State jobless rate climbs

TALLAHASSEE — Florida's unemployment rate climbed from 7.1 percent to 7.5 percent during March as the state continued to feel the impact of the nation's economic recession, a state spokeswoman said today.

It was the highest level in nearly eight years, according to records in the Department of Labor and Employment Security. The last time it reached that mark was in December 1983, but at that point rates were declining following a 10 percent peak earlier that year.

Florida's rate continued to hover above the national jobless figure that also increased from 6.5 percent to 6.8 percent.

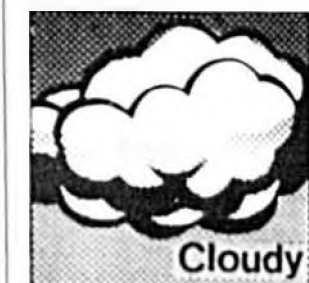

Tot killed in accident

SANFORD — A three-year-old girl was accidentally killed Thursday afternoon when she crawled under a utility truck whose driver pulled away after having stopped to read the electric meter at her house, police said.

The child, Stacey Arlene Frazier, was playing in the front yard of her home when Mark Gibson, an employee of Florida Power and Light, came to the house at 1111 Celery Ave. at about 11:15 a.m. to read the meter, police said.

been living in Sanford for only a few months. According to Lt. Mike Rolundo, public information officer with the Sanford Police Department, Gibson reported that there were several children playing in the yard when he arrived. The driver went to the back yard to read the

meter and when he returned he did not see the children, who had been there a few minutes before, playing in the front yard.

He reported to police that he then got into his car and started to pull away.

It was then that he discovered that Frazier had crawled under the front of the vehicle to play.

According to Rolundo, there was nothing that Gibson could have done to prevent the accident.

"It was just that...an accident," Rolundo said. "He didn't think to check under the car before he got in. It was an unfortunate thing that she had crawled under there."

According to Rolundo, emergency crews re-

Schools chief accuses GOP of 'sabotage'

SANFORD — Some members of the business community have been putting pressure on the Seminole County School Board to change the way the strategic planning committee they have proposed is comprised.

Several business people successfully petitioned the board to change the committee from 12 community volunteers and 13 school district employees to a group of 30 comprised half of business leaders and half of people associated

with the district, including a high school student.

Supt. Bob Hughes believes that the opposition forces are based in the county's Republican Executive Committee.

He noted that a group of more than 50 business people have been involved in the formulation of the strategic plan thus far and none had raised the kind of opposition that has come from the group which recently addressed the board.

"They have a hidden agenda to destroy the strategic plan," said Hughes, a registered Republican for

Astronauts lift off for a heavenly ride

Five-day mission to stalk hot rays

CAPE CANAVERAL — Atlantis thundered into orbit today with five astronauts and an immense observatory that will stalk the hottest, most powerful rays in the heavens. Spewing flame from twin booster rockets, the shuttle roared from its seaside launch pad at 9:23 a.m. EST. It cleared the tower and immediately began turning to head out in the correct direction over the Atlantic Ocean.

The sky was cloudy after a morning of rain. The weather made the launch five minutes late.

The rockets burned for two minutes and dropped empty into the Atlantic about 130 miles downrange, where ships were supposed to be waiting to pick them up. The 100-ton shuttle reached orbit 67 minutes later on the thrust of its three main engines.

All systems going well, said Mission Control's left arm.

It was the 19th launch of a shuttle and the first of 1991 after a hiatus of four months. Gone were worries over tiny cracks in a door opening mechanism of Atlantis that had grounded another shuttle.

The main event of the flight which will last five days, is the release of the Gamma Ray Observatory. Mission commander Steven Nagel and his crew of four will place the spacecraft in a 279-mile-high orbit on Sunday.

On Monday, astronauts Jerry Ross and Jay Apt are scheduled to take the first space walk by Americans in more than five years. They are to spend six hours in the open cargo bay testing equipment that would be needed to build a space station.

Also during the mission, pilot Kenneth Cameron and other astronauts will use a ham radio to contact schoolchildren and other amateur radio operators around the world.

The 17-ton Gamma Ray Observatory, the heaviest science satellite ever lifted by a shuttle, will circle the Earth for at least two years in its quest for gamma rays.

"The study of gamma rays opens a new window not only to the universe but to a whole new realm of physical activities," said Charles Pellerin, director of NASA's astrophysics division.

"You have the real possibility of seeing phenomena that have not been observed before and perhaps have not been imagined before," NASA chief scientist Leonard Fisk said.

The Gamma Ray Observatory, known as GRO, is the second in NASA's series of Great Observatories. The first is the Hubble Space Telescope.

While the Hubble does its work in the relatively narrow bands of the visible spectrum, gathering light that originated billions of years ago, the GRO operates at the extreme far end — beyond ultraviolet and X-rays.

the sidewalks we've had to postpone because of the lack of funds. Meador added, "I don't understand why approve this when part of our community is in need of the sidewalk service. He then made a motion to use the money for sidewalks rather than give it to non-profit groups."

The two sidewalks approved by Meador had been turned down during a previous commission meeting because of a lack of funds. They were Wilton Avenue from Country Club Road to 5th Street and 5th Street from Wilton Avenue and Lake Mary Boulevard. The cost for the two sidewalks was estimated at \$21,000.

 sponded quickly, but Frazier could not be revived.
 She was transported to Central Florida Regional Hospital where she was pronounced dead on arrival.
 The girl's body was transferred to the Seminole County Medical Examiner's office where an autopsy will be performed later today, according to a spokesman for that office.
 The spokesman said that the results of the autopsy will not be available until Monday at the earliest.

Florida Power and Light officials said that no personnel actions have been taken against Gibson. According to spokesman Ray Golden, no action is planned. Rotundo said no charges would be filed.
 "It was a very tragic accident," Golden said.
 Golden added that the company had been in contact with the family and plans to cooperate with any investigation that the police conduct into the incident.
 "We will do all that we can," Golden said.

No major tax increase in budget

Senate passes series of smaller tax hikes

TALLAHASSEE — No major tax increases are included in differing versions of a lean \$28 billion-plus state budget passed by the Florida House and Senate.
 But the Senate passed a series of smaller tax and fee hikes totaling more than \$200 million Thursday after the two chambers approved their budget bills.
 A joint conference committee will try to resolve the differences next week.
 There was little discussion as the House quickly passed its spending bill (HB 2501)

116-0, but the Senate bogged down in partisan debate for hours before voting 38-0 for its version (SB 2300).
 The Senate cut \$88 million in spending from its bill before passing it. Republicans unsuccessfully tried to make even deeper cuts in programs and slash or freeze government salaries.
 The austere budget bills reflect the nation's economic woes.
 "There are a lot of things this budget doesn't do. I think the one thing it does do is take a businesslike approach to a bad budgetary situation," said Senate Appropriations Chairman Winston "Bud" Gardner, D-Titusville.
 Both appropriations bills include 3 percent pay raises for state workers and teachers and tuition increases at state universities. But the proposed \$9.1 billion

education budget is some \$300 million less in state dollars than in the current budget year, although 80,000 more students are expected this fall.
 There is no money for new prisons, little increase for strapped social services and only enough highway money for maintenance and current road-building projects.
 Nearly all agencies are being cut, but layoffs anticipated in Gov. Lawton Chiles' "right-sizing" plans are in neither version of the budget. Instead, thousands of vacant jobs would be eliminated. Local school systems, however, could be forced to lay off teachers.
 A major issue for conferees will be allocating per-student funding to Florida's 67 school districts. Some lawmakers want a new system that improves the funding level for poorer counties, but urban lawmakers

 The rays do not penetrate Earth's atmosphere. If they did, the sky would be a flashing, violent sight.
 Unlike Hubble, the Gamma Ray Observatory has no mirrors. A shuttle mission is scheduled in

1993 to fix a flaw in Hubble's mirror, which was not discovered until the telescope was in orbit.
 The \$617 million gamma ray probe consists of four scientific instruments, three of them Volkswagen-sized. Massive devices are needed to collect the rare, sporadically occurring gamma rays.

 that the four previously approved sidewalk sites included portions of Lake Mary Boulevard, Main Road, Webster Street and an easement near Woodfield Estates. He said the cost of the projects were \$4,000 less than the amount originally budgeted for sidewalks, and that the amount could be added to the \$15,000 to help pay the cost of the two additional projects.
 Commissioner Tom Mahoney said he was in favor of the sidewalks. "I think the people would appreciate our using their tax dollars that way," he added. "I think, however, that there are some non-profit organizations that need our support. I'm just not sure this is the way to do it."

suggestion for fund raising. Several representatives of non-profit groups spoke to the Commission. Bob Wilson of Hospice of the Comforter explained that he believed, "the Cities and the County should address some of the social needs." Wilson said of the people handled by Hospice, 10 to 25 percent of them are unable to pay, and the only solution is to ask the city for a continuation of its help.
 Lake Mary resident Margaret Wesley, representing Better Living for Seniors, said she could understand Mealor considering it a matter of priorities, but she is concerned with the fact that the organization operates on matching funds. "Today alone," she said, "we fed 45 to 50 people at the Lake Mary Baptist Church, not all of which were local people, but were from the area." She added, "You are not just helping Lake Mary, but all of Seminole County with your donation."
 Citizen Sheila ... said the Commission she felt certain there would be organizations in the community willing to help raise money for the non-profit groups. She reported that she had contacted various area cities and found very few of them budgeted money specifically for charitable organizations as Lake Mary had done.
 At the conclusion of discussion, Morris called for a vote on the matter, and the two suggested sidewalk projects were unanimously approved, using the money originally budgeted for the private organizations.

Commissioner George Duryea seconded Mealor's motion by adding that he too did not like to disappoint the charitable organizations but believed the citizens of Lake Mary would be better served with the sidewalks. "But I think, however, that there are some non-profit organizations that need our support. I'm just not sure this is the way to do it."
 Although Mayor Morris said he was the citizen who requested the first grant to United Arts of Central Florida three years ago, he agreed with Commissioner Mealor's suggestion. "We just can't fill everyone's requests," Morris also supported Duryea's

TALLAHASSEE — A group of Republicans has formed a movement to draft Gen. Norman Schwarzkopf to face Sen. Bob Graham in next year's Senate race.
 "We're not officially associated with it, but we don't disapprove," GOP

spokesman Stan Smith said Thursday.
 The effort by former party chairman Henry Sawyer and businessman Jack Latvala of St. Petersburg to draft Schwarzkopf is fine with Van Poole, the party boss and the general's biggest booster.
 "The people who know him feel he's a good Republican on all the issues," Poole said in a

recent interview. "His friends in the Tampa Bay area are very excited about us trying to walk him into it. He'd be a breath of fresh air in the U.S. Senate if he decided to run."
 Schwarzkopf gained international prominence in recent months as commander of the allied forces in the Persian Gulf War.

Gordon: Did not believe claims against Lippman

TALLAHASSEE — Rep. Elaine Gordon, one of the top women's rights advocates in the Legislature, said she believed claims of sexual harassment in a House committee five years ago — but not concerning Rep. Fred Lippman.

"I was very concerned about the allegations," Gordon said. "If they were true, they certainly should be followed through on."
 Gordon, who in 1984 became the first female House speaker pro tempore in state history, told an investigating committee that in 1988 former Lippman aide Kathie Jennings came to her with her sexual harassment complaints about Lippman.

After checking with other female staffers at the House Regulatory Reform Committee, Gordon said she found others who complained of harassment by its staff director, Ken Sarvis.
 But none of the other women said they had suffered harassment from Lippman, she said.
 "In my own mind, my own opinion, I certainly believed the allegations against Mr. Sarvis," said the North Miami Democrat.

Business of kids

The important thing about the new report by the Committee for Economic Development on this country's serious neglect of the needs of its children is not just what it says, but who's saying it.

The CED is an organization of thoughtful and respected businesspeople. Its subcommittee on education and child development includes, among others, the presidents or other senior corporate officers of Ciba-Geigy, Aetna Life and Casualty, Pacific Mutual Life Insurance, Texas Instruments, Sky Chefs, the Mellon Bank as well as the presidents of several major universities.

At the core of their recommendations is a call for a "systematic reappraisal" of how children are prepared for school and a "comprehensive and coordinated strategy for human investment that redefines education as a process that begins at birth" and which includes a great many needs that the schools alone can't satisfy.

"Where children's lives are chaotic, where parents feel alienated from the school system, where families and educators do not expect children to achieve and where resources do not match needs, the traditional school model has failed to educate effectively," the report added.

To remedy that, the panel says the nation has to make "investment in early childhood development a top priority." Including full funding for existing programs like the Women, Infants and Children's nutrition program to Head Start, quality preschool, it says, should be available to all disadvantaged children, but it also puts strong emphasis on strengthening the family and addressing "the unique needs of teen parents and their children."

The report, unfortunately, says little about the funding for this "unfinished agenda." But it leaves no doubt about the need for effective school programs, nor that a great deal also must be done for children — in health, in nutrition, in nurturing — outside of schools.

Very little of this is new, but its source is an indication not merely of the importance of the task, but of the fact that it's now at the very top of the list of the nation's domestic priorities. The nation's business, say the businesspeople, is children.

Rapping with Eazy-E

Political campaign contributions are supposed to buy access to the corridors of power. That's the American way of politics. And access is just what Eric Wright bought. For a gift to the GOP of a little less than \$2,500, Wright landed himself a personal invitation to a private luncheon with the president and a select group of Republican bigwigs, the so-called Inner Circle in Washington.

Before now, Wright had made his reputation as a mover and shaker primarily on stage, where he performs as Eazy-E, the foul-mouthed leader of the controversial rap group N.W.A. According to the Los Angeles Times, the last time Wright received a letter from the federal government having to do with anything other than his annual tax returns, it was a complaint from the FBI that his music was encouraging violence against police officers. He was banned from MTV for the same reason.

The FBI's complaint was an outgrowth of the campaign that Tipper Gore, wife of the Tennessee senator, waged against the excesses of recording artists like Eazy-E. Political parties, however, don't demand that their contributors come with warning labels like the ones that Gore persuaded the record industry to put on album covers. As a result, Wright, who is a self-confessed former drug dealer, lunches on Pennsylvania Avenue with other outspoken advocates of law and order, such as beer magnate Joseph Coors and movie star Arnold Schwarzenegger.

Cops on the line are more particular. They find Wright's performances so offensive that they've refused to provide security for his concerts in several cities. It'll probably take more than a presidential endorsement to change that.

U.S. interests intact in Mideast mess

What a difference a month makes! As March began, Americans were still enjoying the rush that followed Gen. Schwarzkopf's stunningly successful liberation of Kuwait. Our boys (and girls) would be home soon, and meanwhile George Bush's popularity was sky-high.

A month later, the Middle East has turned into a royal mess. "Surgical" military strikes have been replaced by insoluble political problems, and over everything hangs the dark, greasy pall of the smoke from the fires of 900 Kuwaiti oil wells.

What kind of political outcome do we want in Iraq? — and, in any case, can we get it? Saddam Hussein is still alive and well in Baghdad, for crying out loud. The Kurds rose against him in the north, and the Shiites in the south; but he seems to have suppressed both rebellions. But we are warned that if we help the Kurds and Shiites, and Saddam falls, we will simply have accomplished "the Lebanonization of Iraq."

And what about Kuwait? The emir finally got around to going home, but his reception has been distinctly cool. At least some Kuwaitis apparently want more democracy. Meanwhile the little country is in ruins, and the government seems sluggish about improving things.

For that matter, what about Iran and Syria?

Iran is already flashing in Iraq's troubled waters, and Syria must be sorely tempted to do so. Should we warn them off, or let events take their course?

Finally, there are still other players in the Middle Eastern game: Israel, determined not to yield to pressure for some ill-advised settlement; Jordan, trying to inch its way back to acceptability; Turkey, fearful of Kurdish ambitions that threaten its own borders; Saudi Arabia and the Gulf emirates; Egypt; the PLO....

No wonder President Bush decided to go flashing in the Florida Keys!

But perhaps that was exactly the gesture that this

whole mess called for. Let's not get too impatient, let alone depressed, because things are not straightening themselves out in the Middle East. The region has been a diplomatic snake pit ever since the collapse of the Ottoman Empire in the First World War.

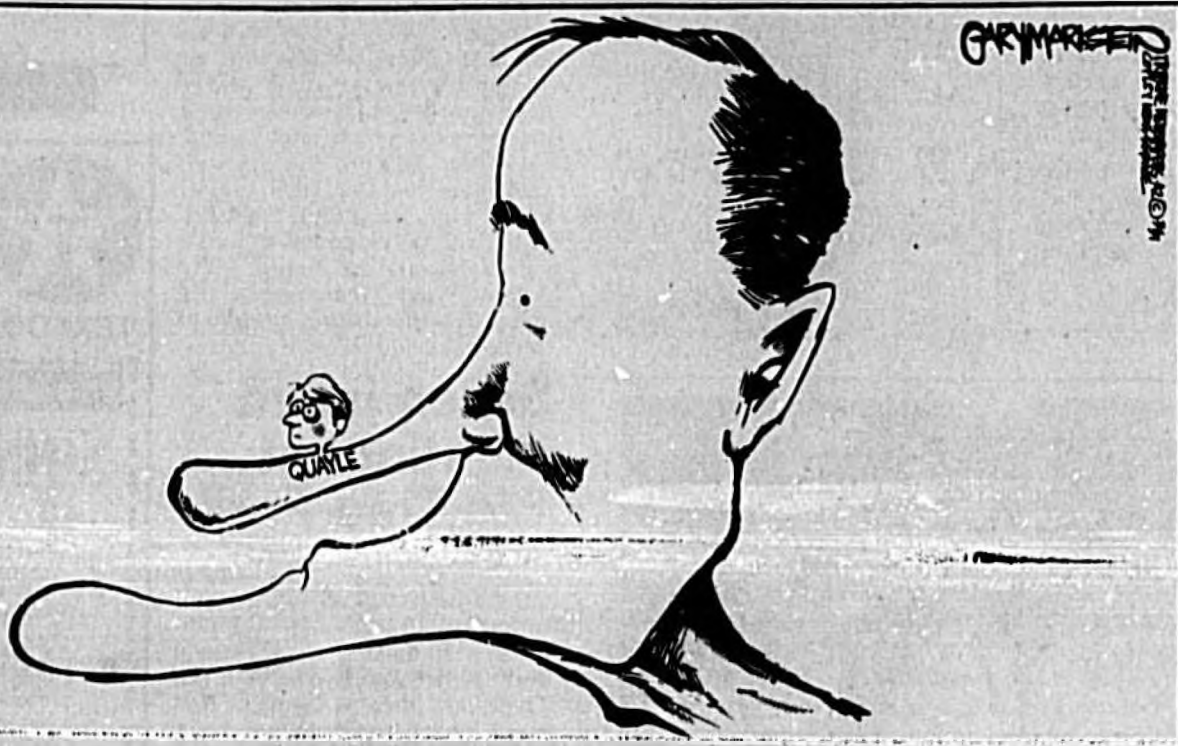
If George Bush had not acted then — and fast — Saddam could have walked straight through Saudi Arabia and the Gulf emirates without even wrinkling his khakis. And then, with control of most of the oil in the Middle East in his pocket, he could have dictated terms to the West, including the United States.

So what if he is still in Baghdad? His teeth have been pulled, and it would be generous to estimate his shelf life at six months. But what, even, if Iraq hangs together, under him or (more likely) some equivalent thug? Alternatively, what if the Kurds and/or the Shiites improbably succeed, and we face that dreaded consequence, "the Lebanonization of Iraq"? (If it was good enough for Lebanon, it's good enough for Iraq.)

What I'm saying is that the situation in the Middle East is indeed a mess, but none of the region's current problems threaten — as Saddam Hussein's actions in August 1990 most certainly did — the vital interests of the United States.

Owning home more difficult

RIO RANCHO, N.M. — For decades, home ownership has been a cardinal component of the oft-cited "American Dream." But here in New Mexico — and in 15 other states — the proportion of owner-occupied households has declined significantly in recent years.

Home ownership has increased in another 10 states, but the nationwide rate dropped from 68 percent to 64 percent during the 1980s, according to the U.S. Census Bureau. That constitutes the first decade-long contraction since universal home ownership was informally established as a national goal in the 1930s.

That phenomenon is aptly described in a report prepared late last year by the National Association of Realtors:

"The progression of American households through their housing careers can be viewed as a ladder on which low- and moderate-income renters move to more comfortable quarters, better-off renters save to become first-time home buyers and (home owners) trade up to bigger and bigger homes...."

"During the last decade or so, the ladder has become steeper. The climb still is attempted by households, but with fewer and fewer reaching the top, more and more crowding in the middle and an increasingly tenuous hold by those on the bottom-most rungs."

Among those most adversely affected are young families. Home ownership among those less than 35 years old dropped from almost 42 percent to just over 39 percent in the 1980s and the decline appears to be continuing in the 1990s.

Among the states, Alabama and Colorado both experienced 6.1 percent declines in total home ownership during the last half of the 1980s. Behind them were Missouri at 5.8 percent, Kentucky at 5.3 percent and Nevada and Kansas, both at 4.6 percent.

New Mexico experienced a smaller but nevertheless significant reduction in its total home ownership rate, as did Florida, Indiana, Louisiana, Maryland, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Nebraska, North Dakota and South Dakota.

The states in which gains were recorded — almost all of them very modest — were Hawaii, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Vermont, Virginia, West Virginia and Wisconsin.

Home ownership as an integral part of the "American Dream" dates back to the mid-1930s when the Federal Housing Administration was established to underwrite low-interest, government-insured mortgages.

It was not embraced by millions of families, however, until the years following the end of

World War II, when the baby boom generated a yearning for residential units roomier than the urban apartments that long had provided much of the nation's housing stock on a rental basis.

Veterans returning from the war were eligible for affordable mortgage financing provided by the Veterans Administration as well as the FHA. The emergence of the "automobile age" accompanied by an ambitious highway construction program opened the suburbs to home construction at a pace experienced never before or since.

The number of new homes built annually increased more than eight-fold in only two years — from 115,000 in 1944 to almost 940,000 in 1946. Construction peaked at almost 1.7 million in 1950 but yearly production averaged 1.4 million through the mid-1960s.

The nationwide home ownership rate climbed steadily, from 45 percent at the beginning of the 1940s to 68 percent at the end of the 1970s. In the 1980s, however, it declined for the first time in half a century, to 64 percent.

As land in urban areas has become increasingly scarce, its price has soared. At the same time, construction costs have been driven up by inflation. But the earnings of many middle-income workers have remained stagnant.

The result is that an affordable home is no longer within the economic reach of many families. Indeed, the realtors' report acknowledges that the climb up the housing ladder "may no longer be simply straight up."

While some families still complete the ascent with ease, the study notes, others fall down and still others are "holding on for dear life."

Does pork barrel include seaweed?

WASHINGTON — A squabble over seaweed has revealed once again how murky congressional rules are when it comes to doing favors for constituents. It seems the Keating Five episode did nothing to clarify the picture.

The seaweed case has nowhere near the glitz of the savings and loan debacle, which saw five senators intervening with federal regulators for S&L owner Charles Keating. But it shows that there is still a vague line between performing constituent services and butting in.

Last July, the Food and Drug Administration approved a Philippine-made seaweed derivative, carrageenan, for use as a food additive in the United States. Carrageenan is used as a thickener in many food products from ice cream to beer, and it is now an ingredient in the new low-fat hamburger that McDonald's plans to introduce in its restaurants.

American producers of carrageenan were outraged that the FDA approved the Philippine version. With the help of Congress, they pressured the FDA to reconsider.

Among those going to bat for American carrageenan were Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell, D-Maine, Rep. Thomas Carper, D-Del., and then-Rep. Howard Nelson, R-Utah. They all asked the FDA for a review of the approval. All of the congressmen had domestic carrageenan producers in their home states or had received campaign contributions from the industry. The domestic manufacturers who stepped into the debate were Hercules Inc. and FMC Corp. Between them, they handed out \$358,840 in campaign contributions.

The Philippine producers cried foul when they found out that Nelson (who has since retired from Congress) and Carper accompanied industry representatives to a meeting last fall with FDA regulators.

The FDA isn't publicly complaining that it was bullied by Congress, but sources told our associate Scott Sieck that the lawmakers have shown an unusual level of interest in what would normally be a run-of-the-mill approval process at the FDA.

Critics of the Philippine carrageenan say it doesn't meet federal standards as a food additive, and they claim it may contain contaminants because of the way it is manufactured.

But the FDA says the Philippine product satisfied the federal standards and that there was no proof offered from the critics otherwise. The FDA has since asked for more material from the Philippine producers and has yet to announce its final decision. In the meantime, the Philippine product can be sold in the United States, but the questions raised by the American competitors have made it hard to sell.

Philippine business interests claim the whole affair was a ploy by the American carrageenan industry to shut out cheaper foreign competition. But behind the fair trade issue is a fair play issue. Should a member of Congress intervene with a federal regulator for a constituent?

The lawmakers who questioned the FDA's approval of Philippine carrageenan say they have the health and safety of the consumers at heart. And, they say if the FDA finally decides the Philippine product is safe, they'll drop the issue.

But the fact that the lawmakers only got involved because constituents and campaign contributors asked them, puts their motives in question. Until Congress can find some way to finance elections without relying on the money of special interests, then any move they make on behalf of corporate interests will look dubious.

over 20 years.

Jim Stelling, a member of the Republican Executive Committee who has been active in educational issues, states that there is no such connection between the Republicans and the requests by the business community to alter the make up of the strategic planning committee.

"No. The Republican Executive Committee hasn't even discussed the issue," Stelling said. "I think it's just coincidence that some people in the business community who oppose this are also on the executive committee," Stelling said.

Hughes believes the bad blood between the school district and the Republican Executive Committee began several years ago when former school board member Bill Kroll tried, unsuccessfully, to introduce privatization of services to the district's transportation, food service and

facilities departments. "I think he's thinking of the bond issue," Stelling said. "I think that's where his whole problem stems from."

Kroll's plan would have turned control of those departments over to private companies and would have put hundreds of district employees out of work.

Hughes said he, and four of the five school board members, opposed the plan which would have cut the number of district employees by nearly half on the basis that it would have done away with too many jobs and replaced them with minimum wage positions.

At the time Kroll claimed that Hughes had too much power over the actions of the board.

"They didn't reject it because I opposed it," Hughes said. "He just didn't present a strong enough case."

Hughes alleges that following that confrontation on the board, Kroll began telling "half truths" to the Republican Executive

Committee about the power wielded by Hughes over the board and staff.

Hughes believes that for similar reasons, the Republican Executive Committee worked hard to defeat the failed bond issue in 1990, supported the proposition to make the school board elections partisan and supported the move to appoint the superintendent rather than leaving the position as an elected one.

"And now they want to sabotage the strategic plan," Hughes said.

Hughes said the plan has been targeted because it is "a good one."

"If it wasn't so good, why would they be going after it?" Hughes wanted to know.

Stelling said that the business people who have raised questions with the strategic plan are not acting on behalf of the Republicans. He suggested that most of the group also belongs to the Greater Seminole County Chamber of Commerce.

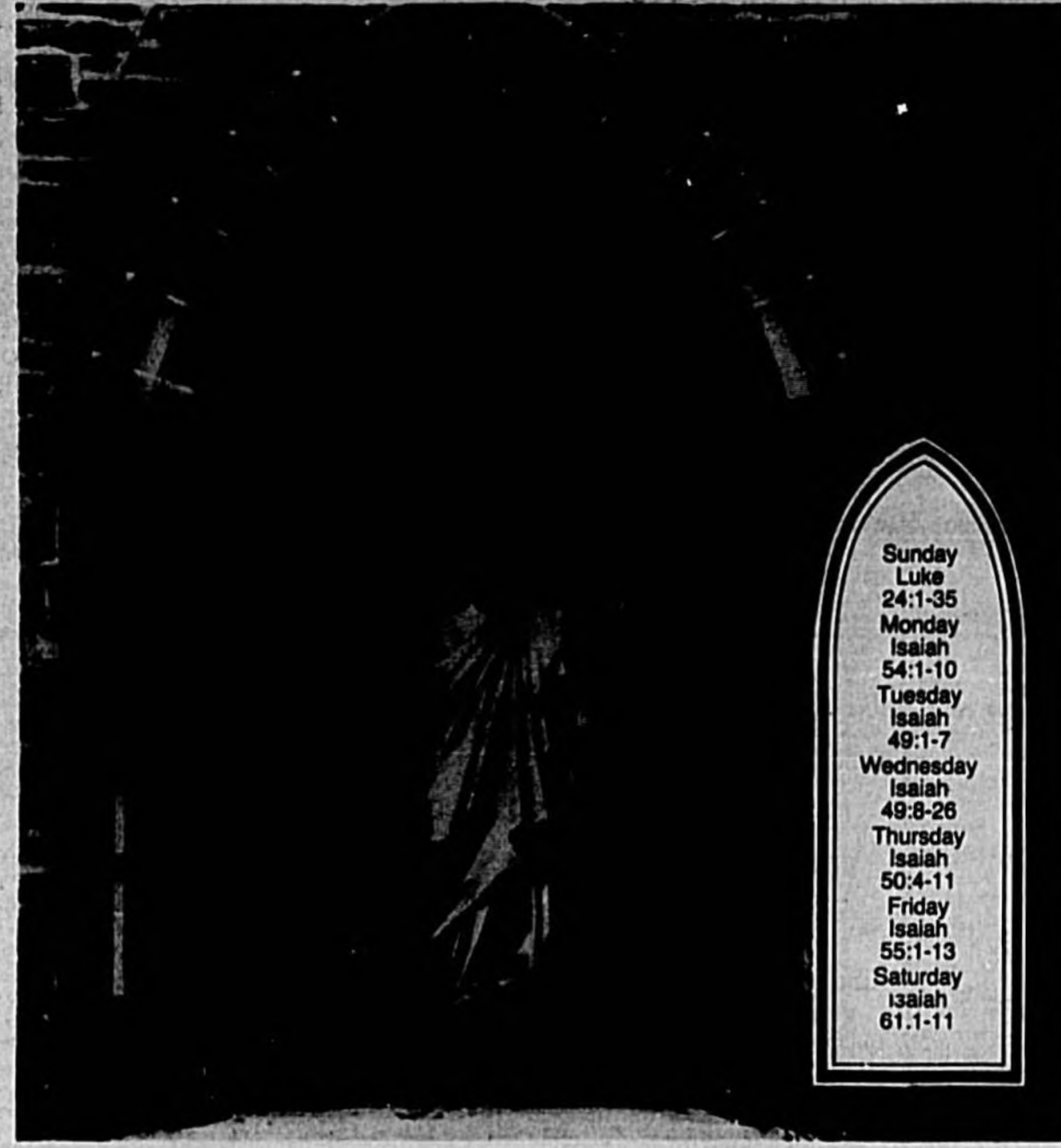

We sing the great hymns of glory and of the suffering of the Cross for our Lord. We even sing and declare that we would be willing to bear the cross.

Really? Do we really think of how Christ suffered there for us? Sometimes we allow ourselves to catch glimpses of the physical and emotional agony Christ went through, but to dwell on it very long causes us so much pain that we shift our attention to other things. As humans, we do not like to feel pain. Therefore, we have focused our faith on the glory that came from the Cross instead of the pain Christ endured there for us and the whole world.

Crucifixion was a common form of execution for criminals in that period of history. I'm sure Christ like many others had witnessed or heard of the pain such victims endured. Why else would he have been so emotionally distraught that he sweat blood as he prayed in the garden? If Christ had not cared to live, or if he had not known how painful and isolated a death he would die, he would not have bothered to cry out to God, "Father, if it be thy will let this cup pass from me. Nevertheless, not my will, but thine."

Yet, Jesus was willing to trust in the will of God. If God willed Jesus should die for our salvation, for victory over death forever, then Jesus would suffer



all that was required.

Jesus told his disciples (and each of us) that if we desired to follow him, we must pick up our cross. Do we carry our crosses as well as Jesus carried his? Or do we grumble and say "Life is not fair!" Do we trust God enough, can we follow Christ's example enough to completely yield our lives over to the will of God for us?

A few months ago, while eating in a local restaurant, we witnessed a man choking. My family, as well as others nearby sat motionless, watching. It was not that we did not care, but that we did not know what to do, and were frozen, wondering inside when and how to respond. Within seconds a man walked from several tables away to the victim who was now standing. As the man approached, the victim turned his back toward

the man and extended his arms. He yielded himself to the stranger without question, trusting that because he saw his need and responded, that he knew what to do. As expected, the victim was relieved of the obstruction which was causing him to choke. The stranger performed the Heimlich Manuever and the victim's life was saved. Both returned to their tables and others went about eating and talking again.
 I couldn't help but relate this experience to our relationship to God and Christ. Christ came as a stranger, able to perform the miracle of our eternal salvation and life with God. We are the victims of this world, choking in its evil, dying a certain death without help. It is only when we are willing to turn away from all other things and yield ourselves and our will to God through

Christ that we are able to be saved. Like the choking victim, we will perish without this kind of unquestioned trust. I dare say the man who was choking did not think once of what he was giving up to accept the stranger's help, rather, he only had been thinking about what he would lose if the stranger could not help. His life was dependent on help.

So is our life dependent upon God's help through Christ. Without Christ, we will lose our life eternally. Think about these words: "For God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believes in him should not perish, but have eternal life." (John 3:16) God gave us proof of this fact when the Resurrection happened.

If God loves us that much and Jesus is willing to suffer that much for us, can't we trust God with control over our lives? Can't we give our heart to Jesus and not worry about what he might require of us, but think of what we will lose if we don't give our will to him?

I pray that the message of this Easter just past has shed new light upon your path, that God's love has become more real to you, and that your trust in God and commitment to God will grow deeper with each passing day.

President announces proclamation of 'National Days of Thanksgiving'

President Bush has proclaimed April 5-7 as "National Days of Thanksgiving" for the liberation of Kuwait, the "remarkable unity of our people" and "declarations of peace and liberty for our troops" and the nation.

He also asked prayers for "the innocent men, women and children ... who have suffered" as a result of the war.

A sampling of churches in the Sanford, Lake Mary area has shown that pastors have not yet had enough time to decide what, if anything, will be done in observance of the proclamation.

Several Christian and Jewish leaders have urged participation in the observance.

Bush asked that flags be flown on all government buildings, all Americans display flags and that church bells be rung at 3 p.m. EDT Sunday.

In his proclamation, he said: "We prayed for a swift and decisive victory and for the safety of our troops. Clearly, the United States and our coalition partners have been blessed with both. We thank the Lord for his favor...."

He urged prayer for "God's help and guidance on the way that lies ahead and for 'reconciliation with all peoples.'"

A Southern Baptist chaplain, Col. Daniel O. Davis, said he believes God placed a hedge of protection around allied soldiers in the Gulf War.

Russian Parliament gives Boris Yeltsin new powers

MOSCOW — The Russian Federation parliament today gave final approval to new powers that boost Russian leader Boris Yeltsin's leverage in his standoff with Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev.

The 1,063-member Russian Congress of People's Deputies approved the new powers 607-228, with 100 abstentions, after defeating two dozen amendments pushed by hard-line Communists.

The final vote on the resolution came Thursday and broke an impasse at the nine-day special session, initially called by hard-liners intending to topple Yeltsin as congress chairman.

Reformers capitalized today on their momentum and broadened Yeltsin's powers further in the final draft of the resolution. They stipulated that his powers would expire when a new Russian president is elected, putting additional pressure on orthodox

Communists to approve the proposed executive position.

The resolution temporarily grants Yeltsin the authority to issue "directives" in Russia, the biggest and richest Soviet republic. It also transfers many powers from Russia's fractious parliament to its smaller legislature, the Supreme Soviet, which has been more cooperative with Yeltsin.

The approval was a clear victory for Yeltsin.

Nearly one-of-a-kind official lends a hand

HEATHROW — In the fast-paced world of tennis, have you ever wondered about who checks the color of a tournament banner? Or maybe, who works with disgruntled players in compromising on playing conditions or a tournament draw?

Mark Darby thinks about those types of things all the time. Quite simply because he is one of only six Association of Tennis Professionals (ATP) Tournament Supervisors in the entire world. Darby, a Beaver, Pa. native, is in fact, one of only three Americans in this elite group.

"I'm responsible for making sure the tournament is run according to the rules and regulations of the ATP Tour," said Darby during the Prudential-Bach tournament being held here this week.

"That's it in a nutshell. But there's a lot of stuff as well that I do on a daily basis... like checking on the banner and little things like that."

In just his second year as a tournament supervisor, Darby appears relaxed and comfortable in his position. A giant man at about 6-foot-6, Darby had plenty of tennis background to make him feel at home in his new career position.

A standout high school tennis athlete at Beaver High (Pa.), Darby advanced to the state championship quarterfinals in No. 1 singles his senior year.

His high school talent did not go unnoticed as Penn State University awarded him a four-year scholarship. As a member of the Nittany Lions, Darby made it to the NCAA Championships during his senior season at No. 1 singles.

Taking a crack at professional tennis, he spent four years playing on the Satellite, Challenger and ATP tours before finally calling it quits.

"I gave it four years and I thought it was enough," Darby said. "I thought that at the particular ranking I had, it wasn't profitable enough. My parents helped me out with some of the tennis expenses. It

was time to find a job." Darby's highest ranking in singles was around 360, while he fared slightly better in doubles at No. 300.

But in 1984, Darby found something better to do than take his shots on the court. He became a tournament supervisor at the Satellite and Challenger levels and worked at that for about six years. Along the way, he also umpired in some ATP events.

From that point, he became an ATP Tour Supervisor. Darby had finally carved his niche in the tennis world.

"I enjoy working with the players and the tour," said Darby, who is 34 and single. "I enjoy seeing it go off (well) ... both elements. Sometimes, it takes a little compromise to get it off on both sides."

Darby's responsibilities have taken him clear around the world and back. He has been to New Zealand, Australia, Japan, Brazil and Italy.

"Brazil was different," commented Darby. "I remember it being a beautiful country. The tennis fans there were more than the U.S. fans. They were fanatical. They were very supportive of their own (players). That's unique because you don't see that in the U.S. as much."

Darby found a tournament in Italy to be one of his most difficult challenges as a tournament supervisor.

"The surface was poor and the lighting was bad," said Darby. "The requirement (of total light brightness) is 100-foot candle. They had 50-foot. I finally agreed to let them go on with the tournament if they brought lighting up to a standard and fixed the courts."

"They got the lights up to 90-foot candle. The clay was soft (before they fixed it). It was such that instead of sliding, you had a bunch of dirt around your feet." But those types of situations seem few and far between for Darby.

"It's a real people position," concluded Darby. "You're talking to people all the time. I talk about different issues with the players but I have a lot to do with the officials too."

High unemployment rate will hamper any recovery

WASHINGTON — The dramatic surge in unemployment that has put 1.6 million Americans out of work in recent months is expected to hamper any economic recovery, analysts say.

"It carries a heavy psychological punch. ... If unemployment is high, people are worried about their jobs and then it takes longer for a boost in confidence to be reflected in higher spending," said David Jones, an economist with Aubrey G. Lanston & Co., a government securities dealer.

Unemployment has been climbing steadily in recent months, rising from the relatively low rate of 5.3 percent last summer to 6.5 percent in February.

The Labor Department was releasing its unemployment figures for March today. In advance of the report, many analysts predicted the rate swelled again, probably to 6.7 percent. That would be the highest jobless rate in more than four years.

The unemployment report also shows how many jobs U.S. businesses cut or added for the month. Some analysts predicted

that payrolls fell by 200,000 in March, which would continue the recent stretch of mass layoffs.

Analysts had been heartened last week because some government statistics indicated that the economy may be picking up. For instance, consumer confidence appears to be rebounding and the sluggish housing market looks to be on its way back, too.

However, some analysts said Thursday that their hopes for a speedy end to the recession were dampened by a Labor Department report showing that the number of Americans filing new unemployment claims jumped to the highest level in eight years last month.

The bleak jobless claims data showed applications topping a half-million for the third straight week.

"For those who might have been hoping for a quick end to recession, I think that notion should be shattered," said Allen Sinai, chief economist at the Boston Co. "It can be a long time between the first signs of life and when the economy actually starts to recover."

Agassi wins with breaks

HEATHROW — Thursday night's feature match between Andre Agassi and David Engel in the second round of Prudential Securities Tennis Classic was a story of converted opportunities by Agassi and missed opportunities by Engel.

Agassi was 3-for-3 on three break points during the match while Engel converted just 1-of-10 break points and 0-of-3 double-break points as the No. 1-seeded Agassi defeated Engel 6-4, 6-4.

Agassi continually put pressure on Engel's backhand and relied on his strong baseline volley game and conservative serving, just trying to get most of his first serves in instead of going for aces.

"My goal for the this tournament and the next few tournaments is to get my first serve in," said Agassi. "My offensive attitude is going to be reflected in the rest of my game because I beat people by working them as hard as I can."

Agassi struggled early in the match when he had to fight off double-break point on his first service game, five deuce points on his second and a break point on his third.

Then, up 5-4 and serving for the set, Agassi again had to fight off double-break point before reeling off four straight points to win the set.

With the score tied at 2-2 in the second set, Agassi broke Engel's serve but had trouble getting his serve in and Engel returned the favor and tied the set at 3-3.

But Agassi was able to break Engel's serve again in the next game and cruised to victory and a berth in the quarterfinals.

"There are days when you walk out on the court and it's just not

there and today was one of those days," said Agassi. "This was a typical match where a year and a half ago there was a good shot that I wouldn't have won. But I'm a lot better at fighting to win and playing smart even if I'm not playing well."

With Agassi's victory, all eight of the quarterfinalists are from the United States for the first time in 275 tour events dating back to April, 1987, at the Volvo Tennis Classic of Chicago.

In other second round singles matches Thursday, No. 3-seed and defending Classic champion Brad Gilbert defeated Patrick Baur 6-3, 7-6 (7-5); Maliva Washington crushed Nicolas Pereira 6-1, 6-3; and Chuck Adams outlasted Bryan Shelton 3-6, 7-6 (8-6), 7-6 (7-4).

The doubles completed the quarterfinal round today with the No. 2-seeded pair of Brian Garrow and Brad Pearce defeating Shelton and Kenny Thorne 7-5, 6-4. No. 3-seed Ken Flach and Robert Seguso were upset by Luke Jensen and Scott Melville 3-6, 7-6 (7-4), 6-4 while No. 4-seed Steve DeVries and David MacPherson won in straight sets over Roger Smith and Tobias Svantesson 7-6 (7-5), 6-4. Pereira and Pete Sampras got by Mihnea-Lon Nastase and Laurie Warder 6-4, 5-7, 6-1.

The singles quarterfinal matches at Centre Court this afternoon will start at noon with No. 4-seed Derrick Rostagno facing No. 6-seed Jimmy Arias, followed by No. 2-seed Sampras taking on No. 8-seed David Pate.

The evening's match will start at 7 p.m. with Agassi playing Adams followed by Gilbert taking on Washington.

Saturday's semifinal singles and doubles matches will start at noon and 7 p.m. with Sunday's championship action starting at 1 p.m.

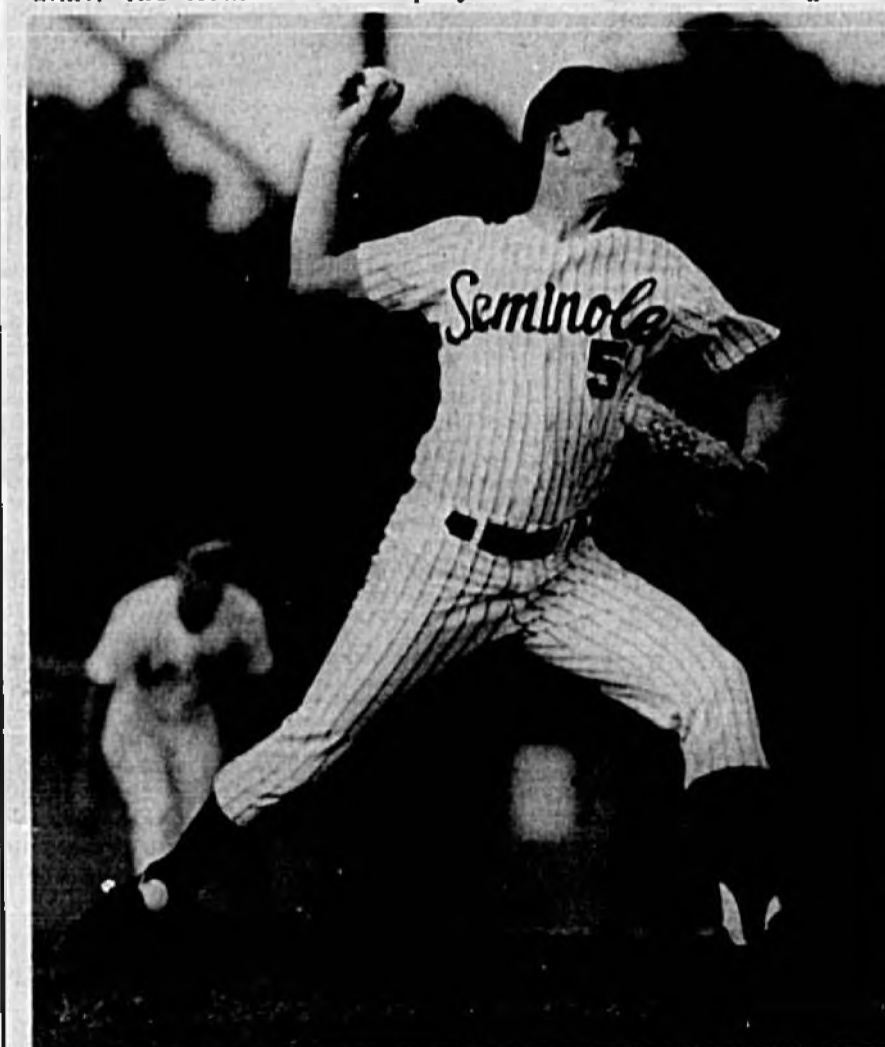

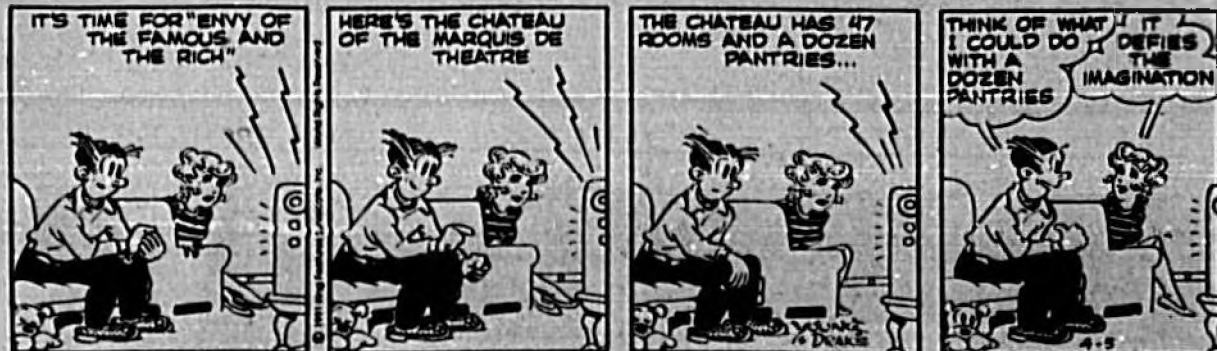

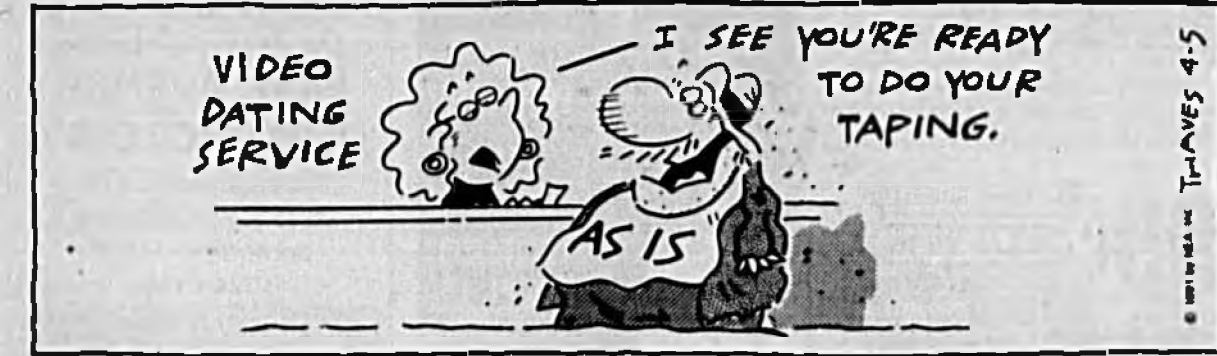

Help in understanding chromosome deficiency

DEAR DR. GOTT: What is Turner's syndrome? What does having only 45 chromosomes instead of 46 mean to an affected individual?

DEAR READER: Each normal person has 46 chromosomes, including one pair that determines sex (XX, female; XY, male).

Chromosomes are sub-microscopic coils, present in each living cell, that bear genes, the protein packets which carry hereditary traits.

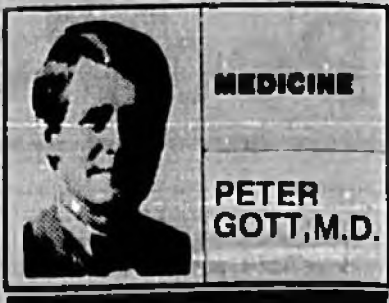
In Turner's syndrome, one of the two (XX) female chromosomes is absent or deleted. This causes a characteristic appearance: short stature, webbing of the neck, low hairline, sagging eyelids, multiple moles, narrowing of the aorta, failure of menstruation and breast development, and infertility.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm a 50-year-old female with systemic lupus erythematosus. My doctor says I am presently in remission. How long can I expect the lupus to remain in remission, and are lipomas associated with this diagnosis?

DEAR READER: SLE is an inflammatory disorder of connective tissue, which binds organs together. Thus, the disease affects many parts of the body, including the joints, skin, lung covering, kidneys, heart covering, lymph nodes and spleen. The most common symptoms are pain, rash and progressive renal failure. SLE is diagnosed by blood tests. The cause is unknown.

SLE is peculiar in that it waxes and wanes. For no apparent reason (or after therapy), patients may experience periods of complete remission, often lasting months or years. Therefore, the prognosis varies. As a general rule, the earlier SLE is diagnosed (and treatment begun with cortisone), the greater the chance for recovery; hence, early recognition of the disease is para-

mount. I cannot predict how long your remission will last. Perhaps, based on your past pattern of disease, your physician can give you a ballpark figure but, by and large, the length of remission is unpredictable.

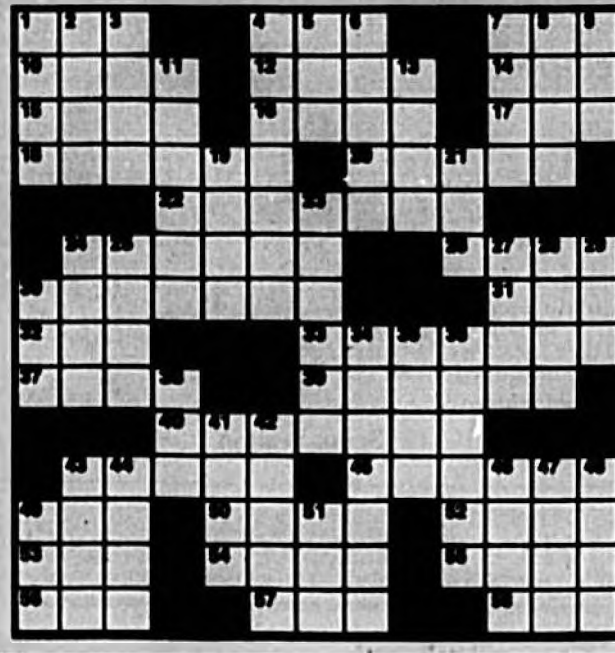
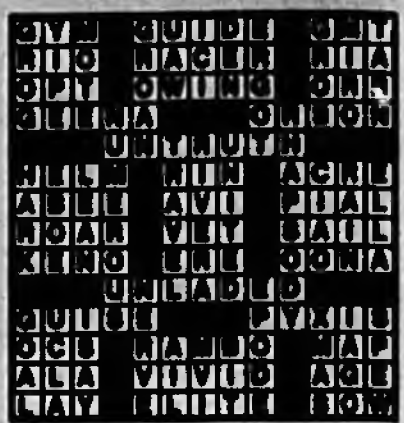

WIN AT BRIDGE

There are people who love to live dangerously... spics, test pilots, hockey goalies, some bridge dealers. Others, like spy masters, airplane engineers and hockey referees, prefer a quieter life.

Into which category do you fall? Place your thumbs over the East-West cards and decide upon your line of play in four spades. West leading the five of clubs in answer to his partner's overcall. Someone who likes to walk on the wild side will go down. Despite the two-level vulnerable overcall, he will play low from the dummy at trick one. After winning with the king, East has two winning defenses. He can return the jack of clubs, giving partner his ruff and at the same time making a suit-preference signal for a heart return. Alternatively East can switch to

the king of hearts. Declarer must lose a trick in each suit when the spades break badly.

"A spic" master, the cautious declarer, will analyze the situation accurately. He will realize that he must get the diamond suit going, and that he must anticipate that the defender will duck for one round. He rises with dummy's club ace, cashes the spade ace and leads a spade back to his partner. Next, he leads the diamond king, ducked by West, and another diamond. West wins with the ace and switches to a heart, but declarer wins with the ace, crosses to dummy with a trump, and plays off the three diamond winners. Child fights for equality

"Separate but Equal," which focuses on one of the court cases that, combined with others, made up the Supreme Court's landmark 1954 decision declaring segregated schools unconstitutional (the decision known as Brown vs. The Board of Education), actually tells two stories. Sidney Poitier, Burt Lancaster and Richard Kiley star in the four-hour ABC miniseries, airing Sunday and Monday, April 7 and 8.

Part one shows the injustices that led to the initial court case. It begins in rural 1950 Clarendon County, S.C., as a young black child, Harry Biggs Jr. (Pearce Venning), trudges more than 5 miles to school. As he walks along the road, school buses -- reserved for white children -- pass by. When the exhausted boy finally makes it to school, he dozes off during class. The child's teacher, Rev. J.A. DeLaine (Ed Hall) requests that one school bus from the county's fleet be made available for the black children, but the district superintendent turns him down. It is this callous dismissal that mobilizes the African-Americans of Clarendon County, starting with Harry Biggs Sr. (Tommy Hollis), and they turn to the NAACP's Legal Defense Fund team.

Part two is largely a courtroom drama, as lawyers prepare their cases and judges debate the legal issues and cajole their colleagues in the five cases (including the Clarendon County case) that were considered collectively in Brown vs. The Board of Education.

The legal drama focuses on two heroes of the civil-rights movement. One is an individual Thurgood Marshall (Sidney Poitier). The other is an organization: the NAACP Legal Defense Fund, which fought for justice for black Americans in the Clarendon County case. They were opposed

by John W. Davis (Burt Lancaster), a legendary lawyer who headed a blue-chip Wall Street firm and strongly believed in states' rights.

E. Barrett Prettyman, who served as historical consultant on the miniseries, was a clerk in the Supreme Court at the time of the decision, and he remembers the differences between the two lawyers. Davis, Prettyman recalls, "believed very strongly that this was an interference with state's rights, but I sensed a sadness in his voice, as if he knew that an era was ending. Marshall was more jocular and homespun. He talked to the justices in a kind of one-on-one manner."

"Separate but Equal" depicts a divided Supreme Court. Although he believes in his heart that segregation was wrong, Justice Felix Frankfurter (Mike Nussbaum) is leery of defying years of legal precedent. He often discusses the case with his clerk, one of Frankfurter's traits that Prettyman remembers fondly. Other justices differed from the loquacious Frankfurter; Justice Douglas, for example, was a loner, a fact that comes through in the miniseries.

In the end, a new chief justice, Earl Warren (Richard Kiley), unites the court, which overturns school segregation. But in the course of the four-year fight, both Harry Briggs Sr. and the Rev. DeLaine lost their jobs -- and Harry Briggs Jr., the boy who started the whole case rolling, never did get to attend a desegregated school.
