

Miners Rescued Five After Being In Shaft 7 Days

(Continued from Page 1)
 Doubled their efforts to clear away the mire, others rushed to the bottom of the shaft and called up to the top.
 "Come down here now," they shouted to the men assembled at the mine mouth.
 Fifteen picked men, assigned to the shaft first in the event the men were found, immediately went down in the tunnel and assisted the men in reaching the surface. One by one they emerged into the sunlight, while the waiting crowds cheered lustily.
 The joy of relatives was shared by rescue workers and others who witnessed many touching scenes when the miners embraced their loved ones.
 Fifteen First Enter Shaft
 Cobb, the first to see the sunlight, was grinning broadly as he climbed weakly from the tube and was enfolded in the arms of his wife and children.
 Cobb was followed by James and Cantiller and then Watson and Wilson came up in the next bucket.
 All of the men were in good condition except Cantiller, who had contracted a severe cold and had wrenched his back while fighting his way through the timber-choked drift.
 The rescue was effected after nearly seven days of unceasing effort in which more than 200 miners and engineers battled against handicaps and frequent reverses.
 The men were entombed at 10 p. m. last Thursday night.
 "We lived in hope and prayed," Cobb said.
 "It was a terrible ordeal, being sealed 150 feet under ground without food and practically no water. We had no idea of how long we had been there.
 "Probably it was well that we did lose all account of time. Had we known of the hours that passed we might not have stood the waiting as well.
 Four in Good Physical Condition
 "Four of us were working 700 feet back from the entrance when water poured in.
 "James was up ahead and might have gotten out, but he came back to warn us.
 "There were only four matches in our possession. We conserved them as long as possible. We had no food. The only water we had was in a small tobacco can. We shared this, only moistening our lips.
 "Using only one light at a time, we managed to have light for a long time. I don't now how long. When the light burned out we were left in the darkness.
 "We knew they were coming after us. How we hoped and prayed."

 WHEREAS The Legislature of 1925 under the Constitution of 1885 of the State of Florida did pass the Joint Resolutions proposing amendments to the Constitution of the State of Florida, and the same were agreed to by a vote of three-fifths of all the members elected to each house of the Legislature on said Joint Resolutions were entered upon their respective journals, with the yeas and nays thereon, and they did determine and direct that the said Joint Resolutions be submitted to the electors of the State at the General Election in November, 1926.
 NOW, THEREFORE, I, H. CLAY CHAWPORD, Secretary of State of the State of Florida, do hereby give notice that a
GENERAL ELECTION
 will be held in each county of Florida on Tuesday next succeeding the first Monday in November, A. D. 1926, the said Tuesday being the
SECOND DAY OF NOVEMBER
 for the ratification or rejection of the said Joint Resolutions proposing amendments to the Constitution of the State of Florida, viz:
A JOINT RESOLUTION Proposing an Amendment to Section 9 of Article XII of the Constitution of the State of Florida Relating to Education. Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Florida, That the following amendment to Section 9 of Article XII of the Constitution of the State of Florida relating to Education be and the same is hereby agreed to and shall be submitted to the Electors of the State at the General Election of Representatives in 1926, for approval or rejection.
 Section 9. In addition to the tax provided for in Section 8 of this Article the County School Fund shall consist of the proportion of the interest of the State School Fund and of the one-half State tax apportioned to the county, all certain taxes collected within the county and all appropriations by the Legislature which shall with all other County School Funds be apportioned and distributed as may be provided by law and shall be disbursed by the County Board of Public Instruction solely for the support and maintenance of public free schools. Provided, that such apportionment and distribution shall be made by general law based upon some declared principle of classification to be determined by the Legislature.
A JOINT RESOLUTION Proposing an Amendment to Article V of the Constitution of Florida Relating to the Judiciary Department, to be known as Section 14 of said Article. Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Florida, That the following amendment to Article V of the Constitution of Florida, to be known as Section 14 of said Article, be and the same is hereby agreed to and shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Florida at the next general election, to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1926, for ratification or rejection.
 Section 14. The Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Florida shall be selected by the Justices thereof at the commencement of the first term of the Supreme Court in the year of 1927, and every two years thereafter.
A JOINT RESOLUTION Proposing an Amendment to Section 18 of the Declaration of Rights in the Constitution of the State of Florida Relating to the Ownership, Inheritance, Disposition and Enjoyment of Property in the State of Florida by Foreigners. Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Florida, That the following amendment of the Constitution of the State of Florida, Section 18 of the Declaration of Rights in the Constitution of the State of Florida, be and the same is hereby agreed to and the same shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State of Florida for ratification or rejection at the next ensuing General Election, that is to say, that Section 18 of the Declaration of Rights of the Constitution of the State of Florida, be amended so as to read as follows:
 Section 18. Foreigners who are entitled to become citizens of the United States under the provisions of the laws and treaties of the United States shall have the same rights as to the ownership, inheritance and disposition of property in the State as citizens of the State, but the Legislature shall have power to limit, regulate and prohibit the ownership, inheritance, disposition, possession and enjoyment of real estate in the State of Florida by foreigners who are not eligible to become citizens of the United States under the provisions of the laws and treaties of the United States.
 The votes cast in compliance with said proposed amendments and the canvass, declaration and returns thereof, shall be subjected to the same regulations and restrictions as are provided by law for general elections in the State of Florida.

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They Come To See For Themselves

Just about the most sensible paragraph we have seen in a Florida newspaper concerning the way to treat unfriendly talk about this state and its people appeared a few days ago in The Evening Independent of St. Petersburg. It said:

Florida will do well to forget about the so-called anti-Florida propaganda in the North and buckle down to work preparing for a good tourist season. The best way to combat the propaganda, if it is still in circulation is to bring people to this state and show them real conditions.

The Independent could have asserted, too, with the facts to back it, that already there are large numbers of visitors in Florida who have come for the very purpose of proving for themselves how much is true in the unfavorable reports they have heard.

As the summer advances, and especially with the coming of autumn and another winter season, Florida will have more people to take care of than it has ever had. And they are going to be more difficult to please, because they will come, many of them, possessed of prejudices and expectant of the unfair treatment they were told they would find in this perfectly awful state.

In order to show these strangers the "real conditions" of which The Independent speaks, it is just as well for Florida towns and individuals to acknowledge that conditions which are not a credit to the state should be publicly denounced and eliminated. If St. Petersburg, let us say, happens to have a gopher in the hotel business, good friends of the Sunshine City should see to it that he is properly punished by a lack of patronage. If St. Petersburg happens to have a skin game rector, the stranger should be publicly warned to avoid him. If any St. Petersburg merchant endeavor to make unfairly large profits, the newcomer should be helped to find trading places where he can get better returns for his money.

While showing visitors in Florida the "real conditions," let us try to see to it that no other "real" conditions exist than those in which lovers of Florida can take an honest pride.

As for the propaganda against Florida, that is helping the state. It was started by the "binder boys", the sharpers, the thieves and the vagabonds, and a few of their half-witted victims who came to Florida to "clean up" and were not smart enough to get away with their "something-for-nothing" schemes.

Back in their home towns most of these people have little standing. Even those of them who have plenty of money in the bank can only buy publicity. Their own word against Florida acts as favorable advertising for this state. The quiet citizen hearing the "knocks" is somehow convinced that those knocks are coming from Opportunity, and he starts out for Florida to see for himself.

So it is Florida's business just now to stay serenely at home and attend to her own knitting. In giving all her attention to her own affairs she will see the things that she wants to discard, the people she wants to send packing from her gates, the conditions she wants to thoroughly renovate. The people will come to Florida. They are coming in greater numbers than ever before. And the quality of newcomer a town desires to add to its citizenry depends entirely on the sort of a town it is. In order to show strangers "real conditions," Florida must have those "real conditions."

The New Month Would Be "Sol"

If things turn out as they are expected to, on Monday, January First, 1928, less than a year and a half from now—the new World's Calendar will be started. A year of thirteen months will be rung in with the best of New Year's bells, and old Father Time will put his little old twelve-month year back among his curios.

Under the new program, every month will start on Monday and end on Saturday. Each month would consist of four weeks exactly, twenty-eight days. And the additional month would be called "Sol" and be inserted in the calendar between June and July.

Instead of there being three hundred sixty-five days in the year there would be three hundred sixty-six, so each year that extra day would be known, and celebrated, as a world holiday.

The advantages of such a simplified calendar are numerous. Pay day would come on Saturday fifty-two weeks in the year. Interest charges could be figured in an exactness that any school boy would understand. Independence Day would always come on Wednesday whether we have the nation's birthday in the month of "Sol" or a little later in the new July. Christmas, too, would come on Wednesday, and schools could make a rule of closing the Friday before just as easy as easy can be.

Altogether it looks like an entirely sensible thing, this work for the greater efficiency of our year's calendar. We do so many things according to the calendar, it would seem to be high time to put it into better shape.

As Brisbane Sees It

Clemenceau on the U. S. A. Planning to the Aid. Food Will Last. Big Business Buils. BY ARTHUR BRISBANE (Copyright 1926, by Star Co.)

THE LETTER that Clemenceau sent to President Coolidge expressed no high opinion of the United States' attitude on war debts. The old French Tiger is fighting for his country and uses the weapons at hand.

FOUR YEARS ago when he wrote an introduction for his book called "Industrial America in the World War," Clemenceau thought well of the United States and what it had done for France. Read this extract from Mr. Clemenceau's own writing:

"Meanwhile, here are some do-jug figures. In 18 months the United States sent us 5,000,000 tons of food supplies and 5,000,000 tons of war material. The steel they sent us represented the raw material for 160,000,000 '76' shells. The foodstuffs they sent us fed 12,000,000 Frenchmen for a year and a half. If this help had not been forthcoming, our army could not have held."

When Clemenceau wrote that, Europe had not yet changed Uncle Sam's name to "Uncle Shylock."
