### Demands Dismissal Of Director, 16 Others At Prison

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — A state senator who sat in on last week's investigation of Raiford Prison demanded today that state Penal Director R. O. Culver, the three top men at Raiford and 13 guards be fired.

Sen. Harvie Belser of Bonifay wrote Gov. LeRoy Collins, the Cabinet and every member of the Legislature that a top-to-bottom sweep is the only answer to the problem of brutality and confusion over the chain of command at Raiford.

Culver himself said today he will recommend that Warden DeWitt Sinclair, Assistant L. J. Swann and James M. Dunn, captain of the guards at Raiford, be fired.

And he indicated that unless the governor and Cabinet back him up, he will resign.

Collins said it is too early to be talking about firing anyone.

Collins made it clear that he will stand behind Culver 100 per cent—and will strongly oppose any move to fire Culver.

Belser called Gov. Collins "inefficient." He said he feels that Sinclair is "morally innocent" for what has happened, but at the same time an efficient penal system cannot be obtained in Florida without a complete change in personnel.

Belser also recommended that a transcript of testimony taken at the 19-hour hearing at Raiford be turned over to both state and federal grand juries for action and to the U.S. Attorney General.

The fire department was called when officers feared the truck would burst into flames. Glenn was taken to Seminole Memorial Hospital, where he is in "fairly good" condition. Damages were estimated at \$1200 to the truck and \$1,000 to the Mathey car. One resident commented that the collision, which took place at 8:10 p. m., "sounded like an airplane."

In another Friday accident, Ulfate Ford, Mount Dora Negro, was charged with careless and negligent driving when his automobile pulled out from behind another he was pushing and side-swiped a vehicle driven by Warren E. Knowles, Sanford City manager. The accident occurred at 13th and Mulberry. There were no injuries. Ford's bond was set at \$200.

Minor damage was sustained by two vehicles Friday in an accident involving a Young cab and a truck owned by Gene Estridge. The two drivers were Andrew Miller and Toni Gatzman. The accident took place at Fourth and Cypress.

## Oklahoma, Texas Struck By Violent Windstorms

LAWTON, Okla. (UPI) — Tornadoes and windstorms as strong as tropical hurricanes struck along a 250-mile front in Oklahoma and Texas today.

They injured seven or eight persons and damaged schools, homes and garages. None was reported killed.

Tornadoes were reported at Lawton, Okla., Walters, Okla., and Olney, Tex. Violent winds reaching the 75-mile-an-hour velocity of hurricanes were reported at Abilene, San Angelo and Wichita Falls, all in Texas.

The tornadoes were generated by an advancing winter storm, the first of the year, that was covering the ground with snow in the Panhandle and plains of Texas.

An inch or more of snow was on the ground already and forecasters expected there would be four inches by night, along with 18 to 28-degree temperatures.

A tornado damaged a home and a farm equipment store six miles west of Lawton. Another tornado struck three miles northwest of Walters, damaging a farm home and outbuildings.

Mrs. H. K. Gore, the police dispatcher, reported that a twister damaged the high school and a nearby elementary school at Olney, Tex., 85 miles south of Lawton. Pupils were told to stay at home because the roof of the high school was damaged.

The wind blew over a trailer at San Angelo, injuring slightly a sleeping family of five. It blew over another house trailer at Wichita Falls, injuring two of three other persons.

It was first believed that a tornado hit Abilene, Tex., but it was later determined to have been a vicious windstorm. The storm at Abilene knocked three radio stations off the air.

Milwee, President of the Ministerial Association, The Rev. Perry Stone, Stenstrom, Executive Secretary of the Jaycees, Barbara Becker, and legislators, Douglas Sunstrom, Mack Cleveland Jr. and Gordon Frederick.

Representatives from the Chamber of Commerce, County Commission, City Commission and the Jaycee president, Tom McDonald, will ride in cars as part of the parade.

Thirty-six floats already have been entered in the parade. Entries must be made before Nov. 20 at the Jaycee Information Booth on 17-92.

Red Plane Attacks Revealed By U.S.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The State Department disclosed today that Russian fighters attacked U. S. Air Force planes over the Baltic Sea and made a threatening pass at another plane over the Sea of Japan 10 days ago.

In a note delivered to Moscow last Thursday but not made public until today, the United States strongly protested the dangerous, offensive and provocative actions of Soviet fighter aircraft.

This government also bluntly warned too if Russia continues such dangerous action "commanded by American aircraft will be under instructions to take any deliberate action which they consider necessary and appropriate."

Presumably this meant U. S. pilots would be ordered to shoot back.

Soviet fighters fired on the U. S. plane flying over the Baltic, but did not hit it. The Russian planes did not fire at the plane over the Sea of Japan.

In both cases, the U. S. aircraft withheld their fire.

This government said the plane attacked over the Baltic was flying on a routine mission. It was about 60 miles from the nearest Soviet territory at an altitude of 20,000 feet.

The Soviet fighters attacked that plane twice.

"The American aircraft withheld its fire, and fortunately was not hit despite the fact that the attacks were launched from behind and without warning," the U. S. note said.

Within a few hours after the attacks on the plane over the Baltic, a U. S. military aircraft flying over the Sea of Japan was intercepted three times by pairs of Russian planes, the note said. The Russians made simulated attacks but did not fire.

The note said this plane was 54 miles from the nearest Soviet territory and was flying at about 32,000 feet.

The first two Soviet planes took a position 1,000 yards off the right wing of the American aircraft. One fighter then veered toward the American plane and crossed only 100 feet in front of it.

"This was a dangerous and unwarranted maneuver involving grave risk of collision and possibly calculated to provoke fire from the American aircraft," the U. S. note said.

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# Editorials

## Bonds To Buildings; Action To Be Speedy

Construction of new schools in Seminole County may be a reality within a few short months. The school bond issue approved by the voters on Sept. 9 will be presented for validation Dec. 5.

R. T. Milwee, superintendent of county schools, said the bonds will be offered for sale by the school board in January. If the bonds are sold, and the chances are very good that they will be, money for construction should become available in March.

The Seminole County Board of Public Instruction is working on plans for many new school plants and facilities. School enrollment has jumped some 25 per cent since last year. County schools are serving 1,264 more students than at the same time last year. This figure is expected to increase in January, the peak month for enrollment.

Many counties have experienced problems in offering school bonds for sale. Seminole should have little trouble, however. The big difference is in the type of bonds. In recent years, the state was the seller. In January, the local school board will offer the bonds.

The bonds approved by Seminole freeholders in September are secured by the county's physical school assets. They are guaranteed by the lands, buildings and other property to which the school board holds title. For this reason, the bonds should find ready buyers at low rates of interest.

This has not been the case with the bonds offered by State Supt. Thomas Bailey. In some cases, school bonds had no bidders.

Seminole freeholders can be proud of their record. The bond issue went over the top with little trouble. These freeholders provided the county's children with a measure of future security.

The Board of Public Instruction is to be commended for its prompt action in offering the bonds for validation so soon after the election. The bond sale, too, is early enough after the election to make voters feel that their efforts were worthwhile.

In many cases, the delay between such an election and the actual start of construction is so long that the voters lose interest. In this case, however, the Board of Instruction followed through in fine style.

## Fire House Is Goal

Lake Mary residents now have a campaign under way to build a fire house. The drive started Saturday morning, will continue until funds are sufficient to construct a building for the community's fire engine.

The community-wide effort was tackled with a great deal of pride and spirit. Volunteers for the job were numerous. The Boy Scout troop, one of Lake Mary's proudest civic accomplishments, joined the effort in full-dress.

Lake Mary's volunteer department serves its own municipal residents, as well as those in Sunland Estates, Leah Arbor, Little Venice, Ravenna Park and 20th St., from Grapeville Ave. to Rinehart Road.

These areas are not in the recently-created Lake Mary Fire District, but Lake Mary provides fire protection because none is available elsewhere.

Citizens in the community have lost little time since the fire district was created by popular vote in the Sept. 9 primary election. The fire house now is under construction. Lake Mary residents know that it will be completed. Such is the community, friendly but very active.

It is far easier to assess the significance of Stassen's latest "dump Nixon" movement — which he proclaimed after visiting President Eisenhower — than to understand in a human way the author of this movement.

The question as to what Stassen has accomplished poses no great riddle. He has dropped a very noisy brick on the steps of the White House — and on the large and sensible toes of the Republican National Committee. At least a majority of that committee's members are neutral — neutral, that is, in favor of Vice-President Richard M. Nixon's nomination for President in 1960.

The harm done to Mr. Nixon, however, is certainly far less severe than that done to the nervous systems of the Republican pros. These are now in a recurring state of astonished exasperation. They can't figure out Stassen any more than anybody else can, and this annoys them no end.

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# Seminoles Beat 'Cudas

The title-minded Sanford Seminoles Friday night took their fourth victory in a row, 21-6, over the New Smyrna Barracudas.

The Seminoles had a rough first half and had every bad break in the books and at the end of the first half had only a two-point advantage.

Coaches Jim Pigott and Dave Laude go their lads together, however, and they found little trouble in rolling over the 'Cudas in the final two periods.

It was fullback Harold Stone's night. The big lad picked up his first TD in two years and did most of the groundgaining for the locals. The hard-driving fullback took over the groundgaining leadership for the year by piling up 96 yards from scrimmage. He has yet to be thrown for a loss and had two 20-yard runs called back because of penalties Friday night. He ran the hardest of his career and the 'Cuda line could not muster enough power through the middle to stop him.

Quarterback Cecil Dandridge continued to pass with much greatness as he hit eight for 12 and 82 yards. The "Little General" heaved the ball 40 yards on one play to Vernon Kirk, who was standing in the end zone but there was another costly penalty on this one and it was no good. He also hit Gerald Jones in the final period for a nine-yard TD. It was his fourth

TD pass of the year. The small quarterback also added 41 yards rushing to his growing total.

Dave Stanley made another fine showing against the 'Cudas and threw their shifty backs for several long losses. Kelly Lake played one of his best ball games and he and Stanley were responsible for the safety that was scored against the Smyrna squad early in the first period.

In the final period the second unit took to the field and its defensive work was outstanding. When these youngsters took to the field the 'Cudas were on their own 33 and when the Seminoles were through, they were on their own 12. Truman Troutner trapped Lin Wright there and dropped him in his tracks.

The Seminoles now have a fine 5-2-1 record and have a good chance to sew up the conference championship here Friday against Lakeview. If the Seminoles are successful in this one it will be their first OBC honor.

In this contest Coach Pigott kept a personal string going by not losing a contest while on the road since coming to S.H.S. Pigott and Laude form one of the best coaching teams anywhere in the state. There is no question as to why football has become the big word in Sanford with this team working together for the good of the boys. Action got underway with San-

ford kicking. It wasn't long until the great defense had the 'Cudas against the wall and Stanley and Lake crashed through to throw Farmer for a safety and the first two points for the Seminoles. This took place in the first two minutes.

The 'Cudas kicked from the 20 and halfback John Lovelace took the ball on the reverse and made a 20 yard return to the Smyrna 45. Then Stone went to work. He picked up two first downs personally and then Dandridge hit Jones for 11 yards to move to the 'Cuda five. Stone picked up one more and then on second down Kirk ripped off tackle for the TD. Carter's kick was wide.

The 'Cudas took the kick but soon lost it on downs and the Seminoles took over again. Wright intercepted a Dandridge pass on first down and the 'Cudas took over on the Seminoles 23. From here the New Smyrna squad made its finest effort and drove down and scored at the end of the first period. They attempted to run for the point but the wall held. Carter and Neely Ross making the stop.

Although the Seminoles had two more chances in the first half, this was the end of the scoring. About halfway in the period Dandridge made his throw to Kirk in the end zone but there was a 15-yard penalty. With two minutes left before the half, Dandridge threw to Kirk for 30 yards to move to the 'Cuda 20. Stone zipped up the middle to move the ball to the ten. Dandridge hit Kirk again and the speedster ran through the secondary to the one. The clock stopped the Seminoles on the one foot line.

After exchanging fumbles early in the third period, the Seminoles were on the go again. Stone began to go up the middle and Kirk also got off several nice runs. Ray Lundquist picked up 12 yards around the end and the Seminoles finally were back in their old form.

Dandridge threw to Alan Swain for nine yards and Kirk carried on the next play to the 'Cuda four. On second down Stone pulled out all the stops and made the two-yard TD. This time Carter was successful on his kick and the score stood at 15-6.

The Seminoles kicked to the 'Cudas in the final period but they were stopped cold and had to punt out of danger. Stone and Dandridge began to find the ground and picked up four first downs on seven plays. Dandridge hit Swain in the flat and the big end bulled his way for eight yards to put his club in striking distance once again. Two plays later Dandridge threw to his right to Jones who carried nine yards for the final score.

These two ends showed all of their talents here Friday and if one had to choose the better of the two, he would have a rough job confronting him. They are the best pass receivers in Central Florida and if the ball is near them, they will get it. Both are sure bets for OBC honors.

# Vol-Kentucky Tiff Tops Southeastern

ATLANTA (UPI)—The Tennessee Vols and the Kentucky Wildcats, a pair of rich-to-rags-to-riches teams who are putting their hopes for a strong finish in the hands of sophomore field generals, meet Saturday in one of the only two Southeastern Conference games that count in the league standings.

The other will be at New Orleans where top-ranked Louisiana State will be out to cap this year's only major unbeaten, untied mark against Tulane before what could be the largest crowd ever to witness a regular season game in the South.

Tennessee, caught in the midst of its worst overall record in 50 years, keeps coming up with upsets when they are least expected. The latest was last weekend when sophomore tailback Gene Etter, figured no better than a third string before the Vols were crippled by injuries, raced 75 yards in the fourth period for an 18-16 win over heavily-favored Mississippi.

The fourth-period heroes of sophomore quarterback Jerry Eisman enabled Kentucky to come to a 20-6 victory over Vols. In the closing 15 minutes Eisman set up touchdown No. 1, passed for No. 2, and scored No. 3 himself. Another Kentucky sophomore, halfback Calvin Bud scored twice and kicked a conversion.

Louisiana State, which will win a host of rewards if Tulane falls as expected, almost lost its perfect season last Saturday night. The Tigers beat Mississippi State

7-6 but were in trouble most of the evening against a much heavier line and on a slippery field. Fullback Tommy Davis' successful conversion was the deciding point.

Tulane, which has upsets over Navy and Alabama, got another great passing performance from quarterback Richie Pettibon, the SEC's total offense leader, but bowed to Vanderbilt 12-0. Halfback David Ray ran back one of Pettibon's passes 94 yards for Vandy's second score.

There are four non-conference games scheduled Saturday as only eight of the league's 12 teams see action.

Alabama will be host to and favored over Memphis State in the game which should insure Bear Bryant's forces of a winning season—the first for Alabama since 1933.

Auburn is favored to chalk up its 23rd straight without a loss while entertaining Wake Forest.

Georgia will be at home to the Citadel.

And Florida will be host to fast-rising independent Florida State in the first football meeting ever between the two schools.

Georgia Tech, Mississippi State, Mississippi and Vanderbilt will be idle this weekend.

The New Year's Day bowl line-up is virtually complete today with Louisiana State, Oklahoma and Clemson "in" and California and Texas Christian only one victory away from automatic bids.

With only one more big Saturday left in the season, here's the likely lineup for the five major bowls:

Rose: Iowa (6-1-1) vs California (6-3-0)

Sugar: LSU (9-0-0) vs Clemson (6-2-0)

Orange: Oklahoma (7-1-0) vs Air Force Academy (7-0-1)

Cotton: TCU (7-2-0) vs Syracuse (7-1-0)

Gator: Mississippi (7-2-0) vs Pittsburgh (5-3-1) or West Virginia (4-4-1)

LSU, the nation's No. 1 team and the only major college unbeaten and untied power, made the Sugar Bowl bid a mere formality when it beat Mississippi State, 7-6, Saturday night. Oklahoma clinched the Big Eight title and Orange Bowl bid with a 39-0 rout of Missouri and Clemson won the Atlantic Coast Conference championship by beating North Carolina State, 13-6.

California retained its Pacific Coast Conference lead with a 12-7 decision over Washington and can clinch a Rose Bowl bid by beating Stanford (7-1) next Saturday. TCU took over the Southwest Con-

ference lead with its 22-9 conquest of Texas and will clinch a Cotton Bowl invitation if it defeats Rice (4-4-0) next Saturday.

The Air Force Academy moved solidly into the bowl picture with its 21-6 victory over Wyoming. Syracuse kept rolling with a 47-0 rout of Colgate and West Virginia walloped William and Mary, 38-6, to win the Southern Conference championship. Mississippi and Pittsburgh stayed in the running despite losses because of fine records against consistently good foes.

The next-to-the-last Saturday of big activity was marked by more than its share of upsets including the Quantico Marines' 13-12 upset of previously unbeaten and untied Rutgers. Ohio State blasted second-ranked Iowa, 38-28, unranked Tennessee edged out eighth-ranked Auburn topped Georgia, 24-14, to stretch its unbeaten streak to 22 games, fifth-ranked Wisconsin defeated Illinois, 21-12, seventh-ranked Purdue topped ninth-ranked Northwestern, 23-6, and Charley Misteard completed 13 of 22 passes as Texas A&M upset Rice, 28-21, in other top games.

# Bayer Beats Snead In 'Sudden Death'

HAVANA, Cuba (UPI)—Big George Bayer, the "human howitzer" who hits a ball a mile, picked up the juiciest plum of his golf career by tapping in a three-inch putt.

That putt sunk Slammin' Sammy Snead on the first extra hole of a "sudden death" playoff Sunday and earned Bayer the top prize of \$8,500 in the \$45,000 Havana Open golf tournament.

It marked only the second triumph for the 6-foot-5, 240-pound

Bayer since he turned pro in 1954. Prior to Sunday's victory, the huge San Gabriel, Calif., slugger had won only the Canadian Open in 1957.

Dogged By Hard Luck

Like Snead, Bayer has always been dogged by hard luck on the greens. He blazes the ball 300 yards and better off the tee but he frequently looks like a novice with his putter.

Tied with 286 apiece at the end of the regulation 72 holes, Bayer and Snead both cranked up and

let fly with their tee shots on the first playoff hole.

Bayer lashed his drive into a trap to the left of the green on the 37-yard first hole. Snead's drive was straight out and his second shot, made with a nine iron, ended on the fringe of the green, 45 feet from the pin.

Bayer, who was a tackle at the University of Washington and played briefly for the Washington Redskins in the National Football League, made a brilliant recovery by putting his second shot 10 feet from the flag.

Snead patted boldly and went eight feet past the pin. He also missed coming back and wound up with a bogey five. Bayer's first putt carried to within three inches of the cup and he then carefully tapped in the money-winner.

Slammin' Sam had a chance to win on the 18th but he blew a five-foot putt, while Bayer, playing in the threesome ahead, sank a five-footer for a par five on the 63-yard hole.

The missed opportunity cost the 40-year-old Snead \$2,000 but he still won \$3,600 for finishing second. He now heads for Mexico City where he will team up with Ben Hogan in the International Golf Championship and Canada Cup matches which begin Thursday.

Doug Ford of Mahopac, N. Y., finished third in the tournament. Ford's 291 brought him \$2,500. Billy Casper of Elgin, Calif., finished with 292, good for fourth place and \$2,200, while Julius Boros of Southern Pines, N. C., gained \$2,000 for his 293 total.

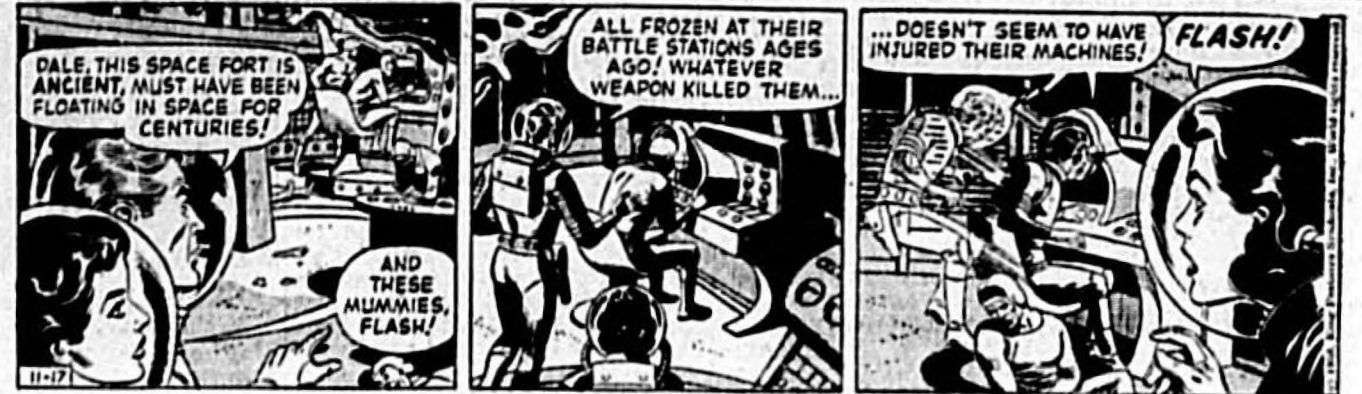
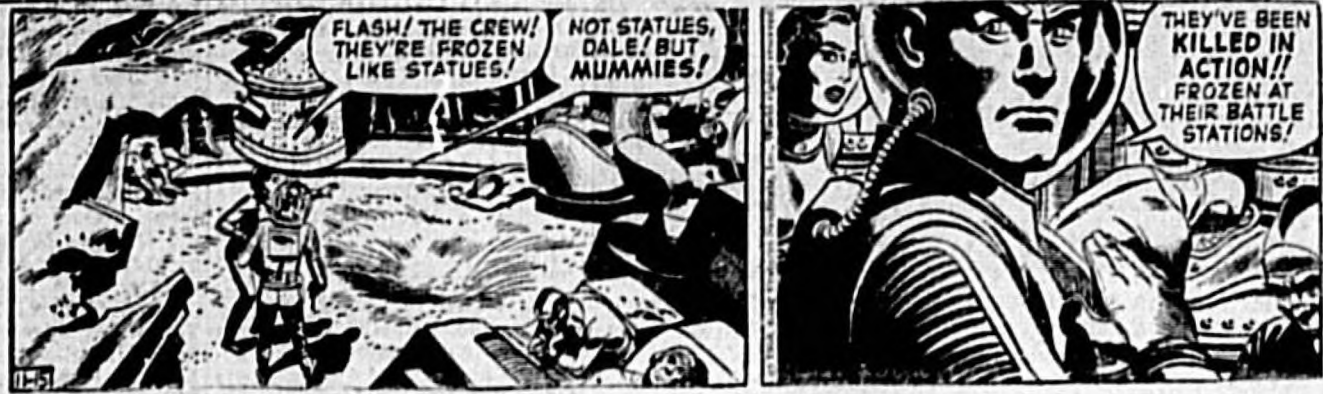

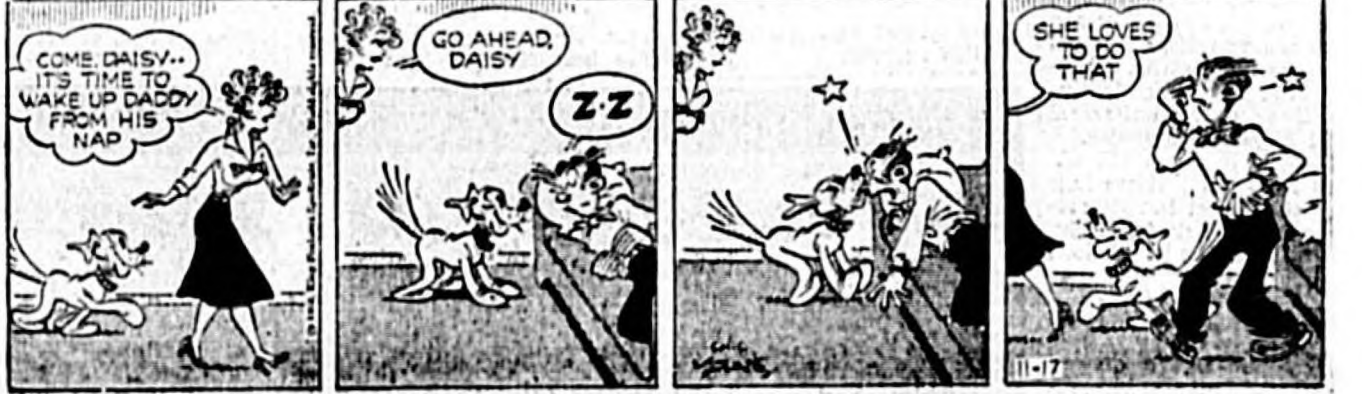

## Boros: Man With A Picture Swing

Jolting Julius Boros, a man with a picture swing and a relaxed, pleasant personality, ended a 33-month victory drought when he won the 1958 Arlington Hotel Open at Hot Springs, Ark.

The \$2,800 first place check was the smallest the easy-going Fairfield, Conn. native ever got for winning a tournament, and he has won six since he started on the PGA tour in 1950.

The victory at Hot Springs did a lot for the "Moose" besides fattening his already robust bank account. In his next 13 tournaments he tied for second three times at Dallas, Chicago and St. Paul, tied for third in the Western Open, placed third in the U. S. G. A. Open and tied for fifth in the PGA Championship.

In all, Jay played 28 tournaments during the first 10 months of 1958 and was in the top five in eight of them as he won \$27,114.27.

Some of his associates feel Boros played better in 1958 than ever before. The record supports this belief.

Besides Dick Mayer, who turned the trick in 1957, Julius, 38, is the only man who has ever won both the "World Championship of Golf" and the U. S. G. A. Open in the same year.

Julius did this in 1952 and he again won the "World" in 1955, his last win prior to the triumph at Hot Springs.

Golf's leading money winner of 1952 with \$37,032 and of 1955 with \$63,125, doesn't blame his last "World" victory for the fact that he failed to win a tournament in the next 33 months.

Thanks to a well-rounded game that features excellent wood, trap and long iron play, 5-11½, 200-pound Julius plays his best golf on the better courses. This probably explains his excellent record in the U. S. G. A. Open, a tournament in which he has missed the top 10 only twice from 1950 to 1958.

In addition to winning this event at Dallas in 1952, Boros tied for second in 1956, was third in 1958, tied for fourth in 1951 and 1957, for fifth in 1955 and placed ninth in 1950.

In his only "bad" Open performance, he tied for 17th in 1953 and for 23rd in 1954.

Bull-bullied Julius as casual on the links as Perry Como on your TV screen, is the ninth highest money winner of all time in official PGA events with a total take of \$168,509 through Nov. 3, 1958.

Opportunist Jay's victory checks alone account for \$84,000 of this total. Broken down, his first place checks were: U. S. Open (1952) \$4,000, World (1952) \$25,000, Ardmore Open (1951) \$7,200, Carling Open (1951) \$5,000 and World (1955) \$50,000.

Not included in this tabulation is the \$1,000 per exhibition contract Julius signed with George S. May in 1955.

Because of this exhibition contract, Julius played only a handful of tournaments in 1956, placed 44th on the official money list with \$5,358.75.

The one-time Bridgeport, Conn., accountant played mediocre golf for him in 1957, winning a total of about \$12,000, only \$9,321.19 of which was official money as far as the PGA was concerned.

Jay's best 1957 performances were a tie for third at the Greenboro Open and Caracas Inv., third in the Kentucky Derby Open, a tie for fourth in the West Palm Beach Open and a tie for fifth at the Texas and Thunderbird Inv. Opens.

His best competitive rounds in 1957 were 65 at Greenboro and Louisville.

Julius, born March 3, 1920, first hit the limelight in 1944 when as an amateur he was runnerup in the North and South Open. He gained the quarterfinals of the National Amateur the same year.

A professional since Dec. 15, 1949, Jay played only a few events in 1950, winning about \$2,000. He won the modest \$5,000 in 1951 and then hit the jackpot in 1952.

Julius makes little effort to project his friendly personality, doesn't say much but, surprisingly

perhaps, is a good after-dinner speaker. He practices economy in speech but his remarks are pithy.

On the course, Julius doesn't wear a hat, ambles along with an unconcerned air, sometimes with a piece of grass jutting from his mouth.

Jay, of Hungarian extraction, has had his share of misfortune. His first wife died in childbirth in 1951. He later remarried, now

has three children, two boys and a girl, and lives in Ft. Lauderdale, Fla.

Boros operates the golf shop at a resort course owned by his former in-laws at Mid Pine, N. C. Actually, Julius spends only 20 to 30 days a year there.

His brother, Ernie, 30, runs the shop for him, then joins Julius on the summer tour after the course closes.
