## Lucas Urges Ban On Labor Bargain Deal

### Says Industry-Wide Bargaining Is Practice Fraught With Danger To People

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Lucas (D-Texas) called today for a ban on industry-wide bargaining. He raked the practice as "fraught with danger to the American people."

Lucas was the leadoff witness at the House Labor Committee hearing on proposed changes in the Taft-Hartley Act.

Author of a bill that would keep international unions from making contracts with two or more competing firms within an industry, Lucas said the legislation is required in the interest of national defense.

"The rights of all the people are more important than the rights of any segment of the people," Lucas said in seeking support of his measure which was part of the bill drafted by former Rep. Hartley (R-N.D.) five years ago.

Lucas recalled that Hartley's proposed ban against industry-wide bargaining was defeated in 1947 by a single vote to become part of the version sponsored by (Continued On Page Four)

## National Guard To Hold Firing Drill At Camp Blanding

Sanford's National Guard Unit, Co. I, will go on a firing drill at Camp Blanding this week-end, it was announced today by Capt. David M. Gatchel.

The guardsmen, who are going on a strictly voluntary basis, will receive no state or government pay, he said.

## Evans' Proposal To Widen Street Gets City Okay

### Cowan Reports Gains Made In Organizing Sanford Industries

Frank Evans, Lake Mary, who owns three business buildings at Sanford Avenue and Fourth Street, last night offered a proposal to the City Commission to widen and pave Fourth Street an additional 12 1/2 feet for a distance of 125 feet east of Sanford Avenue. His proposal was accepted.

Mr. Evans said the additional space in the half block is needed for parking. The Commission also is passing the remaining half block. Mr. Evans expressed the opinion the expense should fall to adjoining property owners.

City Manager Cowan said he is instructed by the Commission to contact these owners relative to the widening proposal.

Mr. Evans said the widening of the street would be a benefit to the City Industrial Board and to the widening of the street.

He predicted he would secure at least 10,000 individual signatures in the effort before he goes through with the construction of a portion of the program. He said he is offering everyone in Seminole County, white or colored, an opportunity to take part in the effort.

The corporation is aimed at giving financial assistance to outside industries in order to get them established here.

Mr. Cowan said that legal procedure in incorporating a corporation is completed but that he had received a telegram yesterday at 12:30 p. m. from the office of the Secretary of State, Tallahassee, stating the incorporation for incorporation had been filed. He also said a few minor details remained to be completed before the first new corporation could be established here.

## Opinion Of Supreme Court Inures Less Meddling With State Courts

### Value Of Scouting Is Told To Lions At Luncheon Meet

WASHINGTON (AP)—State courts, if approved today, will have less of a say in the federal courts, according to a Supreme Court Justice. He said in a 10-page opinion yesterday that federal courts should not use habeas corpus proceedings against state prisoners unless there is a clear showing of unusual circumstances.

After all, Reed said, state and federal courts have like responsibilities to protect the constitutional rights of accused persons.

Reed spoke for the majority in a 5-4 decision upholding state law in a case involving a Negro, Charles Jackson, who was charged with the murder of a white woman in Florida.

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## Commercial Bribery Is Charged By Jury

NEW YORK (AP)—The president of the nation's biggest steamship company has been charged with commercial bribery. It is the first time a steamship executive has been charged with such a crime.

Frank W. Nolan, 52, president of the Jarka Corporation, was charged yesterday on a grand jury indictment with commercial bribery. The indictment is the first of its kind against a steamship executive as a result of the investigation of the Justice Department.

District Attorney Frank S. Hogan said Jarka averages 25 million dollars a year in business.

Nolan, of South Orange, N. J., told newsmen after his arraignment in Special Sessions Court that the charge "is wholly unwarranted and has no foundation." Nolan pleaded innocent and was freed in \$100,000 bail pending trial March 11.

If convicted on all four counts, he could receive a possible maximum sentence of four years in prison and a \$2,000 fine.

Hogan said the charges against Nolan stem directly from testimony he gave the Crime Commission at its public hearing here Dec. 3.

Dulles, who testified at a closed session of the Senate Foreign Relations committee, said he was contacted by the secretary of the National Security Council, James D. Byrd, and the president's attorney, Fred B. Rothman, on the subject of a possible blockade of the Chinese coast.

## Threat Made To Seal Off West Berlin

### Menace Seen To Bonn Government If It Ratifies European Defense Agreement

BERLIN (AP) — East Germany's communists boldly threatened today to seal off West Berlin if the Bonn republic ratifies the European defense pact.

In a proclamation heavy with portent, the Socialist Unity Party of Germany declared that "further isolation" is in store for the Red-surrounded city. It called for negotiations between the West and the Soviets to accomplish:

1. Withdrawal of all military garrisons from Berlin.
2. Abolition of the sector borders dividing the city.
3. Hanning of "terror organizations" which the East says include the American radio RIAS, the anti-Communist "Lightning Group Against Inhumanity," and the Free Jurists' League.

Chancellor Konrad Adenauer has said he will call on the defense treaty for a ratification vote in the West German Parliament between March 10 and 15.

The new Red threat, issued by the party organ, is a reflection of the Soviet sector of the near-terred city, bore the stamp of Russian approval. The Red army organ, "Pravda," published the proclamation.

The statement amounted to an outright threat of blockade (Communist crews have built a "death zone" on the 70-mile perimeter between West Berlin and the Soviet zone. The border between the West sectors and East Berlin still is in force, but open to traffic in respect for the four-power nature of the city.

## Tests Are Started On County Cattle For Tuberculosis

Tests were being made today on cattle in Seminole County by Dr. James W. Blake, state health officer, in order to detect tuberculosis in order to have the county accredited.

Ten percent of the cattle in county must be tested, C. H. Dawson, County Agricultural Agent, said, in order to meet the standard set by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, testing is carried on such three years in the accreditation procedure.

Until this year, Mr. Dawson said, Seminole County was always a "clean" county by testing dairy cattle, which were easily accessible and made up the necessary 10 percent of the cattle population.

However, he explained, the cattle population has increased through new beef herds and more people settling in the county, and was discovered the number to be tested.

The cattle population according to the last census was 12,016, he said.

The county was put in an unenviable position as a result, he said, of the possibility of getting the sufficient number of cattle tested looked vague. However, the proposition was placed before a meeting of the Seminole County Cattlemen's Association last week, he said, and the members got together the cattle necessary to fill the quota, about 5000.

This testing was being carried on today, the last chance before the deadline on Feb. 28, Mr. Dawson explained. Actually, he revealed, the testing of the accredited county was granted an extension of 90 days.

If the effort had failed, Mr. Dawson explained, the county would be taken off the accredited list and placed on the quarantine list. This change would mean that every head of cattle that would be moved from the county would have to be tested for tuberculosis, creating a very undesirable condition, he said.

The reported accord reached in London after 18 months of negotiations, ends a major source of friction between the two nations and clears the way for talks on Egypt's role in a national Arab industrial defense pact.

Prime Minister Churchill called a special session of the British cabinet tonight to approve the provisional agreement. It is done, British and Egyptian governments will be called authority to sign a 10-year armistice ending the long-running Sudan conflict.

Under the agreement the grant of self-rule to eight million Sudanese will be the first major step toward giving them the right to settle their own future as part of the British Commonwealth as an independent state. A three-year deadline for the execution of self-determination has been set.

International supervision of elections in the Sudanese Parliament and of the three-year transitional period has also been arranged. The question of other with British demands for the Sudan's deep South has been the main subject of an Anglo-Egyptian agreement reached in London with the Nacqib government last Nov. 6.
