## Jobless Rate Dips To Lowest Level In 3½ Years

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The nation's unemployment rate fell to its lowest level in 3½ years in April as Vietnam War veterans and coal miners led a blue-collar surge of one-half percent.

The 6 percent unemployment rate last month was the lowest since October 1974 when it was 5.9 percent. The jobless rate stood at 6.2 percent in February.

Settlement of the 110-day coal strike boosted mining employment by 170,000 in April to its highest level in a quarter of a century. The department estimated nearly 900,000 miners were employed last month.

The large gain in jobholders and the drop in the politically sensitive unemployment rate will give President Carter more room to expand anti-inflation activities. Large hikes in wages and prices this winter and spring have boosted the cost of living at a near 10 percent annual rate.

Despite temporary setbacks for job seekers from the coal strike and bad winter weather, the department said 720,000 workers found employment between January and March.

"Most of the advance took place among adult women," it said in a recent analysis of labor force development in the first quarter.

The department also noted that blacks accounted for about 40 percent of the increase in new job holders. The surge dropped the black unemployment rate a full percentage point to 12.3 percent — nearly twice the 6.2 percent quarterly rate for all workers.

The unemployment rolls were cut by 600,000 persons in the three-month period, the department said.

Although black unemployment fell, the department said the gains were experienced mostly by men. There were smaller gains for black women while conditions worsened for teen-age blacks.

The problem of black unemployment is not of recent vintage and is not improving. The Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City, in a recent analysis of teen-age unemployment, noted the number of jobless blacks, 15 or under, has doubled in the past decade.

The bank said there was an annual average of 820,000 unemployed teens in 1967 compared with 1.7 million in 1976. The Labor Department estimates 1.6 million teens were jobless in the first three months of this year.

The jobs rate for these veterans was 7.5 percent a year ago compared with 7.2 percent for nonveterans. Last month, the jobs rate for Vietnam vets was 4.5 percent compared with 6.5 percent for those without military experience.

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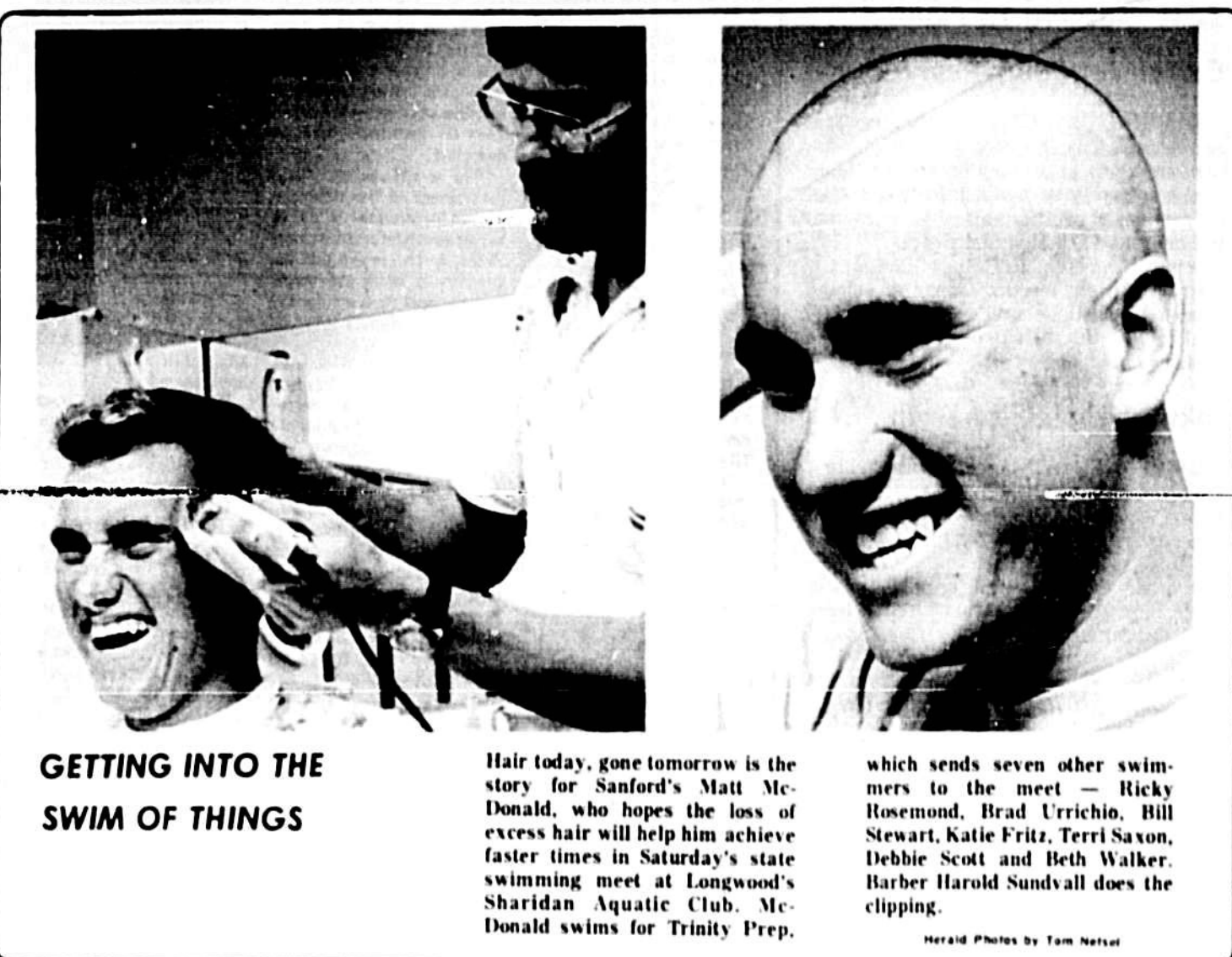

Seminole County did not completely escape the severe weather that plagued much of Central Florida Thursday.

Heavy rains caused temporary flooding in many Seminole County locations and lightning and strong winds resulted in power and telephone outages.

Casselberry Waste Water Treatment Plant reported 2.3 inches of rain Thursday.

Florida Power and Light spokesman John Higgins reported one large power outage in the Osteen area from 11:30 p.m. to 7 p.m. after a tree fell, breaking a primary line.

## But Permits Await Commitments Plant Site Gains Lake Mary OK

Site plan approval, usually the last obstacle before construction is permitted to begin was given by the Lake Mary City Council for the Horian manufacturing plant off Lake Emma Road, immediately south of the National Cash Register plant, Thursday night.

But the city council decided to hold up the construction start until executed documents are received from Detroit industrialist Richard Horian. The documents are to include dedication of a 17-foot-wide strip at the front of the six-acre site, for future widening of Lake Emma Road, and commitment to pay portions of paving costs to four-lane the road in the future and to pay part of the

costs of future traffic signalization.

Horian agreed to the commitments in late March when he made a trip from Detroit to talk over his plans with the city council. Mayor Walter Sorenson said the construction should not be held up for long, just long enough for Horian to execute the agreements and mail them back to the city.

City Attorney Gary Massey said, however, that the site plan is "officially approved" and a building permit will be issued as soon as the formal agreements are in hand.

In other business, the council:

— Heard Councilman Pat Southward report that owners and real estate brokers have submitted 10 parcels for consideration for purchase as a new city hall site. She said additional parcels are being

solicited by the committee which includes herself and Councilman Lillian Griffin.

— Voted unanimously to authorize consultants on federal grants. Mr. and Mrs. Harold Hunter of Gainesville, to file preliminary applications for a federal grant of \$150,000 for drainage plans and solutions.

— Mrs. Southward said the grant, if approved, would be received over a three-year period from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) model cities program. The first \$50,000

would be used to prepare a comprehensive drainage study, she said, with the second and third grant of \$50,000 each to be used for actual construction.

— Adopted a resolution to be forwarded to the state Department of Transportation, with copies to Seminole legislators requesting Lake Mary Boulevard be designated a primary state road in the state program.

The resolution notes that Lake Mary Boulevard from U.S. 17-92 to I-4 is used mostly by persons driving into, out of and through the city rather than mostly by city residents.

Twice a week for the past two years a group of seemingly normal people have gathered at Seminole Community College and proceeded to hit and kick each other about the head and body.

Result: Plenty of action and determination, but very few injuries and occasional tempers flaring.

The group of 20 to 25 is studying the popular Oriental martial art of karate under the direction of Fred Kelley, a 3rd-degree black belt.

Kelley, a resident of Altamonte Springs, has been studying karate for 30 years and has been teaching it for 15 and has the Martial Arts Academy in Casselberry as well as his class in the SCC Leisure-Time program.

One of his students is a young woman who stands about 5 feet tall and goes by the single name Kellie. The Casselberry resident has been studying karate for 14 months and has earned a green belt through concentration and many hours of practice. She likes it because it is "an individualized sport."

When fighting each other or in competition, students wear protective gloves and cushions over hands and feet to prevent injuries but one must still pull punches.

"You've got to practice control," says Kellie. "If you're dead, you can't be state champ."

Another woman taking the class is Linda Kelley, Kellie's wife.

"I started taking lessons for conditioning and for exercise, but now I enjoy it for the sport. It was also about the only way I could get to see my husband, since he's so busy teaching it," she explains.

"We also use it to take out our marital disagreements," laughs the attractive brown belt.

## 'Incredible Hulk': Deaf Ex-Footballer

The idea of making television shows out of comic book stories is by no means new — witness the success of "Superman," "Batman" and "Spider-Man."

However, the newest of these, "The Incredible Hulk," is in many ways a departure from the norm established by its predecessors.

The show is based on the Marvel Comics hero, who first appeared in 1962. Bill Bixby, star of the show, agreed to do it only after being assured that the comic strip series would be treated seriously, and would avoid the ludicrous and bizarre.

Bixby plays scientist David Banner, who has been exposed to a massive dose of gamma rays while doing research on the incredible feats of strength people are sometimes capable of while under stress.

The exposure appears to have had no effect, until Banner's anger is aroused over something, and then he is transformed into a huge man-beast with enormous strength.

As his temper cools, he returns to normal. With the aid of a fellow scientist, Bixby tries to find something to reverse the spell, but his efforts are constantly thwarted by a nosy and sensationalist reporter who works for a local tabloid.

"The creature isn't really evil," stressed Bixby. "He is no huge and powerful that everyone who is exposed to him expects him to be a villain. I liken him to a person under hypnosis — he will do anything during his metamorphosis as the Hulk that David Banner, my role, would not do."

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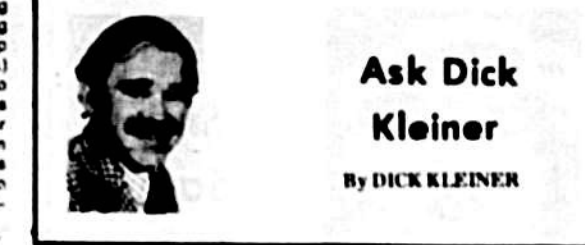

**Hattaway Predicts Senate Bill Defeat**

**Seminole Harness Track Future On The Line**

They're calling it "The Year of the Horse" at Seminole Harness Raceway. Robert Hattaway of Altamonte Springs said he doesn't think the bill would pass.

Which is exactly the feeling of present management at Seminole.

Actually, it's the year of the state legislature because pending legislation on a bill introduced in the Florida Senate to pave the way for greyhound racing to replace harness racing in Casselberry will decide the future of the track. It also will have a strong impact on the pari-mutuel industry in Central Florida.

The story so far has Paul Dervaes representing a group of Jacksonville businessmen who have plumped down a \$100,000 down payment toward a \$3.5 million pro-rata on Seminole Harness Raceway.

The deal is contingent upon the bill passing, which would enable the group to convert to greyhound racing.

The plot hardly thickens, however, with speculation that the bill will fail. State Rep. Robert Hattaway of Altamonte Springs said he doesn't think the bill would pass.

Which is exactly the feeling of present management at Seminole.

"I don't understand why the bill got to the Senate floor anyway without track management even being consulted," said track manager Neil Makin Thursday night at the season opener, which drew a crowd of 3,310 fans who wagered \$118,672, both opening night records.

About the proposed switch from harness to greyhound license, Makin commented, "It would be a severe blow to Florida's harness racing industry. Pompano Park is going strong, running from November until mid-April. Horsemen take two weeks off, come here and race until September. Horses have to rest a while, and by then they are ready to go to Pompano again."

"I see this operation turning \$300,000 in mutuel handle

on weeknights and close to \$500,000 per night on weekends in five years. This will bring us into the major league of harness racing. It will also bring a lot of horsemen here to live year round."

Principal owner Paul Bowen did not want to comment on the sale of the bill. He admitted being miffed by the premature announcement from Dervaes, an officer with the Washington County Kennel Club near Ebro. If the sale

was revamped to propose summer racing, with a season similar to the harness track's. That move is opposed by the Sanford-Orlando Kennel Club in Longwood and dog track and 1972-73 season officials in Daytona Beach.

Considerable attention has been brought to the proposed bill because it was introduced by a senator who does not represent Seminole County.

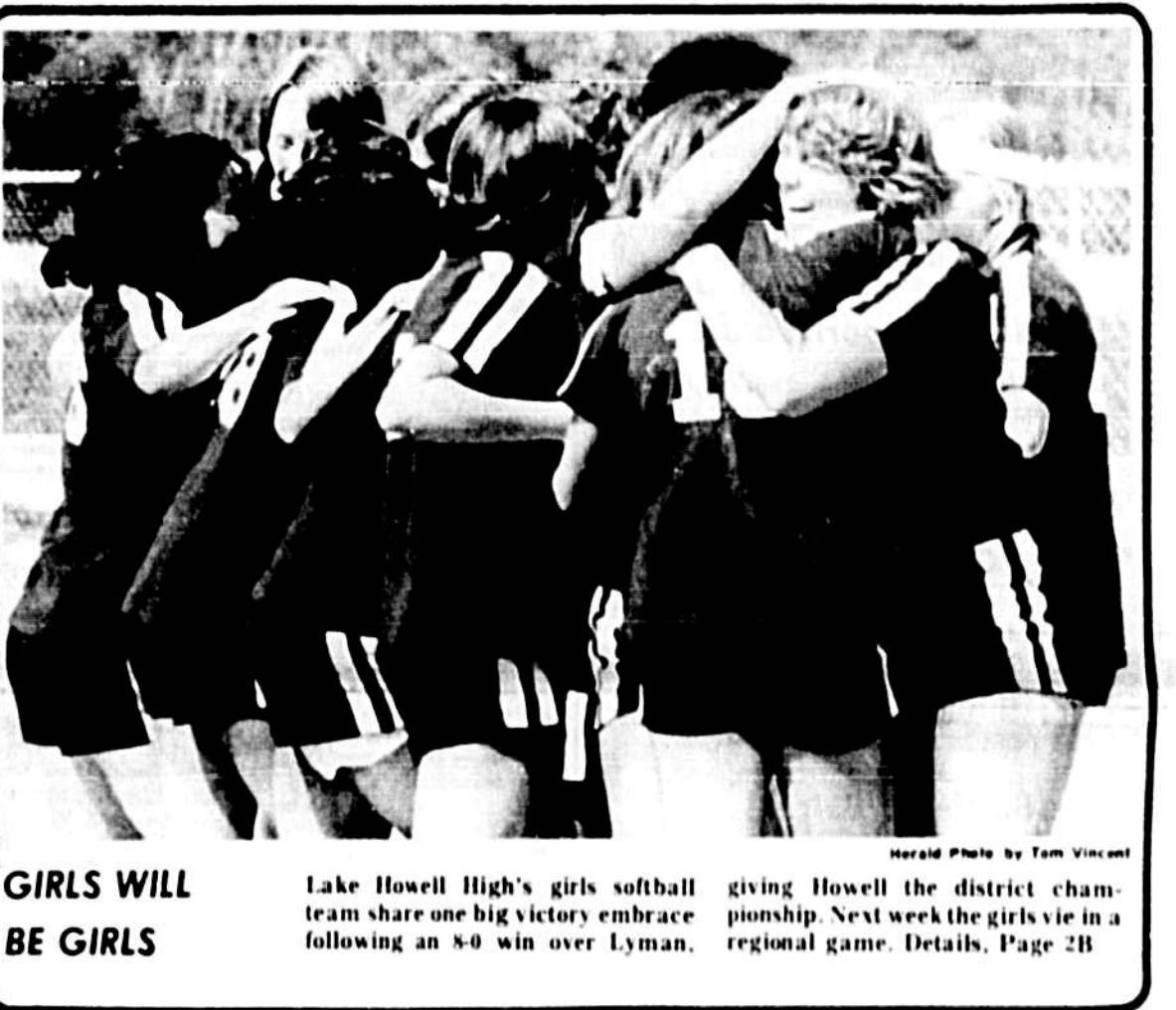
Sen. Ken Plante of Winter Park was approached to introduce the bill, but refused.

Dan Scarborough, D-Jacksonville, introduced it. Two years ago he introduced a similar bill which led to conversion of Gator Downs in St. Augustine to Bayard, now a successful dog track.

Florida's coffers profit to the tune of \$90 million per year from the pari-mutuel industry. Seminole County's most successful operation, the Sanford-Orlando Kennel Club, paid the state \$3,091,379.92 for the recently completed season.

**Perspective**

Primary opposition to the proposed bill is coming from Central Florida pari-mutuel plants. Originally, the bill proposed dog racing in the fall, opposite the season of the Orlando-Seminole Jai-Alai in nearby Fern Park. The bill went through, it was to have been announced in November.

**Seminole's Utility Fee Ruled An Illegal Tax**

A \$35 per month license fee levied by Seminole County on water and sewer utilities in the county was struck down in a ruling issued Friday by Circuit Court Judge Kenneth M. Leffler.

The ordinance authorizing the fee is invalid, according to Leffler's ruling, because there is no law authorizing counties to impose gross receipts taxes on utilities.

The ruling came as a result of a suit filed by the Florida Public Service Commission (FPC). The suit, which named the Seminole County Commission as defendant, contended the fee was an illegal tax because it is applied to utilities not regulated by the county.

Former assistant County Attorney Gary Siegel advised

County Attorney Harry Stewart expressed dissatisfaction with the ruling and said he might recommend the commission file an appeal.

"I would have to study this ruling thoroughly before I can make a recommendation," said Stewart immediately after reviewing Leffler's decision.

"But I can tell you that it is very likely that I will recommend we appeal this."

In rendering his judgment, Leffler determined the license fee levied on the utilities is indeed a tax.

"The law applied to the foregoing facts shows that the utility license fee imposed by Seminole County... is a tax..." wrote Leffler.

The judge also noted "there is no general law granting to counties the power to impose a gross receipts tax on utilities. Therefore, said ordinance and see UTILITY, Pg 1A

**Court Reporter Admits, But Defends Double-Billing**

Seminole County Court Reporter Norman Robbin had admitted double-billing the county and state for the same work, during fiscal year 1975, but defended it as a practice authorized by the circuit court at that time.

Robbin and other officials in the 18th Judicial Circuit, which includes Seminole and Brevard counties, were criticized for "questionable" record-keeping practices in a newly released audit by Assistant State Auditor General Bob Syms. It covered from July 1, 1975 to June 30, 1976.

State law provides court reporters will be paid \$5,400 base pay per year for a maximum of 60 hours per month.

Robbin and three court reporters in Brevard County billed both the county and state for the same initial 60 hours of work each month, according to the audit.

"I have concluded that the court reporters in the 18th Judicial Circuit were doubly compensated," wrote Syms, "for the first 60 hours of their efforts per month in the total amounts shown in the following tabulation."

Robbin, \$8,367.08; Emile Richards, Gerald F. Ryan and Betty George, \$8,440 each. Robbin is the only Seminole court reporter. The others named are from Brevard County.

"At the time, the \$5,400 was just paid to the reporters as

a part of being the official court reporter," wrote Robbin. The \$5,400 was construed to be a retainer fee, according to Robbin.

Since the audit, judges of the circuit court have adopted a general order prohibiting double-billing. However, a previous general order in effect at the time provided for the double-billing, according to Robbin.

"Every penny paid to my office by Seminole County was paid according to that (previous) administrative order," said Robbin. Every voucher submitted from Robbin was authorized by the public defender, state attorney or a

circuit judge, he said.

"Mr. Syms misinterpreted the facts," Robbin said of the officer who performed the audit. "The judges chose to have payments to my office made by the previously used method. The supreme court said the judges of any circuit may determine the rate schedule for court reporters."

Robbin also billed the state for hours worked beyond the initial 60 hours per month, according to the audit.

Robbin received \$5,207.20 from the state for those ad-

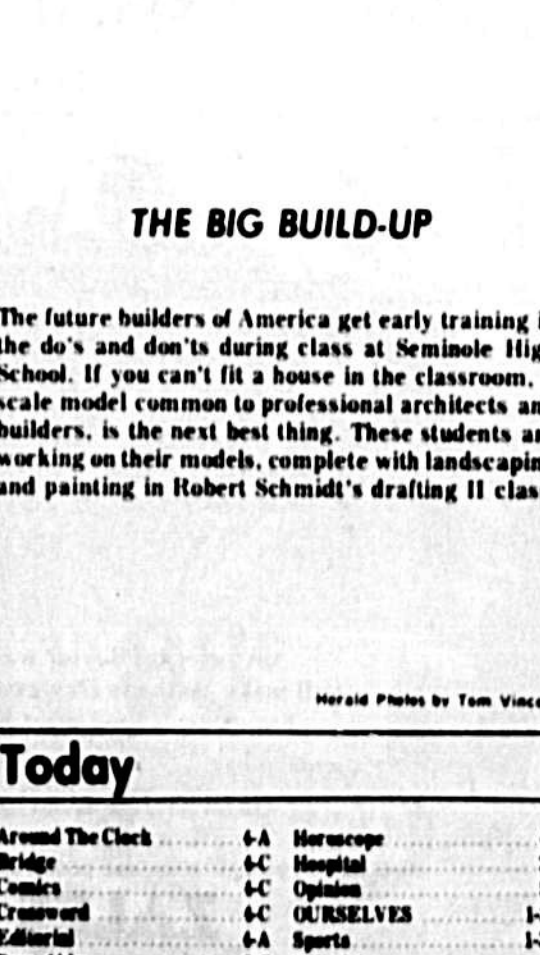
