SEMINOLE COUNTY PURCHASE ELKS CLUB BUILDING FOR COURT HOUSE

DEAL CLOSED ON LAST TUESDAY

Seminole county is now the proud possessor of a brand new court house.

The deal was consummated at the last meeting of the board of county commissioners which occurred on Tuesday of this week. Prior to this time the deal had practically been made but it was thought best to wait until the regular meeting to take official action.

Some sixty days ago the board advertised for bids for the purchase or erection of a suitable court house. As a result there were two propositions, one the Welborne Block where the county officials have been located since the establishment of the county, the other the new Elks Club building located on Park avenue near the bulkhead.

After giving the matter careful consideration and going into the matter thoroughly with the aid of competent builders it was decided that the Elks Club would better serve the interests of the county at the price asked and the deal was practically closed about ten days ago, only awaiting the confirmation of the entire board.

The Elks Club was built about three years ago by the local lodge here. It is pronounced one of the finest buildings of its size in the state. It is three stories in height and built of buff brick, with an admirable architectural design. The rooms of war have proven very oppressive to the club in the past few years. Twenty-three members now being in the service, and the burden of carrying the financial responsibility of such a building has proven too great for the present membership, hence their offer to sell it to the county at a price somewhat less than the building cost to build for the recent advances in cost of building material.

The building is so arranged that it is admirably fitted for a court house. The auditorium on the third floor being especially suited for a court room, and the second floor, with a few alterations will house the several county offices. At least one office will be on the first floor and the Seminole County Guards will have quarters there also.

Bids are now being received for the alterations which will be necessary and it is the present intention to occupy the new court house in a few weeks.

Seminole county and the board of county commissioners are to be congratulated upon the purchase of their new home.

Seminole Negroes to the Front

The negro population, under County Chairman J. R. Byle, supported the recent War Work Funds Drive in no uncertain manner.

Most of this amount was in cash and Chairman Byle announces that the pledges will be collected on time and that every pledge will be paid in full.

Xmas Roll Call Organization

At a called meeting of the Red Cross at local headquarters on Wednesday night, the organization of the Christmas Roll Call was completed with the assistance of Sergt. Lesel of the Canadian army, who has been sent out from Southern Division headquarters for this purpose. Sergt. Lesel, after stating the system and method that is outlined in the plan book for a perfect organization was much gratified by the report submitted by the Chapter secretary of work already accomplished. Upon request he gave an informal address of his own and the experience of the boys overseas, emphasizing the wonderful work of the Red Cross and of the need of this organization for perhaps two years longer. If Sergt. Lesel could personally accompany each team in its house to house and individual to individual canvas, there is absolutely no doubt of the overwhelming success that would result, but Seminole county has gone over the top in every former drive and as this is a campaign for members more particularly than for funds Seminole county is going to see out again. The amount raised is only one dollar and surely we can make one more small sacrifice if assisting it, for the boys who have sacrificed so much for us.

That Deland-Daytona Road

Michael Sholtz, receiver for the Akerman & Ellis Company, will complete the nice miles of roadway between Deland and Daytona according to contract, beginning the work immediately.

This agreement and order of court was made and entered into at Kissimmee on Saturday. The order of court, made by Judge James W. Perkins, appointed Mr. Sholtz receiver for the Akerman & Ellis Company places his bond at \$10,000, gives him authority to take charge of all the assets and property of the company, wherever located, to issue receiver's certificates when approved by the court, to complete the road contract with Volusia county (for both the Daytona and Ormond roads). The agreement is entered into by all parties to the controversy.

Mr. Sholtz will begin work immediately. The material will be obtained near Titusville, from an immense deposit of rock owned by the company, will be shipped to Daytona by rail, and hauled on to the road with trucks now owned by the company. The lease of county prisoners by the company will be entered into and the prisoners worked in the pit near Titusville. The material to be used is conquina rock, the roadway will be fifteen feet wide, and will be covered with tarvia, contract for which has been let to the Findley Methods Company. It will not be necessary to close the road at all while the work is progressing.

Let us hope that there still are many hearts in little old Seminole county that are yet heaving with the spirit of love, patriotism and helpfulness that will enroll in the Red Cross Christmas Roll Call in the week of December, 16-23. To date there has been found but one heart that has the courage and the real patriotism to undertake the management of the Roll Call and there is not in Sanford a more heavily burdened pair of shoulders to carry the responsibility. Every Red Cross dollar is the answer to prayer and there are thousands of our boys, sick and wounded besides a large army that is kept overseas for months to years. Are we going to fail them now? Now when the excitement of battle and intensive training is removed, more than ever, they need the influence of the Red Cross and all of the rest of the agencies that are still at work for them.

FLORIDA LEGISLATURE IN SESSION HANDLES PROHIBITION MATTER

EXPECTS TO ADJOURN TODAY

The special session of the state legislature at Tallahassee continues to grind out legislation both beneficial and detrimental, as legislatures are wont to do.

In accordance with their agreement it is expected that adjournment will be taken today at noon as most of the matters for which this session was called have been disposed of.

Gov. Catts signed the quart a month, or emergency prohibition bill on Wednesday, which becomes effective five days from that date and holds good until January 1, when the statewide prohibition amendment to the constitution and laws for its enforcement take effect.

The governor has also signed the concurrent resolution ratifying the national prohibition amendment to the federal constitution.

By a vote of 24 to 3, the senate passed the general prohibition bill for the enforcement of the statewide amendment after January 1, but not until it had been amended so that pharmacists may sell brandy and whiskey on the prescriptions of reputable physicians, and so that a man may keep till he uses it, all that he shall have on hand, when the amendment becomes effective, the quantity that he may possess in his home not being limited. Nor was the measure passed finally until a two-hour debate, the most interesting and able of this session in which President John B. Johnson and Senator Lincoln Hulley locked horns.

Gov. Catts has also signed the bill abolishing the tax commission, but as he had recommended the passage of this measure, his approval of it was not unexpected. The commissioners: J. V. Burke, R. J. Patterson and John Noel are preparing to quit the rooms in the state house the commission has occupied.

The special senate committee to which was referred the governor's last message calling to the attention of the senate a number of matters, disposed of the various suggestions for legislation by a report.

The committee does not look with favor upon the suggestion that the home or county guards be placed under the control of the governor, and cites the fact that the men of these organizations enlisted for the duration of the war and that the National Guardsmen would soon be returning to Florida.

New Board of Trade President
At the meeting of the board of governors of the Sanford Board of Trade held on Tuesday evening, H. C. DuBoise was appointed by the governors to fill the unexpired term as president of that body. This is the vacancy made by the resignation of R. J. Holly.

Mr. DuBoise will make an excellent man for this job, and while his term of office expires in one month we look for some great things from the Board of Trade during his regime.

He deserves and must have the support of every business man, professional man and farmer of this county.

LAKE MONROE

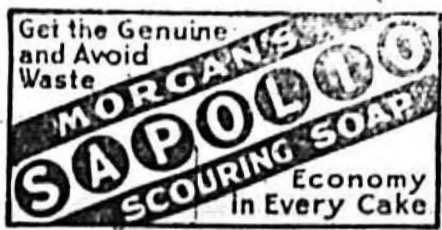
The Thanksgiving exercises given by the school at this place Wednesday afternoon before closing for the holiday were very interesting to all present.
