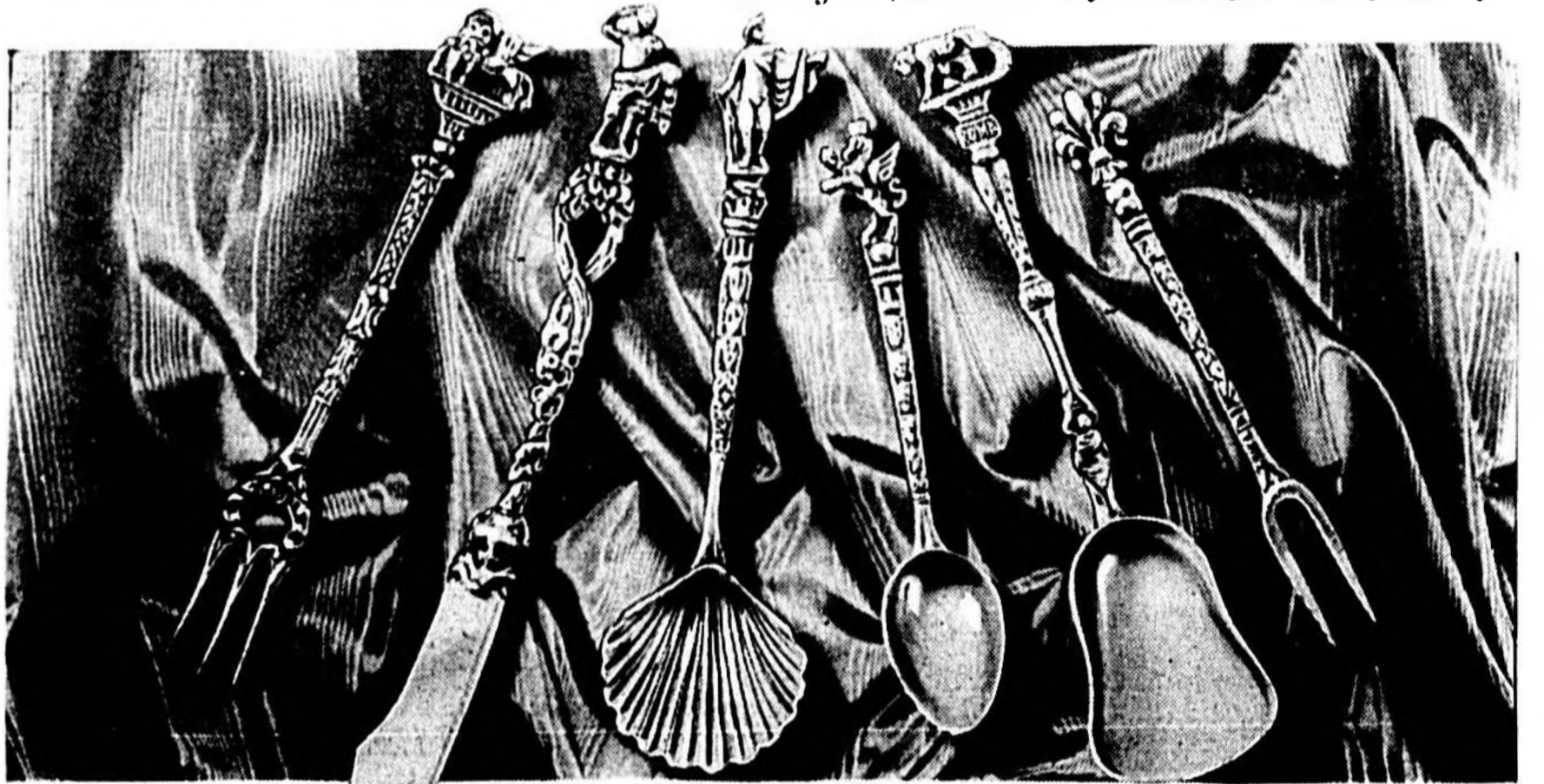

Three Men Die Of Suffocation

SHENANDOAH, Pa. — Three men suffocated yesterday in a gas-filled apartment. Police said the gas came from a clogged chimney badly damaged by Hurricane Hazel. Deputy Coroner Marlin Murphy identified the three as Steve Kollnick, 57, and Jacob Shialle, 59, two bachelors, and John Koles, 45, father of six children, who was visiting them. Murphy said there was a strong odor of coal gas in the apartment. Police said the chimney became blocked with soot where a portion of it had been blown off by storm winds. They said the coal stove used to heat the place apparently hadn't been turned on since the hurricane until Saturday night.

Business Moves At Faster Pace

CARACAS, Venezuela. — There was a time when doing business here meant being in the tropical manner—easy-going and lazy with plenty of time for friendly talk and a siesta every afternoon. But the "tropical manner" has acquired a new meaning in Venezuela; hustling is its definition now and the lazy man practicing the old way of life won't last long. This will give you some idea of the feverish activity going on right now: Celso Palmolive has just broken ground for a new five-million-dollar detergent plant. They're out for a share of the market grabbed by Procter & Gamble, which opened South America's first detergent plant here two years ago. General Tire has started construction of a five-million-dollar plant to produce plastic, asphalt and rubber tiles, foam rubber and storage batteries. General has also announced plans to boost production at its tire factory from 500,000 units this year to 600,000 in 1955. There's tough competition ahead for General. Firestone has just gotten production under way at its new six-million-dollar plant. U.S. Rubber is building a \$4 million-dollar tire factory which will be completed next year. Abbot is constructing a million-dollar pharmaceutical plant. Parke Davis opened its new pharmaceutical factory earlier this year. And Case Pfizer is making plans to inaugurate a new branch office. The U.S.-owned Venezuelan Sulphur Corp. has just announced plans for large scale development of its vast sulphur deposits. Creole Petroleum Corp., an affiliate of Standard Oil Co. (N.J.) recently set into operation a 24-million-dollar gas reinjection plant on Lake Maracaibo and doubled the capacity of its Amay refinery from 70,000 to 140,000 barrels per day. Creole Corp. will soon start producing plastics at its six-million-dollar rayon plant which opened two years ago.

Seminole Ground Play Smears Winter Park, 21-0, In Rain

Crooms Academy Wins Tilt, 47 To 0, Over Dade City Panthers Control Entire Game

John Jones Scores All Local TDs

A fast moving Seminole eleven, unhampered by rain, completely outplayed and demolished their Winter Park hosts, 21-0, at Harper Sheppard Field Friday night.

A near capacity crowd watched fast driving backs move through four-lane highways, rather than holes the Seminole line continually opened in the Winter Park defenses, as the Sanford team controlled the ball fully three-fourths of the game and gained yardage almost at will.

On the defensive, the Seminole forward wall could not be cracked except for one brief period when Winter Park received the ball after a bad punt on the first half as Semihole backs broke up two scoring pass attempts.

Johnny Jones scored all three Seminole TDs and capped the effort by three perfect conversions.

The locals scored in the first few minutes after the initial kick-off when, after holding Winter Park on downs, guard Larry Bates smeared the kicker, and Sanford took over deep in Wildcat territory. Jones drove over from the two to score, and then went on to kick the first of his three conversions.

The only other scoring threat in the first half came as time ran out on the Wildcats and the Seminole pass defense held against two Winter Park tries from the Sanford 12.

The Seminoles took the second half kickoff and moved through tremendous holes in the line to cap a 60 yard drive when Jones bulled over from the three. Seconds later he had completed his second extra point.

The final score was set up when the Seminoles recovered a Winter Park fumble on the 40 yards, Jim Hawkins, and Flowers moved the ball to the Sanford 20 in a series of seven plays. Then Jones went over to score. Like clockwork, the extra point was good.

It was a roughly played game, with penalties styming additional scoring attempts by both teams.

NEW YORK, 28.—It would not be too surprising to see Will Harridge, scholarly president of the American League, toss in the sponge and tell his employers of the past 23 years to find themselves another negotiator for their next debate over the future of the Philadelphia Athletics.

Harridge's present contract still has three years to run, but there must have been days lately when he wondered if he would be able to stick it out. At the end of the most recent protracted wrangle here, the 60-year-old league head counted suspiciously as though he had about contracted a stomach flu. If he comes back for another round it will be only through a stern sense of duty.

We have seen it written lately that Harridge has grown too soft to handle the bunch of hard cases who are battling among themselves over what should be done with the sick Athletics.

It is true that he always liked to run a "tidy" league and deplored such ruckuses as he was called upon to contend with, but he also has demonstrated upon numerous occasions that he could get real tough when the necessity arose.

One of the first things he did after taking office was to fine Bill Dickey of the Yankees \$1,000 and suspend him for a month for laying a haymaker on the jaw of Carl Reynolds of the Washington Senators.

Many times since then the man they now are saying is too soft has taken the law into his hands in a hurry when he felt it was indicated. We have never seen it suggested that discipline in the American League was more lax than that in the National. But when it comes to telling off club presidents and forcing them to act their respective ages, the league president simply doesn't have the authority. They pay him — not the other way around.

Auburn Hunts Win As Georgia-Florida Battle Saturday

Auburn will have an opportunity to regain a large measure of its lost football prestige Saturday while Georgia and Florida will be having a head-knocking session to see which stays in the Southeastern Conference championship race.

Georgia, which held vaunted Alabama to a scoreless tie Saturday, and Florida, which eked out a fumbling 7-0 victory over Mississippi State, stage their annual brawl in Jacksonville.

Coach Wally Butts, Bulldogs still lead the conference, with an 833 percentage and Florida is tied with Mississippi for second at 809.

Auburn puts its new-found punch on display against undefeated and nationally ranked Miami in Birmingham. Auburn whipped Tulane 27-0 Saturday for its second straight victory after losses to Florida, Kentucky and Georgia Tech. Miami, making a big splash this season with a crushing ground attack, rolled over Fordham 75-7 Friday night.

Mississippi takes a rest from SEC activity this weekend, going to Memphis for a game with Memphis State. The Rebels, who whipped Louisiana State 21-6 Saturday night, have only Mississippi State left on their conference schedule.

Florida still must meet Georgia and Tennessee and Georgia has Florida, Auburn and Georgia Tech yet to play.

Other upcoming games are Tennessee at Tech, Alabama at Tulane, Vanderbilt at Kentucky, Chattanooga at LSU and North Texas State at Mississippi State.

Tennessee, with a 1-1 SEC record, still figures in the SEC title chase but the Vols have Tech, Florida, Kentucky and Vanderbilt between them and the big prize.

Other results of last Saturday's games: Duke rallied and beat Tech 21-20, Tennessee outscored North Carolina 26-20, Kentucky beat Villanova 28-3, and Rice thumped Vanderbilt 34-13.

Duke overcame a 20-0 deficit in the last half, scoring the winning touchdown in the closing seconds.

LSU couldn't handle Eagle Day's passing and the fleet of fast backs and hard-hitting linemen the Mass threw at the Tiders.

**New TV Career
Being Started
By Jack Carson**

HOLLYWOOD — Jack Carson is starting a new career in TV and he'll be presenting a new Jack Carson.

No more the loutish blowhard who is the butt of all the jokes. He'll be playing more or less the real Carson—a big, lusty fellow with a clever, almost ironic sense of humor.

Every four weeks, Carson will occupy the NBC Friday night slot, which Red Buttons has three times a month. The king-size comic will open with a shot of his San Fernando Valley ranch and then appear as himself. Then he'll ease into a sketch. Tomorrow night's will be a takeoff on "Lucy" of ferreting the funny life of a gangster. Costars: Claire Trevor, Ricardo Cortez.

"I'm going to try and do satire," Carson explained. "It's the thing I like to do best, and I don't think there's enough good satire on TV. At first we were going to do takeoffs on other shows. But then I recalled I would be hurting some friend's feelings if I did. So now we're doing more general things."

"I think we have a funny approach. But of course, I can be wrong. If the show has a bomb tomorrow night, I may change my way of thinking."

There was nothing satirical about the loud-mouth character Carson used to play in the Warner Bros. films with Dennis Morgan. Jack has been trying to cut away from those portrayals for the past few years and has just about managed it.

He went to an extreme in "A Star Is Born" in which he plays a noncomic role as the hard-boiled press agent who helps put the skills under James Mason. Carson doesn't think he was a head in the film, but others disagree. At any rate it was a lively enough job to get him mention for a supporting Oscar nomination, something few folks ever suspected he would do.

The new TV deal will give him plenty of opportunity for films and that's the way he wants it. He admits making mistakes in his first assault at the new medium four years ago. At that time, he burned all his movie bridges behind him.

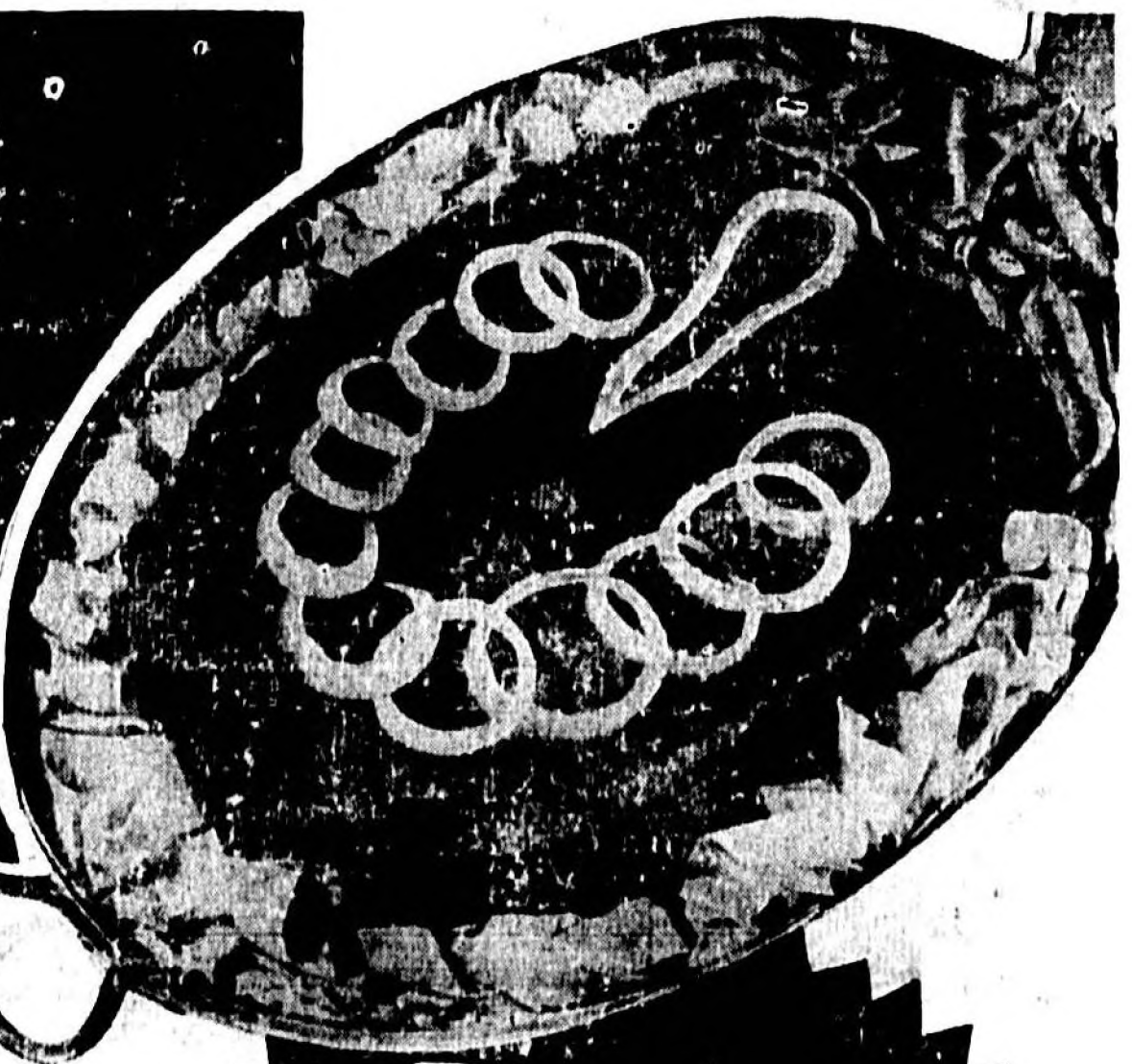
