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LANE VOTED MOST VALUABLE LEAGUE PLAYER

Philadelphia Star Is Honored By Players In Official Balloting

CHICAGO, Oct. 16.—(INS)—Gordon Stanley Cochrane, catcher of the Philadelphia Athletics, today was named the most valuable player in his club in the American League.

Cochrane is 25 years old, a native of Bridgewater, Mass., and was purchased in 1924 by Connie Mack for \$25,000 from the Portland club of the Pacific League.

The selection was made by the league's commission of eight baseball writers, who gave Cochrane a total of 53 points, Henry Mandel, St. Louis outfielder, was second choice with 51 points and Joseph Judge, Washington first baseman, and Tony Laverne, Yankee first baseman, tied for third place. Willie Kamm, White Sox third baseman and Leon Goetz, Washington outfielder, were fourth and fifth in the selections.

Injuries which handicapped Cochrane last season were regarded as working against him in consideration of the award, which carries with it \$1,000 in cash.

Four of the eight members of the commission placed Cochrane as first choice, while three made him second choice. One member did not vote for him at all, picking Jimmy Fox as the Athletics' most valuable player.

Lane Ruth and Lou Gehrig, New York stars, were not eligible for the award, having been previously honored.
