## Price Is Honored With High Award

MOOSEHEART, Ill. — William H. Price of Sanford was awarded the highest and most coveted degree of the Loyal Order of Moose in a solemn ceremony held June 12 at Mooseheart, the famed Moose City of Children.

Price, a member of the local Moose lodge for many years, was awarded the Pilgrim Degree of Merit for his outstanding service and continued devotion to the humanitarian programs of his fraternity.

Investiture of the Pilgrim Class sponsored by Director General Paul P. Schmitz was held in the House of God, unique Children's Cathedral on the Mooseheart campus, under the leadership of Pilgrim Governor Gordon Jeffery and a staff of Past Supreme Governors.

The local Moose Pilgrim honoree was one of more than 200 Moose members from all parts of the United States and Canada to receive the degree. Distinction of the award is noted by the fact that only one of about every 5,000 Moose members receive the degree each year.

The ceremony took place during a busy day at Mooseheart. The Women of the Moose also conferred its highest degree, the College of Regents, on more than 850 qualifying graduate regents at the field house.

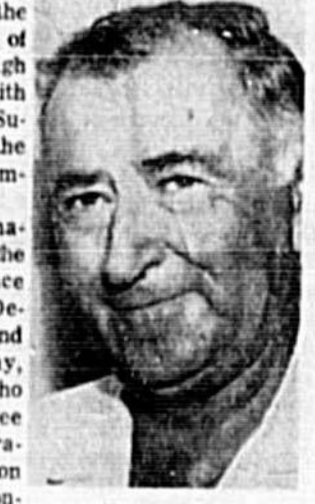

## Change Decision; Clay Is Free Man

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court today reversed the conviction of former heavyweight boxing champion Muhammad Ali, who was sentenced to five years imprisonment for draft evasion.

In an 8-0 decision, the court said the record shows that Ali's beliefs are founded on tenets of the Muslim religion as he understands them.

The 29-year-old black boxer, also known as Cassius Clay, was reigning heavyweight champion when he refused to take the traditional step forward at draft induction ceremonies April 28, 1967, in Houston.

The following month he was convicted by an all-white jury of six men and six women.

Ali had contended throughout his long legal battle that he should be draft-exempt on grounds that he was a Black Muslim minister.

In the unsigned decision, the court said the government has now fully conceded that all's beliefs are based upon "religious training and belief" as set out in previous conscientious objector cases.

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## 'Pete' Christian Is Captured Following Orlando Jailbreak

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — Convicted "satin sheet" killer James "Pete" Christian and six other prisoners escaped from the Orange County Jail Sunday night. Christian and four others have been captured.

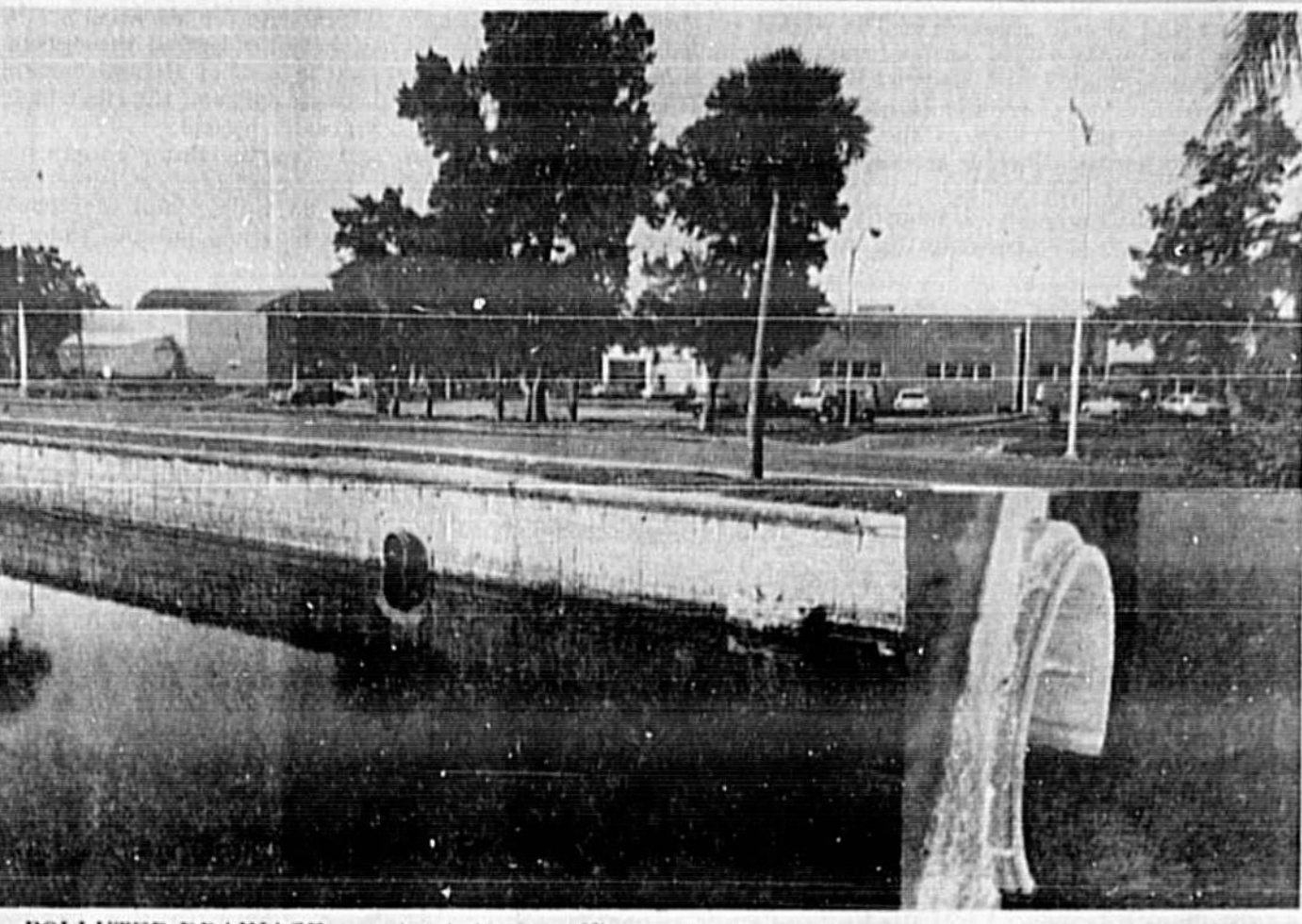
Christian and James A. Hires were captured at 2:35 a.m. today at Ormond Beach. William

Ashe and another police car set up a roadblock at the intersection of Route A1A and Seminole Blvd. Ashe said Christian and Hires got out of the car without resistance and were not armed.

Ormond Beach Police Sgt. Ray Ashe said he was patrolling when he spotted a car answering the description of one reported stolen Sunday night in Orlando.

Daytona Beach police said they were captured as they walked along the beach. They, too, did not offer resistance and were not armed.

Within minutes of the 9:11 p.m. jailbreak, a seventh escapee, Jose Hillman, 18, of Orlando, was captured on the second floor ledge of the downtown jail.

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## 2 Prisoners Are Hunted Nationwide

They all are on the lookout, but none of the municipal and county law enforcement agencies in emulous County have yet become directly involved in the nationwide manhunt for two of the prisoners remaining at large of the seven that escaped from the Orange County Jail in Orlando last night.

It is a bit out of the ordinary as the police agencies of the county have been directly involved in several dramatic chases and captures recently.

All were on the alert for the escapes that overpowered a guard about 9:30 last night and escaped out of the fifth floor of the Orlando facility.

Jail guards captured one of the fugitives while he was on the ledge of the jail and Volusia authorities captured four more before 3 a.m. Remaining at large are Leon Horton and Reverthus Burgess, both convicted felons.

Orange County Sheriff's personnel have had many problems recently, both in keeping their prisoners in the jail and contented with conditions.

Sheriff's Captain Marvin Peele said the escapes from the Orange County Jail were no more than the average for a facility of like size. There have been three successful escapes from the jail since 1970.

According to Peele, most of the problems with the prisoners have stemmed from the problems with the air conditioning system. Peele said, "At times it gets to be 110 degrees or more in the jail and the prisoners become disgruntled and throw their spoons against the windows. The problems with the air conditioning may soon be over as the system is currently being repaired."

In contrast to the Orange County situation, Seminole County Sheriff John Polk has had no escapes from the jail since he took office in January 1969. Polk said there have been several trustees that have walked away to freedom, but no forced escapes from the jail.

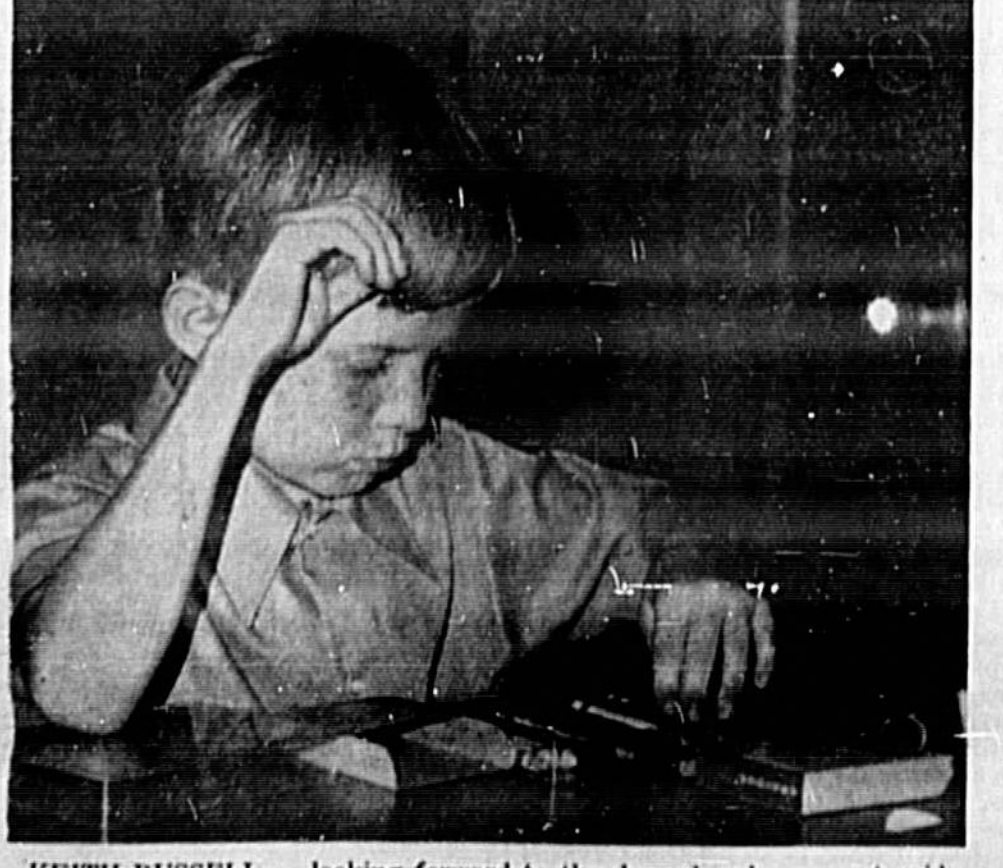
spaghetti and meatballs! Not what the doctor usually prescribes, but that is just what Keith got and he had two helpings.

Prior to the operation, his mother said, "I told Keith this is something you have to face, but I'll be with you." "We have always tried to make a man of Keith," she added. When something is going to hurt, we tell him so and he says "I can take it, Mom."

When he grows up he'd like to be a truck driver. He often talks with the drivers and like most little boys he is "truck crazy."

When Keith recovers from his surgery it is hoped he will be able to participate in more of the activities enjoyed by the other children in the family and his classmates at Casselberry Elementary School.



KEITH RUSSELL — looking forward to the day when he can put aside his crayons for a baseball. (Mariyan Gordon Photo)

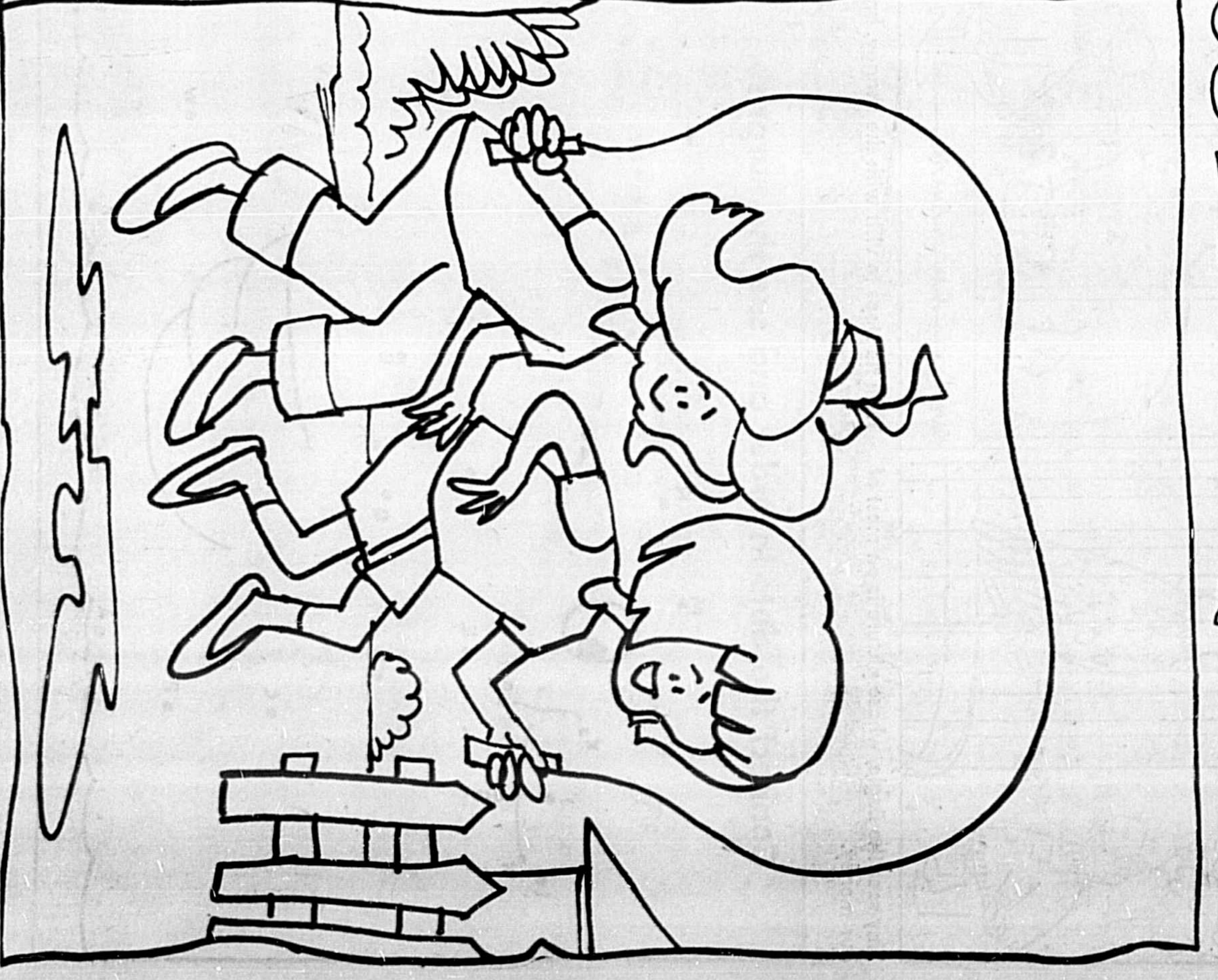

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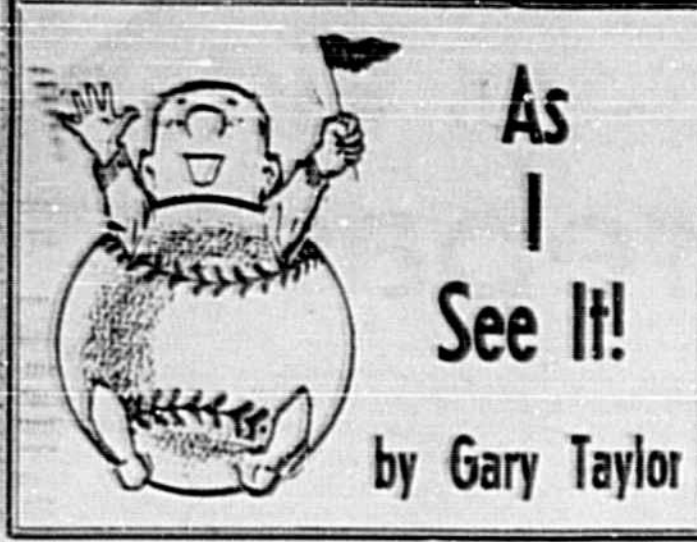

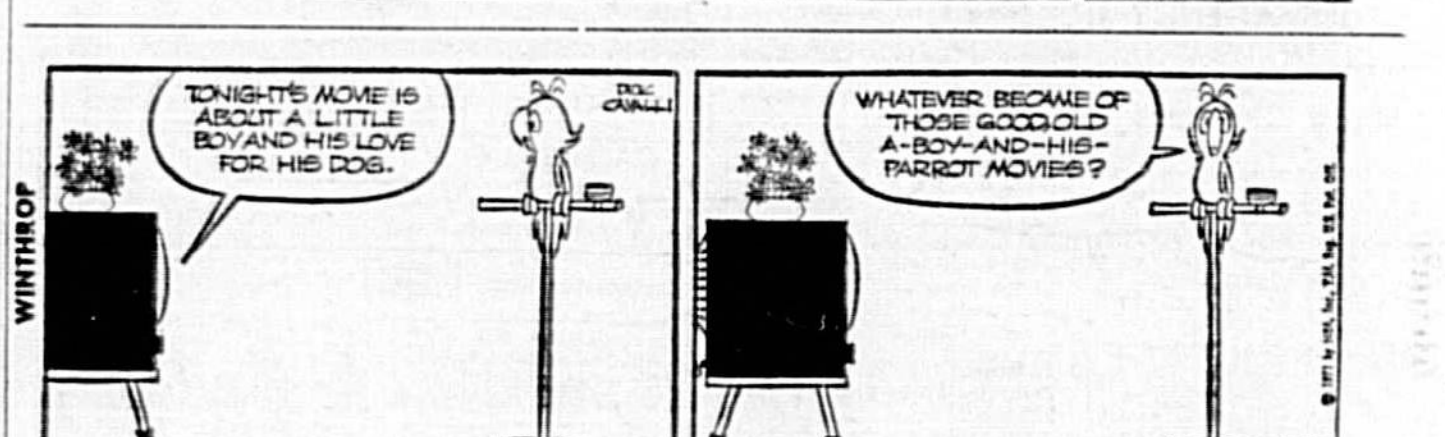

# Safe Way To End-Run Low Calorie Diet Is Told

How about being bourgeois tonight, or cooing via, or maybe spaghetti or chili for dinner? No way, you say, because it would mean your low fat and meat diet is important to control blood pressure and prevent heart ailment recurrences.

Not so, says Dr. W. Jann Brown, professor of pathology at the Medical School, University of California at Los Angeles.

A specialist in the pathology of the nervous system, Dr. Brown also is an avid amateur chef, often referred to by his friends and colleagues as the "galloping gourmet of the cardiac set." He insists his diets, while they sound way out, won't strain a single calorie or a milligram of sodium from most diets prescribed for heart or blood pressure patients.

To achieve this noble mission of liberating cardiovascular disease victims from the bland and boring diets usually imposed on them, Dr. Brown has collaborated with a Stanford University gastroenterologist, Dr. Daniel Liebowitz, and a San Jose, Calif., dietitian, Marlene (Miss) Together, they have penned what you could call a cardiac cookbook. They entitled it appropriately "Him To Cook."

At a result, a lot of people who haven't enjoyed eating for years, have a chance to do so.

Each recipe lists the number of calories and sodium content of a serving, making it easy to substitute one foodstuff for another to hold to diet levels.

## Bergman Picked As City Manager

CASSELBERRY — After many months of screening applications and interviewing applicants, the city council has finally decided upon a man to whom it will offer the position of city manager.

Ron Bergman, a 25 year old from California, will be offered the job of Casselberry's first city manager, with a salary of \$12,000 per month. He will also receive \$50 per month car expenses and \$1,000 moving expenses, which will be refundable if he leaves the job before completing one year.

Bergman was selected from over 45 applicants seeking the position. Councilman Bill Grier, in expressing his support of Bergman, called him "younger and more progressive" than any other candidate considered. "He will serve the city in a better light," Grier said. Councilman Tom Napier also expressed his support of Bergman, saying Bergman's knowledge of the Disney operations in California will be an asset to the city when Disney World opens near Orlando in October.

Napier suggested that the city offer Bergman a three year contract for "job security," but the general consensus of the council was that such a contract would be too binding. Council Chairman Edith Duerr pointed out that Bergman expressed his need to have the city council completely behind him and that yearly elections of council members might cause problems in this area. Bergman will be offered a 15 month contract.

Bergman, provided he accepts the job, is expected to take the position in August. Not only will he be the first city manager in the city, but he will also be the first in the South Seminole area.

The city manager ordinance providing for this position was adopted in September of last year.

## Dumping Of Sewage Not New

As promised, Sanford City Commissioner Robert Meyer Monday night brought to the attention of his commission colleagues, the dumping of raw sewage into Lake Monroe, through the city storm drains that end at the marina just across the street from his post office.

As reported in Monday's Herald, Commissioner Meyer explained to fellow commissioners the evidence observed by him Sunday morning, when a smelly, white substance was noted coming from the drain pipes into the lake.

Meyer said he saw several dead fish around the area of the fluid and reported being advised by a man that human waste was also coming from the drain pipe.

Acting-Mayor W. Vincent Roberts, who presided in the absence of Mayor Lee P. Moore said the incident had been a past problem and said the solution would mean the re-doing of the entire storm drainage system.

Commissioner Robert advised that boats moored in the harbor were also contributing to the problem. According to information, it appears that in periods of heavy rains, untreated sewage bound for the treatment plant somehow overflows into the storm drainage lines and is ultimately carried into the harbor.

Commissioner Meyer said he wanted the city's public works director to look into the problem and bring a report to a later commission meeting. "I would like to have the fluid diverted into the regular sewage treatment system for treatment," Meyer added.

Commissioner Julian Stetstrom, discussing another matter, said he has second thoughts on locating the new police-security complex and would "like to see us putting a building on the Fourth Street and French Avenue site."

Stetstrom advised he was told by City Manager W. E. Knowles, who was absent on vacation from last night's meeting, that the other site on 25th Street at Marshall Avenue had no bottom and would require expenditures for land preparation before the property could be utilized.

The commissioners added he felt neither site would be acceptable, although the commission a week ago deleted all but the two mentioned sites.

## Escapes Remain At Large

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — Two of seven escapes from a large county jail remain at large today after sheriff's deputies said they "just missed" capturing them Monday.

"One or two leads seem very promising. Apparently we just missed them two times," said Capt. Marvin Peele of the Orange County sheriff's office. A statewide bulletin was sent out for Reverend Corwin Burgess, 33, and Leon Horton, 27. "We're still investigating how they got out," said Sgt. Joe Farrell.

The inmates, including James "Pete" Christian who had been charged in three killings, overpowered a guard Sunday night on a rise like a phone call, Farrell said. They escaped from the fifth floor, by sliding down bedsteads.

They were all captured except Burgess, who had been serving time on a breaking and entering conviction, and Horton, who had been held on narcotics charges.

Burgess was at his sister's house in Eatonville about seven miles north of Orlando Monday, according to Peele. "We got a tip on that from one of our informers," the captain said, "but apparently we arrived too late."

The switchboard in the county courthouse lit up because of all the publicity after the inmates got out of their maximum security cells upstairs in the downtown building, Sgt. Farrell said.

## On Assault Charges Youth Is Indicted

Trial has been set for July 28 in the case of James Leonard, 16-year-old South Seminole youth, charged with assault with intent to commit rape.

The teenager, termed "Mallard" "kissing burglar," was indicted by a county grand jury on June 15. He initially appeared in Juvenile Court and at the time State Attorney Alton Herring said that the youth might be committed by the court to state mental hospital until he is 21.

The 16-year-old girl whom he is charged with assaulting identified the boy from photos, and told authorities that a man threatened her with a long knife in her bedroom. Awakening, she was told to submit to his advances or die. The girl's parents were asleep in an adjoining bedroom.

The youth is in custody in lieu of a \$10,000 bond. According to police records more than 10 girls in the Maitland area have been accused, kissed and threatened by "the kissing burglar."
