

What kind of control are you getting at the state and local level? And who asserts it?

The query is pertinent because in host of people of dublous qualifica-tion have attempted to dietate to teachers what should and should not taught in our schools.

A university like Stanford can. as it recently did, refuse such "guid-aner" in the form of strings attached to money gifts. Public schools, depen-

Many of these have very strong notions about history, politics, eco-nomies, sociology and other practical

The question any community should ask with regard to such complainants is this:

What are their true credentials? What do they know of the sub-jects they want taught in their par-ticular way? Is there any support, in the objective evidence, for such teachings?

The classroom is not the courtroom. There are no strict rules of evidence. But a school, if it is to lay any claim to the name at all, must offer its students as much solid, ver-ifiable fact as can be brought to bear on any topic under study.

It also must be a place given over to the free interplay of ideas and opinions. It ceases to be a school when outsiders can intervene to limit it to only those ideas and opinions they approve. The natural response then must be:

"Who are they to say?" Many are ignorant amateurs who want to repeal a history they do not like and to warp the present to their own unsupportable views. Their as-sault on the schools already has gone a long way.

Every community in the nation should be making sure that knowledgeable, balanced, fair-minded persons decide what is to be taught in its schools. And no one else.

Private Rights, Public Goods

The Supreme Court decision overturning several lunch counter ait-in convictions of Negroes in southern states leaves untouched a basic issue of lew that may soon have to be dealt

The question is the extent - if any - to which an individual propchoice alone, can be interfered with by federal authority if he chooses not to desegregate his restaurant or other facilities.

The high court this time really led on only one point: It said state ((city) law or the executive equivalent was used to compel restaurant owners to enforce segregation at lunch counters and that such state lew is unconstitutional.

What would it say if there were no such use of state power? In an opinion, accommonlying the majority view. Justice John Harlan said:

"An individual's right to restrict the use of his property, however un-regenerate a particular exercise of that right may be thought, lies beyond the reach of the 14th amend-

"Freedom of the individual to choose his associates or his neighbors, to use and dispose of his property as he sees fit, to be irrational, arbitrary, capricious, even unjust in his personal relations, are things all entitled to a large measure of protection from government interfer-

ence." This view is of course not the court majority's, nor is it directly applicable to the sit-in cases just now decided.

But it is indeed evident that Harlan's idea gains support from the 14th amendment itself. It says specifically that "no state" shall deprive any person of life, liberty or property without due process of law, nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

In other words, unless it can be shown, as in the newly decided aitin cases, that state power has been used to deny equal protection of the laws to Negroes, the federal govern-ment, through its courts, may be hard pressed to find a legal basis for challenging segregation practices on private property.
Curiously, when the state and not

the federal government is acting to bar discriminatory practices, the shoe seems to be on the other foot. In a case wherein a property own-

er challenged Massachusetts' antidiscrimination housing law, the state's highest court ruled against the owner. The court said a citizen cannot use his property "to the detriment of his fellows." It added that "equally fundamental with the private right is that of the public to regulate it in the common interest." Other state high courts have ruled similarly in matters involving housing and employment practices. But these decisions are no help

to the federal government, which is an institution of limited powers. By contrast, say constitutional lawyers, the state can act in the name of the "common good" to do almost any-thing not barred by its own or the U. S. Constitution.

BIRMINGHAM, Aln. (UPI) — The Justice Department today asked a federal court to keep Gov. George C. Wallace from carrying out his vow to personally block integration at the University of Alabama next week.

Wallace himself was not on hand for the hearing which began shortly after noon. The governor was in Montgomery, Ala.,

and sent attorneys to represent him. The fiery little segregationist said Sunday in New York that he would not attend the hearing before U.S. District Judge Seybourn Lynne but his attorneys would be there.

Sources close to the governor said his attorneys were to argue that Wallace's presence at the university when two Negroes are scheduled to enroll June 10 would be necessary to

The Justice Department asked for an injunction shortly after Wallace said he would stand in the doorway and personally block the students' admission. The government apparently sought to avoid a campus showdown like that with Mississippi Gov. Ross Barnett in the integration of the University of Mississippi last fall.

The deflant governor, who had played a cat-and-mouse game with federal marshals for more than a week behind a highway patrol guard, was served with a summons and complaint by a marshal here Sunday.




