Nation's Fire Loss Reported Increasing

"Our country's fire loss last year amounted to \$423,538,000," Fire Chief M.N. Cleveland revealed today. "That figure is about twenty million dollars more than the loss for 1943 and our worst record since 1932," he said.

"This is a terrible record for any year," the Chief declared. "But it is particularly bad when the war makes it so important not to waste anything. Homes and buildings destroyed by fire just can't be rebuilt in these times. And if any war materials

are destroyed, our boys overseas suffer for it just as much as if the enemy had destroyed those materials."

The Chief appealed to all the citizens of Sanford to do their part in improving the nation's record.

"Most fires can be avoided," he said. "If only people will be careful. Be sure matches and cigarettes are completely dead before you throw them away. Matches and cigarettes start about a fourth of all the fires. If you have to use a liquid that can burn, either at home or where you work, handle it with the greatest care. If you can avoid using such liquids entirely, you'll be a lot safer."

"And then there's just plain rubbish—old papers, rags, old clothes, and other things that people keep for no good reason. They are all fire hazards. Give them to the salvage committee where they may be useful."

"Finally, at home or on the job, use every piece of electrical or gas equipment with care so that you keep it in good condition. Good equipment won't start a fire unless it is abused in some way."

"If you do just those few things, the chances are pretty good that you'll never start a fire," the Chief continued. "But just for good measure, be prepared too. First, be sure you know how to turn on a fire alarm. If you have no telephone in your home, find out where is the nearest one to you. Second, keep your fire extinguisher handy so that you can use it promptly on any small fire that starts."

In concluding, the Chief urged housewives to make a special effort to make their homes safe from fire. "That's where most of the fires break out," said the Chief, "and women and children are the worst sufferers."

Frenzied Japs Hurl Selves Into Volcano

Marines Scale Summit Of Suribachi While Others In North Repulse Two Attacks

By Associated Press. American Marines scaled the summit of the Suribachi volcano fortress on the southern tip of Iwo Island in the most dramatic feat of that costly campaign while the Japanese islander renewed their northward drive after repulsing two heavy night counter attacks.

The Japanese leaped to death from the rim of the volcanic crater as the Marines mopped up by-passed pockets with flame throwers.

In a futile gesture of defiance, Japanese swimmers landed on the southwest coast in an effort to attack the American rear.

Tokyo increased its claims of sinkings and damaging U.S. warships to 28 off Iwo.

In the Philippines American infantrymen invaded Capul Island off the southern tip of Luzon. The tanks captured Manila's city hall and the Manila hotel after bloody duels.

American casualties in the bloody battle for Iwo Island have increased from 77 to more than 300 an hour, Army Chief of Staff Gen. George C. Marshall disclosed yesterday.

W. Nimitz disclosed yesterday that the intrepid American Marines continued their slow advance on the vital central airfield after stopping Japanese counterattacks.

Upwards of 45,000 Americans were fighting to the death against some 20,000 in an area of eight square miles. Japanese guns commanded every yard of the American positions. Enemy planes had started to break through and had damaged the invasion fleet. The beaches were strewn with wrecked American equipment.

\$290,000 Set Aside To Deepen Channel Palatka To Harney

Deepening and improvement of the St. Johns River channel from Palatka to Sanford, and surveys and reviews of additional improvements of the river from Palatka to Lake Harney, were among the projects authorized in the Rivers and Harbors bill.

The bill authorizes construction of projects in the amount of \$290,000 for the State of Florida.

Mayor Edward Higgins, who has long been a proponent of improvement of the St. Johns River channel could not be reached this morning for comment on this bill.

A 12 foot channel, Mayor Higgins pointed out, would result in an inland waterway of this length from Sanford to Trenton, N. J.

The St. Johns River improvement from Palatka to Sanford is based on a 10 foot channel plan.

The bill as passed includes inland waterway canal improvements from Jacksonville to Miami.

A survey of the inland waterway that was conducted by the Federal government, indicated that the area was entitled to the amount of \$41,000,000 for the construction of 150 units for state housing.

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Berlin Expects New Drives To Be Co-Ordinated With Attack By Russians

STOCKHOLM (AP) - While the German home front is held together under the Nazi iron grip, the big question now is whether people's nerves can continue to stand up under the German offensive.

Berlin announced today an "Allied grand scale offensive" has begun on the Western Front and claimed it probably signals the resumption of massive Russian drives in the east.

Berlin and the western offensive opened under a heavy artillery barrage, amid the continuation of the greatest offensive of this war in a hour later.

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Drive Is Started Raising Funds For Local Boy Scouts

The annual campaign for funds to carry on the Boy Scout program in Seminole County for 1945 was launched Wednesday under the leadership of Roy Holler, Seminole County chairman for the county-wide campaign of the Central Florida Council, which is seeking to raise \$17,599 needed to operate in seven counties during 1945 with the closing date of the drive by Feb. 28.

R. G. Kilpatrick is heading the white section of the campaign, while H. L. Duhart heads the effort among the negroes. A total of 20 volunteer workers are assisting in the work.

Chairman Holler challenged the local workers to make short work of the drive by immediately contacting as many Sanford citizens as possible. Meanwhile chairman will be named in various other Seminole communities and the final report will be made as soon as possible to W. W. Wolf of Winter Park, general chairman of the campaign.

In a statement made today, Ned Smith, vice-chairman of the Seminole district of the Central Florida Council during 1944, pointed out that despite wartime difficulties Seminole County ended the year with 17,376 more boy members than it had at the beginning of the year. He especially commended the work of the negro division headed by J. N.

Crooms which chalked up two new Scout troops and a new Cub pack during the year, and a membership gain of 39%.

"Seminole County is particularly fortunate in having James A. Foster, negro field executive for the Central Florida Council, as one of its citizens," Mr. Smith said. He lauded Foster's work here and elsewhere in the Council territory and declared him to be one of the outstanding negro field executives of the Southeast.

Mr. Smith further reported that a total of 148 advancements were made by Seminole County scouts during 1944. These broke down as follows: second class, 25; first class, 2; Star, 3; Life, 7; Eagle, 8; Eagle Palm, 6; and merit badges, 102. The fact that Seminole County has produced five Eagle scouts during the past year is alone worth all that scouting costs, Smith said.

were going to the front by hand.

But Lieut. Gen. Holland M. Smith, Marine commandant, said that his men would take two, 750 miles from Tokyo, at whatever cost. The cost, he added, would be severe.

Smith announced that American casualties for the first 56½ hours on Iwo—up to 5:45 P.M. Wednesday—were 385 killed and 4,168 wounded.

Again and again Wednesday night and in the pre-dawn hours of Thursday, the Japanese counter-attacked in force. Each attack was hurled back. Throughout the night countless enemy troops tried to filter through the Marine lines.

Weekend Defenses.
Thursday morning the Marines went over to attack again. For hours the enemy lines held. At noon, however, the Marines were advancing slowly in the booming rain. They had knocked out many enemy strong points and, Admiral Nimitz said, generally weakened the formidable defense of the central airfield in the booming rain. Two, but Nimitz added: There was little change in positions of the front line.

It was a foot-by-foot advance. The Marines were believed to be about 200 yards from the southern edge of the airfield.

In the south the battle was just as tough. There the Marines had the job of taking the Suribachi volcano, a mountain turned into a fortress.

Interest On Debt Is Now 4 1/2 Billion

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23. (AP)—Lighted by a \$4,500,000,000 item for interest on the national debt, a \$9,163,071,163 supply bill for the Treasury and Post Office departments was approved this week by the House Appropriations Committee. It is to finance the two departments during the twelve months starting next July 1.

Only \$31,422,813,090 of the total constitutes direct appropriations for actual operations of the departments, the rest consisting of so-called permanent and indefinite appropriations for such things as debt interest and tax refunds.

The \$4,500,000,000 interest estimated for 1945 is an increase of \$750,000,000 over estimated current year payments for that purpose. It assumes that the national debt will be \$292,000,000,000 by June 30, 1946, an increase of \$58,000,000,000 over the present debt.

The Treasury's share of the total direct appropriations is \$225,703,400, a reduction of \$10,748,300 from budget estimates and \$4,688,497 below appropriations for the present year.

For the Post Office Department, the bill carries \$1,057,049,290 in direct funds, a reduction of \$8,488,460 from budget estimates and a decrease of \$55,185,232 from current year appropriations.

Attorney General Says Negro Voting Is Sure To Come

TALLAHASSEE, Feb. 23. (AP)—Att. Gen. Tom Watson Wednesday told Florida Democratic party leaders that negro voting in their primary elections was inevitable, and advised them to try to find a way "that will reduce the evils."

Commenting that "I know I am playing with fire politically," the outspoken Attorney General declared that "the negro and the white man in American idealism are entitled to the same political rights."

In view of recent Supreme Court decisions, he said, "that's not to be recognized or something is going to take place that will have the effect of disintegration and the injury of what we've got."

Watson made his statement during a convening of the State Democratic executive committee's legislative council on recommendations to be made to the coming Legislature.

It follows recommendations that the State relinquish all control over primary elections or return to the convention system of nominating in order to prevent negroes from voting as Democrats in the primaries.

The committee asked the chairman to study the problem and report back before the Legislature convenes in April.

A few negroes have been registered as Democrats in some sections of Florida for years. The Escambia County Circuit Court recently directed the registration supervisor to enroll two Pensacola negroes as Democrats, and the decision is being appealed to the State Supreme Court.

Atty. Gen. Watson, native of Virginia, said that it "no such thing as racial equality and there never will be. If I wanted to express my prejudices to colored people I expect I could line up as long a line as any person here. I don't want any negro sitting by me unless I invite him."

However, he declared, "the South has got to let the negro vote. Part of the South is letting negroes vote, and doing just as well as the rest." He said negroes are permitted to cast Democratic ballots in North Carolina, Kentucky, Tennessee, Virginia and Oklahoma.

"It can be done in a way that will reduce the evils. You can carry segregation to the nth degree. You can make them register separately and vote separately. If we do it right we can make history, not for Florida alone, but for the whole nation. We can do it right. We've got the brains and the determination."

As for negroes attaining superiority at the polls, he said "if our Florida politics ever gets so low that the negro can control it, we ought to control it."

took over a 38,000-square-mile area from the Danish frontier to the line between Nuremberg and Pilsen. The Fifteenth Air Force in Italy took everything south of that line. Tactical air forces covered objectives between the Western and Italian fronts and the bomber targets while the RAF bomber command, in action during the day as well as at night, blasted four targets in the Eighth Air Force zone.

The "backshot blitz"—an entirely new idea which Allied air chiefs had mapped and held in readiness for a break in the weather was spearheaded by more than 1,000 Flying Fortresses and Liberators and 800 fighters of the U.S. Eighth Air Force.

Two divisions of this mighty fleet poured into Germany from the north and third attack from the south. Over the Reich they broke up into wolf packs of up to 100 bombers each and hammered at least 24 freight yards and other rail targets in the heart of Germany during the noon hour.

Eight bombers and 10 fighters were missing from this phase of the operation.

Tactical Units Busy
In addition, the RAF and U.S. Fifteenth Air Forces sent out heavy bombers and the attack was swelled by four tactical air forces based on the continent, including the U.S. Twelfth in Italy. More than 4,500 sorties were flown by these medium and fighter bombers from their advanced bases.

The momentum of the massive assault raced unchecked into the night. The RAF announced that two ton block-busters, again loaded Berlin and the overworked German "Achtung" warning service said other bomber formations were over the Reich.

France Awaits More Ships To Bring In Food

Colonies Prepared To Send Million Tons Of Surplus By June 30

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22. The French Empire will be unable to send to its mother country by June 30 more than 1,000,000 tons of food and raw materials urgently required to vitalize the French civilian economy, if a shipping program which has been undertaken by Allied authorities is successful, it was learned this week.

Then French ships have already been released from the Mideast shipping pool and others are to be made available, as soon as military conditions permit, to give France access to stocks which have been accumulating in Tunisia, Algeria, French West Equatorial Africa, Madagascar and Reunion.

An over-all program submitted by French officials and approved by Allied authorities as a reasonable ambition is to make available the following items: food products 227,000; fats 2,200,000; tobacco, 6,000; textiles 2,000; leather, 20,000; agricultural products 11,000; iron and metal 10,000; and other goods 2,000.

These shipping plans are conditional, it was emphasized by United States officials, and do not represent any promise. The changing requirements of the military situation are deemed capable of upsetting the shipping schedule, as happened at the time of the German offensive in the Ardennes forest area.

Colonial shipment began reaching France in January. American-leased stocks which France may now draw upon from a similar tax-exempt stockpile consist of 20,000 tons of coffee at Djakarta and the Ivory Coast, 20,000 tons of cotton in French West Africa, 20,000 tons of rice at Saigon, 20,000 tons of rice at Malaya, and 150,000 tons of sugar at Reunion Island.

The returns in Europe of the principal members of the French economic mission is understood to have increased the difficulty.

Before the F.E.A. can place contracts for such items it must have specifications from the French which give the exact specifications of what they require. 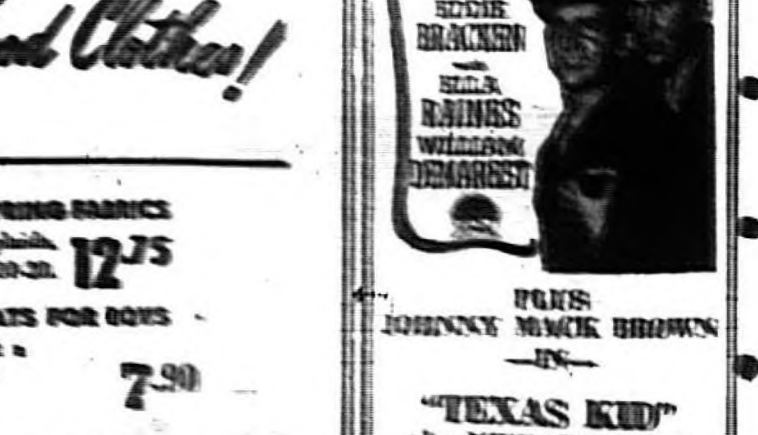

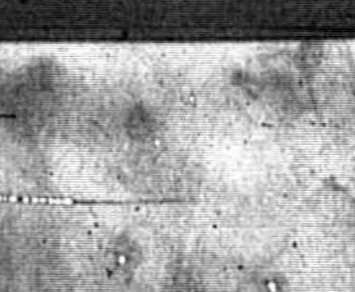

Japanese Toss Furnishings Out Of Manila Hotel

Furniture, and Filing Cases Are Thrown Out Of Windows

MANILA, Feb. 23 (Delayed)—The Japanese hurled furniture, rugs and filing cases from the top floors of the Manila Hotel along the bay front and the 37th Division's 155-mm. Long Tom immediately plastered the hotel wing with high explosives. Enemy troops were clearly visible on the hotel balconies as they tossed armloads of furnishings into the street. When the shells began to fall they dived inside. The hotel is one of the last intact structures in South Manila, where the destruction is appalling over at least ten square miles. It entered the enemy hands after the Japanese had been clearing out the hotel preparatory to burning it.

From the north bank of the Pasig River machine gunners of the 37th swept enemy snipers back across in a series of sniping duels. The old Spanish city of Intramuros. The Japanese had covered the ports with corrugated iron sheets, over which they draped branches for camouflage.

In brief silences between the roar of bursting shells and the clatter of machine gun bullets, clapping against the stout walls the church bells inside Intramuros could be heard tolling in hours.
