





Federal Reserve System

Change Urged By Labor

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) - The AFL-CIO Executive Council is urging Congress to overhaul the Federal Reserve System, saying its tight-money policies are a major cause of the recession. The labor leaders called Friday for a seven-point plan, inclusing appointment of representatives of labor and

consumer groups to the central bank's governing board to make it more responsive to the people. In a harsh attack on the Federal Reserve Board and its chairman, Dr. Arthur Burns, the council said that for the second time since 1969 the bank has brought recession to the economy and unemployment to millions of workers.

## Judge Upholds Tariff

WASHINGTON (AP) - A federal judge has acknowledged President Ford's \$3-per-barrel tariff on oil imports will be damaging to the Northeastern states but has upheld it for national security reasons. U.S. District Judge John Pratt made the ruling Friday after a hearing in which nine states sought a temporary

injunction against the tariff. Massachusetts Atty. Gen. Francis X. Bellotti, who argued the case for eight Northeastern states and Minnesota, said after the hearing that Pratt's ruling would be

WASHINGTON (AP) - Iranian investment in Pan American World Airways is not yet assured and a final decision likely will not be made for some time, says a top Treasury Department official.

Although the Ford administration has given its tentative approval for Iran to invest in the financially troubled U.S. airline, the Iranian government wants to be sure it will not be making a bad investment, Asst. Treasury Secretary Gerald Parsky said in an interview

"Men, in almost all states, cannot be the victims of rape by statutory definition," says Connie Borkenhagen, author of the resolution.

The park area is a few miles south of New Smyrna property to Playalinda Beach East of Titusville. It includes the un-

developed land formerly known as Apollo State Park. Within the acreage lies the east channel of the Indian River and Mosquito Lagoon, two of the most popular and prolific producers of speckled trout and shrimp. The beach offers some of the finest surf fishing in the state

with catches of bluefish, channel bass, and whiting bordering on

The beach, with its red shell and white sand, is backed by a narrow strip of dunes that separates the ocean from the river and lagoon. It is covered by sparse vegetation, sea oats, sea grapes and palmettos. For years it has been unlawful to destroy the vegetation

because without it stormy winds would whip the loose sand away and the sea would reclaim the narrow strip of land. A black-top road, state Road A1A, runs from New Smyrna Beach south to Turtle Mound, which is an undeveloped state, park. From Turtle Mound the road continues as a rough but passable sand road for about five miles. Beyond that, only four-

wheel drive vehicles can traverse. About two years ago the Merritt Island Wildlife Preserve created a sign stopping traffic at the end of the passable road. Reaction from the surf fishermen of Central Florida was immediate and violent, as many of them had invested thousands of dollars in vehicles and equipment to get away from the crowds on Daytona Beach and New Smyrna Beach to fish with a

degree of privacy. Through the efforts of hundreds of surf fishermen and United States Senator William Chappell, construction of a road began behind the dunes for use by four-wheel drives only. About six miles, with a parking space every mile, has been completed. What will happen when the National Seashore Park becomes a reality is anybody's guess, but the scheduled meeting in Sanford should serve to answer a lot of questions for local

The meeting has been arranged by Delbert Euga, local member of the Department of Natural Resources.

School officials called the boycott "orderly, with no problems whatsoever," while principals, working from preliminary head counts, tagged it "an effective boycott." Estimates ranged from 70 per cent at Pinecrest Elementary School to a high of 90 per cent at Seminole High School.

"Definitely, there is a big boycott here," said Dan Pelham. principal at Sanford Middle. Out of 490 blacks, enrolled, Pelham

estimated only 20 showed up for classes today. At Lakeview Middle School, Principal Ted Barker estimated about 85 per cent of the 400 blacks enrolled were missing from today's classes. And at Seminole High School. Principal Don Reynolds said about 600 of the 700 blacks enrolled at the school failed to show up today.

Reynolds and other principals reported an orderly well planned boycott is in progress. In the meantime, Felder says the the boycott will be "100 per cent offsctive" by Wednesday.
