## Local politicians' popularity Two straw poll picks reveal no clear choices

With only one exception, incumbent candidates came out as winners last night at the Seminole Hob Nob, just the opposite from last week's straw poll by the Christian Coalition.

The Hob Nob, held at the Shrine Auditorium in Maitland, is considered the annual premier gathering event for political candidates and supporters.

Wayne Weinberg said there were over 2,200 people attending the event. "We certainly had a great turnout of political candidates," he said. "with many of them bringing groups of supporters."

Weinberg explained that each person was allowed to purchase either Democratic or Republican ballots to make their selections. "Each individual was allowed to put

one ballot in the box," Weinberg said. "Then Sandy Guard (Seminole County Supervisor of Elections) and some of her staffers counted the ballots just as they would in an official election."

The only incumbent who did not receive a majority of votes cast last night was for the top spot in the

## City officials cautious over 17-92 road redevelopment

SANFORD — While officials are moving forward in planning the redevelopment of the U.S. Highway 17-92 corridor through Seminole County, members of the Sanford City Commission are calling for caution.

Members of the 17-92 committee made a presentation to the Sanford City Commission this week, during a work session. Among committee members on hand for the discussion were Chairman Paul Partyka, Vice Chairman Larry Strickler, and Consultant Gary Dickinson.

The project would involve the Seminole County Commission, and the cities of Sanford, Lake Mary, Longwood, Winter Springs, and Casselberry.

Partyka explained that following the establishment of the 20-member committee, the next step is to determine an assessment of need and establish some initial cost figures.

"There should be no doubt that the development of the Highway 17-92 corridor is a critical component in Seminole County," Strickler commented. "We don't need another South Orange Blossom Trail in Seminole."

Strickler told the commission that the way this would be financed would be through a CRA (establishment of a Community Redevelopment Agency).

## Taking a swipe at paying GreeneWay tolls

SANFORD — Travel on the GreeneWay has always meant digging desperately through your pockets or purse for coins as you approach a toll booth.

That no longer has to be the case for those who zip back and forth across the eastern stretches of Seminole and Orange counties on

the expressway.

Beginning Sept. 9, the Florida Department of Transportation's Turnpike District will begin offering the convenient E-PASS, so popular in Orange County, to drivers in Seminole County.

The E-PASS system of toll collection for patrons of the GreeneWay (State Road 417) allows them to have their tolls electronically deducted from a pre-paid

account as they move through the toll plazas.

More than 70,000 drivers swipe their E-PASSes through toll plazas in Orange County already. That number is expected to double when the cards become available in Seminole County next month.

The E-PASS system is being offered through an agreement with the Orlando-Orange County Expressway Authority.

Unlike on other portions of State Road 417, Seminole County will only offer E-PASS users the option of utilizing their draft system in certain toll lanes. In other areas, all toll lanes have the capability of accepting E-PASS users.

To make it easier for patrons to set up E-PASS accounts, the service center for these passes will set up two remote installation events in

## Convention over, 81-day scramble for votes begins

SAN DIEGO — Bob Dole charges from the Republican convention into an 81-day scramble for votes, scorching President Clinton's administration as a corps of elitists "who never grew up, never did anything real." Dole's first stops: four states carried by Clinton four years ago.

Presidential adviser George Stephanopoulos sought to deflect the "never grew up" accusation today saying, "We're determined not to make age an issue in this campaign."

"The real victors in this convention were Pat Robertson and Pat Buchanan," Stephanopoulos said this morning on NBC's "Today." The two conservative leaders "controlled the platform, they control Republican policy, no matter what you heard from the podium," he added.

Dole's tax-cut proposals also drew a prompt rebuke from Sen. Christopher Dodd, D-Conn., chairman of the Democratic National Committee.

"It's a remarkable turnaround. In 35 years, if you were a Democrat and tried to spend money without paying for it, you had to face Bob Dole; and if you were a Republican and tried to cut taxes without paying for it, you had to face Bob Dole. ... He would have been the first person to criticize the very plan he's now the champion of," Dodd said on ABC's Good Morning America.

After a send-off rally, the march across the electoral map begins in the traditionally Republican Rocky Mountain West with a rally for Dole and running mate Jack Kemp in Denver.

### Reward offered by FPL

**FORT PIERCE** — The owner of the St. Lucie nuclear power plant is offering a \$10,000 reward for helpful information about glued switches in a backup control room after the FBI pulled out of the case.

Federal prosecution would be warranted only if the tampering affected plant operations or compromised public safety, FBI spokesman Paul Miller said Thursday.

Neither condition was met, so the investigation has been left to the Nuclear Regulatory Commission and Florida Power & Light Co.

FPL declared a security alert Wednesday at its plant on Hutchinson Island after workers doing a routine check discovered glue in three locked switches in a control room used if the main control room is unusable.

The alert ended four hours later after a plant inspection determined critical areas were safe.

FBI agents went to the plant after the alert, but "we determined that we really didn't have federal criminal jurisdiction because it really came down to an act of vandalism or tampering," Miller said.

The utility said it could not discuss details of the investigation, but attention focused on employees because of the limited access to the control room.

FPL labeled it a case of suspected sabotage. Another incident was reported three weeks ago when locks and doors were vandalized.

The incidents follow a drop in the NRC rating for the plant over safety and equipment violations and complaints about the effect of job cuts announced last November.

### Quads are parents' dream

**LAKELAND** — John and Michele Bolger wished for a baby for many years.

Now their dream has come true, fourfold.

The couple's quadruplets were born Wednesday, and visitors have been gushing over the three girls and their brother ever since.

"At first it was just kind of shock," said Bolger, a 33-year-old landscaper for Walt Disney World. "That, and we were also a little bit scared."

Michele, 27, fared well during the Caesarian section, he said.

Identical twins Kaitlin Victoria and Kayla Brittany, are doing well, and so are Emily Anne and Jacob Michael, their father said. They weighed from 2 pounds, 13 1/4-ounces to 3 pounds, 15 ounces. Emily was the smallest; Kaitlin the biggest of the quadruplets.

### Developer denied surgery

**FRANKFURT, Germany** — A magistrate court has denied a request to free a jailed property developer for hip replacement surgery, ruling that the possibility he might try to flee was too great.

Juergen Schneider, who fled to Florida in 1984 owing billions of dollars in debts, will be allowed to get the hip surgery at a hospital of his choice, but he must be guarded around the clock as long as he is getting treatment, the court said Thursday.

Schneider, 62, has been jailed in Frankfurt pending his trial on fraud and other charges since he was returned from Miami.

He disappeared with his wife, Claudia, in April 1984 owing debts of \$3.4 billion, according to investigators.

The Schneiders were arrested in Miami in May 1986 and were returned to Germany in February. Claudia Schneider was freed Apr. 4, after the court ruled there was little chance she would flee, although she is charged with complicity in fraud.

Schneider is charged with six counts of credit fraud, bankruptcy fraud and forgery. No date has been set for his trial.

### Deductible change sought

**MIAMI** — Homeowners covered by the state's insurer of last resort could be absorbing a bigger share of the loss when they file claims.

The Joint Underwriting Association wants to raise its standard deductible on homeowners claims from \$500 to \$1,000 under a change endorsed Wednesday by its board.

The state Insurance Department must approve the change and premiums, which have not yet been set by the JUA, currently the state's second-largest insurer with 900,000 policies.

Nationally, the standard deductible on a homeowners policy is \$250, said Jayna Neagle, spokeswoman for the industry's national Insurance Information Institute.

"We don't want to have a policy that provides broader coverage than the market. That's one of the considerations," JUA executive director Jay Newman said Thursday. "Given that the JUA has been operating at a deficit, this is also a consideration from the JUA's perspective."

The JUA actually wanted to bump up its standard deductible to \$2,500, but state Insurance Commissioner Bill Nelson told the association not to even bother submitting that proposal.

# State Public Service Commission approves sewer rate compromise

**TALLAHASSEE** — Customers have won a compromise with the state's largest utility designed to limit rate increases that some consumers face to pay for improvements for others.

The state Public Service Commission ruling Thursday was a result of an outcry — and an adverse court decision — that greeted Southern States Utilities' effort to go to systemwide rates for its 152 water and sewer systems in 25 counties.

About 50 customers traveled to Tallahassee, enduring — after

a bus ride — a nearly three-hour technical discussion of "uniform," "modified stand alone" and "capband" rate structures.

"It's more fair than it was," said Joe Ferrar, of Sugarmill Woods, referring to the plan the PSC adopted.

Typical Sugarmill Woods water customers will see their monthly bills drop from \$17.43 to \$15.10.

That is about what they would pay based solely on their own system's operating costs — and about half the charge under Southern States' uniform rate plan.

Most of Southern States'

100,000 customers will see rates rise, however. The Apopka-based utility won increases from the PSC last week averaging nearly 20 percent for water service and 13 percent for sewer service in 141 of its service areas.

And though the Minnesota Power & Light subsidiary didn't get the systemwide rate plan it desired, spokeswoman Ida Roberts called Thursday's decision a positive step.

"We're glad the case is over," she said. "It was unnecessarily contentious. It's nice to be able to go back to running a utility business."

Parties have 15 days to decide

whether to seek a rehearing. Public Counsel Jack Shreve, who represents customers in rate cases before the PSC, said he still had to study the ruling.

"It's clear to me that we've got customers on both sides of this," he said.

The PSC agreed with a recommendation by its staff that the eventual goal for Southern States should be uniform rates.

The utility said that would let plant-building and operating costs be spread over more customers and even out sharp rate increases to any individual system.

But the 1st District Court of Appeal in Tallahassee rejected that argument in April 1986.

### Science scholarships

Hasan Habibi, a graduate of Seminole High School, and Laura C. Meyer, a Lake Brantley High School graduate, each earned scholarships from the Seminole County Medical Society. ## Zile trial may re-start

**BARTOW** — The trial of the man accused of killing his stepdaughter and then faking her abduction may have to start over — again.

Jury selection in John Zile's murder retrial has been underway this week, but defense attorneys say a comment by the Polk County's circuit court clerk has contaminated the jury pool. They want to start over.

Zile's attorneys on Thursday said the entire jury pool, culled from three days of interviews, was contaminated because of remarks Circuit Clerk E.D. Dixon made about "tone" of evidence.

Zile's attorneys said Dixon's comment suggested that the prosecution's case is overwhelming against Zile, who is charged with aggravated child abuse and first-degree murder in the death of his stepdaughter, Christina Holt, 7.

"That clearly implies the evidence is against our client," said Ed O'Hara, Palm Beach County Circuit

Judge Roger Colton said prospective jurors could have interpreted the evidence could have been from the defense as well.

Colton said he will rule on Monday whether jury selection should start over. Colton and lawyers in the case had hoped to seat a jury of 12 and two alternates by Monday and begin opening statements.

This is Zile's second trial. His first trial, in May, ended in a mistrial, with a Palm Beach County jury split 11-1 for a first-degree murder conviction. The lone hold-out wanted a second-degree murder conviction.

Zile's defense attorneys learned of Dixon's comment late on Thursday when a juror said Dixon told 120 people during jury orientation on Tuesday that they should expect to serve three weeks if they were picked for a Palm Beach County murder trial that was moved to Bartow.

Dixon told them there was "tone" of evidence in the case, potential jurors said.

## Parlor offers patrons hot tanning experience

**PENSACOLA** — The owner of a Pensacola business called Exciting Tan is facing sex charges after police accused him of offering customers little tanning but lots of excitement.

"Employees referred to it as a tanning salon; however, one employee said only 1 to 5 percent of the patrons actually left the business with a tan," police Sgt. Chip Simmons said Thursday in a news release.

Instead, women employees would model and dance in the nude and sometimes entice customers to remove their own clothing and masturbate, Simmons said. Models, however, did not physically engage in sex acts with customers and weren't allowed to make physical contact.

Raymond Keith Scott, 23,

the owner, was arrested Wednesday on charges of operating a structure for lewdness and assignation. Both charges are misdemeanors punishable by up to a year in jail.

A city ordinance allows topical dancing but prohibits complete nudity.

"Exposure was part of what prompted the investigation, but what they did after they removed their clothes crossed the line," Simmons said.

He said police had received complaints from patrons, members of the public and employees.

Eight to 10 women worked at Exciting Tan at any given time. They would dance for \$40 but dance nude for \$60, Simmons said.

He said the investigation is continuing and that employees and customers also may face charges.

### Burglary arrest

Sanford police arrested Anthony L. Anderson, 37, of Miami on Wednesday as the result of an ongoing burglary and theft investigation. The cart reportedly contained a small office-type refrigerator. The officer said Anderson was unable to explain how he obtained the refrigerator, and it was confiscated, but Anderson was released. ## Air Force major acquitted in sodomy case

SAN ANTONIO — An Air Force major accused by the military of having a lesbian affair was acquitted of sodomy, a verdict her lawyer called a "courageous judgment" and a victory for privacy rights.

Maj. Debra L. Meeks, 41, was accused of having a two-year, live-in relationship with civilian Pamela Dillard, who the defense called an untruthful predator bent on destroying a military career.

Ms. Meeks also was acquitted

of conduct unbecoming an officer, a charge stemming from Ms. Dillard's claim that the major had threatened her with a gun.

Ms. Meeks put her head in her hands, slumped in a chair and hugged her lawyer when the military jury's verdicts were read late Thursday night after seven hours of deliberation.

"I'm just glad this nightmare is over," a teary-eyed Ms. Meeks said as she emerged from the courtroom. "My dog is at home and I'd really like to go home to my dog."

Prosecutors had no comment.

Defense lawyer Michael Tigar said jurors — all officers of higher rank than Ms. Meeks — issued a "courageous judgment" that should encourage "all members of the military to seek only to serve their country honorably and to do so without undue and unwarranted prying into their private lives."

The military's 1994 "don't ask, don't tell" rule permits gays to serve as long as they don't have sex with service members and keep their sexual orientation and conduct private.

Sodomy, defined under military law, is "unnatural carnal copulation with another person of the same or opposite sex."

Ms. Meeks has refused publicly to disclose her sexual orientation, and again declined to discuss it after the court-martial. "It's my personal, private life," she said.

Ms. Dillard testified that she and Ms. Meeks began having a sexual relationship in Virginia in 1992 and continued after Ms. Meeks transferred to Lackland Air Force Base in Texas. Ms. Dillard claims she eventually moved to San Antonio at the request of Ms. Meeks and was "her wife, essentially."

Tigar, however, said just because Ms. Meeks let Ms. Dillard live in her home while Ms. Dillard did free-lance work and studied for an exam to enter medical school did not mean the two had an affair.

Ms. Dillard testified the relationship began crumbling in

1994 and that a female air force officer become involved with Ms. Meeks.

Jonie Iner, a prosecution witness and longtime friend of Ms. Dillard, said she attended an "engagement party" for Ms. Dillard and Ms. Meeks in April 1992 and that she once saw Ms. Meeks kissing Ms. Dillard's chest.

Ms. Dillard testified her "intense" relationship with Ms. Meeks included oral sex and that Ms. Meeks wrote about it in letters and cards she sent her.

"Those are not the letters that a friend would send to a friend. Those were passionate letters that one lover would send to another," prosecutor Maj. James L. Flannery argued.

Tigar, however, questioned the authenticity of the letters and argued that written words are not evidence of gay sex. Tigar also argued that even if jurors believed Ms. Meeks is gay but didn't think she committed sodomy, they would have to acquit her.

Ms. Meeks could have faced dismissal from the military, loss of her retirement benefits and up to eight years in a military jail if she had been convicted. She had refused a plea bargain offer by prosecutors that she plead guilty to an assault charge.

"This is a proud day for justice in the military," Tigar said. "Major Debra Meeks had the courage to refuse to accept an offer to plead guilty to something she did not do."

## Kevorkian attends 35th suicide

DETROIT — A 42-year-old woman who was said to be suffering from a painful nerve disease committed suicide with the help of Dr. Jack Kevorkian, the 35th death he has acknowledged attending since 1990.

Judith Curren, a registered nurse and mother of two from Pembroke, Mass., died Thursday. Her suicide was the seventh Kevorkian has assisted since his most recent acquittal on assisted suicide charges in May.

Kevorkian, along with his associate Dr. Georges Reding and the woman's husband, psychiatrist Franklin Curren, were present at her death, said Kevorkian's lawyer, Geoffrey Fieger. He did not say how or where she died.

Kevorkian and Reding took the body to Pontiac Osteopathic Hospital at 11:07 p.m., said Dr. Mitchell Garfield, an emergency room physician.

"Some of our personnel helped remove her from a car and put her in a wheelchair," Garfield said.

The woman was pronounced dead and no effort was made to revive her, he said.

Fieger said Curren was suffering from a painful nerve disease, but it wasn't im-

mediately clear what that ailment was.

The Oakland Press, quoting unidentified hospital officials, said Kevorkian indicated Curren was suffering from chronic fatigue syndrome and immune deficiency syndrome.

Calls to Kevorkian's home were met with a recording saying his telephone was disconnected. Telephone numbers for Reding and the Currens were unlisted, and calls to the county medical examiner's office were not answered early today.

Kevorkian, 68, has crusaded for making doctor-assisted suicide available to some terminally or chronically ill people. The retired pathologist has been cleared of criminal wrongdoing in three trials involving five deaths.

Reding, 71, is a member of Physicians for Mercy, a group of Kevorkian supporters.

The previous suicide Kevorkian assisted was that of Elizabeth Mercz, 59, a Lou Gehrig's disease patient from Cincinnati. Kevorkian and Reding took her body to the same hospital Aug. 6.

That same night, Kevorkian's principal legal nemesis, Richard Thompson, was defeated in the Republican primary in his bid for another term as Oakland County prosecutor.

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## 'Pillowcase rapist' hospitalized after mob beating

GARY, Ind. — A man known as Southern California's "pillowcase rapist" two decades ago was in critical condition Thursday, the victim of a mob beating after allegedly trying to rape another woman, a television station reported.

Reginald Muldrew, 47, was severely beaten by the woman's neighbors last week after he tried to break into her home. KCBS-TV in Los Angeles reported Thursday.

Muldrew, who moved to Gary after his release from prison in California, has been hospitalized since Aug. 5, when he was so badly beaten that police used fingerprints to identify him, according to KCBS-TV.

He remained in critical condition Thursday, Methodist Hospital nursing supervisor Leigh Sparks told The Associated Press.

Muldrew was charged with attempted rape, home invasion and robbery. Gary police detectives refused to release any information on the case.

Muldrew, who put a pillowcase over his victims' heads to conceal his own identity, was linked to as many as 200 sex crimes in the Los Angeles area from 1978 through 1978, sometimes several in one night.

He was convicted in 1978 of four rapes and 13 related sex, burglary and robbery offenses and was sentenced to 25 years, but served only 16 years. He spent his one year of parole in prison before being released last December.

## Federal welfare a total disaster

## Beneath-the-radar centerism

SAN DIEGO -- With Bob Dole's choice of "bleeding heart" conservative Jack Kemp, with Colin Powell's upfront pride in his new party, with the emergence of Bill Bennett as a key player in the Dole-Kemp campaign, with Steve Forbes' important role in economic planning within the Dole camp -- it would seem clear that the GOP is headed toward the dynamic center of the political spectrum, which is where the votes are.

But what about the platform? It is said that it is a very conservative document. How often do you find Pat Buchanan and the Washington Post singing from the same choir book? Yet about the nature of the Republican platform they are in synch.

Pat and his spokesperson Bay Buchanan have been in a high spin mode. They claim that the Republican platform solidly reflects the view of the Buchanan brigades. Buchanan's last-minute endorsement of the Dole-Kemp ticket states that the GOP platform actually is "The Buchanan agenda of 1996."

Is it so? Is there a reason for it to be so? During the last two election cycles, Buchanan has run in about 60 Republican primaries. He lost 59. His one victory was by 1 percentage point (in a multicandidate field where his share of the vote was only 27 percent). Moreover, Buchanan's negative ratings are the highest in American politics. Would the Republicans be stupid enough to put themselves in ideological hoc to these particular spinning siblings?

The Washington Post buys the Buchanan view, not just as opinion, but as fact. These are the amazing words of the Post's news story by William Claiborne that ran the day after the convention passed the platform: "The Republican National Convention today adopted a stridently conservative platform...."

Claiborne offers the standard list to back up his bias: pro-life, term limits, flag burning, victims' rights, affirmative action, immigration and welfare.

Is pro-life a "conservative" position? If it is, then is "pro-choice" a liberal one? In any event, the 1996 GOP platform, while clearly pro-life, is marginally less so than the 1992 document. There is an appendix that offers, verbatim, the proposed pro-choice planks. There is a statement that indicates that even a pro-life constitutional amendment would not be punitive to a mother. There is a watered-down version of the so-called "tolerance" idea.

How about affirmative action? The platform endorses, by name, the California Civil Rights Initiative (CCRI) and the proposed Dole-Casady Act. This is cited as evidence that Republicans are really conservative and seek

to kill affirmative action. Yet both the CCRI and Dole-Casady do no more than restate the watershed liberal legislation of this era, the 1964 Civil Rights Act.

How about immigration?

Pat Buchanan is against (illegal) immigration. And so is the 1996 Republican platform. (And the Democratic one.) But Buchanan is against legal immigration. He proposes a five-year total "moratorium" on legal immigration. (Can't you just see it now? It is 2001 and Pat Buchanan is saying, "Great, the five years are up, now let's bring 'em in....") The GOP platform not only advocates legal immigration - it salutes it. ("As a nation of immigrants, we welcome those who follow our laws and come to our land to seek a better life. New Americans strengthen our economy, strengthen our culture and defend the nation in war and peace.")

Those who claim that the platform is animated by harsh conservatism point to its support for amendments for a balanced budget,

term limits, and victims' rights -- and against flag burning. Like it or not, these are positions typically approved by 70 to 80 percent of the American public. Are such proportions of American voters strident conservatives? (The desecration of the flag idea is getting pretty ally at a time when Americans proudly sport flannel designed neckerchiefs, handkerchiefs, shirts, ties, bandannas, instant cameras and cocktail napkins.)

What is happening here in San Diego is the embodiment of the public face of the great stealth movement in recent American politics. That the country has moved toward conservatism has been amply described. But that has only happened because conservatives have been moving toward the center - beneath the radar - on race, on immigration, and on inclusion, offering capitalism with a human face while seeking non-threatening cultural renewal.

Public certification of this tendency and pride in it has come from Bob Dole, who should now be regarded as a serious competitor for the presidency.

## Expansionism must be checked

WASHINGTON -- Recent Chinese expansionism in the South China Sea is no tempest in a teapot. U.S. intelligence sources warn that any further escalation could warrant a military response from the United States.

Central Intelligence Agency analysts are feeling particularly chagrined, sources say, because they missed the most recent sign of that expansionism early last year, when the Chinese built permanent structures on the aptly named Mischief Reef. Mischief Reef is claimed by the Philippines, but is currently occupied by China.

"We missed it because our satellites and interest were pointed to other places," a CIA source explained to our associate Dale Van Atta. That's no longer the case, he said, in part because Chinese military exercises in the Taiwan Strait last March suggested that expansionism has become a "real probability" for China. "We don't want the Spratly Islands to become as well-known in the 1990s as the Falklands were in the 1980s," this source adds.

The Spratly Islands, of which Mischief Reef is one, are a chain of 33 islands, cays and rocks situated between Vietnam and the Philippines -- almost 1,000 miles off the Chinese coastline. Over the last 20 years, the islands have hosted hundreds of occupying soldiers from the countries that lay at least partial claim to them: China, the Philippines, Vietnam and Taiwan. Malaysia and Brunei also claim some of the islands, but have not stationed troops there as aggressively.

Chinese claims to the islands intensified after the United States withdrew from the Vietnam War, and escalated further after the collapse of the Soviet Union left a power vacuum in the region.

Our CIA source shared with us three agency reports, classified "secret," that review past Chinese aggression in the South China Sea, and preview future dangers. "It is apparent that the Chinese consider control of the South China Sea islands as vitally important to their security," one classified CIA report notes. The Chinese have also referred to the region as "an important gate of China," citing the fact that the islands are located on major shipping lanes.

The report adds: "China (says) its claim dates back 2,000 years, citing archaeological and other evidence to support that claim. ... Chinese sovereignty over all the islands (has been) described as 'sacred' and 'inalienable.'" Chinese diplomats are instructed to push this party line at every opportunity, such as cocktail parties and diplomatic functions.

Another reason for the intense Chinese interest is the great wealth believed to be contained in the island chain. Although the Spratlys are geographically uninviting -- uniformly low and flat, with little vegetation -- they represent a rich fishing ground and are believed to lie atop a huge undersea oil field.

The Chinese occupation of Mischief Reef in early 1995 was a direct challenge to the Philippines. Although an American defense agreement with the Philippines could have been used to justify deploying a U.S. naval force to the region, China has always been willing to take such calculated risks.

Since the occupation, Chinese officials have been mouthing words of peace, conciliation and compromise to nervous countries in the region. But the threat remains high.

# Vaccination gap is causing chickenpox, measles outbreaks

WASHINGTON — Outbreaks of chickenpox, measles and other diseases are more likely among American adolescents because of a vaccination gap among the nation's 10- to 12-year-olds, according to infectious disease experts.

Most U.S. infants are getting the series of "baby shots" to protect against most childhood diseases, but vaccines for chickenpox and hepatitis B became available only recently, along with a new requirement for a measles booster shot, medical experts said Thursday.

As a result, there is a vaccination gap among American adolescents who got their "baby shots" before the new inoculation program was in place, said Dr. Steven R. Mouton of the University of Colorado Rose Medical Center.

At a news conference Thursday sponsored by the National Foundation for Infectious Diseases, Mouton and other experts urged parents to get a back-to-school round of booster shots for adolescents who do not have updated immunizations.

Through Aug. 9 of this year, 350 cases of measles have been reported in the United States, a 36 percent increase over the same period in 1995, officials from the Centers for Disease

Control and Prevention said. One in five American children ages 11 and 12 is susceptible to chickenpox because of having had neither the disease nor the vaccine, the experts said.

And more than 30,000 American teenagers a year are now contracting hepatitis B, a liver disease that can be prevented with a vaccine and which can lead to cirrhosis and cancer of the liver.

Dr. Gregory A. Poland of the Mayo Clinic said that measles "is the most contagious disease known to man" and that it poses a real risk of causing lasting disability for some people.

"Measles has shifted from predominantly being a disease of young children to a disease of adolescents and young adults," he said. Worldwide, measles kills about a million people a year, said Poland. The death rate among U.S. measles patients now is one to three per 1,000 cases.

Seventeen outbreaks of measles have occurred this year in the United States, with more than 70 percent of the cases among people older than 10 who have either not been immunized or who have received only a single shot, he said.

"The odds are there will be more outbreaks and there will be hospitalizations and some will die," said Poland. He urged parents to ensure their children

get the needed vaccinations. Chickenpox vaccine was approved by the Food and Drug Administration in 1995. Infants routinely get the shots, but many adolescents are unprotected, said Dr. Anne A. Gershon of the Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons.

Gershon said that chickenpox, or varicella, is not a "harmless childhood disease" and it poses an increased risk of serious complications when it strikes people aged 10 or older. She said the disease causes about 9,000 hospitalizations annually in the United States and about 90 deaths. It can also cause pneumonia and encephalitis, and it can allow infection of the so-called flesh-eating bacteria, she said.

Hepatitis B is on the march, with about 200,000 new infections annually in the United States, said Dr. Harold S. Margolis of the CDC. He said about 70 percent of the new cases are among people aged 15 to 39, with about 30,000 cases among teenagers. About 14 Americans die each day from cirrhosis or liver cancer caused by hepatitis B, he said.

Most infants now receive routine hepatitis vaccinations, said Margolis. But many adolescents and teenagers, who are most at risk, have never gotten the vaccine, he said.

Commissioner Kerry Lyons was the first to voice concern. "We already are saturated with two CRAs," he said. (Waterfront Development and Seminole Towne Center). "Right now, I can't see giving out more tax dollars to another CRA."

Lyons also discussed the billboard restrictions along 17-92 being proposed by the county. "You say you are trying to prevent billboards, then you approve new ones," Lyons commented. "Isn't this talking out of both sides of your mouth?"

"The committee is not pushing details at this time," Strickler responded. "We are looking at the overall project."

"Well, I'm just not in favor of another CRA," Lyons answered.

Commissioner Lon Howell said he is fully aware of the blighted areas along 17-92. "Improvements on the highway could have a good effect on

neighborhoods as much as a block away in either direction," he said. "This will help all of our neighborhoods. And I certainly don't want any Orange Blossom Trail in Seminole County."

Consultant Gary Dickinson said steps to be taken from this point were, (1) determining an assessment of need, (2) take action to create the agency (CRA), and (3) determine the performance projects of the plan. "We have to do all of that before we go to the Department of Transportation for any cost estimates," he said.

Reaction from the commissioners was mixed: "I might go along with this concept," said Mayor Betty Smith. "If it doesn't attack us later."

"This has too much politics in it," said Commissioner Whitey Eckstein. "Until they get politics out, I won't go with any part of this." He also suggested a need for the county to show more leadership in the project.

Presidential candidate Bob Dole received 27.7 percent of the votes while Clinton received 27.9 percent.

Officials said the two factors leading up to the heavy support of Dole were that the Republican Party Convention has been under way all week, and an overwhelming majority of candidates seeking office in Seminole County are Republican.

The presidential balloting received the most total overall votes, 1,242.

The race for Seminole County sheriff drew the second most number of votes at 1,217. Incumbent Don Ealinger obtained 696 for 57.11 percent, while his challenger Joe Becker received 522 votes for 42.89 percent.

In the race for property appraiser, incumbent Bill Suber received 80.04 percent of the votes, with challenger Ben Tucker taking 39.96 percent.

The three-way race for Seminole County commission, Dist. 1, gave incumbent Pat Warren the nod. Out of 1,111 votes total, she received 40.86 percent. Second was Tom Siegfried with 30.24 percent, followed by Grant Maloy with 28.89 percent.

The race for Seminole County commission in Dist. 5 is a four way race among Republicans. Incumbent Daryl McLain took 34.35 percent. Don Nicholas received 23.80 percent with Paul Lovstrand close behind at 23.15 percent. Jean Metta was fourth in the Hob Nob balloting receiving 18.70 percent.

In the race for school board member for District 3, it was incumbent Nancy Warren taking 52.02 percent, against challenger Bob Goff with 47.98 percent.

The only other race in which there is an incumbent is in the non partisan race for Circuit Judge, 18th Circuit. Incumbent Kirby Moncrief took 50.67 percent while Ken Lester received 49.33 percent. The actual difference in the number of votes out of 1,121 cast was 15.

In races where there was no incumbent, School Board Dist. 4 voting went to Larry Furlong with 58.78 percent over Wes Pennington with 41.22 percent. For Circuit Judge, 18th circuit, Group 2, Nancy Alby received 52.55 percent with Marlene Alva taking 47.45 percent.

For Group 4 in the judge race, Carmine Bravo took the highest

Commissioner Bob Thomas however, said the proposal must not be approached with closed minds.

"It's just that we have found it hard to work with Seminole County in the past," responded Eckstein.

"This is exactly one of the problems we've had since the start of this committee," Partyka said. "It's parties fighting each other. We, the committee, have finally agreed with a concept, and now we need the county and cities to agree before anything can get done."

The 17-92 committee plans to continue meeting with other city government during the next few months.

Then, on to Springfield, Ill., and Kemp's hometown of Buffalo, N.Y., on Saturday, and Pittsburgh, Pa., on Sunday.

Dole's uphill quest was fueled by a taxpayer-financed infusion of \$62 million for his cash-strapped campaign. Two thirds of that money — \$41 million — is earmarked for full television ads.

In a tumultuous close to the Republican convention, Dole portrayed Clinton as the leader of a tax-hungry administration that thinks government knows best and lacks the virtues of courage, sacrifice and honor.

"The Clinton administration just doesn't get it, and that's why they have got to go," Dole charged.

Delegates recognized the challenge that lies ahead.

"We're the underdogs but I feel we have the momentum," exclaimed Vermont delegate Walter Freed. "We have the issues on our side."

Maryland GOP chairwoman Joyce Lyons Terhes said, "We have a good shot at it but it's not going to be easy." Rep. William Clinger, R-Pa., warned against a "false sense of euphoria coming out of the convention. The party base has to be energized."

Dole should emphasize his tax-cut proposals, many Republicans recommended. But some delegates expressed concern that Ross Perot's Reform Party could hurt Dole.

Claiming the nomination he has sought for 16 years, Dole told Thursday night's prime-time audience he is a man

"tested by adversity, made sensitive by hardship, a fighter by principle, and the most optimistic man in America."

Point by point, Dole confronted issues used against him — his age, his gruff manner and his reputation as a compromiser. "Age has its advantages," the 73-year-old Dole said. "Let me be the bridge to a time of tranquility, faith and confidence and action."

In a battle with the first baby boomer president, Dole said Clinton was part of "a corps of elite who never grew up, never did anything real, never sacrificed, never suffered, or never learned."

As for his reputation as leader willing to deal, Dole said that "in politics, honorable compromise is no sin. It is what protects us from absolutism and intolerance."

And to those who believe "I am too combative," Dole said, "I say if I am combative it is for love of country."

Twenty thousand Republicans jammed the San Diego Convention Center and embraced their new ticket with roaring chants of "Dole-Kemp, Dole-Kemp." Confetti and balloons filled the air.

Dole lingered long into the night, walking the convention floor to shake hands and cherish the moment. "I liked it," he said of his speech.

Kemp told the convention: "The second half is just starting."

Predictably, Clinton aide George Stephanopoulos trashed Dole's applause-studded ad-

dress, calling it "the most partisan, negative and divisive Republican speech since Barry Goldwater spoke in 1964."

The Clinton campaign placed a major advertising buy in battleground states, attacking Dole as the leader of a party that would slash Medicare.

The Democrats will stage their four-day convention in Chicago beginning Aug. 26. Clinton will try to whip up excitement with a whistle-stop train trip into the convention city.

Dole said Clinton raised taxes after promising to cut them, sat idly by during an explosion of drug use and crime by America's youth and was captive to teachers' unions at the expense of school choice. He also said Clinton had cut the military too deeply, ignored the need for a missile defense system and undermined U.S. credibility by placing American troops under United Nations command.

The nominee's one-time Senate colleague, Republican Thad Cochran, said, "Dole has really created a lot of excitement. 'We've got more energy in our party than I've ever seen before.'"

"We were seven to eight points behind in the polls," said Rep. Dan Schaefer, R-Colo. "It's probably evened it up. It's going to be a horse race down to the end."

Kansas delegate Doug Johnson said of Dole: "He's got to come down hard on Clinton and stress his tax message. Clinton is a louse, and you can quote me on that."

## Preparing for a life serving God

**LONGWOOD** Most college students would leap at the chance to spend the summer in Florida working on a paid internship. But that is not what brought William "Bill" Mills to the Orthodox Church of St. Stephen a year ago.

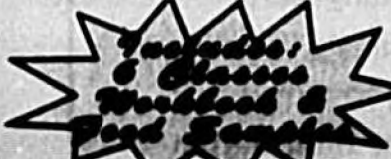

# Pan-American Gold

## Emanski leads USA to 16-Under baseball title

FERN PARK — A gold medal is a gold medal.

While it may not have been earned in the Olympics in Atlanta, the United States still has a gold medal in baseball today.

Tom Emanaki, the owner/operator of Baseball World in Fern Park, led an elite group of 15 and 16 year olds to the championship in the Junior Pan-American Games in Fairview Heights, Illinois, near St. Louis.

And the championship did not come easy as the USA had to battle out of the loser's bracket to win the crown.

But what made the gold medal even more pleasing was the fact that the U.S. beat Cuba twice, believed to be the first time that any team has ever beaten the amateur powerhouse twice in a tournament.

"This (coaching the Pan-Am team) was a new challenge for me," said Emanaki by phone Thursday. "After I coached my school team to the AAU (Amateur Athletic Union) championship three years in a row (1991-1992-1993), I took some time off. But when the opportunity to coach this team and take a shot at beating the Cubans came along I couldn't turn it down."

"We took over eight months to put this team together, recruiting all over the United States. This was a great group of kids. You worry about coaching a group this talented, but they were no problems at all, they were very receptive to coaching."

The USA made a statement right from the start of the tournament that they were here to win as they exploded late in the game to down Cuba 11-5. The USA trailed in the seventh inning.

The USA then put themselves behind the 8-ball in the next game as they dropped an 11-9 decision to Brazil.

But that loss seemed to get the USA fired up as they rolled to six straight victories.

The USA started its title run by blasting Ecuador 33-3. The US hit around twice in the second inning and hit five home runs.

The team followed that up by besting Argentina 16-6, Canada 17-7 and Mexico 17-15 to advance to the final four along with Cuba, Brazil and Canada.

In the semifinals, the USA again beat Cuba, with Matt Roney from Edmund, Oklahoma firing the ball at up to 94 miles per hour in a 5-2 victory. Roney had also beat the Cubans in the first game.

The championship game saw the Americans get a big measure of revenge as Troy Roberson from West Palm Beach pitched the USA to an 8-3 victory over Brazil before over 4,000 fans. Roberson was throwing the ball at around 90 miles per hour.

"Roney and Roberson were the story," said Emanaki. "They both threw complete games (nine innings) and only walked four batters in the 18 innings. The defense was also strong as we only committed two errors (both against Cuba) in the two games."

The U.S.A hit a tournament high .439 as a team and also topped the tourney in earned run average.

"This was a lot of hard work," said Emanaki. "We've been here (St. Louis area) since July 23 and the kids have worked very hard. This was like coaching a "Dream Team." Two of these kids will be sophomores this year, while the other 16 will be juniors in high school. I'll bet that in two or three years 11 of these guys go in the top five rounds in the major league draft."

In addition to Roney and Roberson the team was led by second baseman Clemente Bonilla from Tumachula, California who was named to the All-Tournament team; Jay Perez, a 6-foot-3, 210-pound catcher/first baseman from Seymour, Connecticut, who hit .811 in the tournament; and Drew Henson, a 6-foot-5, 225-pound third baseman from Brighton, Michigan, who led the team in total hits. Henson is also the first freshman in Michigan history to make first team All-State in three sports (baseball, basketball and football) in the same year.

Assisting Emanaki were Denny Bodenmiller, an assistant coach at West Orange High School in Winter Garden, Gary Ridge, a former instructor at Baseball World, and Bob Coons, a college coach from the St. Louis area.

Other members of the gold medal squad were Felipe Lopez (Kissimmee), Brian Williams and Matthew Incinelli (Winter Park), Brian Lents (Denver, Massachusetts), Tony Garcia (Riverside, California), Chris Wright (Los Angeles), Marcus Nettles (Chicago), Ross Bennett (Cape Girardeau, Missouri), Patrick Holmes (Houston), Kavonaki Chatman (Nacodocus, Texas), Nick Bourgeois (Lake Charles, Louisiana) and Jesse French (Tulsa).

# Steelers seek QB, Buccaneers want identity

PITTSBURGH — Pittsburgh Steelers coach Bill Cowher doesn't bother assembling an opponent's game plan for preseason games. If he did, it would probably resemble Tony Dungy's.

For two teams that seldom play each other — they haven't met in the regular season since 1989 — the Steelers and Tampa Bay Buccaneers should seem surprisingly familiar to each other Saturday at Three Rivers Stadium.

Cowher was Tampa Bay coach Dungy's boss for three seasons with Kansas City, where Cowher was the defensive coordinator and Dungy was the secondary coach. They share similar philosophies, mindsets and schemes.

Also, Steelers assistants Dave Culley and Mike Mularky were on the Bucs' staff in 1984 and 1985.

Dungy admittedly still has a lot of Pittsburgh left in him, too.

A reserve on the Steelers' last Super Bowl championship team in 1970, he became the NFL's youngest defensive coordinator at age 29 under former Steelers coach Chuck Noll in 1984. He kept the job for five seasons.

"I was a coordinator at a young age just like Tony was, and he helped me a lot," Cowher said. "I have a great deal of respect for Tony. It's good to see guys like Tony who paid their dues get an opportunity like he's got in Tampa. To me, that's what our business is all about."

Right now, Cowher is more concerned with getting down to the business of choosing a quarterback. He and Dungy talked regularly after Dungy was hired as Sam Wyche's replacement, but the two haven't talked recently.

"There's not too much talk

among coaches right now," Cowher said.

The Steelers' three-man quarterback race is likely to be settled Saturday, with 11-year veteran Mike Tomczak the favorite. He is expected to start despite a strained Achilles tendon that kept him out of practice Thursday.

About the only chance for Jim Miller or Kordell Stewart to supplant Tomczak in the final two preseason games is if the injury — or Tomczak's play — is far worse than expected.

"I'll sit back after (Saturday) and when I'm ready to make a decision, I'll make it," Cowher said. "It's important we get it clearly defined."

Dungy is trying to rebuild the Bucs with defense first. An early sign that improvement is on the way was the Buccaneers' 16-0 shutout of Atlanta last week. The Bucs are 1-1 in the preseason.

The Steelers are 1-2, but hardly

anybody in Pittsburgh has noticed due to the quarterback race.

Cowher plans to play his starters for at least a half and maybe longer. It might be their most extended work of the preseason, as they will likely be cut back to a quarter or so against Philadelphia on Aug. 23.

Dungy wants to see more progress from his defense and a receiving corps that lost Horace Copeland to a season-ending knee injury against Atlanta.

The Bucs also continue to audition replacements for running back Errett Rhett, a two-time 1,000-yard rusher who is boycotting camp in a contract dispute.

The Bucs don't plan to trade for a replacement for Copeland, who was expected to start across from receiver Alvin Harper.

"What it is going to do is allow teams to press the strong-side receiver," quarterback Trent Dilfer said.

# Less sodium means more bone

Are you a woman who hasn't been bothering to look at sodium information on food labels because you're not concerned about high blood pressure? Start bothering. Osteoporosis researchers are confirming in a variety of experiments that the more sodium (or salt) you eat, the more calcium you lose from your body and the more prone you become to debilitating fractures as you age.

Scientists have known for decades that increasing amounts of sodium in the diet cause increasing amounts of calcium to be lost in the urine. Now, researchers at the University of Western Australia have gone one step further, demonstrating that the sodium-induced loss of calcium in the urine does indeed translate into loss of bone density in older women.

They followed more than 100 post-menopausal women for two years and discovered that those who took in the most sodium at the start lost the most bone in their hips and ankles. Specifically, women who averaged about 3,000 milligrams of sodium a day—that's the equivalent of 1-1/4 teaspoons worth of salt, needed to consume roughly 1,700 milligrams of calcium to prevent any bone loss. That comes to almost 6 cups of milk a day. On the other hand, women who ate only 2,300 milligrams of sodium needed only 1,200 milligrams of calcium, the equivalent of 4 cups of milk, to maintain their bones.

Related studies have pointed in the same direction, although the results have been more modest. I don't think fussing over quantities is nearly as im-

portant as getting out the message to eat less salt. All the studies are coming to the same conclusion. They're all showing a high impact on calcium retention from sodium restriction.

### Calcium, sodium seesaw

While we don't have absolute numbers for the effect of sodium on calcium and bone loss, we do know that the more sodium eaten, the more calcium appears to be depleted from the skeleton.

Women in the U.S. currently average an intake of about 3,200 milligrams of sodium a day, 800 milligrams above the recommended limit. Some women are estimated to eat as many as 6,000 milligrams of sodium.

At the same time, women often consume fewer than 800 milligrams of calcium daily, the Recommended Dietary Allowance is 800 milligrams, and some organizations say that women past menopause should take in 1,000 to 1,500 milligrams. Clearly, there's room for improvement in both directions.

You probably already know that dairy foods are the richest sources of calcium, although canned salmon and sardines

Did you know that McDonald's new Arch Deluxe Burger, which the fast food giant is pitching to adults, contains 570 calories and a whopping 31 grams of fat, more than half the fat someone eating 1,800 calories a day should tally. And that's minus the optional bacon, which adds another 40 calories and 3 grams of fat.

with the bones also provide high amounts. In addition, broccoli, kale, navy beans, and dried figs can add significantly to the calcium tally.

What's less well known is that about 80 percent of the sodium we eat comes not from salt we add at the table or during cooking but from processed, packaged foods. And we're not just talking potato chips and salted pretzels. Check out the sodium content of some popular

supermarket and fast-food items. Keep in mind that the less processed the food (think whole grains and fresh vegetables, fruits, meats and poultry), the less sodium it will contain.

My problem isn't lack of willpower. What I lack is a reflex, a signal that says, "Full Enough!" I didn't choose to have this condition. Who in her right mind would choose to be hungry all the time? Words cannot describe my relief when I understood that I had a physical problem. I wasted years feeling guilty and ashamed because of my compulsive eating. For me, the solution has three parts because what began 40 years ago as a physical condition has created emotional and spiritual baggage that I carry with me today.

Almost everyone has heard of the Twelve Steps of the "Anonymous" programs, including: Admit your problem; believe you can be helped; ask for help; clean up your act; make amends; connect to a power greater than yourself; and help others. These steps form a decent life plan for me. They are helping me turn my life around and reconnect with myself, my spouse, my work and my body.

It does not matter that I did not choose to be this way. I am this way. And what I do about it is entirely up to me. After one month, following a generous plan of eating and working my program with plenty of support from other OA members, I'm one clothing size smaller. Better yet, I'm not taking pills or herbs, using a fad diet, or doing anything bizarre that might cause short-term weight loss. I'm doing nothing that I can't continue for the rest of my life!

I am profoundly grateful that I found OA, and I'm indebted to the countless OA members who have given me the benefit of their strength and experience.

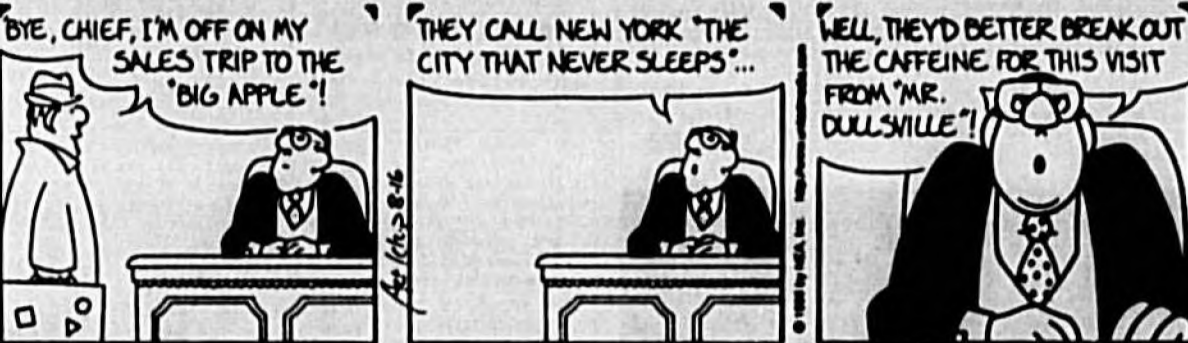

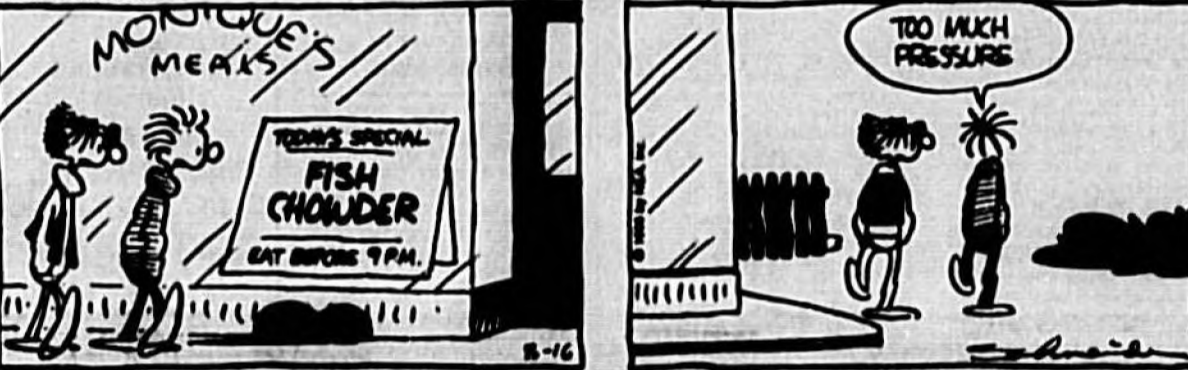

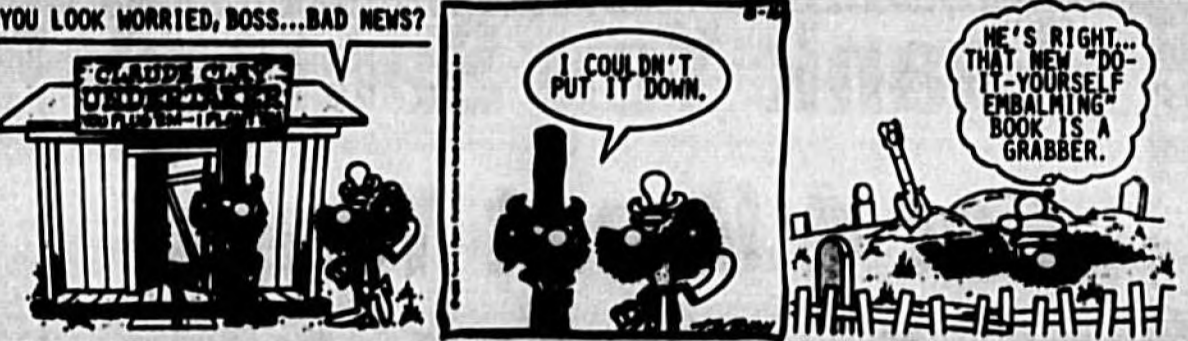

**Cutting back on prescription drugs**

DEAR DR. GOTT: I read with great interest your letter regarding the long-term use of Xanax. I've been taking this medication for several years and want to get off it now. How do I start? I know I have to wean myself slowly but since I'm on Nardil also, which one should I reduce first and by how much?

DEAR READER: Xanax, a prescription anti-anxiety medicine, has been reported to be habit-forming and to cause memory loss. It can also interfere with cognitive thinking, when taken for extended periods.

Nonetheless, it is very useful therapy for a number of conditions — including insomnia, panic disorder and other emotional conditions. Therefore, anyone who uses Xanax for more than a few weeks must carefully weigh the risk/benefit ratio. Also, it's a matter of degree.

For years, I have taken care of an elderly man who is incapacitated by overwhelming anxiety. His psychiatrist prescribed three to four Xanax a day, clearly a high dose for long-term use.

But the medication enables my patient to function relatively normally. He is well aware of the potential consequences and accepts them. In this case, the benefits outweigh the risks.

Similarly, I have several younger patients who use Xanax now and then, prudently, when needed. They experience no side effects or complications whatsoever.

Therefore, you should address your use of Xanax with your doctor. You are also taking Nardil, an anti-depressant, and I don't know which of the drugs you need more. He can advise you.

Here is an easy way for patients to wean themselves off Xanax — with their doctors' approval, of course. Calculate how many of the pills are consumed a week. Then reduce the dose by one pill a week, until you are drug-free.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Generally, health sources recommend a calcium supplement for people as they grow older. However, there are differences of opinion: calcium from bone meal, dolomite, oyster shell, with vitamin D or not. Your opinion?

DEAR READER: Purified calcium that is easily absorbed and available for metabolism can be obtained from many sources, the most common being oyster shells. Some samples of bone meal and dolomite have been found to be contaminated with substances, such as lead, and are probably best avoided.

In order for calcium to be used by the body, vitamin D must be present.

Authorities generally recommend a

glands, shortness-of-breath, tingling limbs, constant fatigue, and yeast infections — to name a few. There is some question of a thyroid condition. What can we do to pinpoint her problem so she can remain gainfully employed and lead a normal life?

DEAR READER: Get her to an internist, a specialist in diagnosis. The potential causes of your daughter's symptoms would fill a page as large as the one you are reading, and run the gamut of serious physical ailments (such as AIDS) to emotional upset and chronic fatigue syndrome. Clearly, she needs an exam, blood tests and X-rays.

If she has already exhausted the medical resources in your community, she should be referred to the diagnostic clinic at the nearest teaching hospital.

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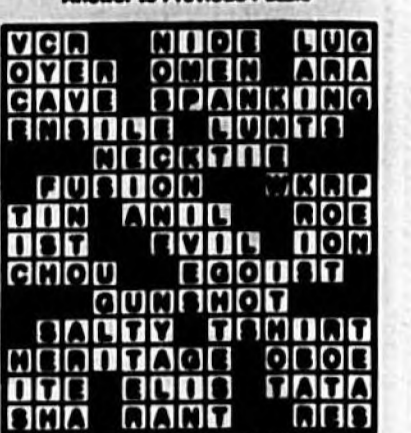

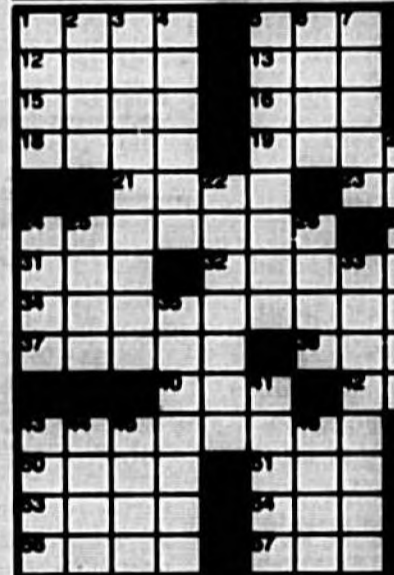

**WIN AT BRIDGE**

**The decisive trick**

It's impossible to remove luck from bridge. This deal was played in the final round of the Open Pairs at the Marbella Bridge Festival, held in that picturesque town on the Spanish Riviera last January. As this round began, the leaders were Alvaro Fresneda, the president of the Spanish Bridge Federation, and Luca de Tena. They were playing against Peter Matthews, from the United States, and Tony Friday, many times a British international.

North's two clubs was Stayman. His subsequent three hearts showed five spades and four hearts. This is called Smolen, but Friday forgot their agreement.

When the dummy came down, Friday saw that the other North-South pairs would be in four spades making

for plus 620. He had to win 10 tricks in three no-trump for plus 630. Scoring only 600 would be a bottom.

After winning the first trick with the diamond ace, East switched to the club king. South won with his ace and ran five spade tricks. West discarded a club and a diamond, while East threw one card from each suit. Next came a club from the dummy, East winning with the queen and exiting with his last club. Now when declarer played a heart to dummy's ace, East unblocked his king to avoid being employed.

However, Friday continued with dummy's heart six, covered by the 10, Jack and queen, endplaying West instead. At trick 12, he had to lead from the eight-three of hearts into dummy's nine-seven.

Serendipitously, Friday had won 10 tricks. His opponents received no matchpoints and lost the tournament.
