## Labor Troubles In Coal Mines Brought To End

(Continued from Page Two)  
A price of \$36.378 a ton for new steel rails to be purchased by the carriers with a government loan.  
This represented a mid-No ground between the \$17.75 offered by the steel companies and the \$38 demanded by the government.  
It was the first reduction in years below the \$40 a ton asked by the companies for steel rails and on that basis was expected to result in a saving of \$6,000,000 to the railroads for the quantity they plan to buy.

The new agreement provided that the miners who have remained away from work for more than a month should be immediately re-employed under the terms of the Appalachian agreement between the commercial mine operators and the United Mine Workers hours, wages and working conditions.

Hugh S. Johnson, industrial administrator, and Donald Richberg, NRA counsel, were the president's negotiators in the mine conference.  
Joseph B. Eastman, the railroad co-ordinator, dealt with the steel representatives on the rail prices.  
President Roosevelt served as arbiter in both instances and brought the negotiations to a successful conclusion just before midnight.

The mine agreement is a two-fold proposition between the President, Johnson and the operators on the one hand and the president, Johnson and the united mine workers on the other.

A formal agreement which shall contain terms and conditions, at least as favorable as the Appalachian agreement, will be made between the captive mine operators and the representatives of their employees.
