sanford for many years.

From a previous marriage, Mr. Vaughn had the following children: Mrs. W.W. Ire, Alex, Arthur J., Mrs. M.Y. Bledsoe and Mrs. Mary Jane Downing. (Does anyone know who his first wife was, the mother of these children?)

D.K. McNab

Since coming to Sanford in 1924, David K. McNab had been an employee of Hill Lumber Company, desk sergeant of the local police force, a building material salesman and was presently manager of the Seminole County Credit Association with offices in the Western Union Building on Park Avenue.

Mr. McNab was born in Olar, SC, but had spent his early life in Douglas, Georgia. He studied at Georgia Normal College and Business Institute in Douglas.

He was married to the former Lucille Echels and had three children: Richard Kirk, Barbara and David. The family resided at 515 Magnolia Avenue.

GRACE STENOGRAPHER



Besides being a member of the local Masonic Lodge, Mr. McNab was active at First Baptist Church where he was a deacon, Sunday School Superintendent and BYFU Director.

Boy Scout work was his hobby; he was presently scout master of a local troop. His favorite recreation was fishing.

(Mrs. Lucille McNab was my excellent fifth grade teacher at Sanford Grammar School. I also knew the family at First Baptist and their children were a few years ahead of me in school. They lived near the Grammar School at 618 Elm Avenue. The oldest son was known as "Zeke"; I don't know how that came from Richard Kirk. The twins were Barbara and Bobby (David Robert?). Zeke graduated from SHS in 1949 and Barbara in 1951. She married Herman Swagerty (1951 also) and they have lived in Palatka for many years. I believe that Bobby went to the school for the deaf in St. Augustine.)

Mrs. J.T. Griffin was born in Woking, Surrey, England and came to the United States at the age of 17 after first visiting in Canada. Since making her home in this country, she had traveled in practically every state in various vaudeville circuits and had appeared in motion pictures for several years.

In 1924 she made her home in Miami where she remained until moving to Sanford in 1931 with her husband, J.T. Griffin, and son Albert Newton. Sanford residents were pleased that she had made this city her home and that she had purchased the Celery Club. She was owner and manager of the Celery City Tea Room, an attractive little cafe on the lakeshore.

Mrs. Griffin liked to watch baseball games, but would rather go fishing. Her favorite pastimes were reading and playing bridge while interior decorating and raising fine dogs were her hobbies.

Judge James Sharon
Before filling the office of Seminole County Judge, James O. Sharon was connected with various other occupations including the mercantile business with his brother in Quincy, 1907-14.

He then secured employment in the offices of the state comptroller where he remained for four years after which he accepted a position with the Federal Reserve Bank in Atlanta.

During all this time, Mr. Sharon had been studying law at night and was able to pass the bar exam while in Atlanta. He and his wife, the former Lois Audrey Smith, moved to Sanford in 1921 where he had practiced law and was presently Seminole County Judge.

Judge Sharon was a Spanish-American War veteran and a member of the Sanford Kiwanis Club, Elks, Woodman of the World, Knights of Pythias and the Men's Brotherhood of First Baptist Church.

He resided at 117 West Tenth Street with his wife and children: James, Jr.; Chandler, Alex and Jane. He was an avid football fan and spent his leisure time reading.

A. Wieboldt

A. Wieboldt was born in Altenbruch, Germany, but had been a resident of the United States since 1899. He had lived in several states before coming to Sanford in 1928.

When young, Mr. Wieboldt had attended schools in both England and Germany. He later studied at the Illinois College of Photography.

Since coming to Sanford, he had operated a photography shop which was presently located in the McLander Arcade. Over 95 percent of the photographs in this special issue of the Herald had been made by Mr. Wieboldt.

He lived with his family at 815 Laurel Avenue; this included his wife, the former Marie C. Meyer, and children Wilhemina, William and Lydia. They attended the Full Gospel Tabernacle.

House wants to repeal drink tax

TALLAHASSEE--The Florida Restaurant Association (FRA) announced that the HB 1955, sponsored by Representative Dave Bitner (R), 11-71, received unanimous support from members of the Florida House of Representatives. After a vote of 119-0, the bill is now on its way to the Florida Senate.

HB 1955 would begin to repeal the \$100 million alcoholic beverage surcharge tax which has burdened restaurant owners and operators since it passed late on the last night of the 1990 legislative session during a short-fall in the state's budget. The legislation would reduce the surcharge 33 1/3 percent beginning September 1, 1999. House and Senate leadership have pledged to assist FRA in seeking similar reductions in the next two years until the surcharge is totally repealed.

The tax requires restaurant owners and operators only--not wholesalers--to pay a tax, in addition to state sales tax, on alcoholic beverages served at a cost of 10 cents on each ounce of liquor, 10 cents for every four ounces of wine and four cents for every 12 ounces of beer served.

Carol Dover, President-CEO of the Florida Restaurant Association, has been the driving force behind repealing this tax since she took over FRA's leadership reins nearly four years ago. In her role as President-CEO, Dover lobbies for FRA which represents Florida's 36,000 restaurateurs. Under her leadership last year, FRA passed legislation to repeal this tax, only to have it vetoed by the late Governor Lawton Chiles.

Nearly 22,000 out of the 36,000 licensed vendors are required to pay the tax, keep records and remit the tax to the State of Florida. Penalties are imposed for underpayment, late payment and nonpayment. In Fiscal year, 1996-97, Florida collected more than \$1 million in penalty fees in addition, the state spends approximately \$2.3 million annually and requires more than 50 state employees to collect and administer the tax.

Dover said she hopes HB 1955 will be heard and voted on favorably by the Senate and if it reaches Governor Bush's desk, Dover is encouraged that the Governor will sign it.

Another 6A scalp for Nielsen

Seminole junior lefthander shuts down state-ranked Oviedo, 7-3

SANFORD - For the second time in less than a week, Seminole High School's Brian Nielsen pitched the Tribe to a varsity baseball victory over a state-ranked Class 6A team Wednesday night.

The Oviedo Lions, ranked third in the Class 6A state poll this week, were Nielsen's latest victims as the Fighting Seminoles posted a 7-3 victory behind his seven-hit, five-strikeout performance.

The win improves Seminole (ranked No. 3 in Class 5A) to 16-4.

Last Friday, Nielsen (6-1) was the winning pitcher as Seminole bested Sarasota-Riverview, then ranked No. 8 in Class 6A.

"He pitched well tonight," said Seminole coach Mike Powers. "He came back on just four days rest and did a good job against a very good baseball

team. After we gave him a lead to work with, he pitched a smart game."

Seminole exploited four Oviedo errors in the bottom of the first inning to score six runs. Seminole only had three hits in the frame - consecutive singles by Paulo Silva, Chaz Lytle, and Mike Robinson. Lytle had the only RBI in the game for the Tribe.

The Tribe added another unearned run (they scored a total of five) in the bottom of the second when Ricardo Montalvo doubled and scored on the Lions' fifth error.

"We capitalized on their mistakes early," said Powers. "Normally, Oviedo's not going to give you many opportunities or allow you extra outs. After that, we continued to hit the ball, but right at people."

Jeremy Griffith (4-1) settled down after Montalvo's double, retiring 14 of the last 18 batters he faced. After giving up four hits to the first 10 hitters, he

allowed just one hit - a two-out single by Silva in the fourth - over the final five innings.

Powers said that the Lions were a better team than their effort showed Wednesday.

"It looks like they are where we were last night," said Powers, referring to the Tribe's disappointing 3-1 loss to Deltona. "Maybe tonight will be a wakeup call for them. They're a good team with solid pitching, good defense, and good hitters ... they're better than the way they played tonight."

Oviedo scratched out three runs to make the final margin respectable.

In the fifth inning, Jeff Knapp doubled and scored on Brett Murphy's single. Blaine Schulte added a solo home run in the sixth (his ninth of the season). In the sixth inning, Bobby Mellor (running for Javier Alvarez) scored on Justin Holmes' flare single down the right field line.

Silva (2-for-4 with a run

scored) led the Seminole attack. Montalvo finished with a double and two runs scored. Lytle had a single, a run, and an RBI. Robinson also singled and scored a run. Chris Bachand scored a run.

Leading Oviedo (17-2) were Schulte (home run); Knapp (double, single, run); Holmes (single, RBI). Paul Lubrano, Brett Murphy, and Jered Goodwin (each with a single); and Mellor (one run scored).

Wednesday's game was also something of a special occasion in that it was played on Stenstrom-Rinker Field at Historic Sanford Memorial Stadium, a facility that holds innumerable fond memories for the coaching staffs of both teams.

"It was a wonderful to come back and play here tonight," said Oviedo coach Kenne Brown, who started his coaching career as an assistant to Powers at Seminole. "I spent a lot of time here working with Wes (Rinker) when I was a boy.

The City of Sanford has done a wonderful job renovating this facility. Seminole has a fine field on its campus, but the team and I really enjoyed the opportunity to play here this evening. I just wish we had played a better game."

Both teams have important district contests on tap this weekend.

On Friday night, the Lions will host the DeLand Bulldogs in a 6A-District 3 contest scheduled for a 7 p.m. start at Paul Milder Field. Seminole will return to its campus to entertain the Mainland Buccaneers in a 2 p.m. game on Saturday at Alumni Field.

Baseball should be ashamed

SANFORD - Did anyone see right through the absurdity of the Baltimore Orioles' visit to Cuba last Sunday?

Was anyone with any kind of a moral conscience disgusted when they saw Oriole baron Peter Angelos and baseball commissioner Bud Selig sitting next to Cuban dictator Fidel Castro, a man with a long history of civil rights violations who doesn't seem to have any intention of turning back from his despotic policies?

The Orioles and major league baseball tried to put a happy face on the whole thing. It would be great for international relations. It was an opportunity to give Cubans a change to see major leaguers for the first time in 40 years.

Please. The whole thing stunk all around and Cuban-Americans as well as all Americans should feel dirty after the exhibition.

Cuba, by the way, will be paying a return visit to Baltimore on May 3. Fidel Castro will be conspicuous by his absence.

Angelos, a man used to getting what he wants, unless it's a pennant, proposed the debate three years ago as a way to glimpse into the future of Cuban-American relations, one without Castro and a United States embargo.

Finally, the Clinton administration gave Angelos the okay to take his team to Cuba last month.

He also gave Angelos the privilege of being able to place Oriole logos all over Havana which will become a gold mine for the majors as soon as the Cubans are free to play in America, if ever.

But while all of this was happening, Cuba exiles were fleeing their homeland and families on flimsy rafts in shark-infested waters trying to free Castro's oppression.

Major Cuban government employees are making \$7 a day while the rest of what once was a beautiful country, struggle for less.

The United States created an economic embargo to show the Cubans that it would not tolerate an oppressive regime.

With one baseball game, America gave Cuba a major public relations coup.

What Castro did Sunday is similar to what Adolph Hitler did during the Nazi Olympics of 1936. It was a major propaganda movement designed to advance his sick policies.

Cuba has some of the most passionate baseball fans in the world. But they weren't at the game.

Instead, Castro made the 50,000 ticket list available by invitation only so that only Communist sympathizers and children could attend.

The real Cuban fans, the ones that would have died for a chance to see American major leaguers come to their country, were left outside the gates, listening to Castro's lackeys put on a spectacle before they headed home to their shacks.

This game was nothing more than a political show for Castro, much like the Hitler Olympics. And the Americans were nothing more than actors on a political stage.

News reports showed that most of the Oriole players didn't understand all the fuss. It was just a baseball game to them.

What a pity that only one of them - pitcher Jose Guzman - had the guts to skip the game. It shows how much major league millionaires keep up with the real world.

Their actions showed an endorsement of Castro policies, even though his country is a shambles.

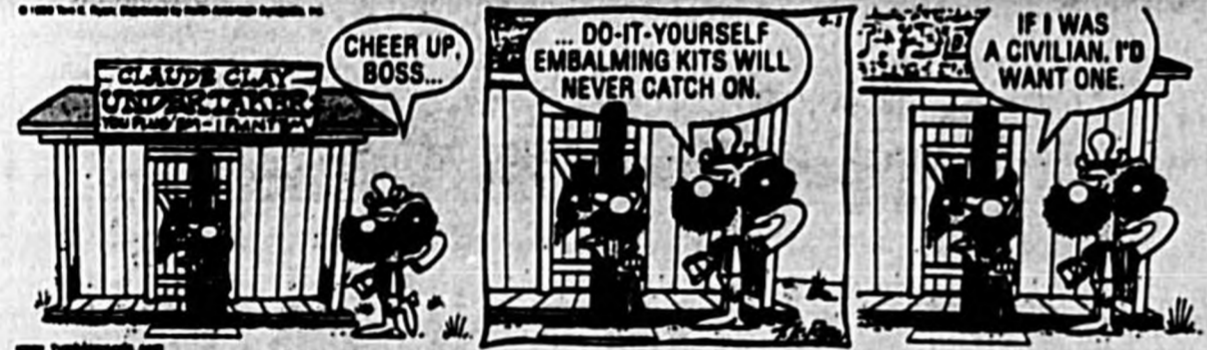

Is this serious or a joke?

This deal isn't instructive; it is bizarre, which seems appropriate for April Fools' Day.

Three questions: How many tricks can South win with spades as trumps? How many can West win with spades as trumps? That's not a pismir (sic). At a tournament, the auction starts as in the diagram. What would you, South, do, given that you know all 52 cards?

The deal was described by Hilary Quintana in the June 1997 issue of Bridge Plus magazine. It is reproduced with the permission of Quintana and the editor, Elena Jeronimidis.

First, suppose South is the declarer in three spades. If West leads a heart or the club king, declarer takes four hearts and one club, discarding dia-

monds from the dummy. He continues with his last heart, throwing dummy's final diamond. East ruffs, but the defenders score only four trump tricks. What if West leads the spade king? Dummy plays low. Or if West leads his low spade, dummy wins with the ace and returns a trump. Whatever the defense, it's three spades bid and made.

Now let's make West the declarer. If North leads the spade ace, West unblocks an honor. Alternatively, if North starts with a low trump, East's 10 takes the trick. In both cases, West gets into the dummy to cash those six diamond tricks to go with his three trump winners. It's three spades bid and made!

So, to answer the final question, after West opens three spades, South overcalls four spades! This is doubled and one down for minus 100, which is better than losing 140. (To ruin the story slightly, four clubs doubled is also one down.)

ASK DR. GOTT

Mites cause allergic reaction

DEAR DR. GOTT: For about five years, I have been infected with mites. My nose and eyes itch constantly. Local professionals have provided little, if any, relief. At age 77, I don't have much hope.

DEAR READER: It is unclear from your question how you have been infected. If you have mites in your skin, a condition called "scabies," applying medicated lotion, such as Kwell, will eradicate the problem.

On the other hand, people are often allergic to the mites that live in the dust of any home. Actually, people are allergic to the mites' excrement, which is carried in the dust and can cause typical allergic reactions in the eyes and upper respiratory tract — all the symptoms that plague people who are allergic to "house dust." Treatment is directed toward desensitizing patients with allergy shots, because it is virtually impossible to rid a house of dust mites. Take heart; an allergist may be able to help you.

To give you related information, I am sending you a copy of my Health Report "Allergies."

six months. However, we're having some sexual incompatability. When we have relations, I'm never turned on. Vaginal dryness makes intercourse uncomfortable. Does this mean that I have cancer or a bad disease?

DEAR READER: On the contrary. It sounds to me as though you are far from ready to have sex when your husband is aroused. This is a common marital problem. Teach your husband how to stimulate you — or stimulate yourself — during foreplay. Once you are aroused, the lubrication problem should solve itself. Or, if you would prefer, use one of the many commercially available personal lubricants. I seriously doubt that your dryness

indicates a gynecological disorder. Most women who experience this problem are victims more of poor timing than of illness.

DEAR DR. GOTT: What is esophageal stenosis? What can be done about it?

DEAR READER: Esophageal stenosis means that there is a constriction somewhere along the course of the esophagus, from the throat to the stomach. This condition usually causes difficulty swallowing; this may be particularly noticeable when chunks of food, especially meat, become stuck and won't go down.

Some forms of stenosis (narrowing) are congenital: Babies can be born with them. In such cases, surgery is necessary.

In adults, stenosis is more likely the result of esophageal irritation, such as the chronic burning of gastric acid. In this instance, antacids may help ease symptoms, but a procedure to stretch and dilate the narrowed esophagus is usually necessary. Esophageal cancer, too, can cause stenosis. For obvious reasons, this is a very serious condition for which surgery is the usual treatment of choice.
