(EST) a Roman Catholic priest sprinkled holy water into the well which Atteo had been digging in a Brooklyn garage. Rescue workers had dug a secondary shaft down to his level and knuckled out the dirt wall between the two shafts to about eight feet above his head. Atteo's comely wife, Maria, 32, collapsed about 5 A.M. after an all-night vigil at the mouth of the shaft. But by 7 A.M. she was back at the shaft mouth, her tear-stained face taut, her lips inactive soundlessly. Nearly a son by a first wife John, 26, set with his face cradled in his arms in despair. Atteo, father of six children, suffered burns on the hands and face when a lit cigarette passed down to him exploded from the effects of oxygen piped into the fetid well bottom.

(Continued From Page One) the fall term in 1951. Ten southern states do not have facilities for giving graduate courses in social work to white or Negro students. Under the proposal, their students would go to qualified schools in other southern states. The states are Alabama, Arkansas, Georgia, Florida, Louisiana, Tennessee and Virginia. Present plans call for nine institutions to accept students from these 10 states. The schools are Atlanta University (Negroes), Florida State University, the University of Louisiana, Louisiana State University, the Nashville School of Social Work, the University of Oklahoma, the University of South Carolina, Tulane University and William and Mary College. They are to accept a total of 90 white and 75 Negro students. William J. McGlothlin, associate director of the Compact's board of control, said this would not supply the demand for graduate-trained social workers, but through regional financing the schools could expand and improve their facilities.

For each student sent to an out-of-state school, the student's home state would pay \$750. The student would have to pay his tuition. Out-of-state tuition charges would be waived for regional plan students.

U.S. Plans To Send Immediate Support To Southeast Asia

Military And Economic Aid Will Go To Indonesia, Burma, Malaya, IndoChina

WASHINGTON, May 11 (AP) — Undersecretary of State Webb said today the United States plans immediate military and economic aid to southeast Asia.

Webb told a news conference: 1. The Department "plans to implement at once" a recommendation by a special survey mission that about \$60,000,000 be used for economic help to the area. This mission was headed by Allen Guffin, publisher of the Monterey, Calif. Peninsula Herald.

2. The military needs of the area will be met by drawing on President Truman's "emergency fund" of \$79,000,000 approved by congress for the general area of China.

3. Webb did not go into details of distribution of aid. In Paris last Monday, Secretary Acheson said American economic and military help would be sent immediately to French IndoChina. The French have been carrying on a shooting war there against the forces of Communist-trained Ho Chi Minh for four years.

4. In speaking of American aid to southeast Asia, Webb said Guffin's recommendations for economic help "are modest." He said:

"The Department is working jointly with ECA to implement the economic and technical aid recommendations for IndoChina as well as the other states of southeast Asia and anticipates (Continued on Page Five)

Jesuit Priest Takes Case To Manila Court

Rev. Hogan Picketed With Striking Airlines Employees

MANILA, May 11 (AP) — A Jesuit priest under government fire for joining Philippine airline pickets prepared today to test his case "to the bitter end."

The priest, the Rev. Walter Hogan, formerly of Philadelphia (Melrose Avenue, East Lansdowne) was called an "undesirable alien" and a "mere agitator" yesterday by Secretary of Labor Pimentel Luvina.

The churchman said he joined four dismissed airline employees in the picket line at Manila's international airport because he agreed with them their dismissal was unjust.

The airline claimed the men were discharged for participating in an illegal strike two years ago. Reverend Hogan charges they were dismissed for union leadership.

The priest said he might be deported for his action but that his place would be taken by another priest who would continue his fight. He said he is the head of a church sponsored institute of social order in the Philippines. The organization, he said, seeks to promote a decent standard of living through social justice.

Reverend Hogan said the average daily wage of unskilled Philippine laborers is \$2.46 a day, skilled laborers \$3.28.

"Under such conditions," he said, labor "naturally" is drawn toward Communism.

As the situation critical here," the priest said, "is that the workers are in a 'black' state, an adequate diet and is not prepared for any emergency because of his income. This is all wrong."

Meanwhile in Taipei, Nationalist warplanes claimed to have bombed many casualties of Chinese Communist troops on Taohsu Island in a raid on barracks.

The island is seven miles south of Chusan Island, main Nationalist base of the China coast.

The escape of Joe "Mike" Dixon, 18 year old youth who had served 10 years to 10 years at Rufford Penitentiary Nov. 20 for the shooting of his uncle Carroll English, was reported to the State Highway Patrol yesterday by authorities at the Correctional Institute at Chattahoochee where Dixon was confined.

Sanford police have been notified of the escape through the Highway Patrol headquarters at Deland.

The shotgun shooting of English took place on Oct. 3 on flooded ground near a fishing shack on the north shore of Lake Jessup. After a Grand Jury had indicted the youth with a charge of first degree murder, the trial jury returned a verdict of manslaughter and Judge M. B. Smith pronounced sentence.

U. S Secret Service Breaks Up Big Counterfeiting Syndicate

Buffalo, N. Y., May 11 (AP) — The U. S. Secret Service claimed today it had broken up a million-dollar counterfeiting syndicate that allegedly operated in 26 states and in Canada.

A printing press and plates were seized yesterday in a raid on a house in suburban Depew. Two men were arrested.

U. E. Baughman, chief of the Secret Service, said in Washington it was probably the most important crackdown against counterfeiting in years.

Secretary of the Treasury Snyder said the arrest of Matthew Zlodinski, 67, and Bernard Neuner, 30, appeared to wind up the case.

More than 10 men had been arrested previously as principals in the syndicate. Sixty-four others have been charged with passing bogus bills in various cities.

Neuner, an artist for a lithographic firm, was accused of "manufacturing" plates used to print \$50,000 in bogus Canadian money and about the same amount in American notes.

He is alleged to have printed \$100,000 in bogus notes.

Vatican Charger Soviet Official With Plotting

Broadcaster Claims Vishinsky Helped To Smash Church

VATICAN CITY, May 11 (AP) — The Vatican radio charged today that Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Y. Vishinsky plotted with Czechoslovak Communist leaders to bring about the complete destruction of the Roman Catholic church in Czechoslovakia.

The broadcast said that Moscow still is the driving power behind the Prague regime's campaign against the church.

Vishinsky, the broadcast said, was among Soviet functionaries who attended a secret meeting in Karlbad to plot against the church. The broadcast did not say when this meeting was supposed to have been held, but Vishinsky was in Karlbad in January, 1949, ostensibly to mend his health at that spa.

The plot, said the broadcaster, was developed around a so-called "Catholic Youth" group which was organized by students at the University of Prague, yesterday told Klement of the high school required of the 500 Catholic public accountants in Prague. PHILADELPHIA, May 11 (AP) — The Pennsylvania Railroad announced today it is furnishing \$3,000 of its 125,000 employees as a result of the strike of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen and Engineers.

CHICAGO, May 11 (AP) — Unemployment mounted steadily today as rail moving and other industries began feeling the effects of the strike of its sensitive line.

With no peace prospects under way in any of the prospects for early settlement, said a government mediator.
