



#### Senate Okays College Aid Measure

The Sanford Weruld

WASHINGTON (UPI)-The Senate has passed President Kennedy's \$2.7 billion college ald bill, but prospects remain dim for his proposal to help grade and high schools.

The college bill, approved Tuesday night by a vote of 69-17, would authorize \$1.5 billion in loans for classroom construction, \$250 million in grants to community junior colleges and a \$924 million scholarship program for needy and talented youths.

A much more limited college aid bill was passed by the House last week. The House measure does not include scholarships or assistance for the two-year community colleges.

The Senate measure now goes to a House-Senate conference committee, where it faces major House opposition to the provision for 212,500 federal scholarships.

In a message to Congress Tuesday, Kennedy recommended a broad five-year program of federal assistance for all levels of education to "Zvelop our intellectual resources to the fullest."

But all signs indicated that a compromise version of the House and Senate college aid bills would be about all that he could expect to get from this session of Congress.

The House, which blocked education legislation last year, appeared unlikely to reverse itself and give the President his request for a \$2. billion five-year program o general aid to elementary and secondary schools.



#### Threats To Downtown

(Part 2 in a series of editorials about downtowns)

Downtown store failures make news. And they chill the spines of other retailers. Many small stores have closed. Does this indicate downtown is approaching rigor mortis? Not so. The downtown stores which are expiring are with grim regularity stores passed by time and change, Most small stores shutting up are old, tiny stores or mom and pop operations that junior does not want to come into. They are weak merchandisers and non-advertisers.

They are sitting in poor locations without vision or gumption to move.

Among the larger stores inadequate buildings, unchanging store images, the end of fine family management and many other factors have sapped their strength. By contrast research reveals that even in hard pressed downtowns many, many merchants

Among big stores and small we find that the aggressive stores modernize or move, promote, adapt merchandise lines, modify the store image-do whatever is necessary to keep ahead of the times—and they prosper. As it now stands there is an obvious and important role for downtown retailing. It can be a growing role and is vital to downtown.

#### To New Traffic Track

The country's mass transit systems do not appear to have made much headway yet under programs set up to help solve their problems. In many modest size communi-

ties the problem is that public transportation has disappeared altogether. In the bigger centers, the problems are to cope with growth and keep afloat financially. The 1961 Housing Act provides

certain funds for transit planning, for demonstration grants, and for facilities and equipment. Though the authorizations were larger, last minute congressional maneuvering imposed restrictions whose effect is to limit the program to \$42 million.

As might be expected, little has been done to implement these provisions in the few short months since passage. A new unit in the Housing and Home Finance Agency is largely in the organization and policy statement phase.

Cleveland and Philadelphia are among the few United States communities sufficiently advanced with their transit plans to apply for loans.

Meantime, the harsh facts pile up. Communities keep on growing, their existing facilities are overburdened, and they find themselves laying out-or contemplating-immense! sums for street and highway improvements to handle the swelling motor traffic.






