## Civic center on county agenda

### Staff wants answers on tourism impact, maintenance costs

SANFORD - County commissioners will decide Tuesday whether to move forward with plans for a downtown Sanford conference center.

The proposal for the center was originally brought before commission in May by the city of Sanford

and the developer, Suncor Properties, Inc. At that time, Commission directed county staff to research the possibility of entering into an agreement as well as funding

details. "We were virtually given no information," said Commissioner Randy Morris. "A lot of questions came up on this."

After meeting with city staff and Suncor President Bob Horlan, county staff is now prepared to discuss the details of the proposal with the commissioners during Tuesday's meeting. Staff will seek direction from the commission regarding how to proceed with the proposed project.

### '56 local students attend Police Explorer Academy

More than 50 youth from throughout Central Florida participated in the first Seminole County Police Explorer Academy last week.

The program, sponsored by local law enforcement agencies, is designed to introduce youth ages 14 to 21 years old to a career in law enforcement. "I found my career 14 years ago when I went through the Police Explorer Program," said academy coordinator and Youth Services Officer William Willis of the Sanford Police Department.

According to Willis, the 56 students, including six from Orange County, eight from DeLand, 14 from Titusville and 28 from Seminole County, will be introduced to several aspects associated with being a police officer.

During the one-week program, the students will attend classes on topics such as community policing, criminal and crime scene investigation, criminal and constitutional law, ethics, discipline and professional standards. The students' 11-hour

day begins at 6 a.m. with military drills, followed by breakfast and lectures. After lunch the students return to the classroom before finishing the day about 5 p.m. with more

military drills. A graduation ceremony will be held at 9 a.m. Saturday at the Seminole Community College Sanford/Lake Mary campus, inside the Fine Arts

Building. In order to receive a certificate of completion, the students must attend each class, take notes to be turned in. See Academy, Page 5

## Iraqi Diary: Who says the war is over?

Editor's note: The Sanford community has always had a strong military heritage. From Fort Mellon to the now closed Naval Air Station Sanford, the city has been home to countless men and women who have served or are serving in the military.

One such resident is Staff Sergeant (SSG) Charlie C. Carlson III. Carlson is currently deployed in the Middle East with the 549th Military Police Company. The 549th is part of the 3rd Infantry Division based in Fort Stewart, Ga., but is currently attached to the 2nd Armored Cavalry Regiment.

The 2nd Armored Cavalry itself has ties to Sanford. The unit is directly descended in lineage from the 2nd Dragoons that served at Fort Mellon in 1836.

Carlson has been in the Middle East since February. He has served 13 years

will publish in serial form excerpts of Carlson's diary from Iraq. For at least the next 10 issues, Herald readers will get a front-line view of the war in Iraq, from the ambushes that can pop up at any time to the pleasure of drinking

in the regular army and is a veteran of Panama, Bosnia and the first (and now second) Gulf War.

Through a special arrangement with Carlson's father, local Sanford historian Charlie C. Carlson II, The Seminole Herald

"The Real Thing," a Coca-Cola canned in Atlanta. Carlson comes from a military family. His father is a retired army sergeant-major, and he is the grandson of 96 year-old Charlie C. Carlson Sr., a WWII navy veteran, and great-grandson of Sanford celery farmer Carl Carlson.

Carlson is married to Joyce Ely-Carlson, herself a former staff sergeant with 12 years of service and veteran of the 1st Gulf War. Charlie and Joyce have two sons, Andrew and Charlie Carlson IV.

During Desert Storm, Charlie II, Charlie III and Joyce, all served on active duty. The family has an extensive war history which includes tours in Vietnam, Cambodia, Grenada, Panama, El Salvador, Desert Storm and the present Iraq War, plus service on the Korean DMZ, Bosnia and in Kosovo.

Together the three have earned more than 80 U.S. and foreign medals and 17 honorable discharges. Sergeant-Major Carlson, who began his military career with Sanford's National Guard unit, has retired twice from the regular army due to recalls to active duty. The three veterans have a cumulative total of 54 years of military service.

While it may seem ironic to many, this family views its military service strictly as a profession, and as combat veterans, they are ardent anti-war advocates and peace activists who view war as a failure of civilized mankind.

April 15, 2003 This is my first attempt to get a letter out. Living conditions are the pits, sandstorms pile up sand over everything. Half

our personal gear hasn't arrived yet. We are on the Kuwait-Iraq border doing a lot of convoy escorts into Iraq. I'm a squad leader in first platoon of the 549th Military Police Company. Our platoon is known as the NIGHTSTALKERS. There are four squad leaders for about 30 men and women in the platoon. We operate patrols with armored humvees. We have been notified that we will be permanently moving to

Baghdad soon to take over police operations there. We get no mail, very little supplies, and basically are stranded in a desert camp. Couple of missiles have hit close to us but caused no casualties and we've taken a lot of small arms fire.

April 20, 2003 After spending several months battling severe sand storms in a desert camp called Virginia, on the border between Iraq and Kuwait, the 549th Military Police

Company finally began packing up to leave this place. For the most part it has been boring, except for unbelievable sand storms and escorting enemy prisoners of war from the front to the rear. I've also been running a few convoy escorts from Kuwait into southern Iraq as our division [3rd Infantry Division from Fort Stewart, Georgia] pushed north toward Baghdad. The bullet knicks on our vehicles is enough proof that we've been there escorting con-

voys. We've been detached from our division and this has made resupply difficult for us. We've had to wait weeks for our equipment to arrive by ship and have basically been doing without supplies. We sleep in tents and there is sand all over everything. We eat MREs, sometimes only two meals a day, and toilet paper is non-existent. We've relocated so many times that our mail does not catch up with us. I can say that my greatest luxury is genuine toilet paper and lukewarm water, but both are very scarce and certainly not enough water for bathing. As you might expect we are dirty and gritty.

April 28, 2003 We are now in Iraq, trailing the 3rd Division which has finally punched its way through the Iraqi line and into Baghdad. Our trip will take several days providing we are not delayed by breakdowns or ambushes. I think they call this route Ambush Alley, it is certainly not the scenic route unless you like desert. It is still unclear if we will rejoin the 3rd Division or remain

detached. General Blount said that anyone with the 3rd Division patch on his left shoulder will leave with the division when it returns stateside. I hope this is true, but I bet the 549th will get left behind to mop up Baghdad. It seems like we are the red-headed stepchild of the division. We keep singing the division's "Dog Face Soldier Song", but for what? I'm tired of singing that song, especially if we can't feel like a part of the division.

May 1, 2003 We woke up at 0400 this morning and by 0800 were again moving north. My writing is not too good, I'm writing this while riding in a humvee. We will stop enroute at the CSC [Convoy Support Center], that will be our last safe pit stop before the long haul to Baghdad. They tell us that the way home is through Baghdad. I worry about seeing my boys again. It is not a pleasant thought knowing that somebody is constantly trying to kill you. Some times I wonder why our family got into this profession, surely there is a better line of work.

May 2, 2003 We received word that President Bush has declared the war over, obviously he's not here to see what's going on. I can tell you that the war is not over, not in the least. Of course nobody wants to hear a dog faced soldier's opinion. I still refuse to sing that Dog Face Soldier song.

Well, the Nightstalkers are travelling north toward Baghdad. The wind is hot and the desert stretches to the horizon on both sides of the road. Once and awhile, we pass through a small roadside village where there are lots of little kids trying to trade their currency with Hussein's picture on it for U.S. dollars. We stopped at a refueling point and as I was gassing up the humvee next to the road, some kids came up to beg. I felt like begging too, since we are short on some things. You never know when someone is going to whip-out a weapon and spray you with automatic fire. It is always on our minds.

**Money for nothing:** Forget winning the lottery. I hope some day I can be as broke as the city of Sanford.

The city, as you've read, is in a budget crunch. The city commission eliminated 17 jobs, 14 of which real people were working at. That hasn't stopped the commission from spending money faster than a college kid on spring break with a new credit card. And like that collegian, the only thing the city has to show for its expenditures is a handful of receipts and some fond, if not entirely sober, memories of where the cash went.

Exhibit A are the infamous vinyl windows. You remember those windows: a home owner on Magnolia Avenue asked for and received a permit to install the

..... windows as part of a renovation project. The property was smack-dab in the middle of the Historic District and those particular windows are not allowed. Four geographically-challenged city employees failed to notice where the home was located and OKed the permit. The Historic Preservation Board noticed the problem and denied the home owner's request to install \$16,000 worth of custom windows that had already been built.

Since the property owner followed the rules and the mistake was the city's, commissioners had two choices: allow the windows to be installed or reimburse the owner for the windows. City commissioners chose the latter, which was an appropriate decision given the city's blunder.

So, you might ask, what's the city going to do with \$16,000 worth of windows? Nothing. That's right, absolutely nothing. Why? The city allowed the window company to keep the windows (though the company "graciously" shaved \$4,000 off the price).

Granted, the windows were custom built and the city is not in the window hanging business. However, for \$12,000 in taxpayer money, the city should have found a use for the windows. The Helen Stairs Theatre could have used one or two for a set design. Another home owner outside the district might have purchased them for a renovation or addition. Ditto for a local builder. If nothing else, the windows could have been donated to Habitat for Humanity.

Instead, the city's administration allowed the company to keep the windows. You can bet the manufacturer is not going to let the windows collect dust in a warehouse. Even if they sell the windows for 20 percent of cost, they'll ring up a second pay day.

Exhibit B in the city's spending spree is Victory Temple of God Church. Last year a major stormwater pipe collapsed in front of the church. The church suffered about \$42,000 worth of structural damage.

Once again, the city had to pony up some dough to fix a problem.

Commissioners Kevin Hipes and Velma Williams, along with Mayor Brady Lessard providing the deciding vote, concluded the best solution was to increase the damage estimate by \$8,000 more than their own expert suggested and give the money to the church with no strings attached. The church doesn't have to show the first receipt for how the \$50,000 is spent.

Like the home owner who purchased the windows, the church is not to blame for the predicament. And to be honest, both of these incidents, though preventable, are part of the day-to-day problems you deal with in running a large organization, be it a business or a municipality.

Mayor Lessard likes to boast about the "business smarts" he brings to the table. Smart business people don't pay for something they never receive or fail to hold accountable those who accept tax dollars. It's time for Brady's bunch to either get a little wiser when spending city money or find jobs for 14 former employees.

According to county staff reports, there are still several questions regarding the current proposal, including the fiscal impact on the tourism fund, the maintenance costs and the acoustics with relation to the garage being located on the top of a multi-level building.

Staff is also concerned that the building will attract tradeshow groups, which would not generate overnight hotel stays, instead of two- and three-day conferences.

If approved, the project would be a collaboration between the city of Sanford, the county and the private developer.

The proposed project would include a multi-level hotel, renovations and additions to the existing Sanford Civic Center, retail space, an outdoor amphitheater and a 500-car parking garage.

"This is not what I envisioned for Seminole County," said Commissioner Dick Van Der Weide. "I don't think it comes close to being the ideal conference center

proposal. "I've always wanted it [a conference center] and always supported it," he added. "But, it has changed completely."

In other news, Commission will:

- Vote on whether to enter into a lease agreement with the Boys and Girls Club of Central Florida for the East Altamonte Community Center, located at 325 Station St., in Altamonte Springs.

- Vote on whether to allow the St. Johns River Water Management District to pursue construction and testing of aquifer storage and recovery wells in Seminole County.

- Decide whether to rezone 17-acres located on the west side of Hester Avenue, a quarter-mile south of County Road 427, from agriculture to planned unit development. The proposed project would see 44-unit single-family homes built on the property.

- Hear an appeal regarding the Board of Adjustment's decision to deny a special establishment

for the Cornerstone Church of Orlando and accompanying attendant facilities on a property located on the northeast corner of Willingham Road and Old Chuluota Road. The property is currently zoned as rural.

- Decide whether to move forward with the Adopt A Trailhead program, which would provide a mechanism for organizations and groups to perform special projects and fund enhanced amenities at Seminole County trailhead locations.

- Vote regarding the allotment of up to \$15,000 toward the Got Milk? 3x3 Soccer Shootout Regional Championships, a two-day event which should bring \$990,000 into Seminole County, and \$3,000 toward the 2003 ISA Class B World Championships, which should bring 1,000 people and \$430,730 into the county.

- Vote on whether to add a proposed energy element into the Vision 2020, the Seminole County Comprehensive Plan.

for a grade, participate in safety and range training and pass a comprehensive test.

"For me personally this program came at a time when I could have went down a road of self destruction," explained Willis, whose wife, Hallie, also attended the program and now works as a secretary in the investigation division of the Sanford Police Department.

"Someone was there and gave me their time which helped me turn around. If someone here needs that help and guidance I want to be able to offer it."

As the first in Central Florida, this pilot program

was in the planning stages for nearly a year. It is a collaborative effort between the Sanford, Winter Springs, Oviedo and Longwood police departments, as well as the Seminole County Sheriff's Office and the Seminole County Police Athletic League. Seminole Community College was a partner in the program, donating the use of the classrooms, outside grounds and lecture halls.

Next year, the Sanford Police Department personnel hope to increase the class to two weeks.

"Everything went wonderfully," said Willis. "They've received a small glimpse into law enforcement."

## City groups should collaborate

Church group learns those who work together accomplish more

One thing I will say about Sanford — there are plenty of organizations active in community affairs. Downtown Merchants, Neighborhood groups, Business groups, and many others, including the Save our Park group. It has always been my contention that if all of these worked together for a single goal, the results would be amazing — anything could be accomplished, and the city of Sanford would move ahead faster than any of us can imagine.

Some of the leaders thought it was about time the old building was modernized and better use could be made of the space. This particular church was more than 100 years old and never had any major overhaul other than patching up whatever may have broken during the years.

There were many who saluted the suggestion. Others, who had been at the church for many years, fought it tooth-and-nail, saying they didn't want change. They like it as it has been for all these years. Still others said while they were in favor of the changes, it would cost money they weren't willing to help provide. Others had differing approaches to the suggestion of modernization and improvements.

Then there was disagreement over exactly what should be improved, modernized or refurbished. Here again there were differing opinions. Finally, the person who had been placed in charge of the entire project said, "OK, until you stop disagreeing, we won't do anything. Whenever you all agree, we'll get started. If you can't reach an agreement — we'll scrap the idea."

It took several months and many meetings by the various clubs, groups, and officials of this church, but finally they agreed. The project was undertaken, and now that it's finished, everyone — and I do mean EVERYONE, think it's the best thing that could have happened. If all of the clubs and groups in Sanford got together and ironed out their differences, it may take months, even years, but it could be accomplished and I'll bet everyone would benefit.

Have you looked around this city lately? A few painted buildings or a little improved landscaping may have made a particular area look better — but I'm talking about the ENTIRE City. It'll take a massive project to improve everything — and it will cost everyone money — but we have a choice to improve it — or watch it deteriorate over the years.

Ask yourself — if we do nothing — what will Sanford be in 100 years? Will our grandchildren want to live here?



## Rolling truth in the White House

NEW YORK — It seems that President Nixon's press secretary, Ron Ziegler, was a man ahead of his time. He brought the word "inoperative" into the White House as a way to avoid saying that the president had been lying all along about the scandals of Watergate. Whatever we told you before is now inoperative.

Politics is a game of rolling truth. Promises and pledges and facts, too, become inoperative when they are no longer needed — or have been revealed as untrue. And as political truth becomes untrue, rolling right along, the untrue becomes the truth.

After Watergate, Sissela Bok wrote a book called "Lying" in which she argued that there were three common excuses for misleading, for lying: (1) I never meant that. I was joking; (2) I was the one misled. I didn't know it was untrue; (3) I had to lie because I was serving a higher cause.

There are, I think, a couple of others now. No. 4 might be, "Everybody does it." Worst of all, No. 5 might be, "No one cares." On the Bok scale, the Bush White House, tangled

in a web of war justification, would like its now-inoperative prewar rhetoric to be judged as No. 2 rather than the trickier No. 3. The CIA did it!

Or, with any luck, the president's men and the woman who is in charge of the National Security Council might be able to hang tough because nobody really cares all that much about why we were led or misled into Iraq — if we can get out. Winning is often its own excuse, especially in the short run.

Frankly, I think lying has become more acceptable than it was in the 1970s. If lying was a sin once, it is a tactic now.

Lies have always been necessary to civilized behavior. Certainly, anyone who has ever answered the question "How do I look?" knows that. But the boundaries of the tolerance have been stretched these last couple of decades.

Wall Street and corporations have been lying to investors, employees and regulators without thinking beyond "Everybody does it." Phony resumes are as American as apple pie. Writers and professors and great newspapers get caught regularly now at one dishonesty or another,

though optimists might argue that is because of more and better scrutiny.

The simplest example of how that translates into representative democracy and governance has little to do with WMD, yellowcake or patty-cake, either. The White House and Pentagon set out to deceive on numbers: How many troops and at what cost? Before the war, we were told occupation would cost \$1 billion a month. That number has now been rolled to \$4 billion a month and counting.

But there may yet be a way out for the deceiving war makers. Stabilize the damned place and come home, if that is possible, and all lies become inoperative. "No one cares" might be an exaggeration, but if the postwar sniping in Iraq is brought under control, I'm not sure that President Bush's opponents and critics will get much attention by reminding him of past exaggeration.

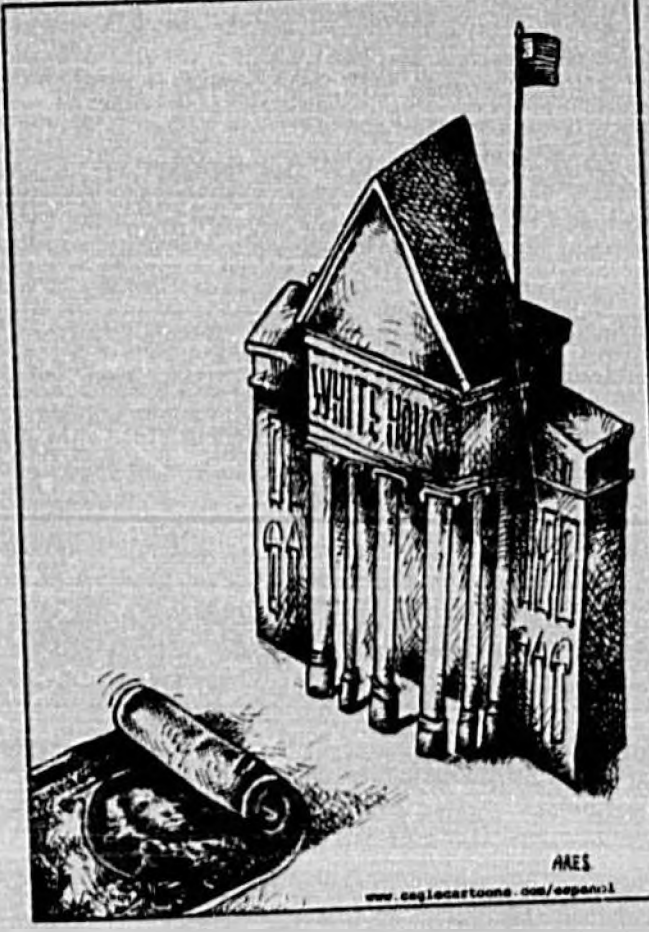
Beyond that there are real questions about whether deception has become the norm, a way of life and a way of doing business. I think it probably has, and I think that has more than a little to do with the so-called information revolution. Both politics and journalism have become subsets of entertainment — those preachy

and stodgy businesses are pretty low-level stuff compared to big-time show business. Action films, music videos and creative pornography are more entertaining than press releases and candidate debates.

Living in the fantasy world of Los Angeles — among the people who do fantasy for a living — I was always amazed at the casual and comfortable lying done by many people in that world. Deals were routinely done by misrepresentation, the most obvious trick being the putting together of a "package" by telling the star you have the director, then telling the director you have the star — and lying to everyone about having the money. If you get caught lying, you tell the other guy how smart he is to catch you, the lies are declared inoperative, and two hustlers can go on from there.

Rolling lies is the Hollywood game. The business there is making things up to reflect and illuminate reality, but things get more than a little scary when the reflection becomes the reality in higher stakes games like war. Then it's not only the president who is in trouble. We all are.

## Colin Powell and the new 'bright shining lie'

Colin Powell has escaped the controversy that has engulfed President Bush and the intelligence services over the president's use of discredited information in his State of the Union speech. Powell didn't use those now-infamous 16 words about an alleged Iraqi attempt to purchase uranium in Africa when he addressed the U.N. Security Council in February.

But Powell isn't off the hook. The intelligence he did use was equally dubious while arguably more persuasive.

In his Feb. 5 brief making the case for war, the secretary of state repeated the canard that Saddam Hussein had forged close ties to al-Qaida, cementing in the minds of many Americans a tie-in between Saddam and Sept. 11. It was that false connection — never explicitly stated, but implied by several administration spokesmen — that helped President Bush to win popular support for his invasion of Iraq. (By October 2002, more than two-thirds of Americans believed — wrongly — that Saddam had a hand in the

attacks on the World Trade Center and the Pentagon, according to the Pew Research Center.)

Yet, as weapons of mass destruction have not been discovered, neither has any evidence that Saddam had made common cause with Osama bin Laden. That's no surprise. The claims of an alliance between Iraq and al-Qaida were never credible.

While bin Laden is a religious fundamentalist, Saddam is a secular tyrant who worships only himself. Besides, Saddam knew that he was closely watched by U.S. intelligence services. It's unlikely he would further inflame the U.S. by linking up with Osama.

So why would a man of Powell's intelligence and integrity — not to mention caution — make such an implausible claim? Why would a former military commander of Powell's stature allow young men and women to be sent off to war under false pretenses?

Powell was undoubtedly under intense pressure to get with Bush's program. The White House badly wanted to connect Saddam

and Osama, regardless of whether the facts supported it. As early as Sept. 12, 2001, according to Bob Woodward's book, "Bush at War," Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld proposed invading Iraq. (And a government-in-exile of neoconservatives, the Project for a New American Century, had suggested toppling Saddam in the 1990s.)

The charitable view of Powell's conduct is that he believed he had a better chance of persuading the White House to moderate its policies on Iraq — at least by building a strong coalition of allies — if he were seen as a team player. It didn't work. Instead, the White House ended up using Powell's considerable credibility to build support for a risky and far-fetched scheme to remake the Middle East.

So far, that scheme has not worked out as the White House planned. Iraq is a mess; the occupation is costing \$4 billion a month; and the Middle East may end up less, not more, stable.

Worse, as Gen. John Abizaid, commander of allied forces in Iraq, finally acknowledged last week, the war is not over. "It's low-intensity conflict, in our doctrinal terms, but it's war, however you describe

it."

Indeed, an American soldier dies nearly every day. Powell probably couldn't have stopped this war, no matter what he said or did.

Bush was determined to invade under any pretext. But Powell didn't have to add the sheen of his credibility to this grotesque misadventure. He might simply have resigned — a move which would have sent a signal to allies and the American public alike about the dubiousness of this enterprise.

Reflecting on his experiences in Vietnam in his autobiography, "My American Journey," Powell wrote: "I had gone off to Vietnam in 1962 standing on a bedrock of principle and conviction. And I had watched that foundation eroded by euphemisms, lies and self-deception."

Having discerned what author Neil Sheehan called the "bright shining lie" in Southeast Asia, an older Powell not only failed to discern it in Iraq, he became part of it.

## Relieving stress

**SANFORD** — Is your life filled with stress and you just don't know how to cope? You're not alone.

According to the Centerpointe Research Institute, every individual has a personal threshold of how much they can handle in everyday life. If pushed past this threshold by events, the individual feels stressed or even overwhelmed.

"People have to deal with so much stress in today's society, there is just no way to avoid it," said Traci Barnes, owner of Traci's Massage and Wellness in Sanford. "But, they can learn to manage the stress."

According to a 2000 Gallup Poll sponsored by the Marlin Company, job-related stress leads the way with 80 percent of all workers feeling stress on the job. Nearly half of these workers say they need help to learn how to manage stress.

"Once you have stress it snowballs and causes all kinds of physiological changes that could lead to sickness," explained Barnes, who attended Florida College of Natural Health to become a licensed and state certified massage therapist.

According to the American Institute of Stress, the stress an individual experiences can cause illness due to increased sympathetic nervous system activity and an outpouring of adrenaline, cortisol and

other stress-related hormones. Stress can also cause an individual to have an impaired immune system resistance to viral linked disorders ranging from the common cold and herpes to AIDS and cancer.

In fact, it is estimated that 75 to 90 percent of all visits to primary care physicians are for stress related problems, according to the American Institute of Stress.

There are several ways to eliminate stress and its effects on the body, including making quiet time for yourself, practicing breathing exercises, paying attention to nutrition, doing yoga and meditation, or having a massage.

"Massages alleviate stress and educate people on how they store stress and how to manage it better," Barnes said. "When you have a

massage you finally realize where all the bumps and kinks are. There are a lot of people who don't know they are stressed out. They believe they are suppose to feel as bad as they do."

According to Barnes, massage dilates the blood vessels, which improves circulation and relieves congestion throughout the body. It also increases the blood supply and nutrition to muscles, improves muscle tone, reduces the danger of fibrosis, and improves circulation and nutrition to joints, which eliminates harmful deposits helping to reduce swelling and pain.

"I felt like I had a calling for healing people through natural health," said Barnes, who became a massage therapist so she could spend more time with her 2-year-old son, Jesse. "Today, people are in pain and don't have any hope because of some type of health issue. This has been a passion all my life. I have been able to relieve that pain and instill hope through massages."

Massages are also able to stretch connective tissues and improve its circulation and nutrition, which breaks

down and prevents the formation of adhesions, a condition in which patients whose muscles become so tight that a type of scarring forms. Basically, this scarring is an extra layer between your skin and muscle.

"This is what we're massaging out so that they don't appear again," Barnes said. "It's like if you have dirt on your face and you wash it."

Barnes is also a retailer of

Starlight International, natural supplements that target specific health issues such as stress, sleeping disorders, depression and overall wellness.

"People are coming up with all these medicines that aren't really needed," she said. "Take control and take your life back through proper supplementation. It makes all the difference in the world when your body is being fed on a nutritional basis."

James W. "Sonny" Powell was honorably discharged following five months treatment for tropical fever in the Pacific.

1st Lt. Franz Warner was an aide-de-camp to Major General Siebert at Camp San Luis Obispo, CA... Pvt. Leo Butner, Jr., was called to active duty. He had joined the Army Air Corps in March.

Company C of the Florida National Guard, under Capt. John Galloway, left for three days of training at Camp McQuarre.

Francis E. Roumillat, Jr. was among 20 draftees leaving for Camp Blanding July 7.

Francis A. Armbruster was listed as MIA in the Pacific... James C. Arant was reported MIA with the Merchant Marines. He had already been Honorably Discharged from both the Army and Navy. It was later learned that he had been killed when a torpedo hit his ship in the Mediterranean... Lt. N. Brantley Adams was killed in action in North Pacific (Alaska) action... Lt. Jack Allen Gillon, taken by Japanese December 12, was reported in a prison camp.

**War Activities at Home**  
The Altman family was excited as four amateur radio "hams" phoned to say that they had heard missing Robert Altman via short wave from Japan saying he was well.

In view of a corn meal shortage, Re. L.B. Mann suggested that a grist mill be placed in the local feed stores.

American Legion officials bragged about the collection, since November 18, of over a million pounds of varied scrap, making the local Post still the USA champion.

USO personnel moved into the new USO building on East First Street at the corner of Sanford Avenue on August 20, 1943. It was dedicated.





## Orlando signs Juwan Howard

The Orlando Magic have signed free agent forward Juwan Howard, General Manager John Gabriel announced Wednesday. Per team policy, terms of the deal are not disclosed.

Howard (6-foot-9, 260-pounds, 2/7/73) appeared in 77 regular season games with Denver last season, averaging 18.4 points per game, 7.6 rebounds per game, 3.0 assists per game and 1.00 steal per game in 35.5 minutes per game.

He led the Nuggets in scoring, rebounding and minutes played. Howard ranked 32nd in the NBA in scoring and tied for 21st in rebounding during the 2002-03 campaign. He recorded double figures in scoring 70 times, including 37 games of 20-plus points.

Howard also led (or tied) the team in scoring 51 times, in rebounding 28 times and in assists 16 times. He pulled down 10-plus rebounds in 19 games and recorded a team-best 18 double doubles.

"Juwan is a consummate professional who had a lot of options," says Gabriel. "He certainly helps in addressing our needs, and we're excited he's coming to Orlando."

Originally selected in the first round (fifth overall) of the 1994 NBA Draft by Washington, Howard has played in 649 career games with Washington, Dallas and Denver, averaging 17.9 points per game, 7.5 rebounds per game and 3.1 assists per game in 37.3 minutes per game.

He has averaged more than 17 points per game during seven of his nine NBA seasons, and averaged seven-or-more rebounds eight times. Howard has also appeared in 13 career playoff outings, averaging 14.6 points per game, 7.8 rebounds per game and 1.5 assists per game in 40.0 minutes per game.

Added head coach Doc Rivers, "Juwan is a complete pro, who comes to play every night. His game is multi-dimensional and he will provide us with a lot of versatility in terms of the lineups we will be able to put out on the floor."

Howard enjoyed his finest pro season in 1995-96, when he averaged a career-high 22.1 points per game, 8.1 rebounds per game and 4.4 assists per game in 40.7 minutes per game for Washington. He ranked 10th in the league in scoring and fourth in minutes played. Howard was named to the Eastern Conference All-Star squad and earned All-NBA Third Team honors.

Wow folks, I just returned from a week of fishing in Islamorada, the Sportfishing Capital of the World.

This is one awesome place to visit and would be an awesome place to live. The fishing is without question one of the hottest places in the world. There are so many options to choose from that you really have to plan each day carefully.

You can choose to go offshore if the weather cooperates and catch dolphin all day. You can choose to fish around town in Florida Bay the backcountry or run to Flamingo.

argest going just over three-pounds. Talk about good, mouth watering fish, these snappers were awesome.

We landed several other types of fish throughout the week, but the highlight of the week was my last day.

Capt. Brian and I headed out for the elusive Bonefish and not just any Bonefish. We were looking for the world class size, 12 pounds or better. When a Bonefish reaches 12 pounds they are called SLOBs. After 3 hours of fishing and several opportunities we finally came across four fish that seemed interested.

Rigged with 10-pound test line, a 14-pound fluorocarbon leader attached to a Daiichi 1/0 circle hook, a 1/16 ounce bullet weight and a nice live shrimp I launched a cast about 10 feet in front of the approaching bones. The largest fish of the four gave the bait a sniff and about that time the smaller fish ate the bait. Once he figured out he had dental floss in his teeth it was off to the races. The bonefish ran over 135 yards of line off the reel at about 35 M.P.H. or faster. After retrieving most of the line he took off on an 80 yard dash and then he decided to do the bonefish dance around the boat three or four times.

Finally after 20 minutes we landed the 12-1/2 pound bonefish. My heart was racing and I had a smile from ear to ear. It was just an awesome thing of

beauty. After a few pictures we gently released this magnificent creature to swim again.

Tight Lines and Good Fishing, Captain David Rogers, AAA Hawgwild Saltwater Charters. HUNTER SAFETY CLASS AND REGISTRATION AVAILABLE ONLINE

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's (FWC's) hunter safety class now is available online as well as on compact disc. Hunters can take most of the classroom instruction without leaving home before taking part in a field day that includes live-firing instruction on a shooting range to earn certification.

Anyone born on or after June 1, 1975 must pass the FWC course or another approved course before purchasing a hunting license. Other states and Canadian provinces with hunter safety requirements accept the FWC course as suitable for hunter certification.

The FWC will continue to offer the traditional version of the course at least once a year in each county. To see scheduled hunter safety courses and sign up, interested persons can visit the FWC Web site at [floridacommervation.org](http://floridacommervation.org), or they can contact the FWC office listed in the phone book and speak to the Hunter Safety Section.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission offers an alter-

native-delivery program that allows students to obtain partial credit for the hunter safety course by completing an interactive Internet or CD-ROM program. To obtain a hunter safety course certificate, students must complete the interactive Internet or CD-ROM program and attend a scheduled "hands-on" field day.

The interactive Internet and CD-ROM course was developed in cooperation with seven southeastern states as a means of increasing accessibility to hunter safety programs. Field days are offered throughout Florida. Internet users can click on the "Course Schedules" link then the appropriate region for information regarding field days in their areas. This alternative-delivery format is in addition to the traditional courses scheduled in all of Florida's counties.

The interactive Internet and CD-ROM course has many activities and questions, including a 50-question test that students must complete. After completing the online Internet course, students must print out the final report form with test results and have it notarized. Then they can enroll in one of the scheduled field days posted online through the "Course Schedules" link. At the field day, students must complete a standard written examination and demonstrate such skills as loading and unloading different types of firearms, safely crossing fences and other activities that all safe hunters should master.

Students wishing to complete the alternative delivery course using the CD-ROM method will need to contact the closest FWC Hunter Safety Office at least two weeks prior to the scheduled course field day. The office will mail a CD-ROM with instructions to students upon request.

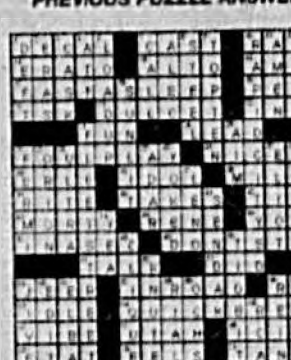
