

CROSS NATION RAIL SYSTEM IS SEEN NEAR

Van Sweringen Brothers Have Only One More Short Link To Acquire In Project

CLEVELAND, Mar. 11.—(AP)—Formation of America's first transcontinental railroad system under control of O. P. and M. J. Van Sweringen is near completion, it was learned by financial circles here today. Only one more rail road is needed to complete the Van Sweringen system, more than according to the prediction of various railroad financial observers.

Already in control of a large railroad system covering 10,000 miles from the Atlantic to the Mississippi River, the Van Sweringens, according to financial circles, have acquired recently a working control of the Missouri Pacific system, which covers important trunk lines in Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, and Arkansas, and connecting with the International Great Northern railroad at Mexico to Laredo, Texas.

The Missouri Pacific system has been acquired through the purchase of common stock and convertible bonds.

The only remaining link believed necessary to join the Atlantic and Pacific by a railroad system under the Van Sweringen management is the Western Pacific line from Salt Lake City to San Francisco.

The transcontinental system is being owned by railroad interests in Delaware, Lackawanna and Western, Buffalo to New York, Norfolk and Western, St. Louis, Missouri Pacific, St. Louis to Pueblo, Colo.; Denver, Rio Grande and Western, the 15 Salt Lake City and Western Pacific, from Salt Lake City to San Francisco.

Cattle Rustlers In South Florida Are Caught By Sheriff

SARASOTA, Fla., Mar. 11.—(AP)—Cattle rustlers using methods employed in the old days of the Far West are active along the Myakka River in south Florida, Sheriff W. A. Jerns said today in reporting the arrest of two men.

Charles O. Rine, 35, and "Red" Anderson, 25, of Punta Gorda, were caught slaughtering a steer after the carcass of a rifle had been found in their backwoods camp. The sheriff said the men were heavily armed and had been successful without any real resistance.

Evidence of rustling was received by the sheriff several days ago and the hunt started. The rustlers remained in the backwoods until a camp in the dense vegetation along the river was located and the men were taken into custody with evidence that the rustlers had been successful in their work through an accomplice in Punta Gorda.

Air-Mail Planes Set New Speed Records

Frank Andrew covered the 77 air miles from Atlanta to Mexico in 25 minutes. A. P. Kerr covered 216 miles between Miami and Jacksonville in 65 minutes, and Gene R. Brown averaged 151 miles an hour between Atlanta and Greensboro, N. C. Kerr averaged 200, and Andrew 180 miles per hour.



BRADENTON, Fla., Mar. 12.—On their record at pennant races in 1926 and 1928, the St. Louis Cardinals have had sufficient interval to furnish impetus to another pennant drive.

Their new manager, Charles (Gabby) Street, is looking for a pennant with a quiet confidence and supplies for the concern for the short-shift experienced by his late club of predecessors.

Some people may not think we have a chance to win, remarked Street, the manager, who is president of the organization, but I believe we have had in recent years.

Under Street, it will take more than the optimism, more than the excellent record of past performances to put the Cardinals in anything approaching a contending position this year. The club's extensive "farm system" has failed to produce all the replacements needed to check the decline of the two-time championship machine. With only a few changes, some of which have not been made, the Cardinals are the same team that Rogers Hornsby piloted to the pennant in 1926 and Bill McKechnie led to the top in 1928. The veteran pitching staff, featuring Willie Shaw, Jess Haines and Clarence Mitchell, has gone somewhat rapidly downhill with no immediate replacements in sight to measure up to their old awards.

If anything is to be accomplished this year by the Cardinals, it is that they are a stick in the foot, they must, however, at least two of three new pitchers, capable of carrying on where the veterans wear out. Gabe Street, who handled Walter Johnson last year in the days of the Cardinals' decline, knows his job. He has a good idea of what he needs to do to make an effective team out of the material on hand. Of the primary concerns, Street said, are:

Sylvester Johnson, a coming eight-hitter, is only 23 and should be a mainstay. Jim Lindry, who had a fine season with Houston, one of the Cardinals' farm boys in the last of the new year, is a big right hander with fast stuff.

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Mar. 12.—A grand parade of former holders of the Open Golf Championship will be offered here March 20, 21 and 22.

Every open title holder since 1922 except Bobby Jones will participate. Not less than six former kings, professional golfers and \$100,000 in additional prizes, dangling in front of them, one of them, Jack Hutchinson, the royal Scot, won both the Amateur and British open, the former in 1927 and the latter in 1924.

First comes Gene Sarazen, the only little caddy, who is back after a season's trip through the south, stepped into fame and fortune by upsetting the cove for a pair of goldfins. In the same year he repeated his feat by the veterans by winning the P. G. A. championship and repeated his victory in this division in 1924. Mahatma Devotees Depart Upon Third Day Of Their March

NAWAGON, India, Mar. 14. (AP)—Mahatma Gandhi, Indian nationalist leader, left here at dawn today with his 79 devotees for their third day's march to the salt fields at Jalapur, in inaugura-

tion of the movement for Indian independence. They arrived shortly at Vasa and intended to proceed to Matra where they will halt for the night.

In an address before the village at Nawagon Gandhi congratulated the eight head men who resigned in protest against Vallabhai Patel's imprisonment. He ex-

horted them to manufacture and to wear homespun cloth and to volunteer as civil resistance workers. His exhortation for severance of government connections also brought about resignation of police head constable at Vasa and Mahatma. The villagers voted in Gandhi's presence not to fill the vacancies.

Mayor Of Hialeah Testifies In Court At His "Rum" Trial

MIAMI, Fla., Mar. 14—(AP)—Mayor John P. Grethen of Hialeah, testified in United States district court today that ill feeling had prompted testimony given against him yesterday in his hearing on charges of conspiracy to violate the national prohibition law.

Grethen, A. K. Ewing, former Hialeah police chief, and William P. Ennis, now chief of police at Hialeah, went on trial yesterday. Witnesses testified that they conspired with liquor traffickers to violate the prohibition law and that they took for their own liquor confiscated in raids.

A rebuke administered to Walter Maddocks, former city judge of Hialeah, for stealing liquor brought the breach between him and Maddocks after which Maddocks threatened him, Grethen said. He further testified that Maddocks had made a "proposition" to him to dispose of a seized liquor through government agents. When he refused the offer, Grethen said, Maddocks told him he would have government agents "down on him" in the future.

Threats also were made by J. J. Quinby, former chief of the Hialeah Police Department, that "he and federal men would get me," Grethen testified. This threat, he said, was occasioned by his action of discharging Quinby.

Cole Blease Says Postoffice Jobs In Dixie Being Bought

WASHINGTON, Mar. 14—(AP)—The allegation that postmaster jobs were being sold by Republican officials in South Carolina with the knowledge of Postmaster General Brown, was made in the Senate today by Senator Blease, Democrat, N. C.

Blease said the postmaster general "ought to be sent to the Senate when he knows that they have been paid for." He spoke after Senator Brookhart, Republican, Iowa, had notified the Senate that tomorrow he would submit to the Senate a final report on the investigation of patronage conditions in the southern states by the postoffice committee.

Demanding to know why Blease had not placed his charges before the investigating committee, proposed to go over the evidence of Blease and if it warranted, to reopen the inquiry.

"I don't bring it to the committee's attention," said Blease, "because if it has done anything I don't know it. I want action and I am going to get it."

Quack Surgeon Of New York Stripped Of Title By State

CHICAGO, Mar. 14—(AP)—The State of Illinois has stripped the title of "doctor" from Henry J. Schireson, self-styled "greatest of plastic surgeons."

An order revoking Schireson's license, signed yesterday by Michael F. Walsh, director of education and registration, culminated charges brought by Miss Salye Holland that Schireson induced her to submit to an operation "to straighten her bow legs." As a result of the operation, it was necessary to amputate both legs.

Dr. M. L. Harris, president of the American Medical Association, headed the state medical committee which heard the charges against Schireson.






