





HONOLULU, Oct. 16.-679-The high augar content of llawailan fruits makes it possible to produce syrups at a less cost than synthetic syrups are produced on the mainland, it has been revealed ledian subber industry. by experiments conducted by Dr S. E. Oliver, chemist, who is experimenting at the Hawaiian Homes settlement on the island of Molokai. He announced the suc cessful extraction of syrups of varying degrees of concentration through a freezing process on which he has been working several years. The experiments here were confined principally to pineapples, which contain an average of 14 percent of augar, but he said he was able to extract a syrup of triple that strength.

"Feminine Bluebeard" Is A Most Daring Criminal

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. Oct. 17.-(P)-Another chapter 7n a story of crime rivaling the famous "Bluebeard" murders in France has been written with the escape of a wo-man "lifer" from the Indiana women's prison.

Displaying the same clever crim-inal skill which police alleged caused her to murder two husbands and a father-in-law by slowly poi-soning them to death, Mrs. Clara Carl escaped from the prison. So far no trace of her has been found. She is considered one of the most daring woman criminals in the country.

There is cool, calm and deliber-ate manner about Mrs. Carl. It was manifest when she was charged with the crimes three years ago. and again was shown when prison authorities after her escape found that for weeks she had been planning her break for liberty.

Feeding Chickens. So cleverly did she outwit the prison authorities that she took all belongings with her. Just at dusk one evening, she climbed up on the chicken house, then on to the prison wall and dropped over on the outside.

Since murder charges were first preferred against her she has been known as "the feminine Bluebeard.

Her life story is a curious mixture of crime, love, happiness and tragedy.

She was the beautiful daughter of a farmer living near New Straitsville, O.

When a young girl she cloped with Robert Gibson, young son of a New Straitsville florist. They had been childhood sweethearts.

Newspapers Want Censor To SpeedUp Blue Pencil Work

ROME, Oct. 17.-(P)- Italian newspapers allied politically with the parties opposing the present Fascis government, whose daily destinies are at he mercy of the Press Censor, have addressed a plea to the Censor that "he condemn them quickly if he intende to condemn them."

The press law provides that the ensor approve each issue of each newspaper, the penalty being suppression of the edition if anything found objectionable.

Recently the censor changed his office hours so that he did not examine the newspapers until several hours after their appearance. The result was that condemnations came so tardily that the newspaper was unable to print a later expurgated edition, as was previously the custom. Consequently all the copies of he newspaper were seized and the regular readers had no copie at all.

"Please, Mr. Censor," the newspapers said, "would you mind condemning us quickly if you intend to at all?"




