### VETERAN HUNTER WILL LEAD PACK OF MANY HOUNDS

Biggest Hunt in History of Country Will Be Conducted As Farewell To Alf Taylor, Former Governor of State

JOHNSON CITY, Tenn., Apr. 11.—(INS)—In the hills of East Tennessee tonight, Old Limber, veteran of the hunt, will lead his pack in what will probably be the biggest fox hunt ever held. It is the farewell hunt of an old Southern gentleman, "Uncle Alf" Taylor, former governor of the state, and the city is overflowing with his invited guests.

"The Sage of Happy Valley" is probably the most beloved of all living Tennesseans and when the horns begin their calling tonight, staid men, financiers, businessmen, farmers, writers, lecturers, sportsmen, newspaper men and cameramen will answer the call.

More than 250 hounds have been assembled here for the fox hunt, and the furry victims will have little sleep when they are released. Never before have so many hunting dogs been assembled in one pack and never before have so many notables been listed on the "acceptance" list.

The Elizabethton Hunt Club is sponsoring the event, which has been entitled the "Old Limber" fox hunt, in honor of the veteran hound that is to lead the pack.

Uncle Alf plans to retire after this hunt, and Old Limber will retire with the famous humorist and lecturer. Both have felt the tightening of the muscles which comes with old age, but both are going to have this one last fling with the fires of eternal youth burning within them.

The peak of Bogat Knox, four miles from the city, is cleared and a huge tent erected for the serving of a barbecue dinner at midnight tonight.

Alec Shell, of Elizabethton, widely known dog fancier, is in charge of the committee which arranged the big meet. He said today that visitors are here from five different countries.

Scouting Expeditions Made this afternoon returned with the information that the knobs are alive with foxes, so there is sure to be plenty of entertainment when the hunt begins.

Uncle Alf has four sons, who form the "Old Limber Quartette," famous as singers of Tennessee folk songs, negro spirituals and mountain hunting songs, and they will entertain the hundreds of guests around the camp fires at night.

Uncle Alf is one of the few Republicans who have ever been elected governor of this state, serving from 1820 until 1922. He comes from one of the best known families of Tennessee.

### Unique Golf Event, Telegraphic Match, Set For September

MIAMI, Apr. 11.—(INS)—America's most unique golf event, the National amateur telegraphic golf tournament, will be held September 1, 2, 3 and 4. Unlike any other tournament it will be played simultaneously during the four days on golf courses throughout the United States and Canada, players telegraphing their scores at the end of each day's play to control headquarters where pairings for the next day will be re-telegraphed to players.

The qualifying round which is expected to attract a field of about 3,000 players will be the week starting Monday August 6 and ends at midnight, Sunday, August 12th. Match-medal play will start Saturday, September 1st.

Qualifying Scores All qualifying scores must be turned in to be received at National headquarters of the Forty Thieves, National amateur golf association, sponsoring the tournament, not later than midnight of August 18th.

Every player in the qualifying round will enter one of the six flights, which will be divided into 10-player wings. In each wing, players will be paired off according to their medal scores and the winner of each bracket will play the winner of the bracket below him as in match play. Medal scores will be counted only. To equalize playing conditions, an arbitrary year of 70 will be used and players handicapped according to the par of the course on which they are playing.

Unique Event The tournament is unique for the reason that match-medal play has never been followed in a tournament of this magnitude before and also because all play will be directed by telegraph. During the tournament a payer in San Francisco may be playing another in New York, and neither will know who wins until he receives "word" by wire from the control station.

### Record Price Paid For Membership In Chicago Exchange

CHICAGO, Apr. 11.—(INS)—A record price of \$24,600 each has been paid for memberships in the Chicago stock exchange on account of new regulations adopted by the exchange to make La Salle street the financial center of the west.

The first of the new regulations permitted persons not actively dealing in securities and who have no intention of appearing on the floor to trade in person to hold memberships.

The change according to directors of the exchange, was made necessary by broadening the functions of the board.

First sale of non-active seats, at the new record, was made to Arthur Cutten and Walcott Blair, both prominent independent operators.

225 Memberships The Chicago exchange has 225 members, as compared to the 1,100 membership in the "big board" as traders call the New York stock exchange. Seats on the New York exchange are selling at more than \$350,000.

"The new rule is recognition of the fact that a stock exchange is, in a way, a civic institution as well as a financial agency," C. T. Atkinson, secretary of the exchange, said.

"Purchase of memberships should prove profitable, of course, but the real significance is support of a movement confirming Chicago as the financial center of the mid-west. The importance of having a large scale operator like Mr. Cutten directly interested in the local exchange cannot be overestimated.

Leading brokers are enthusiastic over the plans being formed for the Chicago exchange.

"Substantial increase has been made in the value of shares handled through La Salle street," one of the brokers who holds seats here and in New York commented.

"However, there is a world of room for improvement, and we are making it as soon as possible."

Drawing Card One of the greatest drawing cards of the midwest is getting new factories and enterprises; brokers believe, is the ability of La Salle street to finance new projects without recourse to money reservoirs outside of Chicago.

La Salle street provides an outlet for desirable legitimate securities, and encourages new business to come here with an assurance it will be able to find credit or cash near at hand," one broker commented.

### Missionaries Ask Citizenship To Be Granted To Natives

BOMBAY, India, Apr. 11.—(INS)—Restoration of American citizenship to a large body of Asiatics rendered homeless by the operation of the Exclusion Clause in the U. S. Immigration Law is demanded by a group of American missionaries resident in India.

Headed by Dr. Stanley Jones, Messrs. Maclelland and Buck, they have addressed an appeal to Secretary of State Kellogg urging Congress to take immediate steps to restore American citizenship to the Asiatics—about 45 in number—whose naturalization papers it is alleged have been cancelled.

Were Naturalized "We believe," the appeal says, "that the cancellation of naturalization papers to those who in good faith have been admitted to American citizenship is an outstanding national wrong which has done injury to America's moral influence and prestige in the East."

"The restriction of immigration is justifiable provided it is a fair application of the quota basis to oriental countries to restrict immigration from those countries to a

neither a social nor economic problem.

"On the other hand, our intimate knowledge of India leads us to believe that a selective process applied to her applicants would add a valuable contribution to the life and culture of the United States.

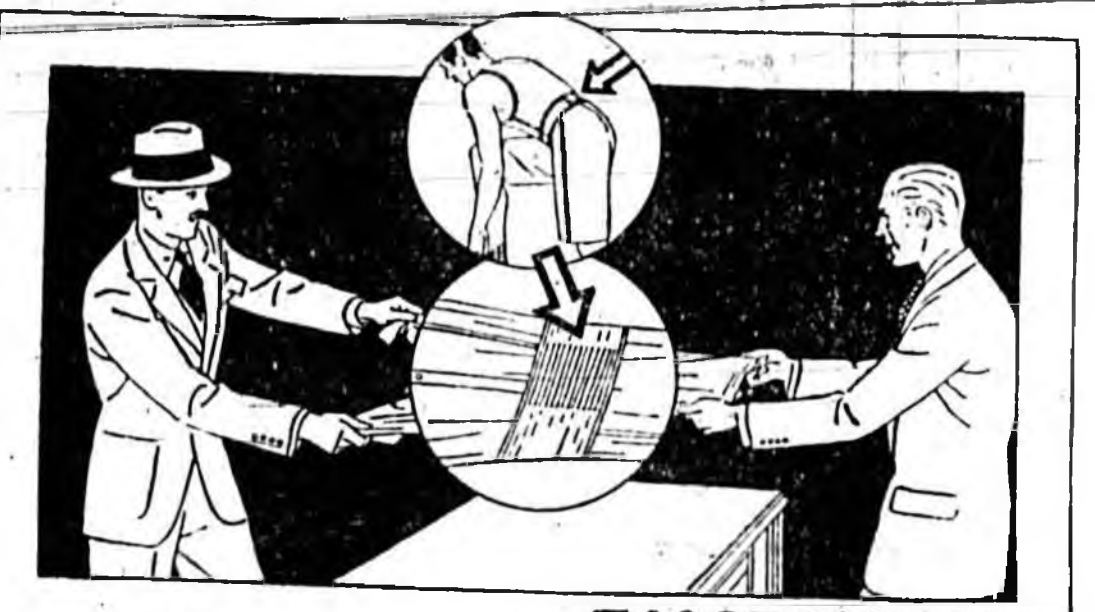
"In view of the effect of such discriminatory legislation on racial relations throughout the world, we feel that it is our duty to protect American citizens in the Orient we feel the gravest concern for the international position of our country.

A Strong Protest "So long as Congress does not enact remedial legislation, both in the case of small groups that have been disenfranchised, and in the matter of oriental exclusion in general, we cannot successfully repudiate the charges of insincerity in our national profession of equality of opportunity.

"We strongly protest against the discriminatory clauses, as we consider them a violation of good faith and international ethics, an affront to the people of India and a source of deep racial resentment and antagonism.

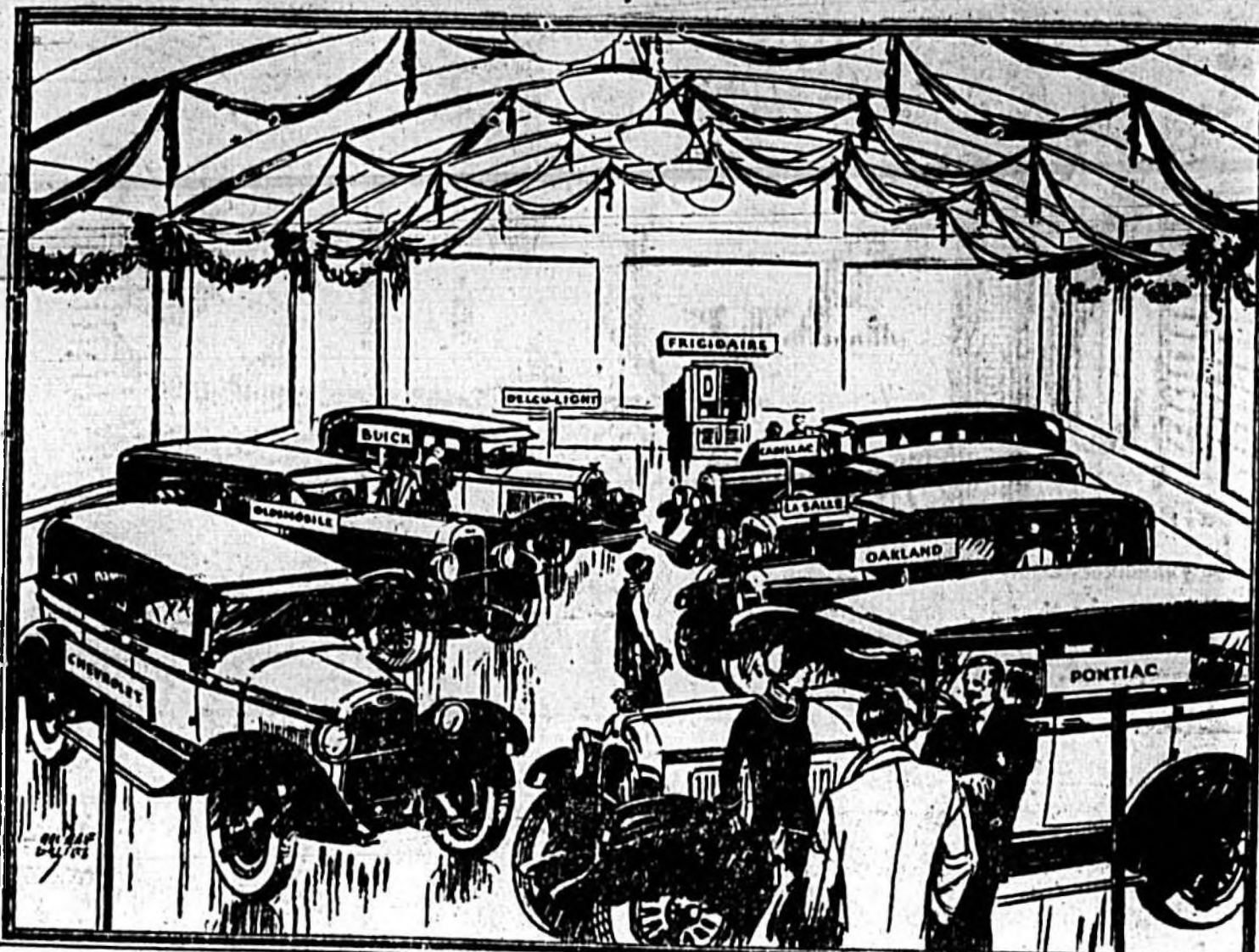

Record Breaking Business In Stocks Has Resulted In Making Many Millionaires

NEW YORK, Apr. 10. (INS)—Many new millionaires have been made through the country—and in Wall Street, too—as a result of the spectacular rise in prices during the recent run of record-breaking 3,000,000 and 4,000,000 share a day markets on the New York Stock Exchange.

George Briggs Buchanan, who has been a member of the exchange for almost a quarter of a century, says that more than 300 new millionaires were made all over the United States. How many Wall Street men ran for profits up into a million or more is problematical.

The public took the market away from the big operators in Wall Street, says the assertion of Buchanan, who has observed the trend of the market since he began before such glamorous figures as the late Russel Sage and E. H. Harriman dominated it.

In Buchanan's opinion, the tremendous listing of stocks from all over the country and the participation of the public from coast to coast in the market have made it impossible for any group to materially influence the Wall Street market except in a temporary way.

Many of the new millionaires around the country had bought certain stocks early and held them while they were going up, playing a less conservative game than some of the experienced Wall Street traders who were constantly anticipating a reaction.
