Minefields Hamper British Advances In North Africa

Rommel Continues To Retreat As Allies Raid Enemy-Held Ports In Tunisia

(By Associated Press.)
Under a lashing attack by 600 American and Allied warplanes, survivors of Rommel's Africa Corps today were reported to have retreated more than 40 miles from the collapsed El Aghella front, with the British army in rapid pursuit. Perilous stretches of minefields, however, have somewhat hampered the British push. Allied planes strafed the heavy Axis flares through the night.

Italy's high command announced Allied planes last night again bombed Naples, the major port for supplying German-Italian armies in North Africa. The communique further noted heavy bombing in Tunis and Sousse. Axis held ports in Tunisia, reporting more than 200 were killed, and hundreds injured in Tripoli, which was once a pirate stronghold, and is now the last bastion of Mussolini's crumbled African empire.

One hundred American fighter planes laden with bombs hammered Marshal Rommel's retreat line. Axis forces yesterday in the El Aghella sector in the greatest fighter-bomber offensive yet in Africa, and presumably they were continuing these punishing blows last night on the Germans and Italians.

Reds Send Nazis Back Six Times On Moscow Front

Finland Does Not Try To Make Peace, Says Stockholm

(By Associated Press.)
In Russia, Hitlerites threw a fresh reserve into battle on the Moscow front, but the Russians declared they sent the invaders reeling back six times in that sector and repelled a series of bitter German counterattacks below Stalingrad, while from Finland the earlier reports that Finland had made peace advances through Sweden met official denial in Stockholm.

The Soviets said the Germans lost 10,000 men in the large southwest of Stalingrad and 600 more in an attack near Voronezh, and reported gains by their own assault troops in the factory area of Stalingrad and in general on the other fronts.

Forty-two German planes, 12 of them transport ships, were downed Sunday, the communique added as the Germans continued to bring up reinforcements by air to troops fighting in the latter end of Soviet winter.

At the cost of heavy losses, the Germans were acknowledged to have succeeded in pressing back our detachments somewhat in the counter-blows southwest of Stalingrad against one arm of the Soviet pincers reaching out to trap 300,000 Germans ponding at the Volga city.

Vice Admiral Says Entire Fleet At Toulon Was Sunk

Permit Given To Sanford Company To Run Bus Line

(By Associated Press.)
The 57 ships of the Toulon fleet were sunk, Vice Admiral Sir John S. Dill, commander in chief of the British Mediterranean fleet, said today.

The admiral's statement, which is the first to come out of the British command since the evacuation of the fleet from the port, says that the 57 ships were sunk by German bombers on the night of November 27, 1942.

The admiral also said that the British fleet had been in the process of being evacuated from Toulon since November 27, 1942, and that the evacuation was completed on December 3, 1942.

Allies Capture Jap New Guinea Stronghold, Buna

Bombers Assault New Enemy Troops Two Points Up Coast

(Associated Press.)
The United States Army today captured a major Japanese stronghold at Buna, New Guinea, after a two-day battle. The capture of Buna, a strategic port and air base, is a major blow to the Japanese in the New Guinea campaign.

Allied bombers assaulted New Guinea coast today, hitting two points further up the coast. The attacks were reported by the U.S. Army.

Ralph A. Smith Presides At Annual Gathering Of Boy Scouts

Ralph A. Smith, U.S. Senator, presided at the annual gathering of the Boy Scouts of America held in Sanford, Florida, today.

The gathering was held at the Sanford Hotel and was attended by a large number of scouts and leaders. Senator Smith gave a speech during the ceremony.

Washington, Dec. 15. (AP)—Navy Secretary Knox said today the Naval Board of Inquiry is making a "very thorough investigation" of the loss of the 21,936-ton former liner President Coolidge while it was operating as an Army transport in the Solomon Islands area recently.

Tennessee's Harmonica System Will Show Up In Sugar Bowl

By WILLARD YARBOROUGH AP Features KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Dec. 15—A smooth orchestra on the players' bench would make Tennessee's Volunteers feel at ease next Sugar Bowl Day at New Orleans. For half times would harmonize perfectly with Tennessee's unique offense, which stresses rhythm and more rhythm.

The Tennessee system, as developed by former head coach Col. Bob Neyland, who learned his football as a West Pointer, involves tricky reverses that necessitate split-second timing for execution. Without this timing, or rhythm, the Volunteer ground attack is nil.

Cosch John Barnhill, who learned this system as a Tennessee player and later succeeded Colonel Neyland when the latter entered the Army two years ago, is a fundamentalist too. He stresses Tennessee, as Tulane University will learn New Year's Day, relies mainly on its running attack to produce the necessary yardage.

This ground game yields to aerial thrusts only when the rhythm falls to open holes in the forewell of the opposition, or when blocking is weak.

"Our main weapon, is the running attack," Barnhill declared. "This offensive football has always paid touchdown dividends and we have no reason to change our tactics at this stage of the game."

Tennessee is powerful in the air too, as many strong opponents learned the past season. Fordham and Louisiana State boasted passing acts in Steve Filipowicz and Alvin Dark, respectively, but the Volunteers handled sufficiently to beat both at their own game.

The two-team system, which makes Tennessee somewhat invulnerable in itself, has been carried over from Neyland's Virginia. This year there is but little difference in the Vols' first and second teams. One is just as powerful as the other on the offense, with the first stringers carrying the stronger on the defense. The teams usually alternate each quarter.

Hutson Is Sure, Guarded Player Of Pro Football

By DILLON GRAHAM AP Features SPORTS Editor NEW YORK, Dec. 15, Don Hutson is perhaps the only player in football who is thoroughly guarded on every play. Most teams assign two players to watch his every step—and even then they seldom are successful.

He is almost as valuable to the Green Bay Packers as a decoy, as he is as a pass catcher. As one rival coach mumbled, Hutson is football's No. 1 unsolved problem. No matter what defense you set up against him, he'll score against you.

Up to this year, New York was the only team that had held him scoreless on passes. Don decided to shatter that jinx. So, when the Packers came to the Polo Grounds a few weeks ago, he not only scored two touchdowns, but he tied the league record for 14 pass receptions in a single game.

The Giants had two men on him—behind him. They figured it was impossible to keep him from catching passes and their job was to tackle him quickly and keep him from scoring. Only near the goal did the Giants concentrate on breaking up the pass.

This slim, tall, almost frail-looking end probably will soon be voted professional football's most valuable player, just as he was in 1941.

His performances during the season just ended were perhaps more spectacular than in any of his eight years in the pro game. He broke a record—generally his own—every time he caught a pass.

In his last game against Pittsburgh, he booted a field goal that brought the Packers' triumph. He also kicked three points after touchdowns for a season's total of 33, bettering by two points the old record held by Automatic Jack Mander.

Here are some of the league records Hutson set this year: 138 points scored, 74 passes caught, 17 touchdowns, 1,215 yards gained on passes caught, 14 passes caught in one game, in the Don Looney's mark, 72 touchdowns passes caught in his career, 5,530 yards gained in his career.

The Chicago Bears are the best team in football and George Halas, who coached them last year and part of this season, is perhaps the smartest tutor. In the western division playing last in 1941, the Bears had 12 different defenses designed expressly for Hutson. They assigned three men to him.

Hutson brings grief to any man assigned to guard him. He has several speeds or changes of pace. He is a past master of feinting and faking.

He catches a football like Tris Speaker use to catch fly balls in the outfield. He can glance over his shoulder, judge the distance of the pass, strike out running, and then stretch his hands out to get the ball at the last second, and just at the right time.

No matter what you do against Hutson, it generally turns out to be wrong.

Without him, the Packers probably would have been just another team rather than in the runner up to the Bears in the western division.

With all credit to Hutson, part of his success must be attributed to his passer, Cecil Isbell. Isbell is one of the best passers in the league, some say as good as Sammy Baugh, and his accuracy in pitching makes pass catching

National League Operation Is Not Affected By War

By SID FEDER WASHINGTON, Dec. 15, (AP)—Professional football's "big show" the National League—decided Monday to continue operations during the war, but failed to hold the regular draft of college players, which annually provides the material to operate with.

In their regular December meeting, a brief affair that lasted less than two hours, the 10 club owners or their representatives voted unanimously to keep right on going, "subject, of course, to whatever regulations or conditions might arise." Yet, they adjourned the meeting without making the usual selection of 200 graduating college players, which is the one reason the class was called.

With about 200 of their players already in military service and more reporting almost daily—even
