Supreme Court Orders 'Integration Immediately'

President Declares: U. S. Won't Retreat

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Eisenhower declared Thursday night the United States "shall never timidly retreat before the threat of armed aggression" in the Formosa Strait.

Chinese Say Army Ready

TAIPEI, Formosa (UPI)—Communist China warned today that the Chinese "volunteer" troops now being pulled out of North Korea were fully prepared to go "any place to fight against the aggressors" including the Quemoy area.

Meeting Is Short, Ruling Unanimous

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Supreme Court ordered today that Central High School in Little Rock be reopened on a racially integrated basis immediately.

The ruling was unanimous in denial of a 2 1/4 year delay in integration which had been granted by a federal judge.

The opinion was delivered orally by Chief Justice Earl Warren.

Warren said the decision was effective immediately. This means that the Little Rock School Board is under orders of the supreme court to admit Negroes when Central High School opens for the fall term Monday.

Warren said the original 1957 district court order of 1957 requiring desegregation was reinstated.

The justices stayed on the bench only about five minutes—just long enough for Warren to in technical language and did not go into any elaboration of its 1953 decision about "deliberate speed" in integration. Many attorneys and jurists had thought it would do so.

Not did it say anything about force and violence at Little Rock. These subjects will be taken up, if at all, when the views supporting the judgment are released later.

Immediately after the historic ruling, Thurgood Marshall, the NAACP's chief counsel and veteran fighter on integration cases, said:

Warren of Bellevue "We of course believe that such problems must be handled in the court and we assume that with this clear-cut judgment the legal atmosphere surrounding Central High School is now cleared up and neither the school board nor the governor nor any other person in the state of Arkansas can even pretend not to know what the law is. Anything now done to prevent desegregation in Arkansas is in open defiance of the law."

Attorney Richard C. Butler, who represented the Little Rock School Board, said the decision was "not unexpected by us." But he said he and his colleagues were "deeply disappointed" that the high court did not approve a delay in integration.

Virgil T. Blossom, superintendent of Little Rock schools, said he would have no statements until he confers with the board. As to whether Central High will open Monday on an integrated basis, that "depends on the governor," Blossom said.

Marshals Prepare To Enforce Ruling

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (UPI)—The Department of Justice attorneys and a swarm of deputy U.S. marshals prepared today to enforce the Supreme Court's decision that Central High School must admit Negro students.

"We are studying the decision but we have nothing to say," Stephen C. Braunsfelder, spokesman for the Department of Justice team sent in to direct the integration, told reporters.

Federal Security The federal building swarmed with government men. The U.S. attorney's office, where the Department of Justice integration enforcement team worked, was closed to visitors.

Lawyers hurried back and forth with documents and cloistered themselves in conferences.

More than 50 deputy U.S. marshals, imported from outside Little Rock, reported for secret instructions. More were arriving. They stood in a line outside the office of Earl Kell, U.S. re-ident marshal, to report in, then were directed to a room, where they were briefed in batches.

U. S. Will Soar Deficit To More Than 12 Billion

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Eisenhower budget director, admitting to a "state of emergency," Thursday night revealed the Treasury expects to spend up more than 12 billion dollars in the rest of fiscal year.

Budget Chief Maurice H. Stans also indicated the administration may seek higher federal gasoline taxes and another round of postal rate increases next year to avoid adding to the record peacetime deficit.

Stans said the deficit would be \$12,200,000,000 for the fiscal year which began last July 1 and ends next June 30.

He told his news conference Thursday the President and his advisers must decide within 60 days about raising federal gasoline taxes by close to one billion dollars next year because the federal highway trust fund used to finance interstate highways will be exhausted next fiscal year.
