Bowles Denies Charge Of Beating-Up Negro **Head Of AAWP Asks For Jury Trial** In Case Involving Letter Carrier

WASHINGTON (P) -- Bryant W. Bowles, president of the Assn. for the Advancement of White People, pleaded innocent today to a charge of beating up a Negro letter carrier. He asked a jury trial which was set for Jan. 5.

Bowles, 35, entered his plea before Judge George D Neilson in Municipal Court. His lawyer, Bond L. Holford, asked for a delay of about three months in the trial He said such a delay was necessary to assure Bowles a fair and impartial trial since widespread

• publicity had attended the case.

Judge Neilson said he did not think the publicity would make it impossible to select impartial irrors. He said he fe't an early trial would be to Bowles' advantage.

Bowles, when he first appeared before the index of the content of before the judge, asked a conference with the U.S. attorney's office to explain his side of the case. The conference was conducted by Austin Fickling, a Negro assistant US attorney who ruled the evidence warranted going ahead with the



Right after Christmas, the gover- stripe. ment will start mailing income tax forms and instructions to taxpayers. And these packets will tell anybody who looks at them what your income bracket was last year — whether you were in the under-\$5,000, the \$5,000-to-\$10,000, or the over-\$10,000 class. This is how it works:

If you reported on the simplest form an income of less than \$5,-000 last year, the government will mail you a new type of return. It will be about the size of an ordinary bank check. The return which you must file by April 15 1955, is designed for easy handling by calculating machines.

If you reported a \$5,000-to-\$10,-000 income last year, your new form will come - along with an instruction booklet - unwrapped. The package will bear a red atripe a quarter of an inch wide.

Finally, if you told the govern-ment your income last year was over \$10,000, you also will receive Veterans Corner weeks each year. Will this a no-envelope packet. But in this case it will carry a quarter-inch wide yellow stripe


