## U. S. Launches New Drives

SAIGON (AP) — The U. S. Command today announced two new American offensives to drive South Vietnam's northernmost provinces and said they were aimed at "capturing or destroying enemy forces, material and installations."  
The two new drives have begun in the 42 North Vietnamese soldiers killed since they began, one 11 days ago, the Division is checking an area north-northeast of the abandoned combat base of Xhe South about 18 miles east of the Laos border and 16 miles below the Demilitarized Zone.  
Dubbed Operation Herkimer Mountain, it has produced 10 significant results since it was launched May 5. The U. S. Command reported 28 North Vietnamese killed and 102 paratroopers wounded.  
In the second drive, about 1,000 U. S. Marines from the 1st Airborne Division in jungle foot-hills 45 miles south of Da Nang. It is aimed at taking pressure off the important provincial capital of Tam Ky, around which there has been heavy fighting in recent weeks. The U. S. Command said 113 North Vietnamese and 26 paratroopers have been killed, and 102 paratroopers wounded.

## Defense Secy. OKs War Tactics

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of Defense Melvyn R. Laird has spoken out in support of U. S. battlefield tactics in Vietnam, which Democratic critics say cause needless loss of American lives.  
"It's always been our goal to keep the maximum pressure on the enemy consistent with the lowest possible casualties," Laird said Sunday, adding that U. S. commanders continue to give instructions to carry out this policy.  
Laird, a Republican congressman from Wisconsin before President Nixon appointed him defense chief, outlined his view in an interview before he boarded his airplane for a week-long North Atlantic Treaty Organization planning conference in Brussels and London.  
Battlefield tactics have come under mounting criticism from Democratic leaders since the 16-day battle in which GIs drove North Vietnamese off Dong Ap Bia Mountain in 11 assaults that cost some 50 American lives.  
Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., called the tactic "senseless and irresponsible" in a Senate speech last week and his stand was supported over the weekend by Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield and Sen. George S. McGovern, D-S. D.  
Mansfield said Sunday the United States is jeopardizing progress in the Paris peace talks by escalating the war through expanded military pressure creating an "act-react syndrome."

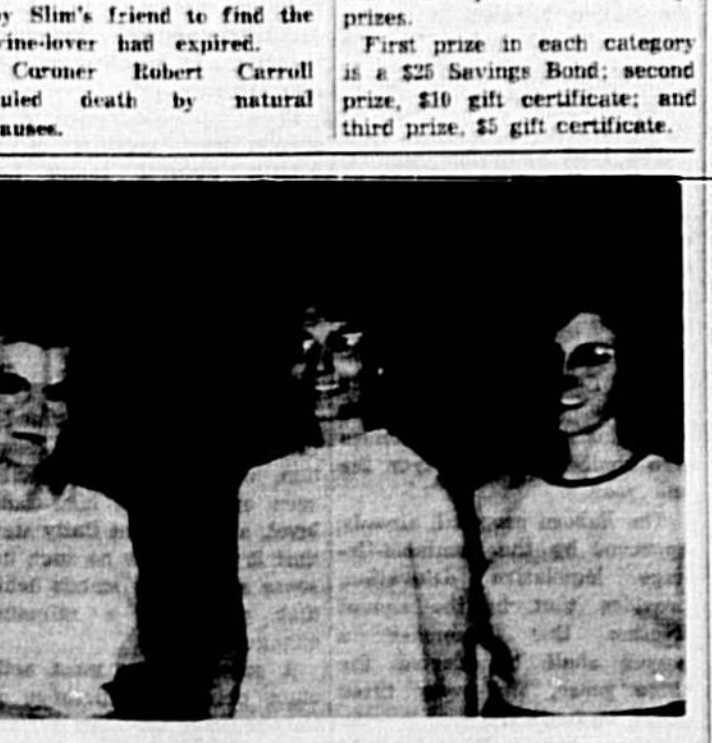
## Picture Rules Told

First prize in each category is a \$25 Savings Bond, second prize, \$10 gift certificate, and third prize, \$5 gift certificate.

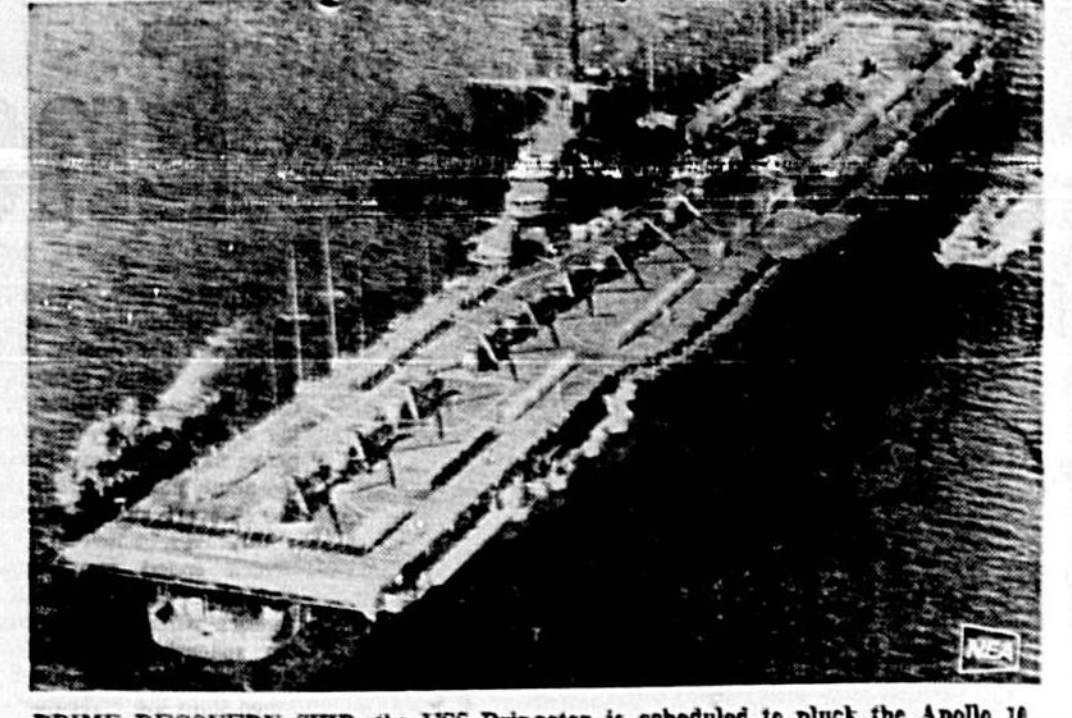

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### Misusing Public Funds

FORT MYERS, Fla. (AP) — Law County School Board members are misusing public funds by appealing a federal court decision they know won't be reversed, a Negro minister charged Sunday in a telegram to Gov. Claude Kirk.

The Rev. Ladson Edwards, president of the local National Association for the Advancement of Colored People chapter, called on Kirk to suspend the school board and superintendent.

Edwards, in a telephone interview, also attacked the board for reversing a decision to integrate all-black Dunbar Junior-Senior High School after 500 white parents protested the plan to make the Negro neighborhood school 75 per cent white.

"I don't mind their white boys coming over here, but they don't want their lovely white daughters going to our schools," Edwards said. "That's an insult to our boys."

### Business Survey

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. — A "compliance survey" of many Florida business firms to determine if they are filing all required Federal tax returns will begin soon, the Internal Revenue Service said today.

District Director A. J. O'Donnell, Jr. said the survey will take about three months to complete and will be conducted by Revenue Officers. A cross section of non-farm businesses will be selected to see if all required tax returns are being filed.

Mr. O'Donnell said the current survey is not designed to determine whether returns are accurate but only whether all required returns are filed. The survey will also be used to check the completeness of the IRS Master File of business taxpayers.

Most businesses comply conscientiously with the tax laws, he added, these laws are complex, and some business taxpayers may not be fully aware of all the tax returns which apply to their particular business operations. These may include returns covering income, withholding, social security, and a variety of miscellaneous excise taxes.

"Compliance surveys" Mr. O'Donnell said, are a continuous part of the IRS program to maintain high levels of taxpayer compliance.

Mr. O'Donnell said the program brought to light will be the result of honest misunderstandings and oversight. But the rare instances of tax evasion abuse which may be discovered will, of course, be dealt with according to law, he added.

### Dorr Field End Seen In Bills

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — A proposed 1967 budget being carved out by House-Senate conferees could decide the Dorr Field issue, regardless of the fate of separate legislation dealing with it.

Over the weekend, the House-Senate conferees voted to include language in the bill that would mean the phasing out of the institution near Arcadia as a facility for the mentally retarded.

"This is a major policy change on something the house has not spoken to," said Rep. Ralph Turington, D-Gainesville, vice chairman.

The Senate has passed a bill calling for the phasing out of Dorr Field, and then included a similar provision in its proposed appropriations bill. The House has not taken a specific stand.

The proposed budget would call for phasing out the facility and endorsement of the current proposal of the Division of Corrections to take over the camp and convert it into a minimum security prison.

Patients now at the Dorr Field, former site base, will be transferred to other institutions off the grounds.

The Division has sought to have the institution closed, claiming it is too far from urban areas and not equipped to handle the agency to use modern techniques in treating the mentally retarded.

Dorr Field was established as a treatment center by the 1961 Legislature.

### Kirk May Lose Security Detail

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Gov. Claude Kirk must look elsewhere for minimum security guards if the proposed appropriations becomes law as it's now worded.

The House-Senate Conference Committee on Appropriations voted over the weekend to make sure that the governor doesn't take highway patrolmen off Florida highways to stand guard at his mansion on Adams Street.

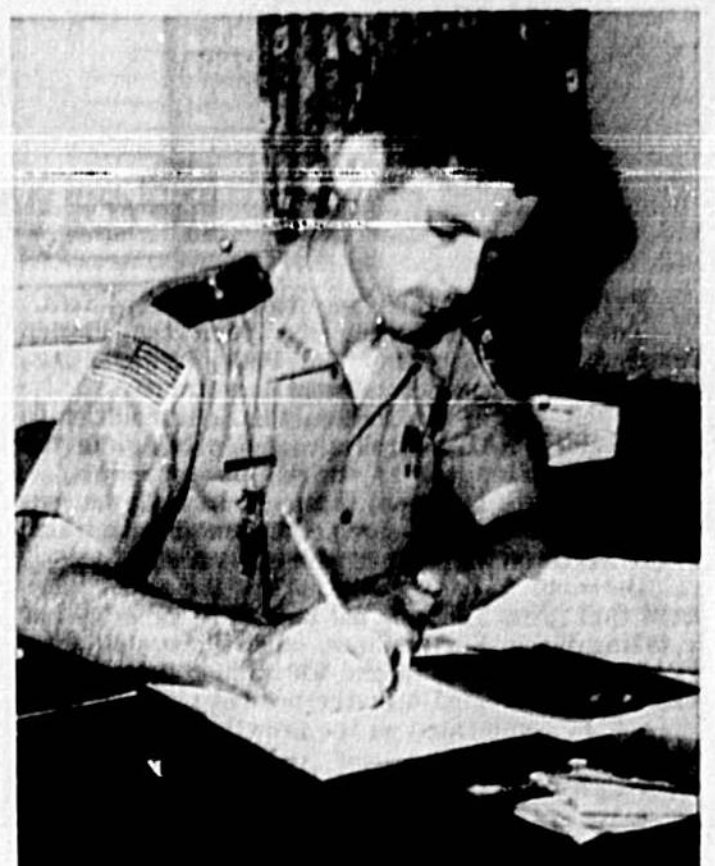
This occurred when the conferees, seeking to draft a 1967 budget, strongly about this point.

"You don't take someone that was trained in traffic control and accident control to be a guard. That was not the intent of the original 1967 bills," said committee chairman Sen. Lawton Chiles, D-Lakeland.

The proposed budget bill authorizes a security force at the mansion of seven men, but now written in its language stating that no monies "may be used to pay the salary of any member of the Florida Highway Patrol who serves as a member of the governor's security force."

### Deputy Personifies New Type Of Officer

The new breed of law enforcement officer is typified by Seminole Deputy William Howard Robbins, 26-year-old Oviedo man.

Robbins has been with the county sheriff's office two and one-half years and before that spent two years in the Army with the Military Police.

Still unmarried, Robbins devotes nine hours weekly studying law enforcement, police procedures and criminal investigation at Seminole Junior College.

The young lawman also works between 60-70 hours weekly patrolling in various parts of the county and guarding the public against the criminal element. He also acts in traffic accident investigations.

"Only problem," Robbins says, "is the short amount of time left for personal things and leisure activities." "Bill" is the son of Mrs. Levon Robbins and both reside at Oviedo.

### Georgia Man Charged With Slaying; Attacks

PENSACOLA, Fla. (AP) — A Georgia man was charged Sunday with slaying a woman and attacking two small boys who surprised in the act of slaying a young woman and hiding her body.

Sheriff Bill Davis said arrest warrants were issued for John Andrew Riley, 25, of Columbus, Ga. Davis declined to name a second man, but said he is 24, Pensacola resident about 20 years old.

The murder victim was Barbara Pennington Pike of Birmingham.

Davis said his deputies found the young, Auburn-haired woman's body partially concealed under newly cut tree limbs Saturday while investigating an attack on two boys.

The sheriff refused to identify the boys, aged 9 and 6. He said deputies were on guard at the home of both.

"These two young boys surprised the murderers," Davis said. "They were shot and stabbed." He said the woman's slayers apparently "were pulling her out of the car when these two boys surprised them."

The boys were listed in satisfactory condition Sunday night. Davis said one was hit with pistol and shrapnel fire and the other was treated for an arm wound and released.

The sheriff said the woman may have been alive when taken to the outskirts of Pensacola for disposal.

"She was shot with a shotgun and the several bullets," he said, "were pumped into her body to make sure that she was dead."

Investigators have been unable to establish a motive late Sunday, but Davis said, "It was not a crime of passion." He said the front of the woman's blouse had been ripped away, but he speculated this occurred either in a fight or in the effort to remove her from the automobile. He said her slacks and underclothing were intact.

The sheriff said identification was made through fingerprints. He said the woman had an arrest record in Birmingham.

Editorial Comment

New Payrolls Are Coming In, For A Fact!

Payrolls are on their way to the Sanford area. Two major announcements from the Florida Power & Light Company and Page Airways, Inc. make this welcome development a certainty.

\$250,000 annual payroll will be reached going into the economy of both Seminole and Volusia Counties. When the Page Airways contributed to the economic strength of our community is considered, it is even more welcome as it brings here a new industry and places it in the Sanford Airport where such a boost is needed.

Of course, all of such installations bring payrolls of a considerable amount into Sanford. But while we do comment with enthusiasm on the payrolls, the coming of new people into our area is, in fact, the basic contributions of these industrial moves to our community.

It is quite natural to expect Page to bring here from its other operations, the key executives who are well versed in corporation policies and practices. Then he pointed to something which we have been quite conscious of and emphasized. This is the existence of a fine manpower pool of experienced technicians who are here where electronics and other space industry demands have brought them.

Burger Nomination

In what was certainly inspired phrasing, President Nixon termed his nomination of Federal appeals court Judge Warren E. Burger to be Chief Justice of the United States the "most important nomination (any) President of the United States makes during his term of office."

The immediate and general approval of this nomination would indicate that this standard choice is, indeed, a happy one. Of course President Nixon knew that the retirement of Chief Justice Earl Warren would take place in the summer.

But what he could not have known was the unhappy public and professional reaction to the Fortas resignation which brought into sharp focus the United States Supreme Court as the inescapable problem of restoring it to its very high place in our governmental structure.

Will the Burger nomination bring this about? If this is answered today, there can be no doubt of the thundering "yes" which would come from the legal fraternity, the great middle-roads in our citizenry and even political critics.

But what has to be remembered is that elevation to such a powerful position as Chief Justice of the United States is something which never leaves a man where it found him. Those who recall the time when Earl Warren was taken out of the world of California in 1953 and nominated by President Eisenhower, would recognize the impact of the office if they looked at the retiring Chief Justice today and reviewed the history of the Warren Court.

Thus we are sure the impact on Judge Burger will be equally momentous. But in this nominee there stands a man whose legal and judicial record is of the most acceptable variety. From every indication this is an appointment of the right man at the right time for the right office.

As a positive and important influence in our national life and as a man who can do much to round out his professional career with the substance which character alone can furnish, we applaud this nomination.

## Two Items Stymie State Budget

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—Two major items—higher education funding and governmental reorganization—apparently are standing between House-Senate conferees and swift approval of a compromise state budget bill for 1969-70.

Lakeeland Democrat Sen. Lawton Chiles, a member of the Conference Committee on Appropriations, said support of higher education is the biggest hurdle still to be cleared before differences are reconciled.

The House would give \$6.5 million more to the University Board of Regents, for a total of \$139.1 million, than would the Senate in its spending version.

Chiles said governmental restructuring still being worked on by a 16-member House-Senate conference committee, has held up work of the appropriations group. He said some lawmakers feel some budget matters can't be decided until the reorganization matters takes final shape.

He said the committee prefers to get a better indication on reorganization "rather than try to lock up now."

With reorganization still pending, Chiles asked: "Why should we kill ourselves and meet 24 hours a day?"

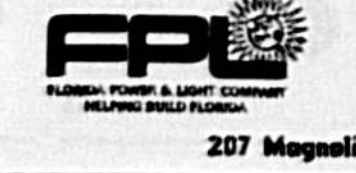

Another major sports story is in the making. This column understands that Seminole High Coach Ralph Stumpf is ready to make a move, switching his abilities to Oviedo High School. It is understood that Stumpf will take over the assistant coaching roles at the new Oviedo High School, whose athletic program falls into the Class A category this year. Stumpf would have been assistant coach at Seminole High during the reign of the JV program. We now understand that he will be Coach Herman Lofman's chief assistant. Stumpf was Seminole High's head athletic director for two years, and headed Seminole's football program. This year, Seminole and Oviedo will meet for the first time in the pickup sport in what should prove to be a tremendous rivalry. An official announcement should be coming very soon as to the status of Stumpf at Oviedo.

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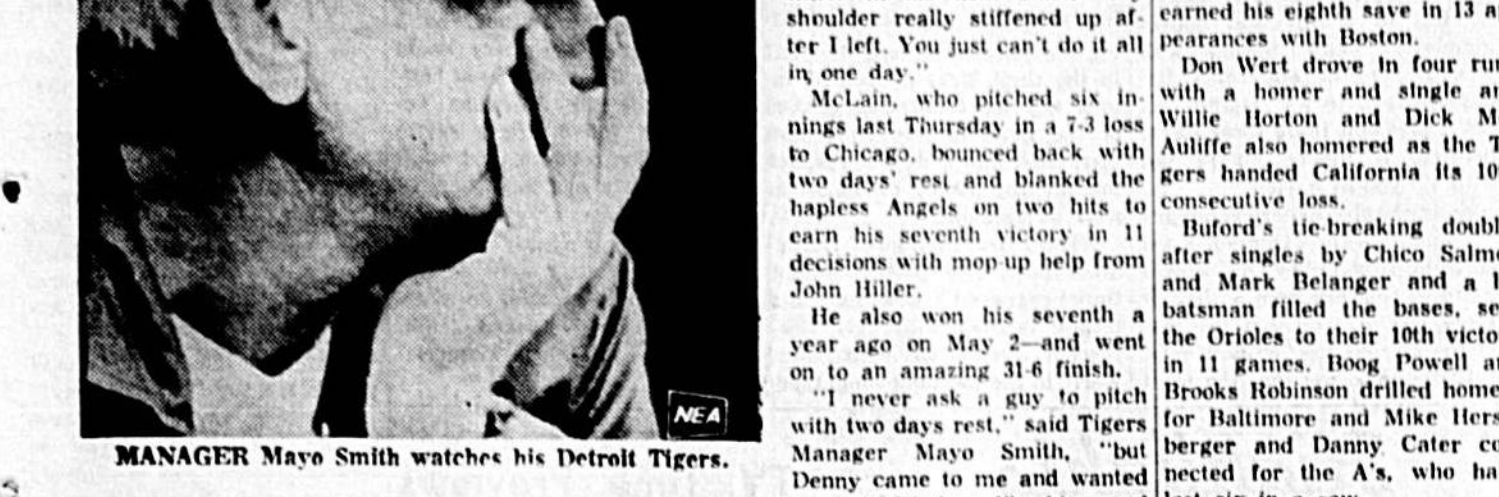

Lonborg, the American League's 1967 Cy Young Award winner and McLain, his successor last year, pitched seven scoreless innings apiece Sunday as Boston trounced Chicago 9-0 and Detroit trampled California 10-0.

Lonborg, plagued by recurring shoulder trouble that has kept him from pitching a complete game this spring, scattered four hits before Vincenzo Romeo put the wraps on the Red Sox' first shutout in 40 starts. "I was tempted to try the full nine, but I'm glad it worked out this way," said Lonborg, 30, who will attempt to get the distance in his next start. "My shoulder really stiffened up after I left. You just can't do it all in one day."

McLain, who pitched six in innings last on Tuesday in a 7-3 loss to Chicago, bounced back with two days' rest and blanked the hapless Angels on two hits to earn his seventh victory in 11 decisions with mop up help from John Hiller. He also won his seventh year ago on May 2—and went on to an amazing 31-6 finish. "I never ask a guy to pitch with two days rest," said Tigers Manager Mayo Smith, "but Denney came to me and wanted to pitch. Pitchers like him need a lot of rest."

McLain has pitched 10 1/2 innings, tops in the majors, in 11 games—compared to 22 innings in four appearances for Lonborg. He pitched the Red Sox' fifth victory in six games and the Tigers' sixth in seven, neither could pick up ground on Baltimore's terror East Division leader, who shaded Oakland 3-0 on Don Buford's two run eighth inning double and Ed Stautman's winning strike to five. The loss, coupled with Minnesota's 2-1, 3-2 doubleheader sweep at New York, dropped Oakland 1 1/2 games behind the pace-setting Twins in the West. Elsewhere, Kansas City edged slumping Washington 3-2 in 12 innings and Seattle beat Cleveland 3-2.

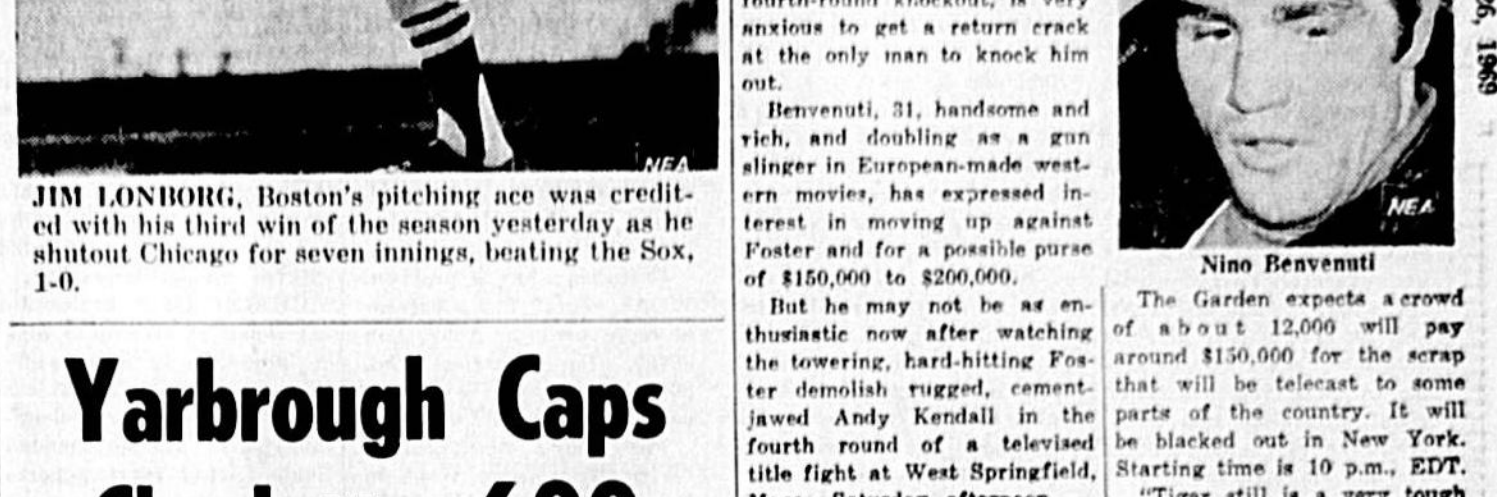

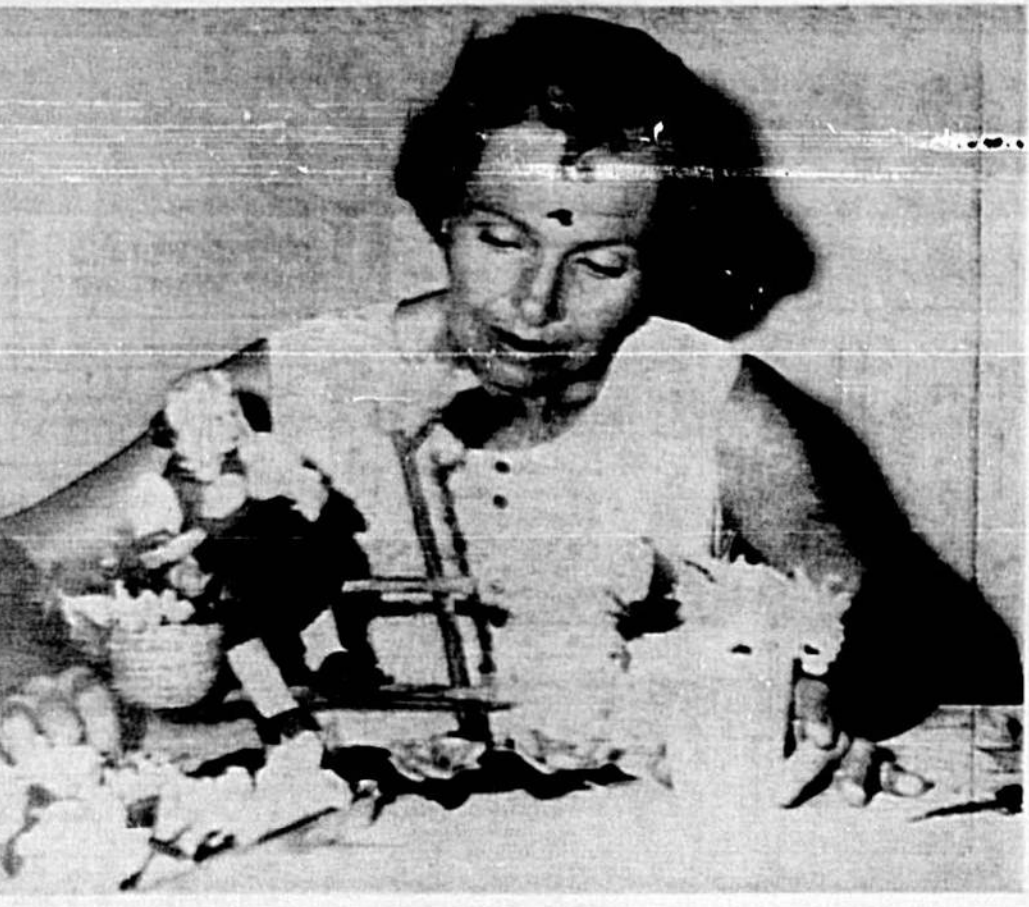

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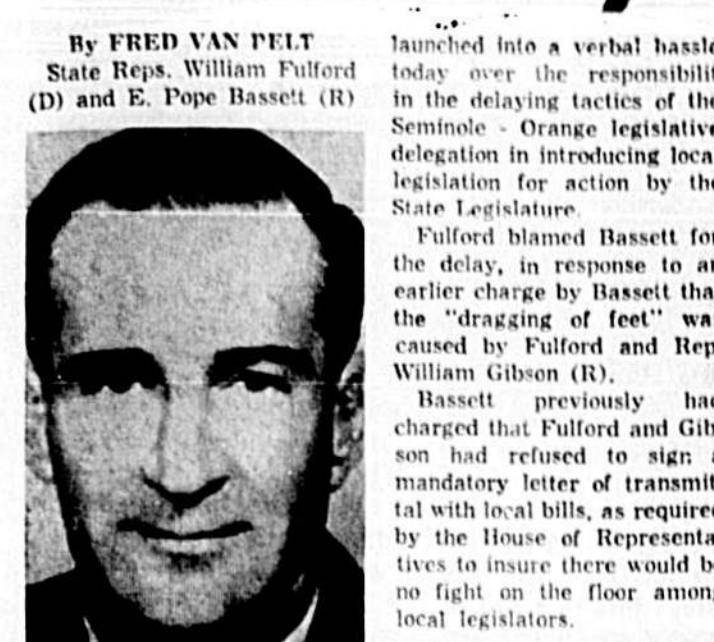
