

Sanford-Orlando 'Phone Service Aired'

 If there is to be any toll-free Sanford to Orlando telephone service within the near future it will probably be in the form of an optional measured service like that being studied by Bell Telephone Company in an experimental operation in Brevard County between "Theville" and East Galie.

This was the gist of an hour discussion of the Seminole Chamber of Commerce's projects committee meeting with telephone officials from Sanford and Orlando held at the Chamber's conference room.

Robert Shelden and William Armond of Sanford and Orlando explained the telephone company's position regarding the chambers wish to initiate a local calling function between the two cities.

Shelden informed the ratio between the two cities is presently two calls per customer per month, and indicated the ratio should be higher for the phone company to consider the elimination of the 30 cents a year.

The federal government contributes more than \$400 million in local governments every year.

The proposed option measured operation would increase the monthly charges of those persons wanting to use the service approximately \$3 for residence and \$5 for business.

Shelden estimated the cost to Sanford of putting in the extended toll-free service to all 15,000 Sanford subscribers would be in the neighborhood of \$1 million and would mean an increase in the telephone rates charged all Sanford customers.

The optional measured service would not mean an overall rate increase, but would result in increased costs to those desiring the service, Armond said.

Shelden said the telephone company would like to have more time to study the extended toll-free service and mentioned the possible installation of the full service is justified at this time.

Krider observed that the criterion used by the telephone officials in measuring the number of calls at two per month per person and explained if the service was available more persons would use it.

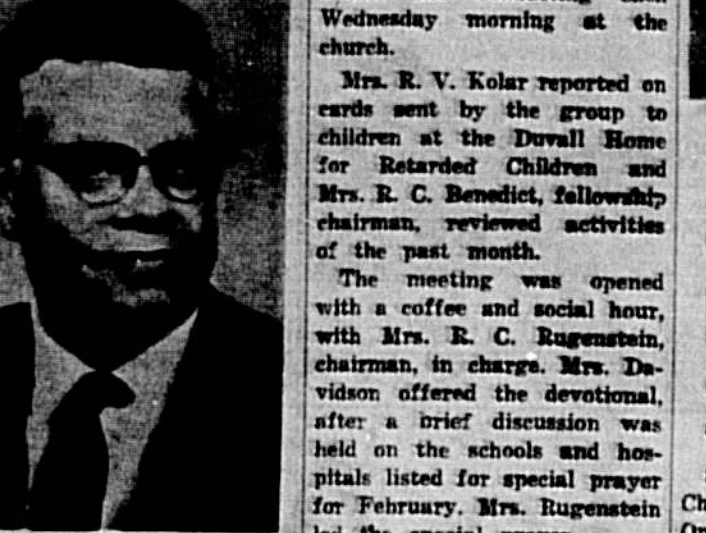

The first unit, a combination parish house - church, was erected in 1956 and an educational wing was added in 1962. With rapid growth of the area, a planning committee was formed early last year to make recommendations for expansion to meet growing needs of the parish. 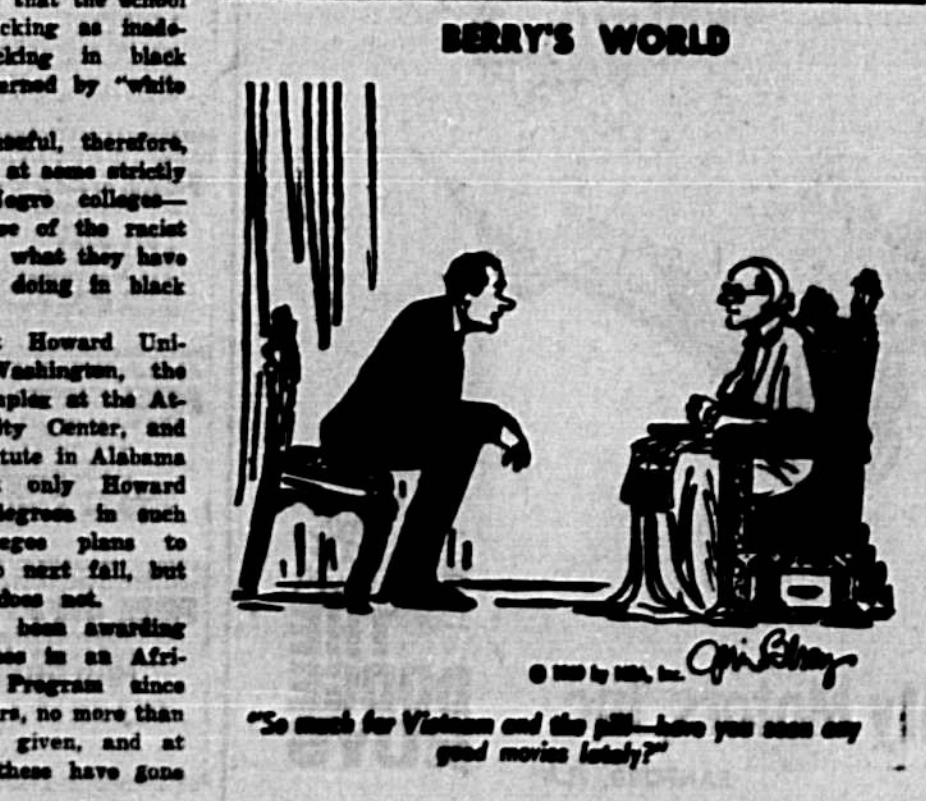
