

# Lions, 'Bama' Mix In Liberty Bowl

PHILADELPHIA (UPI)—Penn State, an Eastern powerhouse which stumbled twice, and Alabama, which rose from an opening defeat to prance unbeaten through its last nine games, smoothed out the final wrinkles today for their clash in the Liberty Bowl game Saturday.

The meeting between the Nittany Lions, powered by All-America Richie Lucas, and the defense-minded 'Bama's in the East's first major NCAA approved post-season game will be nationally televised on NBC starting at 12:45 p. m. e.s.t.

It will mark Alabama's 15th bowl appearance dating back to the Rose Bowl in 1926, and Penn State's third in bowl games. The promoters were hopeful for a crowd of 40,000 in the vast Philadelphia Stadium which seats 60,014, but which only the Army-Navy game fills. The long range weather forecast in an area where sub-freezing temperatures would not surprise was cloudy and fairly mild, with a risk of rain.

Both teams came to town Thursday — the Crimson Tide at mid-day in time for a workout in the stadium, and Penn State late Thursday night after a day drill on its campus. Each planned a loosening drill today.

A hopeful Paul (Bear) Bryant of Alabama, and a gloom-shrouded Rip Engle of Penn State, looked forward to "quite a game" in the post-Christmas bowl venture in the north.

Each hinted "surprises." Penn State could come up with anything, having used practically every offense but the single wing during the season. Defense-minded Alabama, a low scoring unit, also had some plotting.

"I hope to have a new wrinkle or two, and I expect they will too," Bryant said. "But, if I did have, I wouldn't tell you."

Engle insisted all week he was worried over State's mental attitude because there was a let-down following Pitt's startling upset of the Lions "and it's been hard getting the boys up since that time."

## Welter Contender Scott Meets Benny Paret Tonight In TV Fight

NEW YORK (UPI)—Top welterweight contender Charley Scott of Philadelphia, making his Madison Square Garden debut, is favored at 12-3 to beat last, rugged Benny (Kid) Paret of Cuba tonight in their TV 10-rounder.

Left-hooper Scott seeks his seventh straight victory and steps up his campaign for a title shot at champion Don Jordan, who lost much prestige when knocked out in the fourth round Saturday night by obscure Federico Thompson at Buenos Aires.

Tonight's bout will be televised and broadcast nationally by NBC at 10 p. m. e.s.t.

Paret, 22, is unranked among the 147-pound contenders because he has been hovering between the welterweight and middleweight divisions in his seven fights this year.

Also because he broke even in those bouts with three victories, three defeats and one draw. Scott, a 23-year-old converted southpaw, is a solid favorite because of his punch and his winning momentum.

A blanket finish appears to be in the making when eight closely matched super greyhounds go to the post in the Inaugural Handicap, the opening night feature when the Sanford-Orlando Kennel Club starts its 92-day racing meet tomorrow night at 8:10.

Running in this major attraction will be O. B.'s Ample and O. B.'s Massive, representing the famous Oswald Brothers Kennel, a new comer to this area, two Race Street Kennel stars, Hobby Son and Happy Joe Lucky, Karl Male's Revolt's Mary, Deep Rock Kennel's Fish Rock, Orville Moses Wealthy and W. F. Swafford's Rural Commander.

All of these stars have distinguished themselves on other tracks and they showed up brilliantly in the pre-season schooling tests. Rural Commander, Hobby Son and Happy Joe Lucky were favorites here last season. All other entries in this top contest are new comers.

Last winter Happy Joe Lucky was a quintuple factor 11 times in 18 starts, six times with firsts, and he distinguished himself by winning for Orlando in an inter-city match with the fastest dogs at Sarasota early this year.

Schooling here Happy Joe turned in three firsts and a second, while his brother and kennelmate, Hobby Son, was the only greyhound to register four schooling firsts. These two top performers will be striving hard tonight for a brother quintuple.

Rural Commander, who boasts a national A-1 rating, registered eight firsts six seconds and five thirds in 24 trips postward last season, doing more than his share to make the Swafford Kennel the high purse winner during the 38-39 season. At Cloverleaf last October Rural Commander closed the season by winning the Au Revolt Handicap.

### Red China Ready For Invasion, Official Says

WASHINGTON (UPI) — U.S. Ambassador Everett F. Drumright, an expert on China, said Saturday that Communist China now is militarily ready to "jump off at any time" on its long-threatened invasion of Nationalist Formosa.

But he doubted the Reds would strike in the near future.

And he said Nationalist President Chiang Kai-Shek will not start a war because he knows he would require U.S. military support to return to the Chinese mainland. "He knows the United States would not embark on an effort to forcibly liberate the mainland under existing circumstances," the ambassador said.

Drumright, now envoy to Nationalist China and former head of the big U. S. Consulate listening post in Hong Kong, made this assessment in an interview. He is here for consultations at the State Department.

He says a major foreign policy shift in Red Peiping's current arrogance toward neutralist India and Indonesia, in contrast with its earlier efforts to woo Southern Asia.

He predicted that Communist China's expansionist probing of the Indian border will be repeated "sooner or later" on the Chinese borders of Pakistan, Nepal and Burma.

"They now are showing their teeth to Asia and revealing their expansionist intentions," he said.

Why? Drumright frankly confessed that he did not know. But he said that until Peiping has built an industrial base for its military establishment—now heavily dependent on Russia—it is doubtful that it will press its expansion drive beyond limited, probing actions.

He saw no serious conflict between Russia's Nikita Khrushchev and China's Mao Tse Tung on the basic issue of whether to risk war.

"I doubt that either Khrushchev or Mao wants a major war," he said. "Their pullback from the threat to Taiwan last year shows this."

### Hearing Set Dec. 28

The State Road Department has started legal action to get land bordering Sanford Ave. for the Sanford Ave. widening project.

The department filed a petition this week aimed at getting 98 parcels of land along Sanford Ave. through eminent domain proceedings. The department estimated the parcels owned by 137 persons to be worth \$22,103.

Circuit Court Judge Volie Williams will consider the declaration of taking at 4:30 p. m., Dec. 28 in the circuit court chambers. Judge Williams will appoint court appraisers and "make such order as the court deems possible."

Owners of the land involved are commanded to file answers to the petitions in court before Jan. 25, to show "what right, interest or lien" they have in the lands and to show why the land shouldn't be used to aid in Sanford Avenue's width.

The county will pay for the land acquired for the road widening. Sanford Ave. eventually will be 14 feet wide from Geneva Ave. to Onora Rd. with sidewalks on both sides between 25th St. and 27th St. and a sidewalk on the west side from 27th St. to Onora Rd. From Onora Rd. the street will be 24 feet wide to Ginder's Corner.

### New Cold Front Slated To Move Across State

LAKELAND (UPI) — A cold front was expected to bring frost and freezing temperatures to North Florida today.

Chilly weather was forecast for the entire state with the temperature dropping to the thirties and forties in central Florida. The low on the east coast was expected to get a low of from 48 to 55.

The future outlook was for continued rather cold tonight with temperatures near the danger point for crops in the northern portions Monday morning.

A low of 29 to 32 with frost was predicted for pockets and mucklands in the Suwannee and Gainesville citrus districts.

Thirty three to 35 with scattered frost was predicted for the upper east coast, Orlando and north portion of the Brooksville districts.

### Big Four Agree On Peace Plan

PARIS (UPI) — President Eisenhower agreed with the other Western Big Four leaders Saturday on a "maximum program" of peace to present to Russia at a summit conference next April and then staged a "very frank" showdown meeting with Charles DeGaulle on their private differences.

As the Western summit meeting opened in the presidential Elysee Palace Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev injected himself into it by releasing in Moscow a two-month-old letter demanding a German peace treaty and an end to West German rearmament.

Both sides then began to set the stage for an East-West summit meeting which Eisenhower, DeGaulle, West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer and British Prime Minister Harold MacMillan agreed Saturday should be held late next April. April 25 was mentioned as a likely date and a letter was to be drafted Sunday to Khrushchev suggesting the time, Geneva was to be the site, although DeGaulle would prefer Paris.

### East-West Fail On Nuclear Pact

GENEVA (UPI) — Western and Soviet scientists Saturday failed to reach agreement on a workable control system for underground nuclear explosions that could escape detection by present methods.

Their failure after three weeks of discussions ruled out Western approval for a complete ban on all nuclear testing, as demanded by the Soviets, because the west fears sneak tests would be possible.

American scientists discovered that some underground nuclear blasts could be nullified so that detection was nearly impossible. Others might be mistaken for earthquakes. The West presented the information to the Russians and asked them to cooperate on finding ways to close the loopholes.

### Ike To Report To Nation Dec. 23

PARIS (UPI) — President Eisenhower will report to his bosses, the American people, on the results of his 11-day tour next Wednesday night from Washington. It was learned Saturday night.

An informed source said the President already has begun work on the 10-minute address which will be delivered 24 hours after he returns home from his 19-day peace mission.

The speech will be an expansion of the usual presidential remarks at the traditional ceremony of lighting the Christmas tree in the White House lawn.

The source said Eisenhower would keep his remarks generalized on grounds that a detailed, thorough report would be a pretty heavy diet for the nation just at Christmas time.

He has decided to save the heavier material and weightier discussions of foreign policy for his state of the union message to congress early in January.

Some presidential advisers also feel that before he makes any serious pronouncements on his trip he should wait until reaction has solidified in the countries he has visited.

This presentation marks the first time that the distinguished two-time Academy Award winner Betty Davis has appeared in a national tour. She and her co-star, Cameron Mitchell, will be ably supported by Clark Allen who is a rare combination of painter, folk singer and guitarist all rolled into one.

The show, adapted and directed by Norman Corwin, is based on the works of Carl Sandburg, the 82-year-old American poet laureate.

The appearance of Betty Davis will begin the Heart Fund Drive in Sanford. Frank Mebane, special events chairman for the Seminole DeBarry Heart Council, will soon announce the date of the ticket sale.

### 'Old Reb' Dies

HOUSTON, Tex. (UPI) — Walter (Old Reb) Williams, the last survivor of the four million men who fought the Civil War, died Saturday. He was 117 years old.

The death of the tough old soldier was the signal for President Eisenhower to proclaim a day of national mourning.

Williams, made blind and deaf by the ravages of time, had been battling for more than a week his fourth bout with pneumonia in the last year.

### Group Formed To Aid Cities On U. S. 17-92

A new organization has recently been set up to make U. S. 17 the most traveled road in Florida and to aid cities on the route, John Krider, Chamber of Commerce manager said yesterday.

The name of the organization is called "Scenic 17 Highway Association" and the group is planning to send out colorful folders across the nation highlighting the various cities on U. S. 17-92 including the names of motels and lodges and brief description of each city.

Among the plans the group hopes to formulate in 1960 will be included improving, resurfacing and four-laning U. S. 17-92.

Among the major work spearheaded by the organization will be helping to break the bottleneck at Matland and forwarding the stretch around Lake Monroe.

The group also has gone on record as urging the State Road Department to improve the complete road in order to help the economy of the communities along the road.

Krider, who is an officer of the group, will ask the Florida Development Commission assistance in promotion of tourist travel over U. S. 17-92.

Krider also reported that contacts will be made with some 5000 travel editors in the region to gain support for their projects on beautifying the road and to work with various garden clubs in Seminole and Volusia counties to carry on a program of beautification.

"Not too long ago," Krider said, "U. S. 17-92 was the most traveled road in Florida. Through inactivity by the communities along this highway, other roads with active promotional groups, gained much of our traffic," Krider said.

"Now with this organization we hope to start the ball rolling in making U. S. 17-92 'Scenic 17,'" Krider pointed out.

HAVANA, Cuba (UPI) — Cuban army firing squads executed two counter-revolutionaries in nearby Pinar del Rio Saturday in the first death sentences to be carried out in six months.

### Gangster Roundup Opens In Chicago

CHICAGO (UPI) — Attention switched to the so-called "youngsters" in the alleged Chicago crime syndicate Saturday — everyone under 40 — in hopes of solving the gangland slaying of Roger Touhy.

The "youngsters" in a turn refused to do, or say, a thing without first consulting their sponsors.

Touhy's attorney, Robert B. Johnston, charged, however, that the syndicate had instigated Touhy's killing.

Touhy, 61, just out of prison after serving 25 years on what he insisted was a "framed" kidnap conviction, was shot in the back of his head Wednesday night in front of his sister's home.

A companion, Walter Miller, 48, an ex-police sergeant who was serving as Touhy's bodyguard, was critically wounded.

The entire case appeared a throwback to the heyday of Al Capone. Touhy and Capone were arch rivals for the bootleg beer trade of the 30's.

It was the "youngsters" who inherited, or hope to inherit, the Capone empire who today were being questioned on the Touhy killing.

### Here's One Man Who Enjoys Yule Season In Jail

FAYETTEVILLE, N. C. (UPI) — Fayetteville police, with the help of a sympathetic judge, are trying their best to keep Luther Britt out of jail this Christmas.

If they do, it will be the first time in 28 years. He has spent the last 27 Christmases in custody of local or state prison officers.

Britt was released from jail a week ago Saturday and was back in custody a few hours later on public drunkenness charges.

City Recorder's Court Judge DeB S. Carter suspended a 30-day sentence for him Tuesday. But two hours later, police arrested him again. And again the charge was public drunkenness.

# Dewey May Support Nixon's Presidential Bid

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Thomas E. Dewey, a key figure in 1950 Republican presidential jockeying conferred at length with Vice President Richard M. Nixon this weekend in a move viewed as highly encouraging by Nixon's backers.

The former New York governor, who carried the GOP's losing presidential banner in 1944 and 1948, was not available for comment but was believed to have given Nixon any firm commitment of support.

However, political circles viewed the visit—purely social on the surface—as highly significant in light of speculation in some quarters that Dewey might drop his long-time support of Nixon in favor of New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller.

Dewey has taken a hands-off position so far between the two. Dewey and his wife were among the guests Friday night at a Christmas party at Nixon's home. The affair was for cabinet members, top White House aides, and other high government officials.

Nixon, Dewey and U. S. Attorney General William F. Rogers later huddled at length over dinner in a swank downtown hotel dining and dancing room.

The trio also planned a golf game in the crisp, cold sunshine Saturday afternoon at a Maryland country club. Mrs. Dewey returned to New York Saturday morning.

Rogers is one of Nixon's closest personal friends and advisers. He also was an assistant district attorney under Dewey during the latter's "gang busting" days in

New York City and came into the Eisenhower administration with Dewey's strong backing.

Nixon's office would not comment on the Dewey visit except to confirm that he was a guest at the vice president's party and that they later dined together.

Other high level guests at the party included Rogers, Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell, another of Nixon's close personal friends; Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield, former Republican national chairman; Secretary of the Interior Fred A. Seaton; presidential assistant Wilton B. (Jerry) Persons, who is directing White House operations in President Eisenhower's absence; and Person's deputy, Bryce N. Harlow.

# Deer Makes Excellent Eating, Home Demonstration Agent Says

Since the deer season has opened, remember that deer meat is excellent eating, and there is many a good meat in even a spike buck. Many people don't like venison simply because the meat was not properly handled from bagging to eating.

"As soon as the deer is dead . . . and make sure, or you may be wearing a hat rack in your stomach . . . cut open the body cavity and drain out all of the blood before it hardens. Skin the animal immediately or take it to a good butcher. The most important phase is to hang the deer in a cold locker above freezing temperature for as long as three weeks. This aging is important for tenderizing the meat and really bringing out the good flavor."

After aging, have the carcass cut into steaks, roasts, and deer burgers; wrap the meat in moisture-vapor proof paper . . . not butcher's wrapping paper . . . and quick-freeze. "Slow freezing will cause large ice crystals and loss in flavor," says Miss Susan Christian, nutritionist.

Game meat has less fat than domestic animals. Therefore, when you are cooking venison steaks with a dry cooking method, use a plentiful amount of fat. And if there is a doubt about tenderness, use a meat tenderizer.

Practically all venison goes well in a thick stew. More people should try hickory wood-barbecued venison and no boiling sauce. However, if you must use a barbecue sauce, have it ready for serving with the meat.

# He-Man Doesn't Smoke As Much As Non He-Man

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A Harvard scientist said today that he-men smoke less than non he-men.

The scientist, Dr. Carl C. Seltzer, based his conclusion on studies extending over several years of 232 Harvard men.

The men were classified according to their "masculine component" as indicated by body build and anatomical traits.

In a report to the American Assn. for the Advancement of Science, Seltzer said that "the heavier smokers show the greatest proportion of individuals with weak or very weak masculine components."

Conversely, the more masculine men smoke less than those of more feminine build, he said.

Seltzer said this "suggests that for a specified type of individual smoking may be a reflection of certain personality and behavioral traits which are characteristic of his biological makeup."

In addition to being heavier smokers, Seltzer said, the "less masculine persons tend to have an aversion for strenuous exercises and sports, are apt to be low in physical fitness for hard muscular work, and are often poor in muscular coordination."

"They are apt," he continued, "to be less well integrated and more idealistic, creative, and intuitive."

"They are more frequently shy and anti social and more frequently have traits of self-consciousness and inhibition . . ."

"Academically, they most often select the area of arts, letters, and philosophy as a college major, and their choice of career tends to follow these same lines of interest."

Seltzer recommended that further studies be undertaken to determine whether heavy-smoking, less masculine men are most subject to lung cancer and coronary disease than their he-men fellows.

# Report Claims GSA Overspent

One item highlighted a General Accounting Office (GAO) report which said the General Services Administration (GSA) could have "deferred or saved" expenditure of \$9,800,000 on shipments of strategic metals to stockpiling sites.

Comptroller General Joseph Campbell said in a report to Congress that the GSA has agreed to defer an additional \$5,500,000 on transportation costs. He said there is "likelihood of actual savings of all or part of this amount." The GAO watches over federal spending for Congress.

Campbell said the GSA overspent on transportation of strategic metals between 1955 and 1959 by failing to select storage sources or ports of import.

Asked if he thought the United States should offer population control advice to other nations, Cardinal Spellman said:

"The United States should give economic and financial help, not advice."

The cardinal refused to comment on the problem of world over-population.

"The Pope has said all there is to be said on that subject," Spellman said.

The pontiff, in an address last Monday to the sacred college of cardinals, reiterated that birth control was not the answer to over-population and starvation. He urged a better "distribution of earthly goods" as an alternative to artificial restrictions on conception and childbirth.

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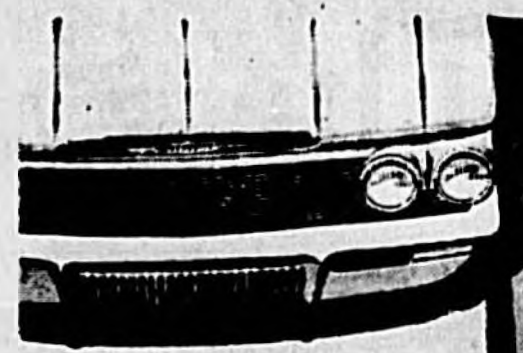

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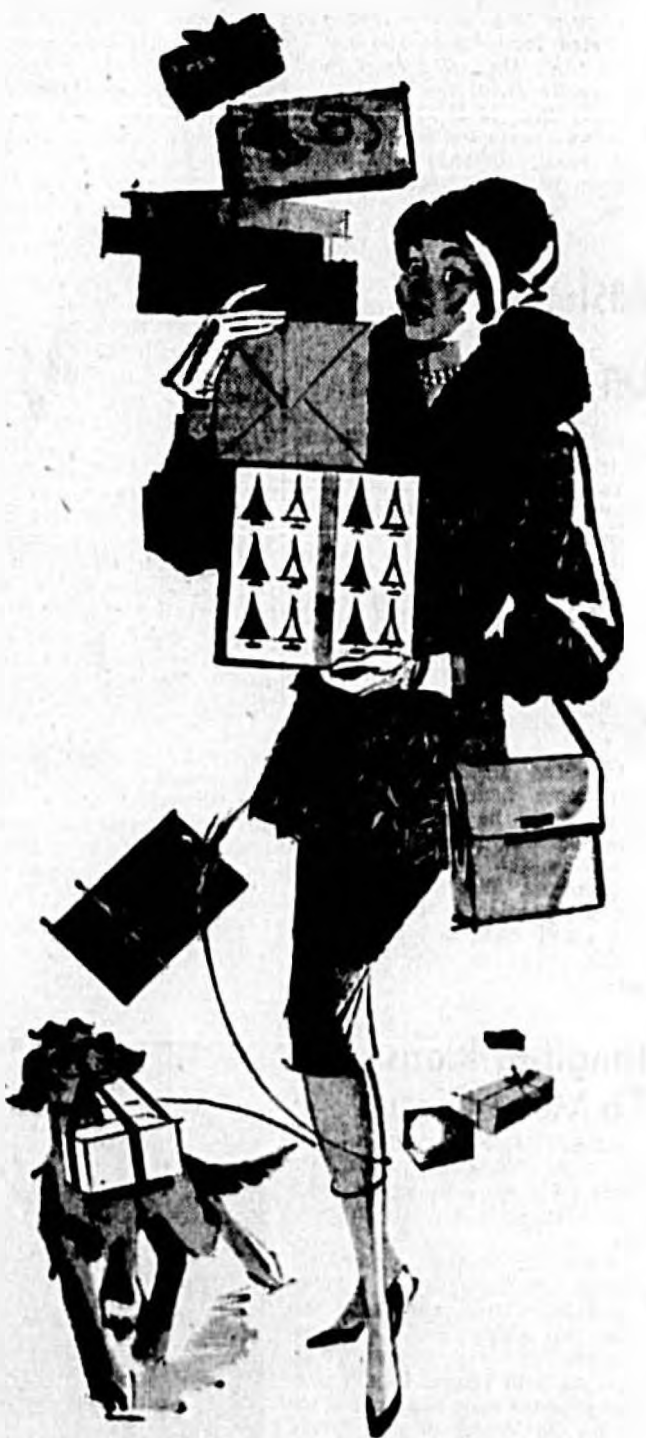



## Herter Proves Strength, Patience At Geneva Talks

The man-of-the-week: U. S. Secretary of State Christian A. Herter.

The place: Paris.  
The quote: "We have a strong impression of a general desire for peace among the Soviet people."  
In Paris this week, the U.S. secretary of state found himself on the horns of a dilemma.

On the one hand, as advance man for President Eisenhower, part of his job was to convince the reluctant French and West Germans that enough of a thaw had occurred in the cold war to warrant a summit conference with Soviet Russian Premier Nikita Khrushchev.

On the other, he had to convince the foot-dragging members of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) that the time had not yet come to relax Western defenses which, in fact, must be strengthened if the West were to be able to meet any surprise communist attack.

As part of the first point, he had to convince both the Germans and the French that the United States would not sacrifice Berlin to the Communists for the sake of an over-all settlement.

"We are determined," he said, to protect the freedom of West Berliners. He said the "acid test" of Soviet desires to relax tensions would be its attitude toward Berlin and that Khrushchev had been so informed.

He added that the United States expected negotiations to continue through numerous meetings, from the summit on down.

So far as NATO was concerned, Herter's task broke down into two categories.  
One was to convince United States' prosperous fellow-members that they now must bear more of the financial burden.  
The other was to convince them that, with NATO one-third below strength, they must meet their manpower commitments to the defensive force.

Since both would cost individual nations more money, his task therefore became doubly difficult. A Scandinavian member put it bluntly when he said his people knew only what they were told, and they were told that tensions were relaxing. Therefore, they asked, why were large defensive forces necessary?

Herter's reply, in effect, was that only with strong forces behind them could Western negotiators hope to reach suitable agreement with the already strongly-armed Russians.

## Ike's Fish Recipe Not Up To Par

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Mrs. Rose G. Kerr and I weren't 15 feet away when the ship's bell sounded and if we hadn't stepped mighty quick we wouldn't have made it. As it was, 10 other lean and hungry-looking types got there first.

We were 11th and 12th in the 15-man volunteer line to taste-test President Eisenhower's recipe for rainbow trout and a rival recipe devised by home economists of the Bureau of Commercial Fisheries.

The bureau is devoted to the proposition that fish is good and good for you, and why in the world don't you eat it more often?

Mrs. Kerr is boss of its home economics unit. Because her desk is next door to the fish-tasting room, she makes the lineup as many as four times a day and, in 15 years, has done more than her share to prevent the catch from going to waste.

In that time she and her staff have devised, tested, tasted, and published thousands of recipes for seafood, from fishburger to salmon shortcake.

Despite their efforts, alas, Americans still prefer meat. We've been eating only 10 1/2 pounds of fish per capita yearly.

As a result, a lot of fishermen have been reduced to grits and grout, and goodness knows what sort of shape they would have been in if Mrs. Kerr and her helpers hadn't been on the job. The bell rings in the hall out-

side the test kitchen whenever the girls have concocted something new. On most working days this will be at 10 and 11 a.m. and again at 3 and 4 p.m.

Anybody in sound of the bell is eligible, on the theory that average reaction is needed. Places for 12 are set on shelves fixed to the wall on three sides of the room. A high stool is ready at each place.

Competing recipes are ladled onto compartmented plates. The diner's only investment, aside from a fast spring for the lineup, is the time it takes to eat and fill out a score card. Servings are judged for appearance, flavor and texture, on a 10-point scale from yummy to ugh. There is space also for remarks.

The rainbow trout came frozen from Idaho. Nobody knew for sure how Eisenhower's recipe got into

the public domain, but there it was.

One thing was sure, though. Mrs. Kerr's cooking experts cook it better. Ike's version was dry. I thought. Apparently the rest of the panel thought so too. The composite grades run off afterwards gave Ike's trout 91.05 against 94.80 for the girls' version.

The government plans to include a rainbow trout recipe in a booklet on outdoor fish cooking next June. Happens that Mrs. Kerr's recipe, after maybe another test or so to perfect it, will be published rather than Ike's.

Meantime, try her ideas for Christmas. Her seasonal recommendations run from calf to shrimp stuffing for turkey.

As for Mrs. Kerr, for whom the fish bell tolls four times a day, I hear she plans to eat steak.

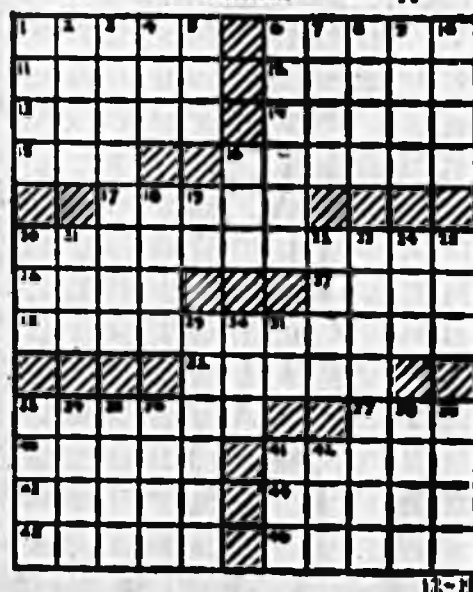

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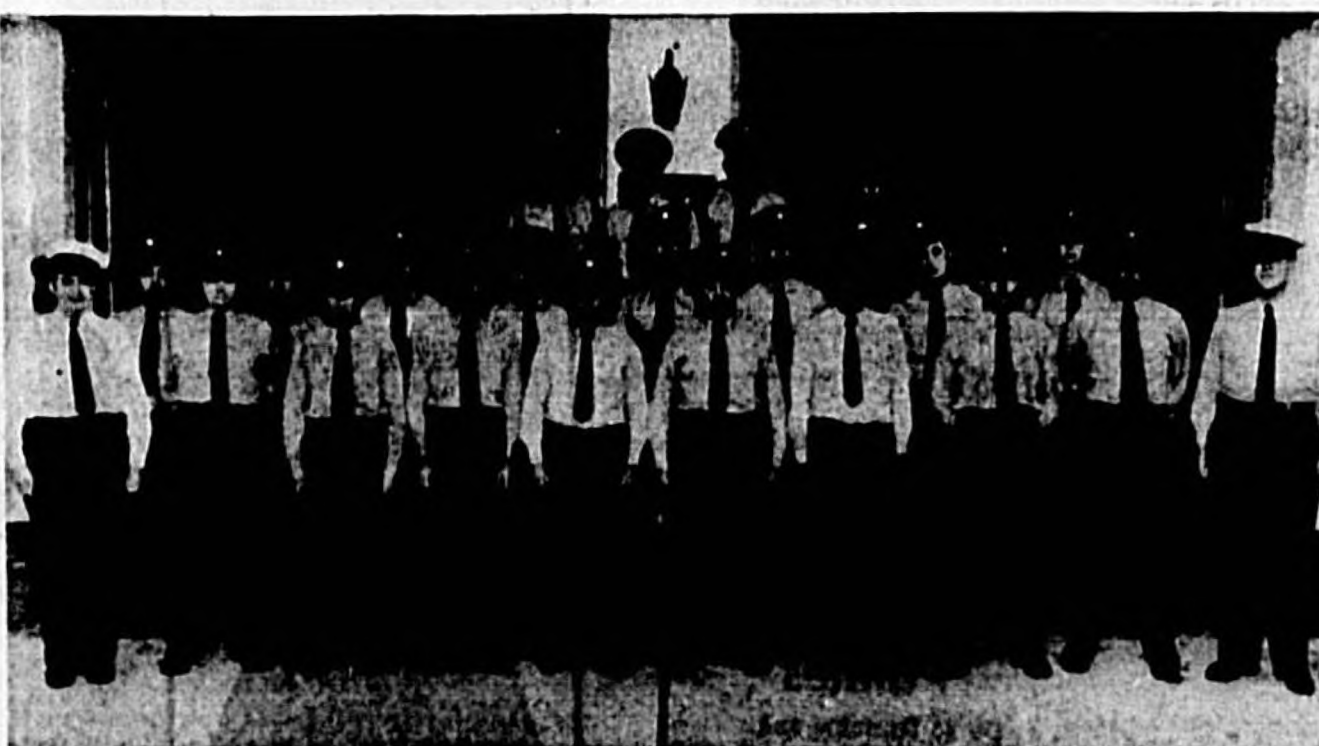

## Penn State Wins Liberty Bowl, 7-0

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — Galeen Hall, sophomore understudy of the great Richie Lucas, cooked up a dramatic 18-yard scoring play in the final seconds of the first half Saturday and the touchdown gave Penn State a 7-0 victory over Alabama in the inaugural Liberty Bowl game.

Hall, a 18-year-old from Williamsburg, Pa., tossed a screen pass from a field goal place-kick formation to sophomore speedster Roger Kochman as the clock reached the runoff point and the sprint star raced over with the only touchdown before a crowd of 36,211.

It was a beautifully conceived play, coming after Alabama's spirited defense had held Penn State on the one yard line and again on the nine as the first half rolled to its close and Lucas was on the bench with a left hip injury suffered minutes earlier.

Penn State had tried a field goal from the 12 and Alabama dug in on the five after State had another first down on the nine. But Billy Richardson had blasted through to block Sam Stellatella's field goal effort and the Tide had fought off another threat.

Then, a punt went only four yards and State was on the attack again on the 22 with scarcely less than a minute left. Hall tossed a four-yard pass to Pat Botula and the race against time continued.

The Nitany Lions lined up, ostensibly for another Stellatella field goal try, which seemed the likely play. But this time, Hall had other plans. He grabbed the ball, wheeled and tossed a short pass to Kochman who had six blue jerseys in front of him to clear the way.

The blockers set the opening and the youngster, who scored two touchdowns against Syracuse, found it and whizzed into the end zone. Stellatella converted and Penn State had the lead to stay.

It was State's first use of the fake, place-kick this year, and only the second aerial touchdown scored against Alabama in 1959.

Hall, who led Penn State to victory over West Virginia when Lucas was injured, thus did it again in the East's first major, NCA bowl game, played in a crisp 42-degree temperature in Philadelphia Stadium.

## Realty Investments Set To Hit New High In '60

Investment opportunities in real estate are expected to hit a new high next year, W. H. "Bill" Stemper, president of the Seminole County Board of Realtors predicted here today.

Stemper painted this bright picture of the sound investments available and the increasingly diversified ways of putting money in real property on the basis of local experience plus opinions expressed at the recent convention of the National Association of Real Estate Boards in Toronto, Canada. The Seminole County board is affiliated with NAREB.

"It looks like there's a good chance real estate investments may at last get equal treatment with certain types of security investments," Stemper said. "This could bring about tremendous growth in real estate syndicates and permit the small investor conveniently to put his money into real estate which historically has been the best long-term investment in the country," he said.

"The optimistic forecast of the Department of Commerce that commercial and industrial construction will show marked increases in 1960 suggests great opportunities also for direct real estate investment, in addition to the syndicate type of transaction," Stemper added.

He explained that the Treasury Department recently withdrew its objections to legislation which would put real estate investment trusts on the same tax basis as regulated investment companies.

"This means the bill has a good chance to pass Congress next year," Stemper predicted.

The trend toward real estate syndicates was substantiated at the NAREB Convention, the Realtor board president said. Stemper quoted Robert H. Weir, San Jose, Calif., a prominent tax attorney and writer on tax subjects who addressed a convention session, as saying "real estate can stand up to any other investment medium for Mr. average investor and that it excels in flexibility."

With more Realtors offering professional service to investors in the form of syndicates, we can look forward to the ultimate in flexibility for real estate investments," Weir said, comparing real estate syndicates to mutual funds in stock investments. Stemper explained that a real estate syndicate is a fund owned by any number of people and invested in real property.

He said real estate syndicates can provide a good return on money if the syndicate funds are wisely invested. At the same time, he pointed out, a syndicate provides "the advantages of real estate investment without the usual headaches of property management."

"Only a comparatively few people have enough money to buy an apartment, office building, or commercial property on their own, but if the present growth of widely held real estate syndicates continues, the average man will be able to buy a share of a shopping center in the near future as conveniently as he buys a share of stock today," Stemper said.

Other major factors in the bright outlook for real estate investments include local and national predictions of population growth and surveys which show the demand for homes will spiral in the years ahead. "With homes must go commercial and industrial developments and community facilities, all of which will provide fields of real estate investment," Stemper declared.

The Seminole County board president explained that the flexibility of real estate means it can fit easily into a person's broad investment program. He pointed out that real estate can be held for possible growth, sold, leased, or used to back up a loan, among other things.

Stemper said the tax advantages of real estate investment arising from depreciation provisions will become increasingly important to the small investor faced with a heavy tax burden.

Pat's guest Thursday night was Polly Bergen, attired in a black evening gown and singing bluesy-hued songs intended for adult ears. Boone's show now seeks sophistication and an adult audience as determinedly as, say, Dick Clark's show plasters itself with coatings of adolescentism. Another point: Boone sings the standards now, and not the "top 10" tunes.

(Thursday night, he worked on "I Won't Dance," "Laura," "I Feel A Song Coming On," among others.)

Boone, it seems, is reaching for a new niche in show business and I'd say the fellow he is patterning himself after is none other than Frank Sinatra. And to think — Pat doesn't go near the spas of Las Vegas. Some of the dialogue Pat has been using betrays this ambition, I think. Too often, however, the chat bears a hip attitude that somehow is not in accord with Pat's public personality or background.

I notice that Boone also has been striking out in the direction of comedy on his show, and I use the phrase, "striking out" advisedly. The professional comedy touch is still lacking.

While the show's format has been thrashing around from week to week, without a sturdy point of view to support it, I must add that the sets and direction display a healthy respect for imagination and it is refreshing to see them try for original effects. And, kids, don't let all this about Pat worry you. He'll be all right.

## Kennedy Certain He's A Winner

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. John F. Kennedy is now convinced he can win the Democratic presidential nomination — "and most importantly the election" — and plans to announce his candidacy early next month.

The young Massachusetts senator intends to throw his hat into the race Jan. 2, barring any last-minute change in plans.

United Press International obtained a letter prepared by Kennedy's staff disclosing the date and urging "active and influential Democrats" to join in his campaign.

Kennedy's office insisted the letter was one of several prepared for all possible contingencies but other sources said it reflected the senator's intention.

The letter, dated Dec. 28, says that Kennedy is confident he can win the nomination at the Democratic national convention in Los Angeles in July and go on to capture the White House.

Kennedy says his confidence stems from talks with political leaders and visits he has made to all 50 states in recent years.

## School Forecasts Double Enrollment

JACKSONVILLE (UPI) — Jacksonville University is embarking on a 10-year 10 million dollar development program based on a forecast of doubled enrollment during the next decade.

University President Franklin A. Johnson announced the program Thursday. It calls for new buildings, increased faculty and other improvements.

About half of the funds will be diverted to increasing the institution's endowment.

## Farm Issue To Be Important In '60 Election

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Vice president Richard M. Nixon will likely support the administration's controversial farm program when it goes before Congress next year, sources close to the administration's number two man say.

But it will surprise few experienced politicians if 1960 presidential candidate Nixon—assuming he gets the GOP presidential nomination—moves afterward to make it clear he is not taking his farm policy advice from Agriculture Secretary Ezra T. Benson.

Benson has said he expects Nixon to give full support to the farm program he drafted for 1960 with President Eisenhower's complete approval. Benson told newsmen shortly before entering the hospital for an operation that he believed Nixon would take the same attitude if the vice-president became a presidential candidate.

A source close to Nixon agreed that he is the full support of the Eisenhower-Benson proposals for 1960 legislation aimed at reducing government controls over agriculture and lowering price support rates.

What attitude Nixon would take toward Benson's advice on farm policy during a presidential campaign remains a matter for speculation at the moment.

Observers believe Nixon feels, though he has never said so publicly, but that many farmers dislike Benson and that his attitude has cost the Republican party votes in states where the farm vote is still an important factor.

Nixon said in a public speech that agriculture "very possibly" will be a major domestic issue in 1960. If that estimate proves to be correct, Nixon may try to make sure that the GOP approach to farm policy is based on a "Republican" plan as distinguished from a "Made-by-Benson" program "at the proper time."

The distinction between a Nixon-Republican program and a Benson policy would presumably be aimed at holding GOP candidates in key farm states run on a program the whole party can endorse without tying them to the Benson symbol. Nixon's record on farm policy to date, however, does not support any assumption that he would turn far away from the basic policies of the Eisenhower administration.

The vice president led a recent press conference at Indianapolis that a return to the high, fixed price supports of previous Democratic administrations would mean rigid controls for farmers. He has said, without going into details, that present farm programs are "inadequate" and that a new approach must be based on freedom from "wishful thinking or demagoguery."

Democrats who think that close ties with Benson will hamper GOP candidates, have been anxious to link Nixon as closely to Benson as possible. Sen. James E. Murray (D-Mont.), in a recent letter to the Washington Post & Times Herald, insisted that "the facts are that the vice president has been the chief of the Benson fire department, rushing to the defense of Benson personally and of his farm policies whenever the political fires got warm."

# DeGaulle Still Differs With Ike As Talks End

MADRID, Spain (UPI)—President Eisenhower arrived in Spain today on the last leg of his peace mission that took him halfway around the world and made another plea for "peace and friendship in freedom."

The president told welcoming crowds, including Generalissimo Francisco Franco, that he came here "with a message from the American people to the Spanish people" about "a brighter future in cooperation for the noblest of

all human causes: peace and friendship in freedom."

Eisenhower's plane landed at nearby Torrejon Air Force after a flight from Paris.

In Paris he attended a three-day meeting of the Big Four western heads of government and discussed serious Franco-American differences with President Charles DeGaulle.

The Western leaders invited Soviet Premier Nikit Khrushchev to an East-West summit meeting

in Paris next April 27 in the continuing drive for world peace.

The president will wind up his journey, to three continents with a return to Morocco tomorrow night for the Christmas holidays.

Eisenhower failed to extract from DeGaulle a promise that France would integrate its air force with NATO's but he did win a pledge that DeGaulle would study means of closer cooperation with the Atlantic Alliance.

Eisenhower plunged right into the Algerian question and DeGaulle's reluctance to integrate the French air fleet with NATO.

Eisenhower gave a detailed explanation of why the United States abstained in the United Nations vote on Algeria. DeGaulle was said to have listened carefully, then repeated he still did not like the U. S. abstention.

U. S. Defense Secretary Thomas S. Gates Jr. returned from Paris today declaring that NATO is as strong as ever but that "national difficulties" over troop integration still must be worked out.

Gates said in an airport interview that chiefs of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization have highly endorsed such integration issues as the NATO air defense plan and that it is now a question for political leaders.

Gates referred to the opposition of DeGaulle to putting French troops and airmen under direct orders of officers of another country.

# Mother 'Forgot' Travelling Child

FORT LAUDERDALE, (UPI)—Mrs. Maria Leen, 24, who sent her 8-year-old daughter alone and penniless on a 42-hour bus ride from Miami to New York, told police here today she "forgot" to warn anyone the child was coming.

Mrs. Leen, a nightclub dancer, sat in jail here facing a vagrancy charge as she told how she put the tot on a bus and told her she was going to live with her stepfather, Jung Leen.

Mrs. Leen had put five-year-old Evelyn on a bus at Miami Thursday. The child arrived in New York in near-freezing weather in a light dress and sweater and carrying all her belongings in two cardboard boxes. She was carrying a birthday card through which police were able to find her stepfather.

Mrs. Leen was arrested here Sunday, hitch-hiking through town. She said she quit her night club job because "I was getting to the point where I just don't like to work in those places." She said she went to a church and made a promise she would send Evelyn back to her stepfather.

She said the woman where she lived packed Evelyn's clothes in the little boxes and she put the child on the bus Thursday.

"I didn't have enough money as I would have gone with her," she said.

"I'm not neglecting that child," she insisted. "If I didn't love her, I wouldn't have sent her to her stepfather."

Mrs. Leen, dressed in black pants and a sweater, said she came to New York from Puerto Rico at the age of 12. She said she married Leen at 15. She said she left him and came to Florida about a year ago.

After putting the child on the bus she said she started to hitch-hike to New York herself in hopes of going back to Leen.

When Evelyn arrived in New York there was no one to meet her. The bus driver called police.

The child could tell officers only that she had come to live with her stepfather, "Bing," who lived in the Bronx.

Police found in her belongings a birthday card from "Bing." It had been sent to a Miami address. Police called the Miami address and learned the address of the child's father. They returned Evelyn to Leen.

# News Briefs

**DeGaulle Plans Visit**  
PARIS (UPI)—President Charles DeGaulle will arrive in Washington Easter Monday, April 18, for an official visit of "several days." It was announced officially today. The visit will be his first since April, 1945, when he went to Washington for talks with President Truman.

**Rocky Delighted**  
MIAMI (UPI)—Gov. Nelson Rockefeller of New York said in a taped interview here Sunday he would be "delighted" to see Richard M. Nixon as his vice presidential running mate if he decides to run for president. Rockefeller was interviewed by newsmen Friday on a visit to Miami and the videotape program was shown Sunday night over WFTS-TV's "Important."

**Bodyguard Better**  
CHICAGO (UPI)—A 62-year-old retired police sergeant who was critically wounded in the blast of a shotgun fire that killed gangster Alvin Karpis today. Walter Miller, who had been acting as Karpis' bodyguard since the 31-year-old former beer baron was paroled from a 25-year prison sentence, was wounded by 12 gauge shotgun pellets in the legs and back.

**Easing Restrictions**  
TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—The Development Commission's aviation department has hopes the federal government is taking some of the restrictions off of thousands of acres of flying space in the state. Stoutmire is firmly convinced the various military services have too much land tied up in Florida for their own use. He thinks several of the services could get better use of the same area.

**Not All Bad**  
WASHINGTON (UPI)—Victor N. Nyborg, president of the Association of Better Business Bureaus, said today the problem of fictitious pricing and bait advertising "is not at all the sinister, vicious thing it was a year ago."

Nyborg said work by the Federal Trade Commission over the past year indicates that most businessmen voluntarily halt such practices "when the rules of the road are spelled out."

**Death Toll Up**  
MIAMI (UPI)—Ten traffic fatalities and four miscellaneous deaths pushed Florida's weekend violent death toll to 14, a United Press International survey showed today.

**Reward Offered For Police Slayer**  
A \$1,000 reward has been offered for the arrest or information leading to the arrest of Samuel Johnson, a Negro suspected of shooting Palatka's chief of police and a Palatka patrolman last week.

Johnson has used the alias Jerome Davis. He is 41, five feet three and one-half inches and 140 pounds. He has a scar over his left eye and inside the bridge of his nose. Parsons with information should contact the Palatka Chief of Police. The patrolman died after the shooting.

**Area Taxpayers To Get Graphic Tax Dollar Plan**  
Taxpayers, for the first time in the county's history will get a graphic account on just where their tax dollar is going when the tax bills are mailed out tomorrow and Wednesday.

A special tax graph will be enclosed in all the tax bills explaining where the money goes.

The graph will show that 45.45 per cent of the tax dollar goes toward school finances, 18.18 to roadwork, bridges, 1.16 to health, 3.33 to welfare, 13.11 general fund, 6.36, fine and forfeitures, 5.91 hospital and 5.91 for capital outlay.

The graph also will give a detailed study on "just what is assessable property," the time for filing of homestead exemption and property escaping taxation.

According to the graph, property of every class and kind escaping taxation may be back assessed for a period of three years and the current year.

The graph also points out that the deadline for filing homestead exemption is April 1.

The graph also stresses that the status of real estate as of Jan. 1 determines its assessment for the current calendar year.

Tax Assessor Richard McCanna has pointed out that every separate parcel of real estate in the county is individually appraised for assessment purposes.

The graph outlines the requirements for property exemptions; who is entitled to them and special sections on house trailers which states that trailers are also subject to property assessment like any house.

Details on intangible personal property also is discussed briefly as well as graphs on where the tax dollar goes.

"This graph will make our job easier in handling any complaints," John Krider, chairman of the County Commission pointed out.

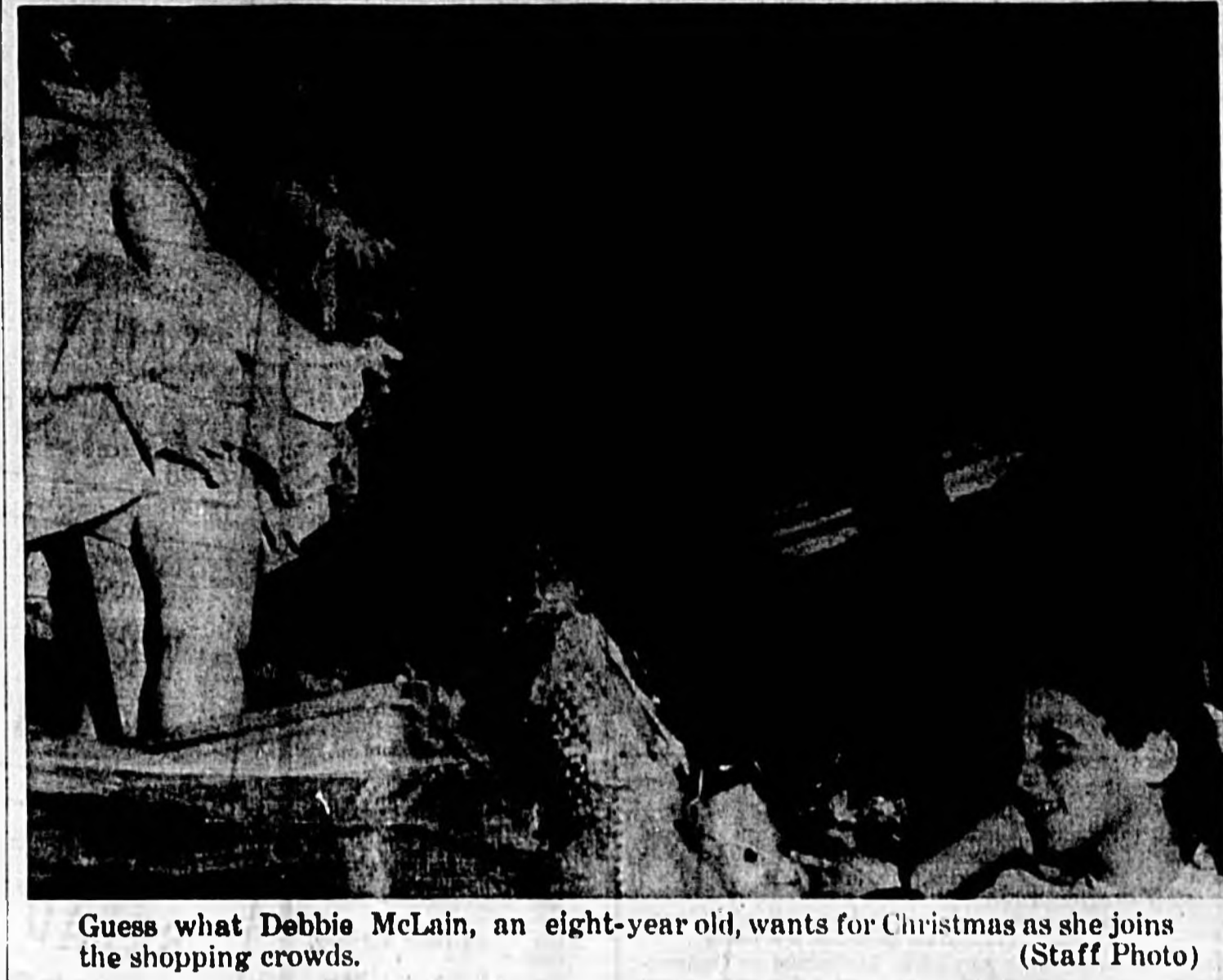
"All the data needed is right in front of the taxpayer if he has any questions," he added.

Toy dealers were extremely happy over the number of toys sold in the past few weeks.

"For the first time in a number of years, people are doing their shopping early," one merchant said.

He said that the steel shortage has not hurt supply of toys to any great extent.

"We had plenty of swing sets and toy cars available this year," he added.

Furniture dealers also were pleased with the way the shoppers turned out in large numbers to pick up assorted gifts ranging from small coffee tables to "wall to wall carpeting."

Ladies' apparel stores probably did the greatest amount of business as men came in looking for all sorts of merchandise with a list of their wives' sizes on slips of paper, one store manager said.

Car dealers were surprised with the number of cars sold during recent weeks, with the wife and hubby coming in together and buying themselves a Christmas present.

Banks reported business was heavy and said residents dipped into their accounts for that "extra dollar" to surprise relatives.

The post office reported it is "jammed" with packages going out, but the biggest rush started today.

As one merchant put it, the local residents "realized that they didn't have to leave town to get their Xmas shopping done, and all were well stocked this year," he added.

# Chessman Slated For Gas Chamber

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—For the eighth time in nearly 12 years, convicted author Cyril Chessman will be sentenced today to die in San Quentin's gas chamber.

Superior Judge Herbert V. Walker will order the execution, probably sometime in February. Walker was assigned to reorder Chessman's execution and set its date following recent refusal of the U. S. Supreme Court to grant Chessman's latest appeal.

Chessman has managed to evade previous death sentences by a series of legal maneuvers. He was convicted in May, 1948, of 17 felonies including two counts of kidnapping and raping. Both counts carried death penalties.

# Korean War Bride Finds Out There Is A Santa

FORT WORTH, Tex. (UPI)—The world looked a little brighter today for Mrs. Marie Mackey, 25, a Korean war bride, and her two daughters, Beverly, and Judy, 1. Yesterday it looked hopeless.

Mrs. Mackey and the two girls were sitting at home quietly awaiting death from starvation. They hadn't eaten for two days.

"In Korea, people without food or money usually just wait to starve to death," said police patrolman R. I. Haddix, who found the family after a neighbor reported hearing the children cry all night.

"It looked like she (Mrs. Mackey) had resigned herself to the fact they were going to die. They were just awaiting death."

Haddix said there wasn't crumb of food in the house when he found them. Beverly was wearing only a pair of pants and Judy was wearing a diaper.

Although Mrs. Mackey spoke little English Haddix learned she hadn't seen her husband in four days.

Haddix had \$3.02 in his pockets. He went to a nearby grocery store and spent it all on bread and milk. The store owner matched that amount and a customer clipped in. When he returned to the house, Haddix had \$10 worth of food.

In just a few hours Mrs. Mackey and the children had more food and Christmas gifts than they ever dreamed of.

While they were at a hospital, Mrs. Mackey's husband Jack, 26, was arrested at a washateria.

He denied he had neglected his wife and daughters.

"I took them some carrots, night before last," he told police.

# Oviedo, Geneva Toll Rates Studied

A study is now underway to estimate long distance telephone rates from Geneva and Oviedo to Sanford, Bob Sheddien, district manager for the Southern Bell Telephone Co. reported.

Sheddien said officials of the company are surveying the entire area on the economic feasibility of extending the calling radius between various communities, including Oviedo and Geneva.

At present, Geneva and Oviedo residents are charged long distance rates to call Sanford.

Sheddien said he had no idea when the study would be completed.

"It's a long and difficult job and many things must be taken into account," he said.

He pointed out that officials will study the actual amount of the toll business between the communities, how much equipment is needed and how much cable is required to take care of the increased calls.

Officials must also discuss it with a cross-representation of the communities involved to see if they desire such service.

# Castro Launches 'Big Brother' Spy Movement

HAVANA (UPI)—Premier Fidel Castro has launched a "big brother" drive against "counter-revolutionary" foes of his regime, asking Cubans to report to the authorities any critical talk they overheard.

In a three-hour telecast yesterday, Castro announced stringent measures against enemies of his regime, including a law that would permit confiscation of the property of convicted conspirators.

Labor Minister Augustus Martinez Sanchez, whose official car was shot up early yesterday, appeared on the television show with Castro. He made no mention of the attack on his car, in which three persons were wounded.

Martinez himself was not in the car when it was raked with bullets by unidentified gunmen in suburban Velasco. The gunmen fled before police arrived.

# Flood Conditions On Board's Agenda

A report on ways to alleviate flooding in the Temple Terrace and Tanglewood areas of the county will be the main business on tomorrow's County Commission agenda.

Chairman John Krider said a representative from the firm of Brill and Gray, Sanford engineer, will report to the board on their findings after a one-month survey of the area.

County Engineer Bob Davis said that three different plans will be offered to stop the flooding. "All of them expensive," he said.
