Wangler obtained a permanent injunction against Maclas, and when the San Antonio woman returned to church determined to sing what she wanted, she was arrested.


#### Don't eat it; adopt a turkey

# Young war refugees lured into modern-day slavery snare

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa -Slave-traders are luring hundreds of young refugees from Mozambique's civil war onto farms and into black townships of South Africa to serve as laborers and concubines or be ritually slaughtered, two newspapers reported

The purchase price of a slave is \$78 per head in rural settlements and \$137 in urban areas, the liberal Weekly Mail said, after a reporter posed as a buyer

# Stromberg project OK'd

LAKE MARY - Slemens Stromberg-Carlson last night received from the Lake Mary city commission go-ahead for expansion of its Rinehart

Stromberg-Carlson, in the process of merging with Siemens Communications System, plans to add 20,000 square feet of modular office space to be utilized during modernization of the existing plant. With more than 2,000 employees, the firm is the largest industrial employer in Seminole

The firm had requested that landscaping requirements for the entire site be limited to the area around the existing building and parking lot, plus lesser landscaping along Rinchart Road.

Following a discussion of the landscaping, however, the commission agreed that rather than requiring the heavy buffer around the building, the landscaping be placed along the entrance driveways to the plant.

# Hazards from Santa: Toys turned tragedy

WASHINGTON — The Joy found under the Christmas tree this year could turn to tragedy for thousands. of children because their parents are unaware of hazards associated with many toys, government and consumer experts warn.

From January 1989 through September 1990, 33 toy-related deaths were reported to the Consumer Product Safety Commission and, says spokeswoman Anne Paylich, "we get our figures only from certain sources. It's never a

In addition, according to 1989 data from the National Electronic Injury Surveillance System. 148,000 people were treated in U.S. hospitals for toy-related injuries, 83 percent of those age, 14 or younger.

Many of those deaths and injuries could have been avoided, the experts say, if parents had chosen the toys more carefully, heeded age

recommendation labels or monitored the use and condition of the toys as children play with them.

Swallowing or choking on small parts, falls on or against toys. lacerations or punctures from sharp edges, playing with more sophisticated toys meant for older siblings and playing with broken See Toys, Page 5A

# Three-legged Tipsy tiptoes on Turtle Mover

OVIEDO - Tipsy the turtle was born with only

three legs, which made getting around on land a little difficult. "He'd kinda tip over and drag," said Karen Serivener, 8, who created a prosthesis for the

young reptile to help him get around a little easier. The father of a triend found the pond turtle when he was lishing a few weeks ago and offered it to Karen, who said she hopes to become a animal rehabilitation specialist when she gets older.

"I liked him because he only has three legs and I thought I could help him," said Scrivener, a third grader at Stemstrom Elementary School, 1800 Alafaya Woods Blvd., Ovjedo.

With some manufacturing assistance from her father and some knickknacks from his tool box, the youngster attached the small wheel from a matchbox car to a plastic stick. That is, in turn, strapped to the turtle with a rubber band.

Three legs flailing and head turning to look at Scrivener, Tipsy is unsure about the contraption that he has been removed from the water to be fitted with. Once on the table he speeds, turtle

ORLANDO - Eddie "The Continental Lover" Mansfield made more than \$1 million as one of professional wrestling's had boys, then he exposed the sport as a fraud and was blackinsted.

Pive years later he has popped up in Orlando, open-ing a school to teach students the sport's inside tricks and trying to line up financing for a movie he has written.

"It's an action-adventure-romance with a professional wrestling background," said Manafield, 35, a hulking strawberry Blond. "R'll take you belied the neeses of how wrestling is really lived day to day. ... It shows you how corrupt wrestling promoters really are.
"It's the 'Rocky' of wrestling to whee it is."

in 1985, Manafield went on ABC TV's "90-20," called professional wrestling a fraud and demonstrated the phony throws, the kicks, the tricks used in the ring.

He did it, he said, because

two promoters had blackballed him.

"They jeopardized my career," he said. "I said, 'If you

do this to me, I'm going to expose you." and he did.
"The best thing I ever did, greatest thing for the wrestling business," he now says.

Across his forehead are tracks of scars, scars he put there himself when he cut himself with a razor blade in an old ring trick to draw blood

and excite fane.
"I had 22 stitches in my head one time," he said.

The fans, he says, "They really don't give a damn if someone thinks its phony or a sham. They just go for the entertainment. ... I see nothing wrong with it.

"It's entertainment. It's good vs. evil. It's a formula. and the formula works. ... As far as being real or fake. I think wrestling fans don't give a damn. They just enjoy

Manafield moved to Orlando in September, leased 1,000 square feet in a metal building behind a liquor store off South city's red-light district, and opened his school, "The Continental Lover's School of Pro Wrestling."

In the ring, he was a nasty pretty boy, Eddy "The Conti-nental Lover," who gave himself a reputation as playboy and bleached his hair white-bionde.

His best season was 1980-81, when he and George "The Animal" Steel won and lost and won and lost the world heavyweight tag team

It was also his top-grossing season. He was carning as much as \$5,000 a week and was voted outstanding wrestler by the World International Fan Association.

In 1977, at age 19, he was the National Wrestling Alliance's rookie of the year.

# Humphrey to serve sentence in hospital

TITUSVILLE - Edward Humphrey, a suspect in the Gainesville student killings, was sentenced Thursday to 22 months in prison with the recommendation that he serve his time at a state mental hospital.

Humphrey, 19, was convicted of simple battery Oct. 10 for hitting his grandmother Elm Hlavaty, 79, at the family's Indiatiantic home.

Circuit Judge Theron Yawn Jr. sentenced Humphrey to the maximum he could have received for the conviction, 22 months, with the recommendation that the state Department of Corrections commit him to a mental facility.

State Atomey James Carter said the Corrections Department had agreed to send Humphrey to the state mental hospital in Chattahoochee.

Yawn also orderd Humphrey to serve 14 months probation with continued psychiatric counseling. Humphrey's public defender.

### High court overturns death sentence

TALLAHASSEE - The Florida Supreme Court overturned Thursday twin death sentences given a man convicted of murdering an elderly Putnam County couple, ruling that procedural errors by the trial judge warranted a new sentencing hearing.

In a unanimous decision, the court said Circuit Judge Robert Perry improperly limited Manuel A. Colina's attempts to pin the blame on a co- defendant who turned state's evidence, and also violated guidelines by citing an apparent lack of remorse in sentencing Colina to death.

The unsigned court decision says Perry's rulings unfairly prevented Colina's lawyer from trying to show that his client had been dominated throughout the crimes by Felix Castro, who received two life sentences in a plea bargain.

Regarding the remorse issue, "We clearly and unequivocably said almost four years before the trial of this case that lack of remorae should have no place in the consideration of aggravating factors," the court said.

The errors were not serious enough to undermine Colina's conviction, the court said. But the justices did order Perry to conduct a new sentencing hearing.

According to court records, Colina and Castro, after smoking crack cocaine, visited the home of Cecilia and Angel Diaz to collect some money they owed Castro for some work.

They ended up tying up both people with a clothealine and beating them to death. They then stole cash, jewelry, liquor, a television and the couple's car to buy more drugs and liquor before fleeing to Texas, where they were Colina's lawyer tried to elicit testimony from

his client regarding statements made by Castro about the murdered couple, to suggest Castro might have been the real force behind the crime. But the judge ruled it would have been impermissible hearsay. The high court said the testimony was

intended to show Castro's threatening behavior toward the couple and should have been admitted.

#### Report: One-fourth of Florida car owners lack insurance coverage mandated by law

TALLAHASSEE - Twenty-five percent of the cars on Florida's roads lack mandatory insurance, but a crackdown on uninsured motorists prompted more than 46,000 to buy coverage. according to a report released Thursday.

However, even the threat of having their driver's licenses and vehicle registration canceled hasn't persuaded a hardcore group of uninsured motorists to obey the law, the report says.

The Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles' computers list nearly 36,000 motorists who face having their license tags seized if caught driving because they have gone without insurance for more than 30 days, the report says.

But only 42 motorists have actually suffered that sanction.

"That's a small number, no question about it,"

department spokesman Ed Birk said.

There are more than 11 million licensed drivers in this state, so the odds of catching any one of those 36,000 is really low," he acknowl-

"There will always be uninsured motorists out

there. It's just the nature of the beast and the magnitude of the problem," said agency chief Leonard Mellon. The progress report on Florida's mandatory

insurance law was presented to Gov. Bob Martinez and the Cabinet, who accepted it without

Since July 1, 1968, insurance companies have been required to notify the state of all policy cancellations. The motorists are given a 30-day grace period to buy another policy. Then they become subject to losing both their driver's licenses and their vehicle registration.

WASHINGTON - Roman Catholic worshippers will hear more gen ter inclusive Biblical texts during the mass but God will still be generally referred to with a masculine pronoun under new guidelines adopted Thursday by the National Conference of Catholic Bishops.

The more than 300 bishops, ending their annual four-day fall meeting, adopted a set of princi-ples and a set of guidelines aimed at translators of those verses from the Bible that make up the lectionary - the threeyear cycle of Bible texts publicly read each Sunday.

For example, the passage from Hebrews 5:12, which in the New American Bible reads, "You have forgotten the exhortation addressed to you as sons: ' My son, do not discipline of the Lord ..." will be heard when read at worship as. "You have forgotten

the exhortation addressed to you as children: 'My child, do not disdain the discipline of the Lord

In approving the new guidelines and principles, the bishops are following in the steps of most mainline Protestant churches in efforts to make the language more inclusive and less male-oriented.

But the proposal was bitterly fought by some bishops.

"I'm opposed to inclusive lan-guage," Auxiliary Bishop Austin Vaughan of New York flatly told the meeting. "I believe our people have worshipped effectively for 1,900 years without inclusive language."

He said the move, long sought by many women in the church, "is part of a trend to defeminize women" and when that is accomplished, "men will become less masculine."

But Archbishop Oscar Lipscomb of Mobile, Ala., chairman of the committee that drafted the guidelines, said the church must make the Bible as accessible as possible to all people while remaining faithful to the original texts.

"If the Word of God is not somehow 'user friendly." he said, "we have betrayed what we are all about."

Also on Thursday, the bishops heard a pledge from Bishop Joseph Imesch of Joliet, Ill., that his committee will continue to press forward in writing a pastoral statement on the concerns of women in the church and soci-

The proposed pastoral was to be debated at this meeting but was pulled from the agenda in September under the direction of the Vatican which expressed some dissatisfaction with the

Imesch and his committee have been struggling for seven years with the statement, drawing fire both from feminists and traditionalists.

And despite some reports that the letter has been killed. Imesch anid, "the pastoral ... is alive and well although it is taking a well-deserved subbatical."

# Atlantis blastoff lights up sky

CAPE CANAVERAL - The five-man crew of the shuttle Atlantia settled down to a clandestine day in space today with no word

on when the antronauts might release a top-secret spy satellite into orbit.

"It looks like we're off to a good mission." said Forrest McCartney, director of the Kennedy Space Center, "We're just delighted with it. We think it's a great gift for the country ... something to be thankful

With skipper Richard Covey, 44, and co-pilot Frank Culbertson, 41, at the controls, Atlantis rocketed away at 6:48 p.m. EST Thursday to kick off a four-day mission, the seventh and last fully classified shuttle flight planned by NASA.

While details could not be immediately confirmed, Atlantis was thought to be

carrying a spy satellite that might be used to support Desert Shield operations in the Persian Gulf region after the spacecraft is checked out in orbit, a procedure that

typically takes a month or more.

When the astellite might be released into space was not known, but sources said before blastoff the spacecraft might not be deployed from Atlantia's cargo bay until the second or third day of the mission.

NASA officials will not discuss operational details under a Pentagon-Imposed security policy and all radio traffic between the

Space agency officials planned to release a statement late Friday to announce the day Atlantic will glide to a landing at Edwards Air Force Base, Calif., but an exact landing time will not be revealed until the day before

Reliable sources, however, said the mission was scheduled to last three days, 23 hours and 55 minutes, resulting in a landing at Edwards at 3:43 p.m. PST Monday, assuming the astronauts have no

problems launching their payload.

Reporters and outside space experts. drawing on a variety of sources, speculated before launch that Atlantis's payload was either a photo-reconnaissance satellite or an electronic envesdropping spy station capable of intercepting military communica-

Atlantis was launched into an orbit that will carry it 28.5 degrees to either side of the equator, well south of Iraq.

Such orbits typically are used by highaltitude electronic eavesdropping satellites. but Aviation Week & Space Technology

magazine reported last month Atlantis was carrying a satellite equipped with a variety of sensors, including digital cameras that could be used to spy on the Persian Gulf region from a 460-mile-high orbit.

John Pike, a space policy analyst with the Federation of American Scientists in Washington, disagreed with that conclusion.

Based on Atlantis's announced 28.5-degree orbit, he said, "The payload was a 'Magnum' signals intelligence satellite to be used to pick up radio and radar

While details about the satellite could not be immediately confirmed, NASA Administrator Richard Truly said last month Atlantis was scheduled "to fly a crucial — particularly these days crucial — national security mission," strongly hinting the payload will somehow be used in the Iraqi

Atlantis's liftoff came four months after the shuttle was grounded by a hydrogen fuel leak that blocked a planned July launch. But it appeared to be clear sailing Thursday as Atlantis turned night into day with a picture-perfect climb to space that was visible for hundreds of miles around.

"Roll program. Houston!" Covey radioed mission control as Atlantis wheeled about to

line up on the proper trajectory. "Roger roll, Atlantis," astronaut Michael Baker replied from Houston on a backup UHF radio channel monitored by reporters at the Kennedy Space Center.

# Magellan's signal lost, regained

PASADENA, Calif. - The Magellan spacecraft, on a mission to map the planet Venus, experienced a 40minute signal loss Thursday. its third since it went into orbit around the planet in

August. The Jet Propulsion Laboratory at Caltech in Pasadena said the craft's signal was lost

for 40 minutes beginning shortly after 9 a.m., as Magellan was on its 825th orbit around Venus.

One of the spacecraft's two radio signals was restored about 9:40 a.m., but the second high-gain antenna remained pointed away from Earth, officials said.



# Long shadow

Whenever William Gennett leaves a highprofile job, his successor inevitably suffers by comparison. Few officials in Washington use the government pulpit as effectively as Bennett does. Education Secretary Lauro Cavazoa is still trying to emerge from Bennett's long shadow. And the nation's next drug czar will probably have the same

When Bennett came to Washington nine years ago, he proceeded to establish himself as a tough-talking conservative with a flair for publicity. His talent for framing complex issues in catchy phrases was particularly evident during his stint as education secre-

Almost at once, Bennett wrested the debate over educational reform from the pedagogues. prompting a lively and informative debate about teaching and learning. An unabashed defender of high moral standards, his booklet "Schools Without Drugs" remains one of the government's most requested publications.

When Bennett was appointed by President Bush 18 months ago to formulate and direct the nation's first comprehensive anti-drug strategy, skeptics said he had taken on an impossible task. Within days of assuming office, he targeted Washington as the first battleground. Although that battle has been largely unsuccessful thus far, it at least underlines a new federal commitment to clean up the capital.

During his term, Bennett visited various drug-infested neighborhoods in various cities, conferring with police chiefs and patrolmen. He frequently acolded academic and elected officials who wanted to legalize drugs. He persuaded President Bush to ban imports of semiautomatic weapons favored by drug

He also toured schools and drug-treatment centers, praising the good work being done there. He oversaw the establishment of boot camps designed to rehabilitate first-time drug offenders. And his personal crusade for tougher drug laws paid off earlier this week in Alaska, which just voted to recriminalize marijuana.

When Bennett became drug czar, he stated his intention not to stay in the job too long. The White House has denied reports he is leaving because of disputes within the administration. Whatever his reasons for resigning, we can only hope that William Bennett has not aworn off government service

#### Middle-age motherhood

Medicine has now reset the biological clock for motherhood. Researchers at the University of Southern California announced a few days ago that they had helped four postmenopausal women give birth to healthy babies. The new technique, involving the implantation of donated eggs and the use of hormone treatments, offers exciting possibilities to postmenopausal women who want a chance at motherhood.

"There may be 50-year-old women who should be able to do this," Dr. Mark V. Sauer,

one of the researchers, said.

Perhaps. But medicine's work is not complete. How about some medical miracles for 45-year-old backs, to help them cope with removing a thrashing 32-pound toddler from the cookie aisle of the grocery store? How about a balm to aid creaking 48-year-old knees forced to crawl under the bed in search of missing Legos? And please don't forget an elixir for 55-year-old memory cells asked, at homework time, to recall quadratic equations and the subjunctive conjugation of French verbs. Wombs artificially stimulated to sustain a pregnancy in middle, age are a nice trick, but, for motherhood's sake, don't stop

# Does America have the will to fight?

Before President Bush gives the signal for an all-out attack on Saddam Hussein's Iraq. I hope he satisfies himself on one point that is critical to success: Does the American nation any longer have the guts to fight and win a war?

Please don't misunderstand me: I am by no means convinced that the answer to that question is "No." But our experience in Vietnam, plus various other considerations of even more recent vintage, certainly make the question a legitimate one. If we are going to commit our troops to a bloody desert war, let us first be very sure that our national will is up to the test.

Actually, I don't happen to believe that the Vietnam War proves otherwise. The doves like to think they won that argument, sapping America's will with their interminable starches. think they won that argument, sapping America's will with their interminable sinrches, etc. But polls taken at the time make it clear that they never represented a majority of the American people. The majorities that ultimately opposed the war always included a large segment that would have been delighted to see it pursued aggressively, but were diagnosted with Lyndon Johnson's healtation walts.

When Nixon ordered the bombardment of Hanoi, Le Duc Tho hot-footed it to the Paris peace conference so fast he won the Nobel Peace

Price. The "accords" reached there would have preserved the status quo ante, and were republished by the North Vietnamese only when

the Democratic Congress crippled Nixon so thoroughly that he couldn't or-der retailation

But that brings me to my first serious concern. The American people have got-ten to thinking it's clever or amusing. or something, to give the presidency to the Republicans and Congress to the Democrats. The Vietnam disaster was an early example of the sort of partisan brawl that can lead to, even if the result te an ignominious defeat for the nation.

that risk in the Middle East? If, for whatever reason, the war stretches out into a long. bloody semi-stalemate, must we watch while the congressional Democrats grow more interested in inflicting wounds on George Bush, and earning Brownie points with the voters for their masterly hindsight, than in pushing the struggle on to a successful conclusion?

And how about the American people? Listening to TV commentators muse about the possibility of "American boys coming home in body bags." one can foresee all too clearly the kind of "war coverage" that will flood American homes night after night. No civilian population has ever had to face such a barrage, and it is fair to ask how long a society as diverse and compassionate as ours could be expected to stand it.

Certainly, I have been surprised at the number of otherwise typically conservative friends of mine with sons of military age who are showing up on the "anti-war" side of the Middle Eastern question. To be sure, it's been nearly threequarters of a century since the American people went to war of what might plausibly be called their own volition (don't forget that we were abruptly kicked into World War II), and maybe the will to do so has simply died.

### Advances in Year of the Woman

BOSTON - On the morning after the night before, an assortment of political analysts came out, red-eyed and bleary to check the condition of the portrait they had drawn. This was the season they had entitled "The Year of

In 1990, they said, more women were running for office than ever before. In 1990, "their issues" would be hot. In 1990, "their votes" would count.

In the early light, the big picture was still littered with undigested data, with gender issues and gaps, with women candidates and voters. The post-election image was a bit more complicated than the simple strokes that had been made earlier. But a pretty interesting portrait was emerging.

How did women do as candidates? Looking at the top of the ticket, Wendy Sherman, the executive director of Emily's List, a women's fund-raising outfit, said: "We haven't exactly shattered the glass reiling. But we've thrown a few sizable boulders through it."

The most sizable boulders were the three women who made it into the governor's mansions: Ann Richards of Texas, Barbara Roberts of Oregon and Joan Finney of Kaneas.

The Richards victory was especially sweet. After a brutal and battering Texas-style campaign, she best the Bubba and his bank account and did it with the votes of women. The women's vote went for her 61 percent to 39 percent, with a gender gap as big as the

On the other hand, Dianne Feinstein, even in defeat, came within a whicker -- 100,000 votes out of seven million - of being governor of California. And most of the women who ran and lost for the Senate against incumbents proved they were serious contenders instead of sacrificial lambs.

But the news is in what sportscasters like to call "the field." As Sherman says, "We're beyond the tokens and beyond 'The Remarkable Woman' who breaks through the pack. It's not like there are five women out there and that's all we've got. The field is very deep."

This year there were 85 women running for statewide offices. Of these 51 women won. There were so many women running for licutenant governor — 19 in all — that the races sometimes looked like the evening news-anchor team. In five states, coed teams ran against each other. There are now six women lieutenant governors, ten secretaries of state, three attorneys general and 12 women in charge of the coffers as state treasurers.

The long slow process of waiting and running, the stop and start of politics has begun to work in women's favor. When the openings come, women are in the pipeline.

At the same time, the old arguments used against women seem to have lost some of their clout. Ten years ago, the very word "competence" was a synonym for male. "The concern about whether women could do the job," says political analyst Ethel Klein. "seems pretty much eliminated."

In fact, says Klein optimistically. "the voters are more than happy to have women run. Corruption and honesty are much more salient issues. And there is an added edge that women have about honesty and hard

work.

"Leadership" is still sometimes used as a code word to help male candidates, especialy in races that hinge on the so-called "macho issues" of war and foreign policy. But

that, too, seems to be losing its certainty. Even "money" is

gradually changing hands. Few women candidates raised as much as their male opponent, but they are finally getting serious money. The most visible, like Richards and Feinstein, broke the gender record for donor dollars.

As for the year of the woman as voter? Women's votes made the difference not only for Ann Richards, but for Barbara Roberts, and a number of men, including the new progressive senator, Paul Wellstone of Minnesota. In Massachusetts, in the last week of the governor's sace, women seemed to lead the undecideds away from John Silber to help Bill Weld squeak to victory.

The picture for 1990, then, was not exactly a revolutionary poster. The Year of the Woman collided with another Year of the Incumbent. Whenthesentimentis toss-'em-all-out-but-mine, seatholders have a powerful edge and most of them are male. So the Senate next year will have only two women out of 100. The House will have only 29 women out of 435, and there will still be only three women in the governor's job.

But if you're looking for the boulders, keep your eyes on the ranks. There are a lot of women aiming for the glass ceiling.

### Merchant sailors lack right gear

WASHINGTON - Some American sailors have been forced to sail into the Persian Gulf without protective gear to shield their skin from the chemical bombs of Saddam Hussein. They aren't the sailors of the U.S. Navy, but they think they are entitled to the same protection.

They are the civilian sailors of the U.S. Merchant Marine. pressed into service in the Persian Gulf crisis to carry supplies to the U.S. troops in Saudi Arabia. It's tough enough that many of the ships they have been assigned to are rust buckets that haven't seen serious action in years. If the sailors are going into a hot spot in less-than-prime vessels, they want all the protection they

can get. Our associate Scott Sieck has obtained a cable from one merchant vessel to the Navy in which

assigned to are rust buckets. the crew begged for proper gear. The cable was from the ship Cape Archway to U.S. officials in Naples, Italy, sent as the ship was in the Mediterranean Sea en route to the Persian Gulf. The cable detailed the shortage of chemical-protective gear including gloves, chemical detection kits, masks and decontamination kits. The commander who sent the cable said the equipment was "important to the morale of my crews." Then he ended with a biting reminder. "This is the third

assistance." A spokeswoman for the U.S. Maritime Administration, which oversees the civilian fleet, said that the safety gear was finally delivered to the Cape Archway at sea. She acknowledged that during the early stages of Operation Desert Shield, resources were stretched to the limit.

The merchant mariners are low on the priority list for those limited resources in part because they are at the least risk of being harmed should war break out. For security reasons, the Pentagon won't say where the ships dock to unload their supplies. But officials insist that the ports are out of harm's

The merchant vessels also have the option of staying out of range of Saddam's weaponry during most of their mission. They shuttle in and out with supplies, while the Navy ships must remain in a wartime posture in the Gulf. And Saddam is not likely to waste his chemical potshots on moving ships when he can aim for sitting targets in the desert.

But those caveata don't put the merchant mariners completely at ease.

Their role in Operation Desert Shield has been plagued with exceptions to the rules. We reported earlier that the Iraqi invasion of Kuwait caught the Maritime Administration off guard. The agency oversees a fleet of reserve ships for carrying cargo during national emergencies.

Mechanical problems and the overall poor condition of the fleet slowed the flow of supplies to the Gulf, including tanks, artillery and basic goods. The delays were com-pounded by the fact that the Pentagon's cargo-delivery schedule was designed to respond to a threat from the Soviet Union or a war in Eastern Europe, not a confrontation in the Middle East.

The Cape Archway was among the crippled ships. It had to stop in Bermuda for about a week for repairs.

While the county notifies school officials of pending development approvals, school officials do little more than supply a form letter in-dicating whether nearby schools are overcrowded. A school official has attended only one or two of the weekly development review meetings during the last three years, county officials said

Tuesday.
"The level of direction is wholly inadequate." Furlong said Tuesday. "And it's not just the fault of the BCC (board of county commissioners.) I think the school board has been pretty lax too."

Furlong will be sworn in as a county commissioner Nov. 20. but he sat in on the county planning worksessions Tuesday since he will be voting in March to adopt the revisions to the county comprehensive plan. Commissioner Sandra Glenn, ousted by voters Nov. 6, did not attend the worksession Tuesday.

Furlong said the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council is considering placing an education element in their regional growth plan to en-courage Central Florida counties and cities to coordinate development with school capacity in a similar way adequate roads and water facilities are required to be available when homes are built.

Leslie Banks, chief of the ECFRPC general planning section, said the council is considelement in their growth plan. but no decisions have been made. She said the element would encourage local governments to work more closely with school officials to assure adcquate school space will be available when homes are completed.

Banks said the element would not require local governments to follow the guidelines, however.

Commissioners have been reluctant to pursue including schools in their growth plans because school officials had no money to build the dozens of schools they mid was needed just to meet current-resident needs. County commissioners said they can't turn down a new development based on school overcrowding because they can't control new school construction.

When the \$520 million school bond issue failed at the polls in February, school officials adopted a \$2 tax increase to begin building new schools but they say that won't meet the full school needs of the county.

County planners recommended increasing communication with school officials, including creating a joint planning committee to address development issues, but Furlong was not happy with the proposal.

"We ought to abandon all this coordination belony and have the administrations meet regularly to define the needs and how to address them." Furlong said.
"There's been a lot of talk over the years but it's just not accomplishing anything."

The Sowetan claimed to uncover "a warren of clearing and safe houses, holes in the border fence called highways, handlers and a carefully planned trans-port network for bringing teenage boys and girls" into South Africa.

The Weekly Mail said most of the slaves were girls aged from 14 to 17, enticed by offers of work or shelter but sold to men in townships in eastern Transvaal province and around

The newspaper cited the case of 17-year-old Jabulile Masuku. first "repeatedly raped" by her slaver and then "sold as a concubine to a man old enough

It said boys were most often sold to peasant farmers, made to work long hours and given no remuneration.

The Sowetan quoted an unnamed welfare worker in South Africa's eastern nominally self-governing black tribal territory of Kangwane, home to many refugees, as saying "many of the refugees... are killed for muti" - a form of ritual sacri-

But the Weekly Mail said investigations showed that despite their hardships, most of the former slaves and people still in bondage they had interviewed would choose to remain in South nca rainer than return to strife-torn Mozambique.

Right-wing rebels of the Renamo movement have fought the socialist government and ravaged the countryside since . shortly after independence

NEW YORK - A forensic anthropologist assisting the exhumation of a possible saint in a lower Manhattan graveyard said he was "encouraged but cautious" that the remains the former slave have been unearthed.

#### Gorbachev in crisis speech at parliament

MOSCOW - Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev, making the most important speech of his political career, called Friday for a new union of Soviet sovereign republics and consolidation to pull the country out of crisis.

A record number of journalists and diplomats, who jammed the press balcony, attended the Supreme Soviet session inside

People stood in the aiale and at least 600 gathered around three television monitors for an anticipated debate between

Gorbachev and his main rival Boris Yeltsin. "There has never been such a huge crowd," said an usher at the Supreme Soviet.

Gorbachev, whose approval rating sunk this month to 21 percent, immediately addressed himself to the crisis in the country and denied that he lacked a plan.

The Soviet president also criticized "speculation being spread in the country about imminent hunger and lack of fuel for the winter."

#### Thatcher on the defensive

LONDON - Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher went on the defensive in her battle to retain control of the ruling Conservative Party, saying she was considering changes in Britain's widely unpopular poil tax.

Former Defense Secretary Michael Heseltine is trying to unseat Thatcher in a party vote next Tuesday by appealing to Conservatives' concerns about their re-election prospects in

polls that must be called by mid-1991. Heseltine has hit hard on Thatcher's resistance to plans by the other 11 nations of the European Community to unify markets and nations, and her government's poll tax, a levy denounced as inequitable because it is a flat fee on the people unrelated to income.

WASHINGTON - U.S. and Saudi forces began Persian Gulf military exercises Thursday that will reach as close as 25 miles to the Kuwaiti border in maneuvers billed as non-provocative but called "imminent Thunder.

Scheduled to end the day President Bush arrives in the Red Sea town of Jeddah for a Thankagiving Day visit with U.S. forces, the exercise will include a mock amphibious assualt about 100 miles south of Kuwait and a link up of Marines and Scudi troops about 25 miles from the border.

The exercise will include Army, Navy, Air Force and Marine Corps units along with Saudi Air Force, navy and marine units, Nearly all Air Force units in the region will have some role in the exercise.

The Pentagon did not specify the size of the U.S. military force involved and left it to Saudi Arabian officials to disclose their own participation levels. But officials did say at least 1,000 Marines and 1,100 U.S. aircraft will participate as will 16 Navy ships.

Defense sources said the most foward unit was a small Marine combat groupequipped with tanks. It will work a little more than 25 miles south of the Kuwati border with a Saudi unit to make sure that allied forces successfully linkup and operate together. Described by Pentagon spokesman Pete Williams as the "most comprehensive, most ambitious" exercise so far in Saudi Arabia. the operation will feature an amphibious landing roughly near the town of Juball, a

port and industrial facility on the gulf coast. Pentagon officials would not discuss intelligence aspects of the operation, but it is believed that electronic envesdroppera would watch for the Iraqi reaction to the exercise. U.S. and Saudi units will also work to test their command, control and communication abilities. Iraqis in Kuwali were expected to be atraining to learn what they could of the operation.

The amphibious exercise was the third to be conducted by Marines in the region.

WASHINGTON - The Republican National Committee laid off about 25 percent of its workforce Thursday in a postelection "restructuring."

In a brief statement, the committee said the roughly 75 cutbacks were part of "organizational changes to gear down from a midterm election and gear up for the 1992 cycle." It said the reduction was the same as one the committee had in 1987, following the last midterm election.

The RNC has about 300 fulltime employees. In addition, an unspecified number of part-time employees reportedly were being

Mary Matalin, chief of staff for the RNC, said the laid-off employees would be paid through the end of the year.

Party officials denied that the cutbacks were related to the GOP's performance in last week's election.

Overall, the party lost one Senate seat and nine House scats in the balloting. While that was far below initial party hopes. the midterm performance was better than usual for a party controlling the White House.

In announcing the layoffs. Matalin said "all RNC employees are to be congratulated on Joba extremely well done."

#### 'You Know It's True': Milli Vanilli lied

NEW YORK - The man who produced the Grammy Award

winning album for the dancing duo named Milli Vanilli has admitted the pair did not sing on their 1989 album, prompting industry officials to consider withdrawing the award. The president of the National

Academy of Recording Arts & Services said Thursday he may strip the duo of their Grammy if it can be proven the pair did not sing on the record. Frank Farian, the German

arranger who produced "Girl You Know It's True." - winner of the 1969 Grammy for Best New Artist - Thursday admitted he hired other singers to perform on the record.

Farian also confessed that the duo, Rob Pilatus and Fab Morvan, "lip-synced" their way throughout live and video performances.

Farian said he kept the information from Arista Records. which put out the debut album. The record's credits list Pilatus and Morvan as singing on all

The album, including the hits "Girl You Know It's True," and "Blame It on the Rain," sold 7 million copies.

"I feel like a mosquito being squeezed," Pilatus told the Los Angeles Times. "The last two years of our lives have been a total nightmare. We've had to lie to everybody. We are true singers but... would never allow us to express ourselves."

Farian, who fired the pair

Wednesday at a press conference in Munich, Germany, owns the name Milli Vanilli.

"We were afraid for two years that this day would come." Pilatus said. "We've cried about it sometimes, that the secret might come out. But deep inside, we wanted it to happen. I'm happy now that I can talk to our fans about it. We won't let them down. I swear we will soon have an album out with our own voices on it which will prove our talent."

Michael Greene, president of the National Academy of Arts & Sciences said Thursday his organization had not realized that Pilatus and Morvan had not performed on the record.

The academy relies on recording credits presented by record companies, Greene said

Challenges to the legitimacy of Grammys are not made until "a body of evidence is presented that compels the Academy to review their legitimacy," according to Greene.

He said if it is established that the Milli Vanilli album credits were falsified, "we will then take this matter to the National Awards and Nominations Committee for their consideration as to the disposition of the award in question."

Farian said he was forced to go public when the young dreadlocked singers asked to sing on their second album.



# Coping with a mild bladder inflammation

DEAR READER: Interstitial cystitis is a non-infectious inflammation of the bladder lining. causing painful and frequent urination, often with blood. These symptoms are identical to those caused by acute cystitis, a common bacterial infection of the bladder for which antibiotics are used. The cause of interstitial cystitis is not known. however, and antibiotics are useless in treating this affliction. Interstitial cystitis and acute bacterial cystitis are differentiated by a urine culture.

The preferred therapy for interstitial cystitis is electrocautery: A urologist passes a lighted tube through the urethra into the bladder and selectively burns inflamed por-tions of the bladder lining. This is usually effective but must be repeated at intervals to relieve symptoms. Your prognosis is good, although you will probably continue to have periodic attacks





As little as Q-x-x-x of spades, K-x of hearts, and a minor-suit ace would suffice. Over four hearts, North and not cover the queen. Covbid five diamonds to show his ering an honor with an honor is own first-round control. That placed South in a sink-or-swim position. If he bid only five spades, it was unlikely that North could carry on to six with the right heart holding. So, counting on North to have the right hearts, South bid the slam. The defense started right with the lead of the club queen. Declarer ruffed the second club. played three rounds of spades ending in dummy, and then led the heart queen, hoping to catch

East with K-x of hearts. West now scored his singleton king to set the slam. It was unfortunate that declarer reached a ridiculous contract. But he should have at least given himself a chance to make it. Forget that East might have K-x of hearts one of the basics of card play. Instead declarer should play for a layout that would allow him to succeed. The answer is simple if either defender has a lone
