

### Dollfuss Dedicated Self To Upholding Independence Of Austria On Accepting Office

The Austrian premier, Dr. Engelbert Dollfuss, for a time the youngest and one of the boldest prime ministers in Europe was engaged in a struggle to maintain Austria's independence in the turbulent period beginning in May, 1932, when Austria was starting to succumb to the economic and political pressure of Germany and Italy.

In a fortnight he was back at his desk again.

Dollfuss was born Oct. 4, 1892, in Tetsch, Lower Austria, and spent his boyhood on a farm. He studied law in Vienna and worked in the turbulent period beginning in May, 1932, when Austria was starting to succumb to the economic and political pressure of Germany and Italy.

Afterwards he became active in agricultural organizations, was secretary of the Lower Austrian Peasants' League and helped organize the Lower Austrian Chamber of Agriculture. In 1920 he went on the executive staff of the federal railways and was named president of the lines in March, 1931, he became minister of agriculture and in May, 1932, President Miklas asked him to form a cabinet.

"Dollfuss" was only 4 feet 11 inches tall and his size was a prolific subject of jest which he would not take on. He was once when introduced at a luncheon as "Europe's youngest chancellor," he chimed in with "and the smallest of them all."

Dollfuss, Austria's "little Napoleon," talked with Benito Mussolini, Italy's stoutly belligerent, to such good effect that he went back to Vienna as premier. He was concerned with Italy would follow upon any change in the independent status of Austria.

### Dillinger's Captors To Get Pay Boosts

WASHINGTON, July 26.—(AP)—J. Edgar Hoover, chief of the justice department's division of investigation, announced yesterday that the captors of the gangster Alvin Karpis, who was shot in the back of the head by a police officer in Chicago, will receive pay raises.

Hoover would not disclose the extent of the compensation increases other than to say that the men had been advanced on the grade scale for division of investigation executives which runs from \$4,600 to \$5,400 a year.

10 Fishermen Said Dead After Wreck

Brief report of the disaster came today from the British consular agent which told of the picking up of survivors "about 50 miles off shore. An earlier message from the Atlantic coast schooner men were missing but the fact that the schooner carried 15 men indicated that it was lost.

### WIDESPREAD RAINS BRING LATE RELIEF

WIDESPREAD rains and generally cloudy skies over the major portion of the nation Friday brought relief after a week of stifling weather with 100 degree and higher readings not uncommon. The heat took a toll of 1,429 lives.

Moisture was far from adequate, however, and most of the country received merely a surface wetting. Prices on the Chicago Board of Trade were higher for corn, but lower for wheat and soybeans. Crop experts continued to predict greatly decreased yields of all staple grains because of the protracted drought.

Out of the dust and misery of the nation's worst drought two developments arose today.

The first was a possibility that the Bankhead Act, involving compulsory reduction of the cotton crop in Oklahoma, Texas and New Mexico, might be extended to the South, notably, Texas and Oklahoma. This has led officials to wonder whether the crop would be reduced even lower than the 10 percent now permitted under the Bankhead Act.

A second development was the government's expansion of the Federal Reserve Act, which was passed in 1913, to include the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas, Texas.

### 3 KEY FIGURES IN DILLINGER CASE HELD BY POLICE

Starhernberg Asks Spirit Of Dollfuss To Be Mediator Of Nation Before God

VIENNA, July 26.—(AP)—The spirit of Engelbert Dollfuss, Austria's slain martyr, was invoked today by Acting Chancellor Franz Starhernberg in a public broadcast before the Austrian people.

Other hundreds of thousands of Austrians, who had been crushed by the Nazi uprisings, were today being urged to stand firm.

Starhernberg, in a broadcast, said that the nation was in a state of crisis and that the people must stand firm.

He called for the spirit of Dollfuss to be a mediator of the nation before God.

Government Drives In Foes Over Borders Under Withering Barrage Of Bullets

VIENNA, July 26.—(AP)—Government rifles, machine guns, and artillery drove the rebellious enemies of Engelbert Dollfuss out of Austria today.

Government forces in Styria were crushing the Nazi uprising, forcing the brown-shirted rebels from their positions in mountain passes and villages. Many fled over the Yugoslavian border.

Fighting continued in Carinthia where the Nazis have been more successful, and a Red leader declared that if Red forces in that province are held out until tonight, "We shall be ready to start a new push in Styria and the time will come when we will be more successful."

## BRITAIN NOT TO INTERVENE IN AUSTRIA

### Simon Reveals Policy Of Nation As One Of Watchful Waiting; Baldwin Scoffs War

LONDON, July 30. (A.P.)—Sir John Simon, British Foreign Secretary, informed the House of Commons today that Great Britain has no present intention of intervening to preserve Austrian independence.

Replying to a question as to what steps the government is taking to preserve Austria's integrity, Sir John said: "His Majesty's government is continuing to watch the situation carefully but no action on its part is called for or is in contemplation."

The Foreign Secretary, however, declined to answer a question as to whether Great Britain "has made a direct proposal to the German government expressing its disapprobation" of alleged interference in Austrian general affairs. The Foreign Secretary asked that the question be submitted formally in advance.

Stanley Baldwin, acting Prime Minister of Great Britain, said in the House of Commons today that there is no immediate danger of war in Europe despite the difficulties and perplexities of the present situation.

He made the statement in defending Great Britain's recently announced plans to increase its air force. He opposed the labor party's motion of censure declaring "There is no cause at all for a panic of any kind. As far as I can see there is no risk in the immediate future of peace being broken. It might well be that peace will not be broken, and there are a great many people in Europe who will do all they can to see to it that it is not broken."

Nearly \$200 worth of clothing belonging to Andrew M. Carraway, manager of the Sanford Country Club was stolen from the club last night while Mr. and Mrs. Carraway were attending the Milane Theater.

Entering, they found that the office had been ransacked after it had been entered through a rear window, and that the main part of the building had been entered through a screen window near the kitchen.

## Mussolini Tribunal Wipes Out Class Rule

ROME, July 30. (A.P.)—The highest classed forest guard is entitled by the dignity of his office to wear a uniform, the supreme court has decided.

Seeing all doubts as to how far the government would go to back up fascist militarism, the tribunal ordered a rebuff for Alfredo Motta, of Lucca. He had been absolved by lower courts of charges toward two forest patrollers.

The high court held that "even the forest militia are agents of public safety and therefore any affront to them constitutes a public outrage."

Motta requested interference of the guards in what he considered a strictly private altercation with a neighbor. Asked by them what the law was about he told them to "keep their own business."

## HARRIMAN OKEYS HOMESTEAD IDEA PLANNED BY U. S.

### National C. Of C. Head Terms It Fundamental, Far-Reaching

WASHINGTON, July 30. (A.P.)—Henry I. Harriman, president of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, yesterday described the Administration's subsistence experimentation as "the most fundamental and far-reaching movement under way today."

"Approve of the subsistence homestead projects?" Harriman repeated. "Of course I do."

The chamber's president had just returned from a visit to Readville, W. Va., where with the aid of Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt one of the first subsistence undertakings was established.

This venture was assailed as "communistic" by Dr. William A. Wirtz, of Gary, Ind., in his testimony before a House committee. "Social security has got to be given the people of the country," Harriman said in an interview. "The subsistence homestead projects will show us the way to the necessary decentralization of industry; the relief of mass congestion in the cities; provision for workers to own their own homes and contribute to their own support."

## GEORGIANHELD AS VIOLATOR OF NRA CODE

### Road Contractor Said To Have Paid As Low As 10 Cents An Hour For 17 Hour Shifts

ATLANTA, July 30. (A.P.)—Charged by the federal government with violation of the NRA construction code, John E. Whitley, highway contractor and close friend of Governor Talmadge, was arrested here yesterday and released after posting \$5000 bond.

An information charging Whitley with violating the code on 70 counts for paying wages as low as 10 cents an hour for working days ranging up to 17 hours was filed in federal court at Macon because the alleged violations occurred within jurisdiction of the middle Georgia district court there.

Coming here from his home at Lagrange, Ga., Whitley surrendered to the United States marshal and appeared before the United States commissioner to arrange bond. His trial was set for Nov. 8 before Federal Judge James S. Deaver.

The information filed at Macon Saturday, which takes the place of an indictment before a federal grand jury, resulted from an investigation by Irwin Geiger, member of the litigation division of the NRA at Washington.

The alleged violations took place on a state-financed paving project and no federal funds were involved. Geiger said his investigation revealed that the Whitley Construction company had worked employes as much as double the maximum allowed, which is eight hours for a 24 hour period.

Geiger said he learned Whitley has discharged some of the employes whose names are mentioned in the complaint and said that seven were "fired" Friday.

The NRA several weeks ago withdrew from Whitley the Blue Eagle, although he never had signed the code and contended he had no eagle to give back. Geiger said that under the law Whitley's company came under the NRA code regardless of whether he had signed.

The maximum penalty which could be assessed against Whitley on conviction is \$500 for each count. Conviction on all 70 counts would bring a maximum fine of \$35,000.

In a statement Whitley said the charges were "persecution against me for political purposes."

## PILOTS PUZZLED STATE TREASURY BY FAILURE OF BALANCE BETTER THAN LAST YEAR

### Stratospherists Who Escaped Death Find Instruments Ruined

HOLDREGE, Neb., July 30. (A.P.)—Varying theories for failure of the huge balloon "Explorer" to reach its proud goal of a new stratospheric altitude record were expressed by members of its crew yesterday as they counted up full total loss of their equipment.

To the loss of the mammoth gas bag—largest ever constructed containing about three acres of fabric—and the flattened and split gondola, they added regretfully destruction of their ton of valuable scientific instruments—all except the spectrophotograph.

A check of the instruments within the metal cubic during its thrill-packed ten-hour flight of more than 300 miles to a height of 60,000 feet was completed yesterday by Major William E. Kepner, pilot and commander of the expedition, and his aides, Captains Albert W. Stevens and Orvil A. Anderson. All saved themselves by parachute jumps from their disabled craft.

Stevens said the "mechanical brains" furnished by more than a score of societies cooperating with the flight backers—the Army Air Corps and National Geographic Society had been destroyed by the jarring crash of the gondola. The spectrophotograph, however, had been hung outside during the trip into the upper reaches, and floated to earth on a separate parachute.

## MISS DRESSLER WILL BE GIVEN SIMPLE BURIAL

### Death Finally Claims Indomitable Will Of Woman Who Starred For Over 50 Years

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif., July 30. (A.P.)—The body of Marie Dressler, most beloved of the picture actresses, will be taken to her home yesterday from Santa Barbara, where she died Saturday after a long illness.

Two friends of many years' standing, Mr. and Mrs. Alan Walker, who were with her when she died peacefully, consulted with several others among her closest companions about funeral arrangements. She had no living relatives.

Simple rites were planned. "Her life was so simple, and we know it was her wish that the last ceremonies be unostentatious," said Walker.

Death conquered an indomitable will in claiming the life of the 62-year-old actress. She really fought to live. She wanted to make an other picture, create another character whose tears, smiles, defeats, triumphs and grumpy old ways would thrill again from screens throughout the world.

Disease cut short the career that led from poverty to the pinnacle of screen immortality. She was stricken three years ago. She knew then her years were numbered but she continued her work, even to the point when her appearances before the camera had to be curtailed to short durations because of the pain she suffered.

Marie Dressler carried on, however, and her will to live remained with her almost to the minute of her death. Almost a month ago her physician abandoned all hope, saying death might come in a few hours, a few days, and surely within a few weeks.

She was in a coma for more than three weeks, unable to recognize those about her. Shortly before she took her last conscious breath she seemed to know the end was near. "I did put up a good fight, didn't I?"

Those were the last words she spoke. Her physician marveled at her resistance.

Uremia was the immediate cause of death. It was one of the complications of a cancerous growth in the lower abdomen.

For more gifted than most of her contemporaries, Miss Dressler was known as one of the most brilliant conversationalists in Hollywood. She did not have the benefits of a grammar school education, but she was an avid newspaper reader and fulfilled a promise made to her mother when she left home as a child to join a road show, that she would read a newspaper every day.

Her success on the screen is unrivaled. The academy of motion picture arts and sciences awarded her the first prize for the best performance of the season 1933-34. It was given her for her role "Min," in the movie, "Min and Toll."

## DOLLFUSS WAS MURDERED BY EX-SOLDIER

### Disgruntled Sergeant Fired Fatal Bullet; Schuschnigg Named As New Chancellor

VIENNA, July 30. (A.P.)—Authorities today pinned the murder of Chancellor Dollfuss to a disgruntled former Army sergeant.

They announced that Otto Planetta, who was disgraced from the military service because of his Nazi sympathies, had confessed firing the shot Wednesday which killed the Austrian leader.

Then they moved ahead under the leadership of the new Chancellor, Dr. Kurt Schuschnigg, to smash the stubborn resistance of Nazi groups still holding out against government forces in various sections of the country.

LONDON, July 30. (A.P.)—A reliable source stated tonight that the British government has learned that an official statement issued in Berlin last Wednesday proclaiming the overthrow of Chancellor Dollfuss is "as important as it is welcome." This statement, according to the same source, was withdrawn a half hour later before it could be published in any of the newspapers of Germany. Quarters close to the British government attach great importance to the fact that this statement was purported to have been issued by an official German news agency in Berlin in view of protests emanating from the German capital disclaiming any connection with Bavarian activities and Austrian internal affairs. The German statement was said to have been based on "official and private reports from Austria" and concluded: "The new government will see to it that order is restored and that pan-Germanism is given a home also in German Austria."

No "new government" with such a program had even a home momentary control in Austria, the Nazi rebellion having thus far proved abortive.

Dr. Schuschnigg, a monarchist, took the leadership of Austria today and the guns of civil war which had cracked for four days were silent.

Silent except in Carinthia province which borders Italy and Yugoslavia. There Nazis occupy a stronghold and maintain their defiance of the Fascism which they sought, following the assassination of Dollfuss, to overthrow.

No new fighting developed over the week-end but authorities here were fearful that another Nazi attack, a putch planned for last night but which failed to develop, would break.

Vienna, although strongly patrolled at strategic points, was serenely peaceful under a beautiful sky. (Continued on Page Three)

HOUSTON, Texas, July 30. (A.P.)—Red Cross officials started rehabilitation work recently following the hurricanes and tidal waves that took at least 10 lives along the Texas coast. The tenth victim was Mrs. J. H. Howard, Bay City.
