**An Exorbitant Tax**

For a long time it has been widely complained that Florida has among the highest, if not the highest, gasoline tax of any state in the union. Here a seven cent levy is made on every gallon of gasoline sold. Add to this the one cent tax which the federal government collects and you have a total tax of eight cents. If you spend twenty dollars a month for gasoline out of that you are contributing eight dollars a month for the operation of government, or ninety-six dollars a year.

In view of this situation, one is hardly surprised to find trouble brewing in Tampa where city officials have tried to complete the slaughter of the goose that lays the golden eggs, by piling on an additional one cent tax for municipal purposes. That makes the total tax which Tampa motorists have to pay come to nine cents per gallon. Furthermore, since only the city filling stations have to pay it, there is a difference in the price of gasoline in Tampa and just outside the city limits.

As a consequence of this extra city tax, which has proved to be the straw which broke the camel's back, filling stations within the city of Tampa proper, have formed a union and are among themselves refusing to sell gasoline at any price, and are attempting to prevent independent operators outside the union from doing so either. They have in short, organized a strike, not against low wages, child labor, or long hours, but against high taxes. The strike is now in its fifth day with city officials trying to break it by delivering gasoline through the police department.

We know nothing whatever about the merits of the city's position which resulted in the levying of this one cent gasoline tax. Very likely the officials were hard pressed for funds and had to do something. Probably the gasoline tax was the least of the evils confronting them. But we do know that whenever a tax becomes so burdensome that taxpayers protest against it to the point of organized strike, it ceases to be an effective or economical method of taxation. Tampa, we believe, will find very shortly that its gasoline tax is costing the city far more than it will get out of it.

There is an old saying that nothing is certain but death and taxes. And to a certain extent that is true. Everyone knows that he must pay taxes and nine out of ten are willing to do so up to a certain point. But when the tax burden becomes so heavy that it arouses the resentment of a large part of those people who have to pay it, then there is nothing quite so uncertain as that particular tax. King George III of England once levied a certain tax on tea, which so aroused his subjects that they dumped his tea in the bay.

Governing authorities for some time have fallen back on the gasoline tax with unconscionable regularity whenever they needed any extra funds. Because it was a good horse they have ridden it to death. Starting out at one cent a gallon they have piled tax on tax until now nearly half the price of gasoline goes to pay the tax. And if the city authorities of Tampa get away with their municipal gasoline tax, the practice will probably spread to other cities.

The time to call a halt on the gasoline tax is now before gasoline costs us a dollar a gallon with 90 cents of it going to the politicians.

**Lemon Shortage**

Had as was the loss to California orange and grapefruit growers as a result of the recent freezes in the Pacific coast state, the lemon crop suffered to an even greater extent, according to H. W. Bennett, lemon grower of Babson Park and a director of the State Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Bennett told Chamber of Commerce officials the other day that 75 percent of the California lemon crop had been completely destroyed and that the trees themselves have been damaged so badly that it will take them several years to come back. Florida growers are urged to take advantage of this situation by planting more lemon trees.

"While this is regrettable and unfortunate for California, it is truly Florida's opportunity to colonize a comparatively new home industry of great potential value and profit," Mr. Bennett says. "California groves valued at from \$2,500 to \$3,000 per acre have been damaged to the point where they will require years to come back. Damage this severe is extremely improbable for Florida growers as the Sunshine State's lemon belt, in the scenic highlands and lake-protected region of South Central Florida, lies 500 miles south of the California lemon belt.

"Additional protection in this state is afforded by the never varying temperature of the Gulf Stream, which encircles the state and largely controls extremes of both cold and heat. With grove heaters (seldom needed) 100 percent protection is assured for Florida growers. Low production cost, no more than for oranges and grapefruit plus a limited suitable production area, which keeps the price up, are only two reasons why growers will find lemons and limes more profitable," he declared.

**RIGHTS OF SIT DOWN STRIKERS**

If Secretary of Labor Perkins ed and when the resistance is brought the strike leaders and the General Motors officials together it will be interesting to observe what happens about one point. The beginning of everything is the stipulation of General Motors that there must be evacuation of the 'sit-down' strikers from the plants in a condition precedent to any negotiations. Whatever attitude Miss Perkins takes on this point will be inferred to be the attitude of the national government. And the attitude of government—national, state and local on this particular point constitutes the most deep-reaching element in the whole situation.

The strike has two aspects. In one it is an ordinary industrial conflict. But the injection of the sit-down feature raises an additional question which goes to the heart of government and the organization of society. This latter aspect, considering what is going on in the world, is most interesting to watch.

Under the existing state of law and in the existing American conception of society, the sit-down strikers are trespassers on privately owned property. Some strike leaders claim the Michigan law contains a feature which exempts sit-down strikers from the status of trespassers. They say that when a man goes on another's property in response to invitation by the latter, the visitor does not become a trespasser when he remains. Whatever the Michigan law may be, the common sense of law everywhere, and the common view of everybody familiar with American usage, would undoubtedly regard the sit-down strikers as trespassers.

In case of trespass the usual practice is for the owner to appeal to the local law officers. In many cases the appeal is merely to the police, in other cases to the courts. In some cases there may be a hearing, in others not. In all cases assuming the intruder is shown to be a trespasser in the legal sense, there is ejection by the agency of the law. If, after appeal by the owner to the law, and after showing that there is trespass in the legal sense—if in such a situation the agencies of law do not eject the trespassers the condition is in effect a breakdown of the machinery of law.

To what extent this now exists in Michigan is not fully clear from the dispatches. Apparently, General Motors applied to the courts for what amounted to a writ of ejection. The writ was issued. At this point the strike leaders showed that the judge, issuing the writ was a stockholder in General Motors. Virtually every lawyer would say that the judge should have remembered his relation to one of the parties and should have declined to act. The same writ would have been issued by any court. Actions in trespass are a frequent part of the work of any court; they are almost routine.

Apparently, in the present case, the sheriff read the writ to the sit-down strikers and they ignored it. Subsequently, according to dispatches, General Motors procured writs of ejection from another court. Whether these were actually served on the strikers is not clear. When a sheriff or other officer of the court finds himself resist-

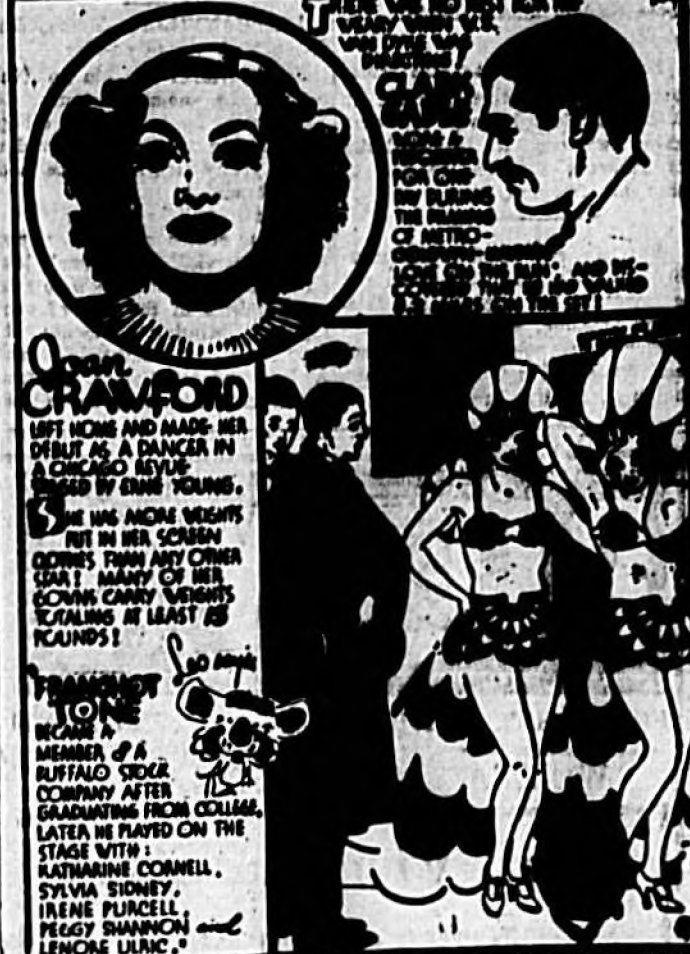

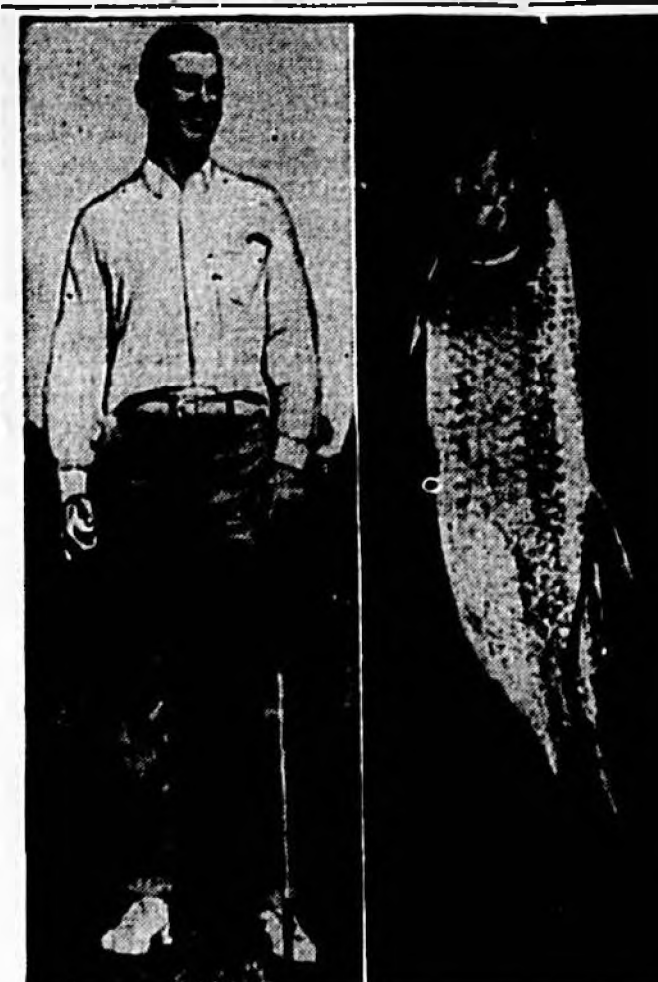

### Reichsfuehrer Begins Another 4 Years As Leading Light

BERLIN, Jan. 30.—(AP)—Reichsfuehrer Adolf Hitler, starting to rule Germany for another four years, "withdrew" Germany's signature from the Versailles Peace Treaty today in which the Reich was declared "guilty" of launching the World War.

Asserting that Germany's re-annexation of military sovereignty was a matter affecting only the Reich, the Nazi chancellor told the Reichstag "we have taken nothing from any nation, nor have we done any nation wrong."

He declared German Government from now on would exercise sole sovereignty over the federal railway system and the Reichsbank.

Not quite a year ago the same Reichstag which Hitler addressed today on the fourth birthday of Nazi power, reannexed the broad Rhineland in violation of the Treaty of Versailles.

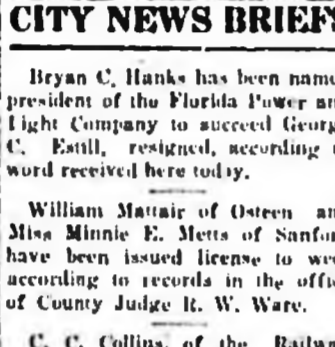
