

Weakest American League All Star Team Will Meet Nationals

NEW YORK. July 3. (AP) — Without much doubt, the American league will go into Monday's All Star game here with one of the weakest teams it ever has mustered for its annual argument with the National league.

In particular, the junior circuit's pitching and catching are virtually important factors in such a tense contest where victory virtually rides on every pitch. Appropriate, then, that all the same law for the other years the tie has been held.

The National league All Star squad, by contrast, is about as strong as it can be, with Eddie Stanky never having been selected as All Star, and the rest of the players never having been selected as All Stars as their rivals, but they have done very well, considering. They have won three of the nine games played and figure, on superior pitching to take this one. This will be the ninth All-Star contest for Mel Ott, Billy Herman and Joe Medwick. The National leaguers do not change much.



Big American
Mercy Ship Is
Sunk By Enemy

AN EAST COAST PORT, July 6 (AP)—A big American merchant ship, the *West Point*, was torpedoed beyond its lifeboat capacity in the survivors of two torpedoes—was sunk near the northern coast of South America June 15, but not before a courageous Navy officer gave up his life to fire at the attacking submarine.

Soon hours earlier, Capt. Eric Johansen had halted the ship to pick up 63 crewmen adrift in lifeboats, and 110 men in all were standing by when the first torpedo struck at 0:21. Mr. M. E. Elmer, the chief engineer, including nine of those who had survived the previous sinkings, six of the ship's regular crew, and three Navy gunners.

Thirty crewmen, eight gunners and the rest of the survivors were picked up after 18 hours adrift in over-crowded lifeboats and liferafts.

The first exploded destroyed one of the vessel's two lifeboats, but Second Officer Harlan Sooten of Philadelphia said "the men from the other ships made an attempt to force their way into the seats of the regular crewmen."

Those without places went over-board and most of them found refuge on rafts or in the lifeboats in tow which had been unable to meet the needs of the regular crewmen.

The first exploded destroyed one of the vessel's two lifeboats, but Second Officer Harlan Sooten of Philadelphia said "the men from the other ships made an attempt to force their way into the seats of the regular crewmen."

The order to abandon ship came immediately, but Captain Sooten, First Officer George Collins of New York, the radio man and the navy officer in charge of the gun crew remained aboard and were lost. Sooten did not know the name of the radioman, and knew the officer only as Lieut. Kammerer of Philadelphia.

When he returned, was a real hero," Sooten said. "After we had left the ship he managed to fire about three shots at the sub with the help of the first officer, who didn't know anything about the gun."
