





# Teachers To Enter Politics In 'Less Noisy' Manner

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — An official of the Florida Education Association says school teachers this year will be "much more politically active than they were in the past, but they'll be much less noisy about it."

George Swart, the FEA's legislative liaison specialist, said the FEA will hold special public hearings this month and a delegate assembly in November to mold its recommendations for the 1968 legislative session.

The legislative specialists said they already proposed to the FEA call for a push in the legislature to eliminate millage restrictions on local school support, increase the educational improvement program passed last year, and to raise the minimum qualifications for school board members, stronger tenure laws, a professional negotiating statute, higher teacher salaries and a lower pupil-teacher ratio.

Swart said the FEA has prepared books on the voting records of legislators, a special volume on people who proposed legislation, and records on attitudes expressed by lawmakers in talks with FEA staff members.

The FEA recently lifted sanctions of Florida schools ending a 14-month-long battle with state and local school officials that included a statewide teacher walkout. Additional funds for teacher pay raises and educational programs was the central issue of the strike.

## Gi Kidnaps Policeman, Surrenders

FRESNO, Calif. (AP) — A young Army paratrooper lay wounded today by his own hand after kidnapping a police officer and dashing into the hills in a wild, three-day chase.

Fired and hungry after going without food, Darrell David Chavarria surrendered to an irrigation work crew while almost 40 officers searched for him by aircraft and on foot.

As the temperature reached 120 in the San Joaquin Valley, Chavarria handed over three guns but kept a fourth hidden in his trousers.

The 18-year-old Klamath Falls, Ore., youth pulled out the weapon at the Fresno County courthouse after the 25-mile drive from Tranquillity and shot himself in the stomach.

Chavarria listed him in fair condition after 72 hours of surgery.

"Darrell always said he would rather be dead than behind bars," said Sheriff James Crone of his son after driving to his side. She said he told her he hated the Army.

Military authorities said Chavarria had been absent without leave from Ft. Bragg, N.C., since Aug. 12. They gave no reason for his absence.

Chavarria escaped Thursday night after being arrested near Greenfield in Monterey County on a stolen car warrant.

Drawing a pistol, he forced two military policemen to stand by as he abducted Patrolman John McCarter, and drove off with him in his patrol car. Chavarria used the car radio to warn other officers away, saying McCarter would be a road block.

He used a bullet to disable the car at one point and sped on past. The car finally ran out of gas and Chavarria commandeered a pickup truck and made McCarter drive it. He fled into the hills after the policeman drove into a ditch, and tramped through the hills from Thursday until Sunday before he gave himself up at a ranch near Tranquillity.

## 'Crime Fighting' Program Eyed

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## Nixon Hits LBJ

NEW YORK (AP) — Former Vice President Richard M. Nixon has lashed out at the Democratic administration as having "broken faith with the American working man."

Nixon, the Republican presidential nominee, said in a Labor Day message to Congress that the last two years the average American worker has been on a government-operated treadmill. New taxes and wage controls have more than wiped out all the pay raises he won since 1965.

"More than \$2 billion of the great Social Security Trust Fund, the government-held pension fund accumulated from the pay checks of workers and their employers, has disappeared in the government-generated inflation of the mid-sixties," Nixon concluded. "The men of politics would better serve the end of honest labor if they simply abhorred the politics of inflation—the modern curse of the working man."

Nixon opens his campaign Wednesday at Chicago at the start of a tour of the Midwest and West.

"The hidden tax of inflation was levied heavily on the final prices we pay for the goods and services we buy," Nixon said.

"More than \$2 billion of the great Social Security Trust Fund, the government-held pension fund accumulated from the pay checks of workers and their employers, has disappeared in the government-generated inflation of the mid-sixties," Nixon concluded. ## Four Transplant Recipients OK

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — The four recipients of transplanted organs of a 20-year-old shooting victim were listed in satisfaction today.

A spokesman at Methodist Hospital said the heart recipient, William C. Carroll, 50, of Scottsdale, Ariz., and the lung recipient, William J. Whaley, 38, of Fort Lauderdale, Fla., sat up in bed and took nourishment Sunday.

The donor was Nelva Lou Hernandez, wife of a Houston warehouse foreman. Her corneas also were removed and placed in an eye bank.

Dr. Michael E. Delbak, who led the mass operation, said it was the first time that four organs from one donor had been transplanted.

The organs were transferred Saturday by five teams totaling more than 60 physicians, nurses and aides.

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## Four Die In Plane Crash

CLEWISTON (AP) — Four youthful aviation enthusiasts "out just enjoying themselves" were killed Sunday when a light plane crashed on a runway at a church yard.

The plane bounced once, Rich-bank said, and then skidded to a stop in the church yard, where it struck a large tree and a wide strutting debris over a wide death plunge began.

## Romanian Invasion Tension Eases

WASHINGTON (AP) — Concern in administration quarters over Romania appeared somewhat eased today following a reported Kremlin denial of rumors it plans to invade another East European ally.

Informants said Ambassador Anatoly F. Dobrynin brought the Soviet disclaimer to Secretary of State Dean Rusk Saturday night, in effect responding to President Johnson's public warning in a San Antonio speech Friday.

The informants stressed that the Moscow envoy had not given a flat commitment or assurance that Russian troops would not be sent to Eastern Europe.

But they welcomed the response as cooling off some of the Washington fears which had soared over the weekend.

Amid fresh reports of Soviet military movements along Romania's borders, Johnson added to his prepared speech a reference to the Czech invasion and a warning: "Let no one unleash the dogs of war."

"There are even rumors late this evening that this [Czech invasion] action might be repeated elsewhere in the days ahead in Eastern Europe," Johnson said.

But he said he has passed the President's words to Dobrynin during a 10-minute State Department meeting about the tone of the speech and heard back from the ambassador the next night.

In the interval the State Department called in envoys from the North Atlantic Treaty Organization nations for a hurried look at developments on the other side of the Iron Curtain.

The State Department announced afterwards that the continued occupation of Czechoslovakia by large numbers of Russian troops causes a change in Europe's East-West military lineup "of significance to the security of the United States and its allies."

"In the light of these events we are reviewing with our allies what the implications may be for existing arrangements to provide for our common security," the U.S. announcement said.

Pentagon officials, however, said they do not expect to abandon current plans to bring home 33,000 GIs from West Europe, leaving the U.S. force in Germany at around 300,000.

U.S. intelligence estimated Soviet troops near Romania have produced no clear sign of an impending invasion, analysts said, because the Romanians could be merely repositioning forces in connection with their Czech action.

Yet none would rule out the possibility that the Kremlin—having taken on the political onus of watching one independent-minded ally—might decide to move against another while it was at it.

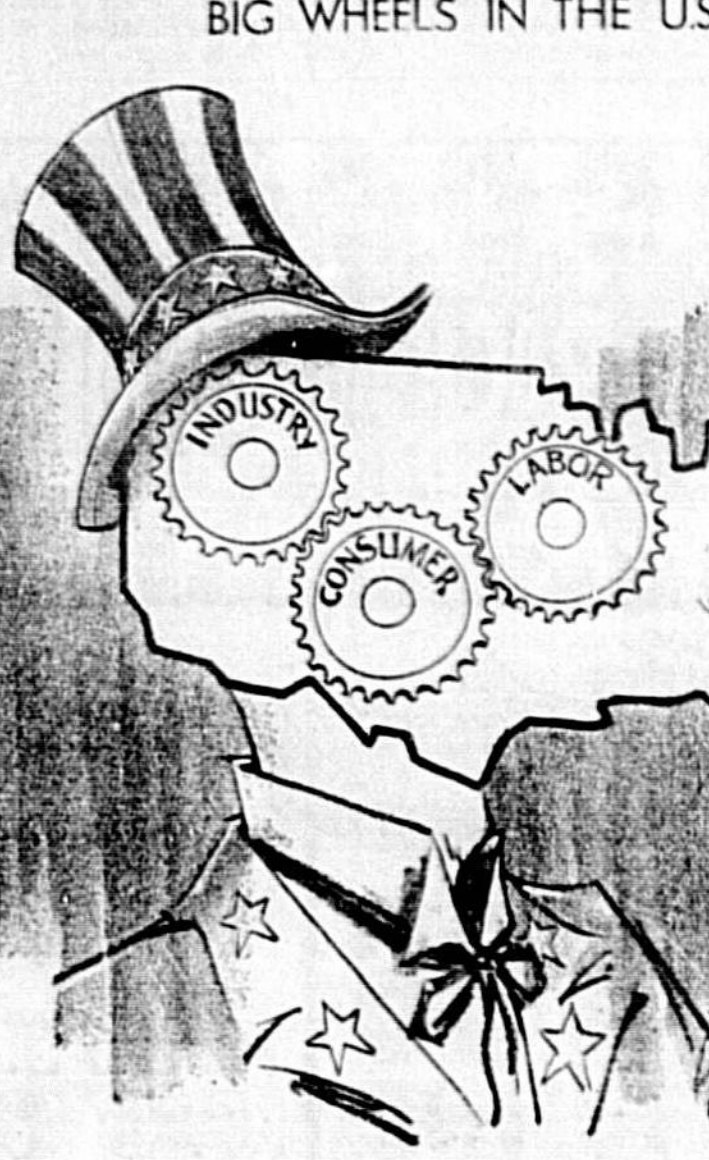

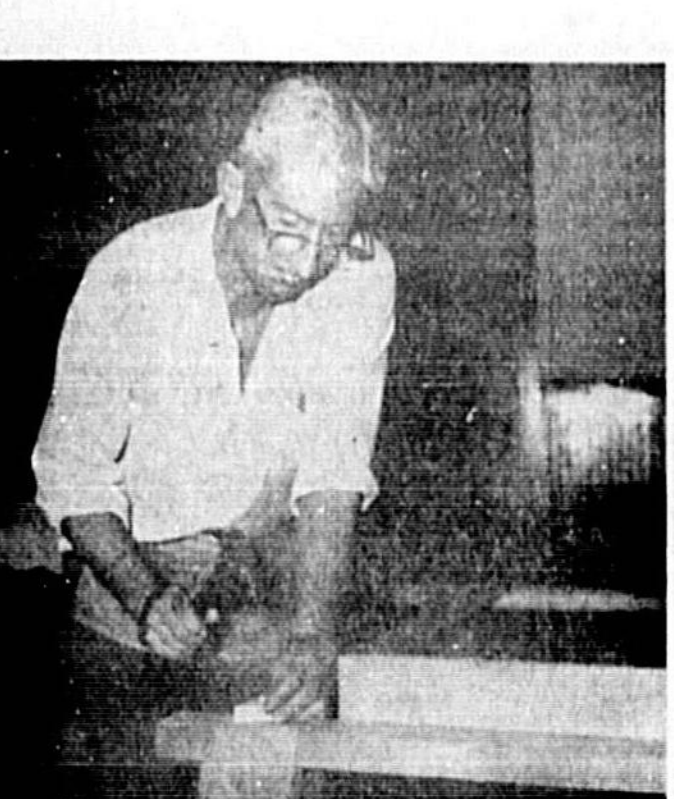

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# Czech Communists Elect New High Command

PRAGUE (AP) — Czechoslovakia's Communist party elected a new high command Sunday despite the Soviet occupation of the country.

It was not clear whether the new president elected by the central committee had been cleared by the Soviets, who in the country Aug. 20 to stop the liberalization drive by

gun by party chief Alexander Dubcek. A communist spokesman said Dubcek, who remained his post as party leader, told the central committee that withdrawal of Soviet troops from cities and towns had begun. But in Bratislava, the capital of Slovakia, mass arrests were reported as Soviet troops from cities and towns had begun to occupy public buildings and offices.

Only two members of the new 21-man presidium are known to be pro-Soviet conservatives. They are the former leader of the Slovak party, Vasil Blazek, and Jan Piliar, a former deputy premier.

The central committee at the same time elected itself by 87 members to a total of 194. The new members were delegates to the party congress that was held in Bratislava in 1967, in which Dubcek was expected tooust his conservative opponents. It is not known yet whether the congress will take place.

In Washington, meanwhile, informed sources said Soviet Ambassador Anatoly F. Dobrynin told Secretary of State Dean Rusk Saturday that the Soviets did not plan to invade Romania. Recent reports of Soviet and Hungarian troop buildups along the Romanian border had led to speculation that the Soviets were planning to subdue another restless ally by force.

In a series of weekend speeches, Romanian Premier Ion Gheorghe Maurer rejected Soviet criticism of Romania's support for Czechoslovakia.

# Iran Mourns 8,000 Dead

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) — Iran observed a national day of mourning today for more than 8,000 persons killed in an earthquake that devastated 750 square miles in the northeast part of the country.

As aftershocks continued, officials said at least 8,222 persons had been killed, 2,826 were injured and about 100,000 made homeless by the catastrophe Saturday.

Government spokesmen said no foreigners were among the victims.

Destruction of the region's underground water system raised a new threat to the thousands of survivors housed in tent cities. The army sent convoys of water tankers and food to the area.

Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi personally directed relief work from Tehran and sent Prime Minister Amir Abass Hoveida to the disaster zone along with five of his cabinet ministers.

The Shah planned to tour the region Tuesday. He was expected to order a large-scale reconstruction program as he did in the Ghazvin area after a major quake there in 1962.

The center of the quake was believed to have been near the village of Kakhak, which was leveled. At least 1,400 of the 2,000 inhabitants were reported killed or wounded. In the village of Bas-Ahad, at least half the 1,000 residents were reported killed.

More than 30 towns and villages were devastated. Officials said most of the victims were snapping in their mud-brick homes when the quake struck during the hot afternoon. Large numbers of children were playing in the streets at the time and were spared.

# 'Cut New Trails,' LBJ Tells U. S.

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — President Johnson, in his annual Labor Day statement, says Americans "must cut new trails to human justice—toward insuring that all citizens, not just some, have full opportunity to live and work in self-respect."

The statement, issued over the weekend, said the nation has "only scratched the surface" in its strides toward human dignity. But it ended on an optimistic note.

"Never before has a nation been so well-equipped to wipe out poverty, ignorance, want and other ugly forms of human misery," Johnson said.

"Today, in a time of the affluent many, labor's fight, America's fight, must be in the victims of racism, poor education, no skills, language barriers, hunger."

The chief executive attended two church services Sunday—shaking hands with parishioners filling in the aisle for communion at St. Francis Xavier Roman Catholic Church, Stone- wall, and later taking communion himself with Mrs. Johnson and daughter Lynda Bush at St. Barnabas Episcopal Church, Fredericksburg.

At the Catholic church, just a couple of miles from the LBJ Ranch, the Rev. Wunibald Schneider prayed for "unity in this country and peace in Vietnam." At St. Barnabas he turned to the west, the Rev. William Campbell prayed for "all those behind the Iron Curtain and especially those in Czechoslovakia."

There was no word on when Johnson, who has spent most of the past month at his ranch, would return to Washington. Congress sets up shop again Wednesday after recessing for the national political conventions.

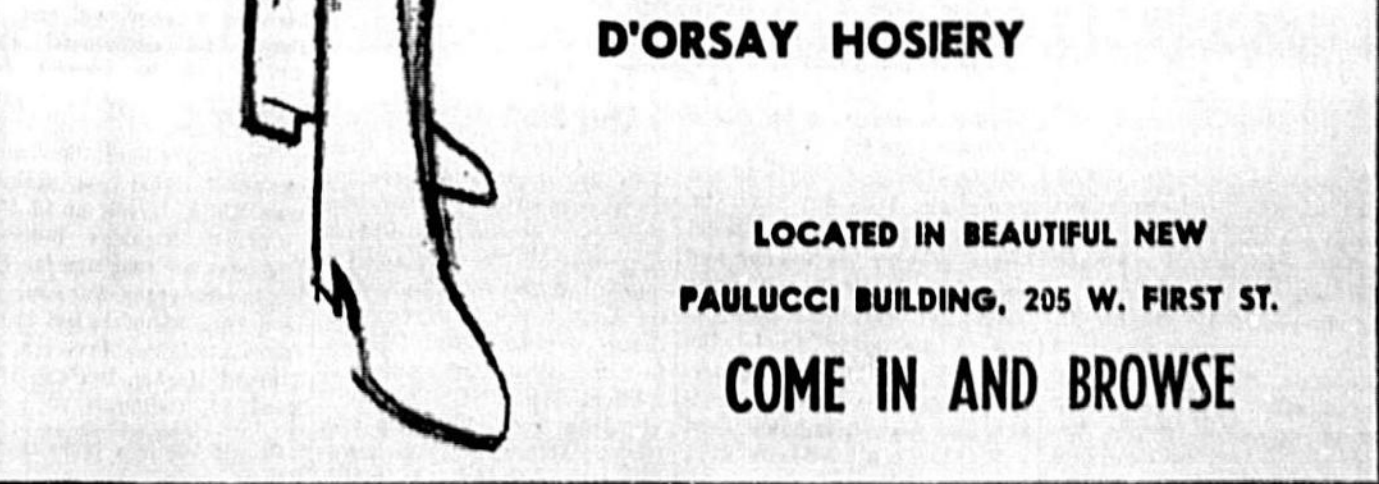

# Viet Cong Rockets Kill 27 Da Nang Civilians

SAIGON (AP) — The Viet Cong marked the 23rd anniversary today of Ho Chi Minh's proclamation of Vietnamese independence with a rocket attack on Da Nang that killed 27 Vietnamese and wounded 46. All but two of the casualties were civilians.

Five of the rockets hit the U.S. Navy's administrative headquarters in downtown Da Nang, and five caused light damage at the big airbase, but only one American Marine was wounded. The other military casualty was a South Vietnamese soldier who was killed.

Lighter barrage hit a military post at Dien Ban, 13 miles south of Da Nang, and Tam Ky, a district capital 35 miles south of Da Nang. At least five millionaires were wounded in these attacks.

A heavier barrage of 100 rockets and mortars on Sunday hit one of two Special Forces camps near Tay Ninh, north west of Saigon near the Cambodian border. The U.S. Command said one American and five Montagnard mercenaries were killed and two Americans and 11 Montagnards were wounded.



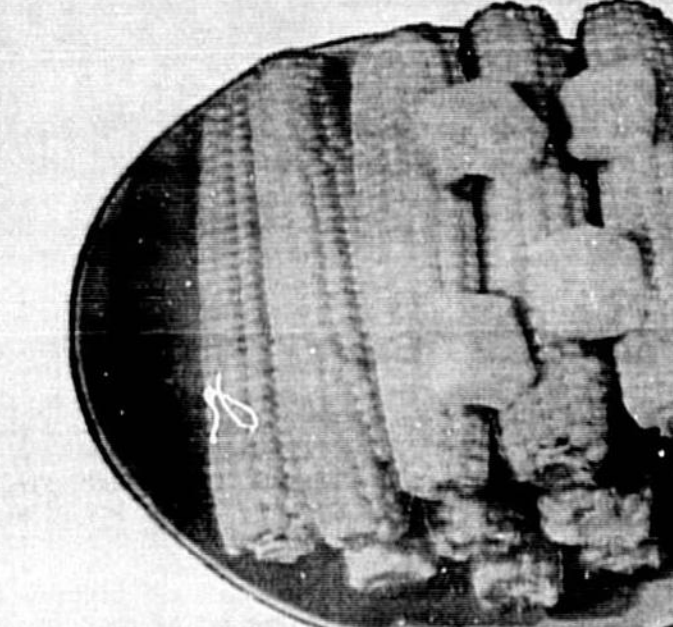

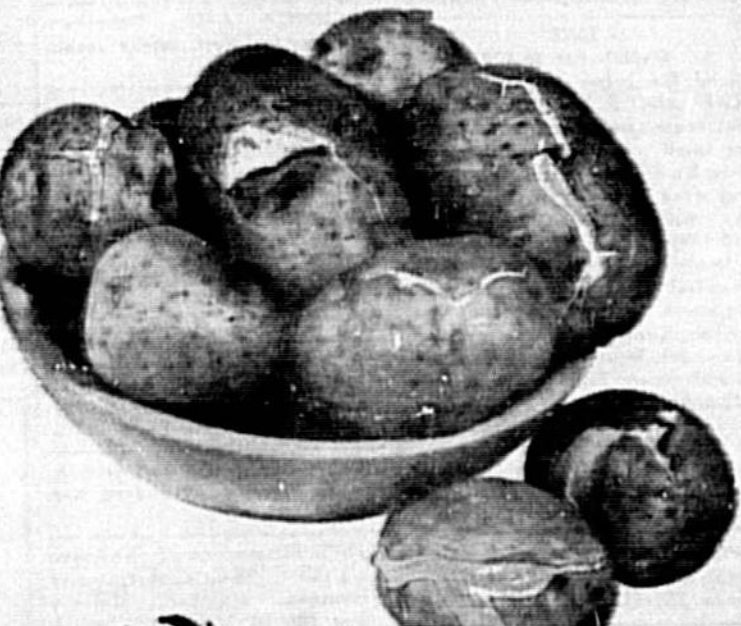
