Dr. MacKenzie is speaking here tonight in the interest of Dr. Fons Hathaway, erstwhile leading candidate for governor. Dr. MacKenzie is an able speaker, a fine man, and would make an excellent governor himself.

There is an important meeting tonight in Lake Mary pertaining to the county commissioners' race. Some persons have seen fit to resort to not only underhanded but also unlawful methods in their endeavor to defeat the incumbent.

A friend of ours has just received a very frank expression of opinion from Bryan Mack, editor of the Lakeland Ledger, and candidate for delegate to the Democratic National Convention.

Who Can Defeat Catts?

Among the quantities of political propaganda sent to us daily from the Hathaway headquarters in Jacksonville, frequently comes the statement that the voters must unite upon Hathaway in order to defeat Catts. Such poppycock is daily becoming more and more ridiculous as Hathaway's strength rapidly diminishes and he drops from second into third and possibly fourth place in the race.

This rapid decline in the road chairman's popularity is due, we believe, very largely, to two reasons: his utter lack of any personal appeal, and the irregularities which have been revealed in his department. We have no doubt that either of these reasons would be sufficient to defeat him, but combined they have served practically to eliminate him as a factor in the race.

Wherever Hathaway has gone, he has been preceded, and followed by, whole pages of advertising, and by bill dodgers and ballyhoosers, who have sought to make up in sheer racket what their candidate lacked in popularity. We are informed that in other counties, as in Seminole, Dr. Hathaway would have fared better had he left his campaign to his loud speakers and contented himself with attending to his duties in Tallahassee. Wherever he has gone, he has lost votes.

In addition to that, people are beginning to see that Dr. Hathaway is expecting too much to ask the voters to take his word as to his own honesty against the affidavits and photostatic copies of the records which Mr. Carlton has produced. The Tampa candidate has produced the records, which, by the way, are Hathaway's own records, and they show the grossest kinds of irregularities. But Hathaway has simply said, "I didn't do it," and he expects to be believed.

But even if there were some truth in the Hathaway ballyhoo that he is the only man who can defeat Catts, we still could not favor his candidacy. We can not see the advisability of voting against one man who was merely a petty grafter in order to support another who has already demonstrated his ability at being a profiteer of the first rank. We cannot see that Florida would be much better off under the rule of Fons Hathaway than with Sidney J. Catts at the helm.

Dr. Hathaway's leading opponent is, however, not only a man who can defeat Catts, but also one well worth defeating him with. In as hot a campaign as has ever been staged in Florida, not one thing has the opposition been able to produce against Doyle Carlton. The very worst they have been able to do is that they have "mud-slinged" and that he is mud-slinging. As far as his being a slacker is concerned, he was no more of a slacker than Fons Hathaway who even now looks as if he could serve efficiently as a private.

And as far as mud-slinging goes, we greatly prefer mud-slinging to graft and corruption.

Using The Lake

The advocacy of sport that has come to be looked upon as the recreation of kings and the pastime of millionaires would seem to be a little untimely during these days of economic stringency when most of us are finding it difficult to indulge in a little golf or tennis.

Perhaps the suggestion that our citizens take fuller advantage of the wonderful opportunities for boating on Lake Monroe may have come to us from the effects of an intoxication resulting solely from gazing at that beautiful body of water and imagining the sight of a closehaired sloop racing before a stiff breeze. At any rate we cannot think of a sport which offers such exhilarating enjoyment just at the same time has so ideal a setting as boating on the general and sailing in particular on our own incomparable lake.

Apart from its actual benefit to those who enjoy the exercise of sitting behind a tiller and watching the water gurgle through the scuppers, there is a more practical side to the ever increasing popularity of nautical diversion. If Sanford is to make a serious bid for its share of Florida's yearly tourist pilgrimage it must have sufficient attractions to attract and hold the tired northern business men seeking relaxation in our warm climate.

At the English seaside resorts or along the Riviera where the tourist crop is the only crop, sailing fills no little part in the daily life of the visitors. We know of but few Florida cities that have seen the opportunity in this direction and we believe that Sanford, through a little interest on the part of her home people, could lay the foundation for an attraction that would be of measurable value to her future position as a leading tourist resort of central Florida.

THE CATTS' HALLUCINATION

Sidney J. Catts has gone over the state and gathered to himself quite a following by advocating a wide open state on gambling. If he is elected, he tells the people, they can have horse races, dog races and even cat races, if they want them. Sidney J. Catts is all things to all men if by any means he can gather votes to himself. It seems unaccountably strange to us that a man of this type should be able to fool the public in this day and generation. Nowadays, we like men who are straight-forward, four-square, upstanding. When a man who has been or who is a minister of the gospel comes before the people and makes an appeal to them for their votes by advocating wholesale gambling, and, inferentially all the iniquities which accompany it, he is manifestly writing himself down a political trickster.

Sidney J. Catts leaves on us the impression that he is either a counterfeit preacher or a political mountebank. If either conclusion is true, he is not a man to be trusted with the administration of the affairs of the state. Tallahassee. If the voters will give the matter a little thought, they will readily see that Sidney J. Catts cannot fulfill his campaign promises. There is no likelihood of the legislature voting to make the state wide open on gambling, than there is of the Republicans carrying Mississippi. John W. Martin, the present governor, had it been possible for him to do so, would have kept the race tracks open. It is not likely that Sidney J. Catts can accomplish what John W. Martin failed to do. The law prohibiting racing is on the statute books. The supreme court has made a ruling which makes it imperative that the governor should execute the law. If Sidney J. Catts, should be elected, were to take any action to

invalidate the law, he would be impeached and thrown out of office. In pretending that he will use his almost powers to open the state wide to all kinds of races, he is seemingly resorting to the art of the mountebank and endeavoring to fool the people. The people, who are thinking of voting for Catts on this issue, should get their eyes open, for they are under a great delusion. If elected, it will be absolutely impossible for him to deliver the goods. There are a good many people who are figuring on voting for Catts because they think he can open the race tracks, who do not relish the idea of having a man like Catts sitting in the governor's chair at Tallahassee. Catts has a rather unenviable reputation on account of some reputed conduct with peonage affairs and the wholesale pardoning of convicted rapists. Southern chivalry, we hope, is not dead in Florida. Although some men may be willing to compromise themselves on the gambling issue, the women of the state certainly cannot vote for a man who when governor exercised his pardoning power as did Sidney J. Catts. Nor do we believe the voters of Florida at this time, when Florida is being built up in the good opinion of the nation, are willing to bring it to disrepute by electing as governor an eccentric and grotesque figure as Sidney J. Catts. What Florida needs today to establish itself more securely in the high esteem of the nation and promote its prosperity, is an outstanding man as governor who can be depended upon to give it a sane and sensible administration of its affairs. We do not think Sidney J. Catts is this type of a man and we do not like to see good citizens fooled into voting for him, on the specious and

### GREAT MANHUNT CONTINUES AFTER 4 BANK ROBBERS

Casualties Stand At 3 Known Dead, Two Wounded And One Missing As Result Of Wild Looting Of Bank In Kansas

LAMAR, Colo., May 28—(INS)—Search for the four bandits who robbed the First National Bank of this city, leaving a trail of murder in their wake, continued today along the southern Kansas Colorado state line.

The casualty list to date stands at three dead, two wounded and one missing. A. N. Parfitt, president of the looted bank, and his son, John Parfitt, cashier, were killed during the holdup. Dr. W. W. Whelinger, of Dickinson, Kan., was slain, presumably by the bandits, after being lured from his home to attend one of the wounded desperadoes.

The fate of E. A. Kessinger, bank teller, who was abducted by the bandits, is still unknown. It is believed he has either been killed or is being held as a "pawn" through whom the bandits hope to negotiate for their lives and assurance of a fair trial if they are cornered by the posse.

Reports from Hill City, Kan., state that two men from that place were shot and seriously wounded when a sheriff's posse mistook them for the bandits. This incident reflects the hair-trigger tension throughout the district. Undoubtedly the bandits, when found, will be shot on sight.

The greatest manhunt in the history of the West has gathered momentum each hour since the bank robbery of last Wednesday. Virtually every male resident within a hundred miles of the Kansas Colorado state line has taken up arms and joined one of a dozen-like posses scouring the district.

**New Haven Planning For Costly City Hall**  
NEW HAVEN, Conn., May 28—(INS)—A dozen architects are working on plans for a costly city hall here to replace a sixty-year-old brown stone pile that has sheltered New Haven's municipal affairs adequately in the past.

Dean Everett V. Meeke, of Yale School of fine arts, who will be the final arbiter of plans, has six New Haven and six New York architects lined up with sketches, and several of these workers will be commissioned to draw plans. The structure will front New Haven Green, facing Yale University, two undestructed blocks away.
