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Praise for the "Spotters"

The job of being an airplane spotter is not an easy one, for it requires an around-the-clock alert against attack that never ceases; and, at the same time, because it is more or less a "silent service," there is little public recognition of the task being performed.

Throughout the county numerous persons are giving their time freely to what some may begin to feel is a needless effort. They are doing an essential job quietly and efficiently 24 hours a day, and with just as much dedication in alertness, there is no reason to believe that the airplane spotters in the days to come will not be the real heroes.

Our enemies have the unhappy faculty of always timing their attacks at the moment when our guard is down, and our contemplated raids on our country will probably be planned when the Nazis and the Japs believe our civil defense forces have reached a state of boredom caused by long unwarred vigil.

A recent letter written by Lieut. Gen. H. H. Arnold, commanding the Army Air Force, stresses the value of the sky scanners to the nation's defense. He said: "It is sometimes hard for a ground observer to realize the importance of his duty when there is little or no activity and when the threat of enemy air attack is remote. It is essential that each and every observer in our civil defense system fully understand that the value of an aircraft warning system is dependent upon its readiness before the raid appears."

We hope the day never comes, all indications point to the likelihood that the Axis powers will, before the war is over, launch certain types of air raids on American cities and military installations. For this reason the airplane spotter's duties are becoming increasingly important, and for this reason also, we believe the public should not forget the important service being performed and give credit where many persons who are engaged in this patriotic sacrifice.

War and Fishing

A wartime development of major importance to Florida is the request by the Government that the fishing industry double its production. Specimens of fish caught in Florida waters are not directly affected to the extent that prevails elsewhere, but when one kind of seafood is limited in the markets of the country the way is opened for another kind to fill the void thus created.

When caught fish is virtually monopolized by the Government, for armed forces, the demand for fresh fish should be greatly increased. This is the way Florida enters the picture. A survey of the industry shows that it has been asked by the Government to practically double its production, but at the same time the Government has cut its productive capacity almost in half.

Demand on the Atlantic Coast fisheries also has been doubled, while the Government has commandeered 32 percent of the vessels engaged in the industry in these waters. Florida's fishing industry also has been affected by the conversion of boats to government use, but not to the extent of the vessels engaged in the industry in these waters.

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Conditions as a whole, however, are such that if the country keeps on eating fish at anything near the normal volume, the industry must work wonders with the available facilities.

Although the war has changed the situation in the fishery, pole, hook and bait assumes new importance in those sections where the fishing is fairly good. He is in position to supply his family with a delicacy that is becoming more and more a delicacy.—Florida Times-Union.
