Beaver Pelts For Christmas?

What would your reaction be if your husband brought home eight beaver pelts and said "Here's your Christmas present" or handed you a live King Crab to cook for supper?

These were only two of the unusual experiences which Mrs. Willis Benson, former Casselberry resident, had during her winter and spring on Kodiak Island in Alaska.

Mrs. Benson gave those attending the County Federation of Women's Club meeting held at the Casselberry Woman's Club last Thursday an interesting glimpse of life in our northernmost state.

She and her son Billy joined her husband on Kodiak where he teaches math and science in the Navy Base school. Their elder son, Charles, stayed in Casselberry in order to complete his senior year at Lyman High School and she is in town for his graduation.

Kodiak Island is at the head of the Aleutian chain and is 100 miles long and 50-60 miles in width. The town of Kodiak has a population of 3,000 and the Navy Base, which is located seven miles

from the town, has a population of approximately 5,000. The economy of the island is based primarily on the fishing industry. Some of the varieties of fish found in abundance in the area include salmon, king crab, and smelt. Many people smoke their own salmon and it is a delicious hors d'oeuvre.

Deer, elk and bear on the island provide exciting hunting and there are some cattle ranches. Beaver dams are found on the streams. Fields and slopes are covered with beautiful wildflowers and blueberries, cranberries and salmon berries abound.

There is one bakery and as bread is priced at 30 cents in town and 25 cents on the base, Mrs. Benson soon learned how to bake her own. She also learned how to make that old favorite of the prospectors, "Sourdough Pancakes."

Transportation to Kodiak is primarily by plane and the boat comes from Seattle only twice during the summer. A ferry to be put in operation in 1964 will make the island more accessible to tourists.

Alaska enjoyed a relatively mild winter this year. The temperature varies but the lowest record on Kodiak is nine degrees and the highest for August is 55 degrees and for January, 30 degrees. Several days of high winds, known as Wilia Walls, during the winter forced the closing of schools.

Armed forces radio and television programs, seen without commercials are broadcast from Elmendorf Air Base at Anchorage.

The population includes many retired people, authors, artists and guides who love to live there because of the friendliness of the people and the magnificent scenery.

There is a variety of businesses, a small hospital, and churches of many denominations are found in the small town.

To fill her time Mrs. Benson worked as a substitute teacher and as a clerk in a gift shop. Some of the souvenirs which she exhibited at the Woman's Club were a cribbage board made from walrus tusk, a small totem pole, a belt of hair seal and recipe books containing examples of colorful Alaskan cookery.

She and Charles are looking forward to joining the rest of the family in Alaska soon after his graduation in June.

Teach Us To Pray

Many questions are asked about prayer. I would not be surprised if more people ask questions concerning this means of grace than any other. This is not a modern happening. When we turn back the centuries to the time when Christ was on earth the same ineffectiveness existed. When the disciples asked our Lord to teach them to pray He spoke the words we find in Matthew 6: 9-13. We identify this model prayer as "The Lord's Prayer."

The introduction says, "Our Father, Who Art in Heaven." We find a very warm, close and intimate relationship with God in being permitted to address Him as "Father." We must stand in awe at the privilege of being able to approach God as His children. Let us note also that He is our HEAVENLY Father. For those of us who have children, we know that the best is not too good for them, yet our judgment is not always right. For example, we all know people who would not think of saying their children any physical advantage yet neglect their most im-

portant soul! The Heavenly Father knows without a doubt what we need.

There are six great petitions in this prayer of a few words. The first three relate to God and His honor while the last three are primarily concerned with man and his needs.

The First Petition says, "Hallowed Be Thy Name." Praise is given to God in these words. How appropriate it is to begin our prayers with praise to the God of all that is.

The Second Petition asks, "Thy Kingdom Come." In many of our churches we repeat this prayer time after time, but how many of us are sincere? We are praying to be ruled by Christ Himself. Certainly this places our allegiance to Him above our business, recreation, country and families. He makes it very clear that He is Lord of all or Lord not at all.

The Third Petition, "Thy Will Be Done On Earth As It Is In Heaven."

It is simply not enough to become citizens of the Heavenly Kingdom, but GOOD citizens where the will of the Sovereign God is our will.

The Fourth Petition, "Give Us This Day Our Daily Bread."

"Daily Bread" does not indicate that we feel it necessary to have great wealth to be satisfied. We will not have to "keep up with the Joneses" to find happiness, but we do ask that God provide us with the necessities of life that we may live respectfully for Him.

Petition Number Five, "And Forgive Us Our Debts, As We Forgive Our Debtors."

How many of us mean this! What a DANGEROUS petition. Do we really want God to forgive us as WE forgive others? This involves multiple pardons as well as tremendous pardoning for most of us.

Evidently Peter was faced with the problem of forgiving a troublesome person. He asked if he had to forgive as much as seven times, to which our blessed Lord replied, "seventy times seven," meaning an unlimited number of times.

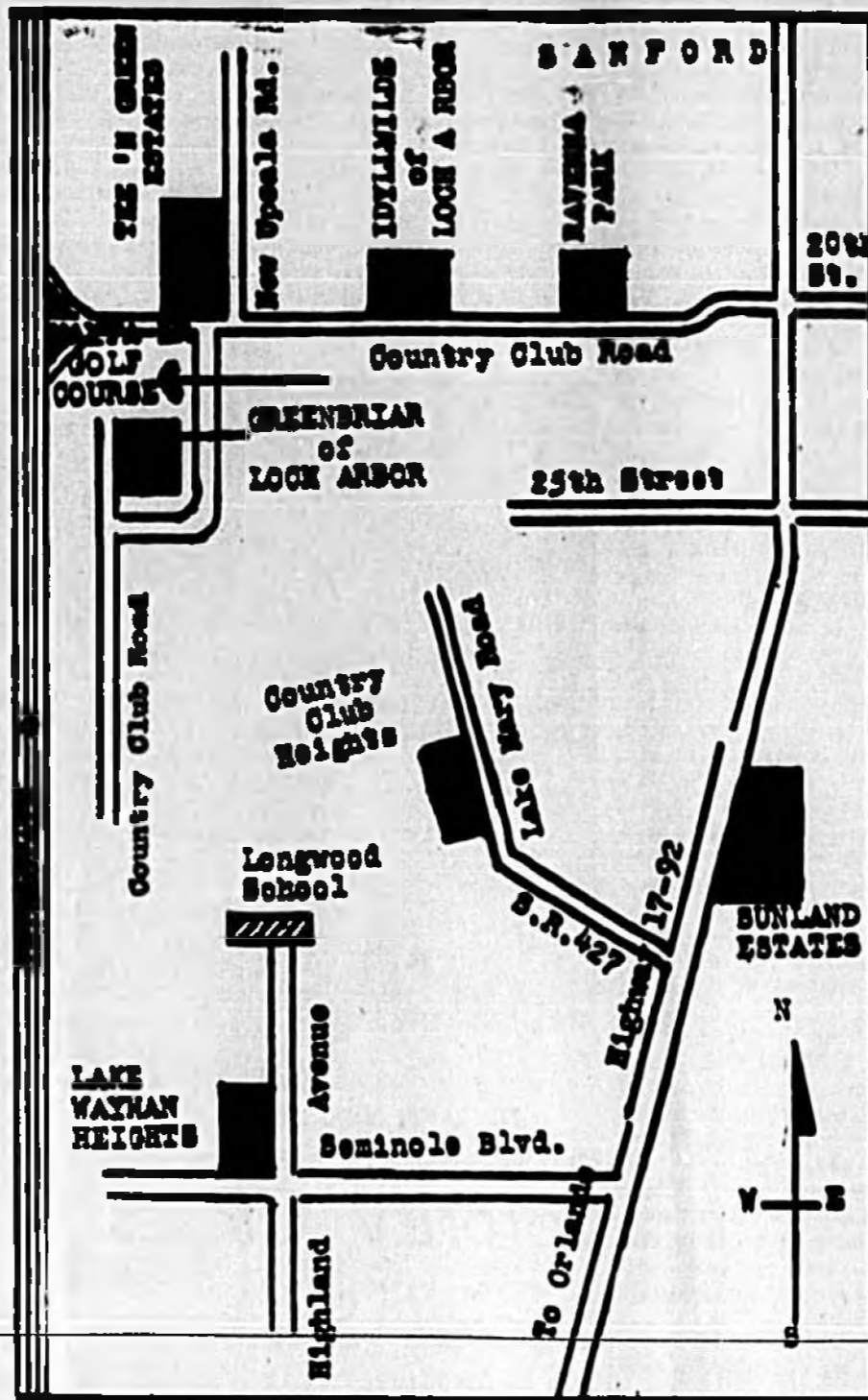

Heavy Attack Squadron 11's Detachment Eight maintained its leadership among Heavy Attack Wing One squadrons Tuesday by flying to first place in the May bomber stream competition at the Sanford Naval Air Station. However, results released today showed that the top individual honor went to Heavy Attack Squadron Three (VAH-3) and an A3B Skywarrior flight crew of Cdr. Henry Dement and his bombardier-navigator, Lt. Bill Malicowski. Another VAH-3 flight crew, composed of Lt. Jim Pirrotte, pilot, and Aviation Electro-

nic Technician First Class Gerald Smith, bombardier-navigator, earned third place, also flying an A3B. The rest of the laurels belonged to Detachment Eight (Det. 8), which also won inter-squadron bombing competitions for March and April. All four of skipper Cdr. Bob de Lorenzi's entries finished among the first seven in the 15-plane event. All were flying A3B's. This consistency was good for a 245-point lead over second place VAH-3. Ernie Carlson, earned fifth place. The other Detachment Eight crew, Lt. Cdr. Ken Cosky, pilot, and bombardier, Lt. (jg) Tom Treanor, finished seventh. The victory for Detachment Eight was especially gratifying since it capped off two months of "bridesmaid" finishes. The Detachment narrowly missed winning both the March and April Bomber Streams.
