There is no use looking for Pushtoonistan on the map. It is not there, and may never be, but it is making trouble between Pakistan and Afghanistan.

Pakistan, created to give India's Moslems a land of their own, has 7,000,000 Afghans or Pushtoos inhabiting a region along Pakistan'z west border the size of Michigan. Minnesota and Wisconsin combined.

The Afghans would like to annex this area. Pakistan has refused. As a compromise the Afghans have asked that the Pakistan Afghans be allowed to choose between union with Pakistan and independence. This suggestion brought the talks to a standstill and the dispute has been referred to Saudi Ara-

The turmoil in the East for finding and fixing boundaries, allegiance and nationalism is part of the shifting pattern of today. The dispute between Pakistan and Afghanistan seems part of this shifting and fixing. It looks as though what is involved is more a cry of, "Afghaniatan for Afghans," than land grab motives.
