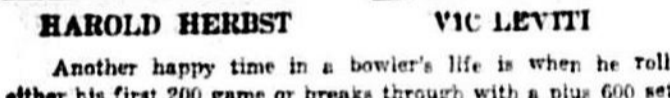
It's for free and we can guarantee you one thing... if the fighters put on a repeat performance such as they did this past week, then you're in for some enjoyable moments of pin head.

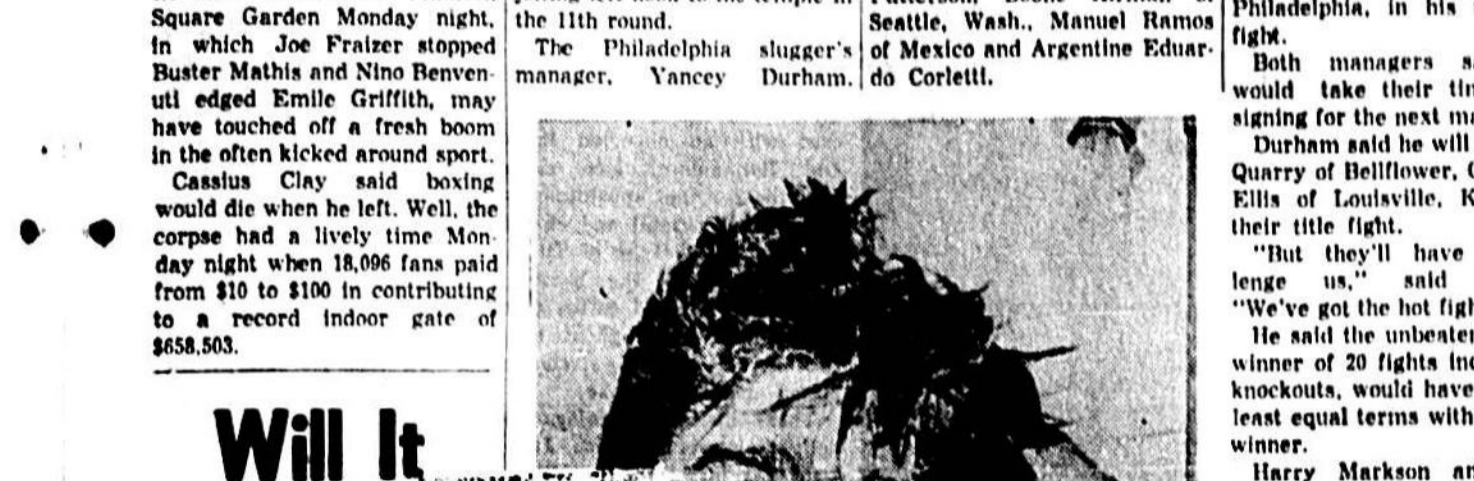

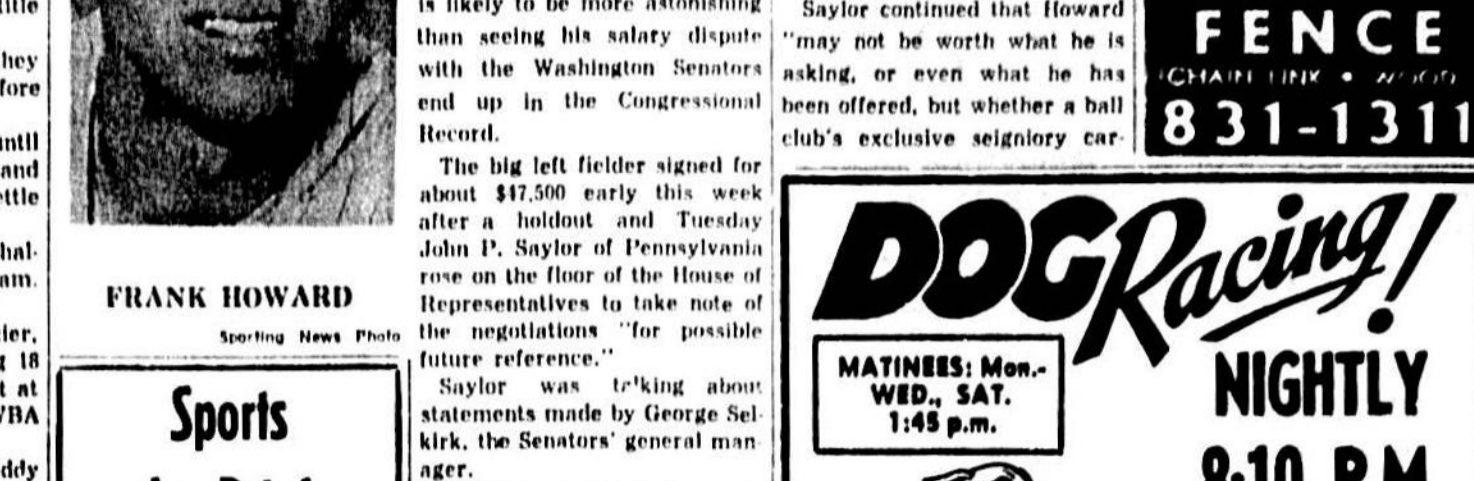

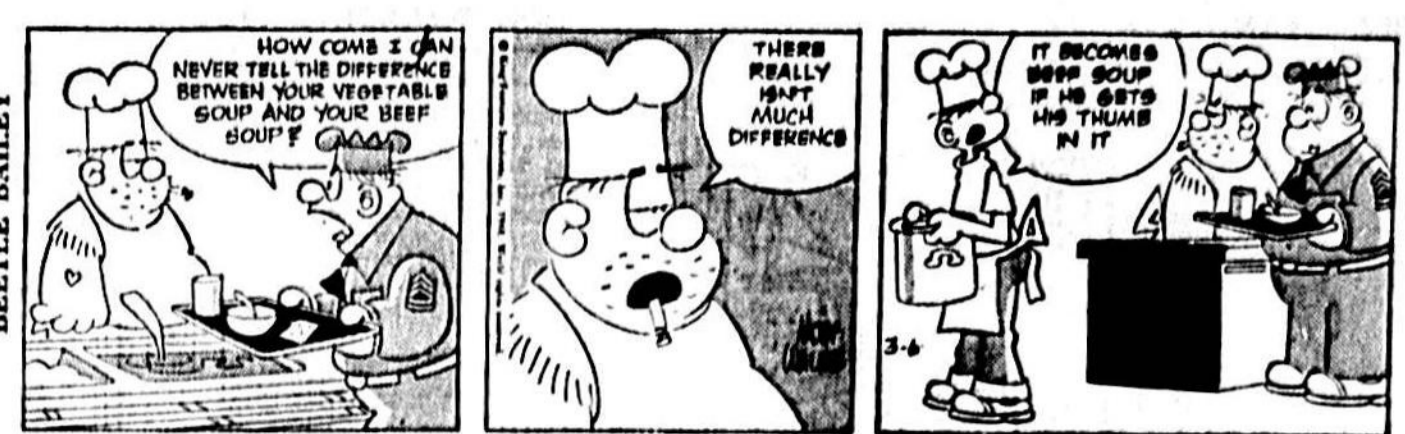

Reds Hit Province Capitals

SAGON (AP) — U.S. forces killed 110 enemy soldiers in three sharp clashes in the past 24 hours, U.S. spokesmen said today as the Viet Cong snatched provincial capitals and military posts for the third straight day.

The snatching caused little damage, the U.S. Command said.

Some 75 miles north of Saigon, Viet Cong troops ran into the 3rd Airborne Division camp at the Viet Cong holding a village. The Communists opened up with automatic weapons and hand grenades and pulled in about 200 reinforcements. Supported by mortar fire, the Americans killed 66 of the enemy. Two Americans were killed, while five Americans were wounded, a Marine air observer reported.

Another Viet Cong force of about 200 men, including a Viet Cong command, snatched the provincial capital of Tay Ninh, a Marine air observer reported. The Communists used mortar fire and automatic weapons to force the evacuation of the province. Two Americans were killed and 21 wounded.

Other scattered clashes brought total American casualties for the day to 13 killed and 20 wounded, U.S. spokesmen said.

Fighting was reported continuing two miles southwest of Ca Mau, with South Vietnamese troops pursuing guerrillas they drove out of the provincial capital at the southern tip of the peninsula.

The Communists invaded the town Tuesday, and the allied command said government troops killed 27 of them in 15 hours of fighting before the remnants of the enemy were chased from the town.

The government said the Viet Cong killed 30 civilians and wounded 50 when it seized the provincial hospital.

It reported 19 government soldiers killed and 43 wounded and

Rib Lamb Chops Plus

Even though plain broiled lamb chops are immensely popular, it's fun on occasion to give them a different treatment. What do we suggest? Try marinating them in a flavorful blend along with such pungent ingredients as orange, pineapple and green pepper. Then, at serving time, the chops are broiled on a spit while the rest of the food is put on skewers. Kabob style. When the chops are turned, the skewers are added to the grill. This combination is delightful to serve to a foursome with steamed rice — white, brown or wild — as the accompaniment. A cooked green vegetable and a salad can go along, too.

For the dessert, choose one without fruit in it so the flavors of the main dish won't be repeated. Any dessert that plays up vanilla, chocolate or coffee would be a good choice.

RIB LAMB CHOPS PLUS

2 tablespoons orange juice

2 tablespoons orange marmalade

2 tablespoons salad oil

2 tablespoons finely chopped onion

1 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon dry mustard

1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce

4 rib lamb chops, 1-inch thick

8 small link pork sausages, parboiled and halved crosswise

Fresh marinated-free orange sections

Fresh rinsed-free pineapple chunks

Green pepper squares

In a large shallow container, stir together the orange juice, orange marmalade, salad oil, onion, salt, mustard and Worcestershire sauce. Add lamb chops, sausage, orange, pineapple and green pepper and turn to coat with marinade. Cover tightly and refrigerate for three to four hours.

Remove chops from marinade and broil three to four inches from the source of heat for five to seven minutes. Meanwhile arrange sausage, orange, pineapple, and green pepper alternately on four long skewers. When chops are turned, place skewers on broiler rack. Turn and brush the food on the skewers with the leftover marinade. Broil chops and skewered food for five to six minutes or until chops are as well done as you like and the skewered food is hot through. Makes four servings.

To parcook the sausage links, place them in a cold skillet with several tablespoons of water. Simmer, covered, for five to eight minutes.

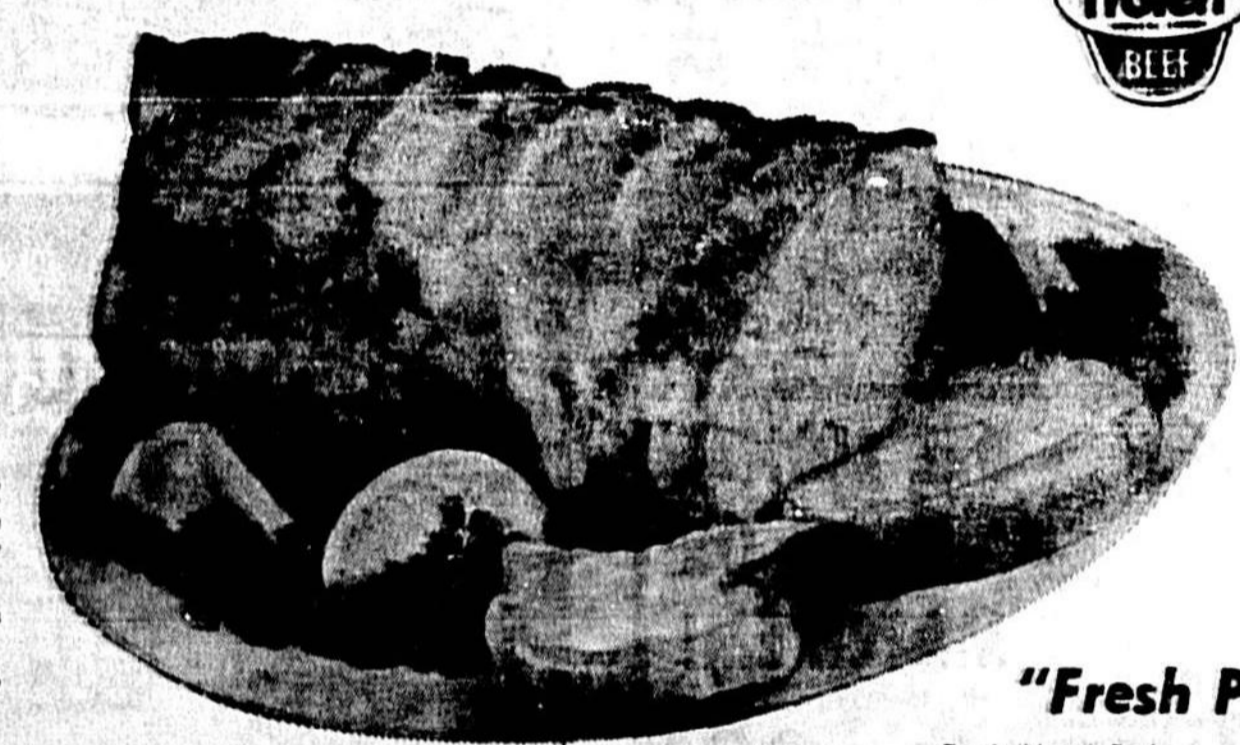

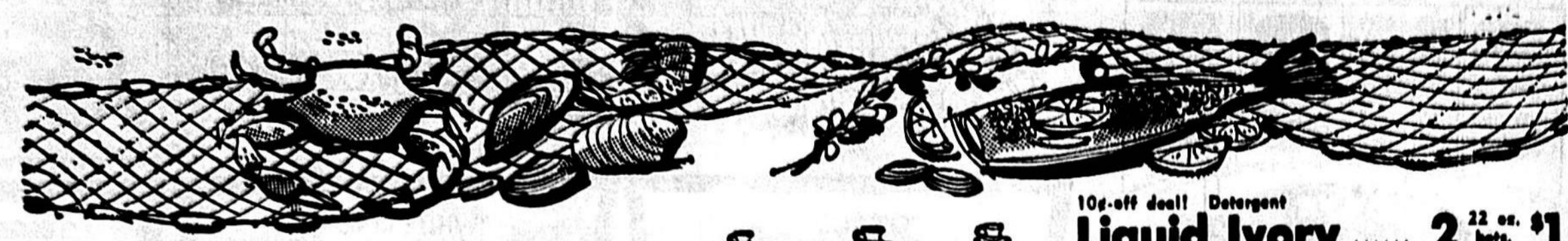

D. Taylor's Raised Doughnuts

DEAR CECILY: According to my father, no one in the world can make raised doughnuts like Doris Taylor of Derby Line, Vt. When the spirit moves her, Doris whips up a batch of doughnuts and delivers them to Daddy, her neighbor, with the greeting, "Thought it about time you had some raised doughnuts."

When she was young, Doris's favorite dessert was her grandmother's raised doughnuts—crispy on the outside and light on the inside. And her favorite way of eating them was the Vermont way—dunking them in maple syrup. "I was always getting the doctors for dribbling syrup on the table, but it was worth it!" Doris says.

Doris has been using the family recipe for doughnuts for years and years. When her daughter was younger, she would whip up batches of them for tea—after-school parties. I'm sending you her recipe because I think it deserves wide fame.

Remember eat these doughnuts right after they're fried—no reheating the next day. But Daddy, being a displaced Bostonian, is very happy with reheated doughnuts. In fact he thinks they taste even better the next day.—Miss M.

Dear Miss M: We tried Doris Taylor's recipe and her doughnuts were a huge success at our house. But no dribbling on the table! We supplied our eaters with big paper plates for the maple-syrup dunking. Thanks for passing along this fine recipe.—C.B.

DORIS TAYLOR'S RAISED DOUGHNUTS
2 cups milk, scalded
one-third cup sugar
1 tablespoon salt
2 envelopes active dry yeast
one-third cup warm water
1 egg, slightly beaten
1/2 cup shortening, melted and cooled
7 cups (about) sifted regular flour

Shortening for deep-fat frying
Into the scalded milk, add beat, stir the sugar and salt to dissolve. Cool to lukewarm.

In a large mixing bowl dissolve the yeast in the warm water. Stir in the lukewarm milk mixture, the egg and the melted half cup shortening. Gradually stir in enough of the flour to make a soft dough.

Turn out onto a well-floured board or prepared pastry cloth. Knead for five minutes. Place dough in a lightly greased bowl turn to grease top. Cover with a clean towel. Let rise in a warm place until doubled—about one hour.

Turn out onto a lightly floured board or prepared pastry cloth. With prepared stockinet-covered rolling pin, roll out to one-inch thickness. Cut out with a floured doughnut cutter (2 1/2 or 2 inches). Roll off leavings of dough and cut out. Leave cut-out "holes" as is. Cover and let rise in a warm place until doubled—about one hour.

Fry doughnuts and "holes" in deep hot (375 degree) shortening, without crowding and turning once, until cooked through and brown—two to three minutes. Drain on brown paper or several thicknesses of paper toweling. Serve at once with plenty of maple syrup for dunking—the doughnuts need the maple syrup because they are not sweet.

Makes about 30 doughnuts and 30 "holes."

Serve your guests an interesting cookie from Italian cuisine. Assorted Sandwiches, Anise Cookies, Fritted Cupcakes, ANISE COOKIES

3 1/2 cups unsifted regular flour
Stir to aerate before measuring
2 tablespoons baking powder
Small pinch of salt
1/4 cup butter
1 tablespoon peanut oil
1/4 cup sugar
1 large egg
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
1/4 teaspoon anise extract
On wax paper stir together the flour, baking powder and salt in a large mixing bowl beat to gather the butter and oil. Add sugar and beat thoroughly. Beat in egg one at a time. In a small bowl mix the lemon rind and anise extract with the mixture, mixing well. Chill if necessary to handle easily.
On a greased pastry cloth with your palms, roll level tablespoons of the dough until each is as thick as a pencil. Roll each into a coil with ends outstretched. Place, a few inches apart, on a greased cookie sheet. Bake in a preheated oven, 350 degrees, until only lightly browned—about 12 minutes. Makes about 40 cookies.

Billboards 'Improve' India City Slums

MADRAS, India (AP) — Even small signs of environmental uplift come once every five years, a time which coincides with India's general election campaigns.

Just a change of sign boards in our slum does a lot to improve our condition," said Elumalai, a resident in a downtown slum of 200 huts. His slum once named for Jawaharlal Nehru but now it is named for a minister in the state's new ruling party, the anti-Hindi and anti-North DMK (Dravidian Advancement Front).

"Let me tell you the many advantages which followed the change in name," said the 40-year-old industrial laborer.

"Soon after the defeat of Congress by the DMK, some officials of the municipal corporation visited our place and objected to what they called unhygienic huts. All slums, particularly those in Madras, are unhygienic.

"Some of our huts were pulled down. We were in a difficult situation, but our problem was happily solved by some among us who are sympathizers of the party in power changed the name board. That did the trick and no further action was taken by the city council. Our demolished huts were also allowed to be reconstructed.

"Complaints regarding lack of basic amenities in our place were entertained readily although no further steps were taken." But Elumalai is not concerned for "our being allowed to have this shelter undisturbed is a favor in itself."

Not all slum dwellers can see any benefits resulting from "right" political affiliation.

"Wherever conditions remain as before, the slums are crowded and unhygienic. Where is the facility for maintaining even personal cleanliness? We have no tap inside our huts and we have to carry water from the public tap, which lies at a considerable distance. These slum dwellers feel that politicians promise the impossible just to get their votes.

"We do not receive VIP treatment once in five years from prospective candidates, before any election," said Chandran, a laborer. "They (politicians) compete with each other in promising all possible help and assistance. What happens after that? As soon as the election is over we are forgotten and not even allowed to present our legitimate grievances."

Gov. Claude Kirk, asserting Florida has stood its ground and will win the battle for "control of our public schools," said today he will let a \$254 million education spending package become law at midnight.

Describing the 18,000 striking Florida teachers "as a group of men and women who are struggling between two competing unions," Kirk said he hoped "that the minority of teachers who are still out will new return to the classrooms."

The governor, who has often repeated his "no new tax" pledge, said his position has not changed. He blamed the Democrat-controlled Legislature for the \$330 million in new taxes which will finance the education package and pay off \$50 million of the state budget deficit.

The tax package will raise the 3 per cent sales tax to 4 per cent on April 1, close most exemptions in the sales tax, put a 4 per cent levy on commercial rentals and boost the tax on cigarettes, liquor and tobacco.

The governor has changed his mind so many times in the past few days regarding this bill we will wait until the day is over to determine whether it will actually become law.

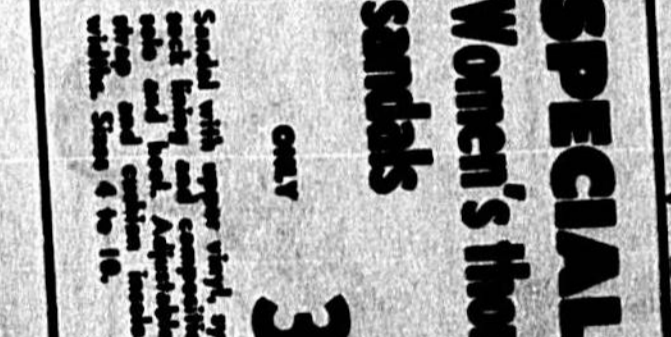
