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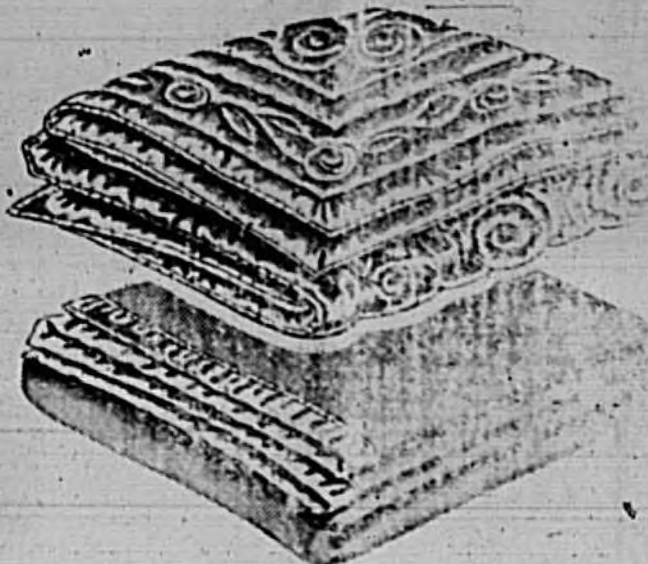
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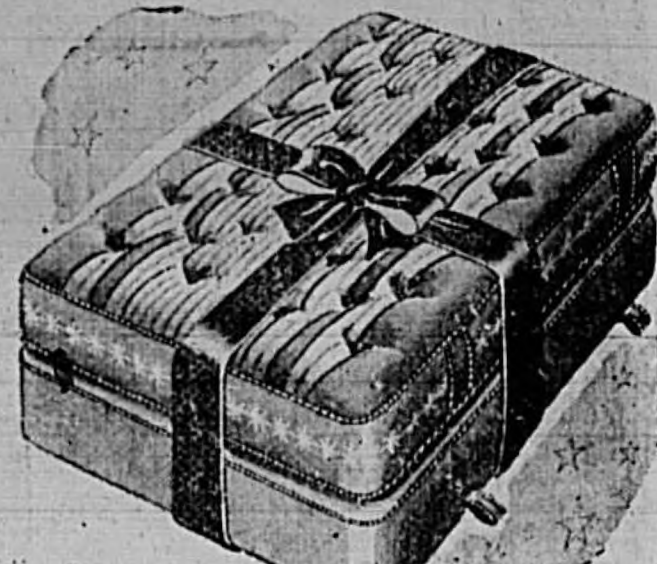

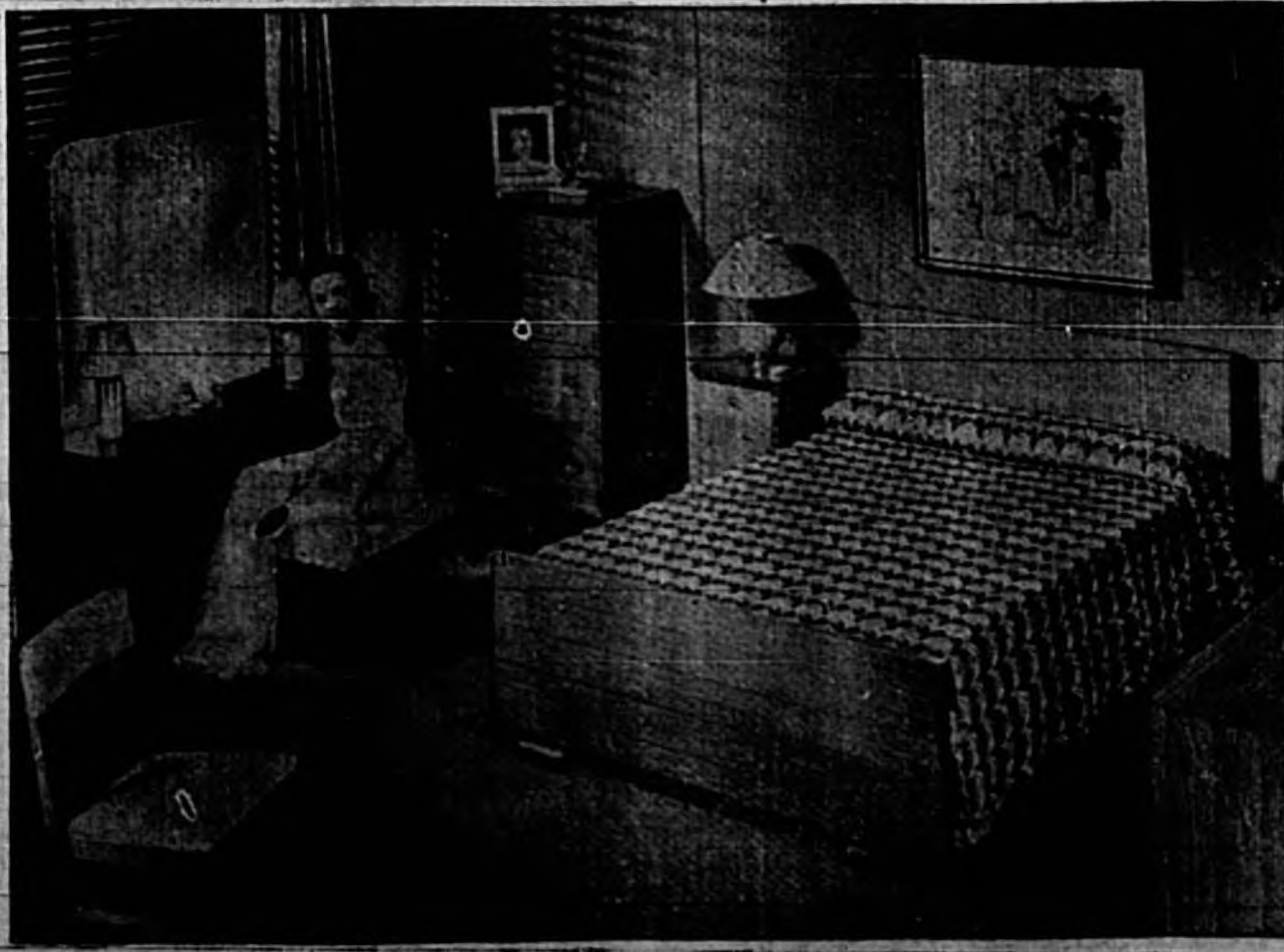

Turner Claims Kimmel Failed To Obey Order

Declares Message To Pacific Commander Needed No Supplementary Orders

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21. (AP)—The Pearl Harbor Investigating Committee was told today that if orders had been followed by Admiral Kimmel, losses would have been reduced materially during the Japanese attack on Hawaii. The witness was Admiral Richmond Kelly Turner, who was chief of Navy operations at the time of the disaster. Turner declared that the orders sent to Kimmel called for the deployment of the Fleet at sea. Admiral Turner defended his very hard to stop. But Turner asserted that it was entirely adequate and did not call for any supplementary orders. He added that he had had the utmost respect for Admiral Kimmel's abilities, and that this respect was shared throughout the Navy.

In answer to earlier questions, Turner said that the Fleet had been prepared for just such an attack as the Japanese launched, and that it was ready for war on Dec. 7, 1941. The Admiral conceded, however, that even had the orders been carried out, a portion of the Japanese fleet force probably would have gotten through.

Stalin Spends His 66th Birthday At Office In Kremlin

MOSCOW, Dec. 21. (AP)—Generalissimo Joseph Stalin pursued a custom of long standing today he observed his birthday — his 66th — by working at his desk in the Kremlin. However, the Soviet Union celebrated Stalin's birthday, the Soviet leader, in the eyes of millions of Soviet citizens, is regarded as the greatest of all Russians.

And this year Moscow, particularly, had cause for celebration. Stalin returned to the Kremlin only this week after a vacation of more than two months at the shores of the Black Sea. The conference of the foreign ministers was overshadowed temporarily by Stalin's birthday. But Foreign Commissar Vyacheslav Molotov, Secretary of State James Byrnes and Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin continued their discussions today.

Molotov and the Foreign Commissar's wife, tented Byrnes and Bevin an official reception last night at which the three foreign ministers drank vodka and champagne toasts to the continued friendship and collaboration of their three countries.

First Winter Day Less Severe Than Last Autumn Week

Throughout most of the nation, this first day of winter is offering less severe weather than was served up by the closing week of autumn. Moderating temperatures are the rule everywhere except in the Dakotas and Minnesota where a new mass of arctic air has moved in and settled down. The warmest city on yesterday's map was San Diego, Calif., where the mercury reached 72 degrees.

But the passing of the heavy storms that left deep blankets of snow from the Rocky Mountains eastward is scant consolation for servicemen who have been delayed on their return trips home. The west coast port of San Francisco is jammed with troops who will be unable to reach their homes for Christmas because of snarled transportation. And the same storms that disrupted traffic across the nation now are spilling the chances of hundreds of servicemen on their way back from Europe to reach home by Christmas Day.

Communists In China Propose End Of Conflict

CHUNGKING, Dec. 21. (AP)—A Chinese Communist spokesman in Chungking said today that his party was prepared to put into writing its proposals for ending the unending war in China. He said the Red proposals for an unconditional armistice would call for both sides to be "frozen" in the present positions they control in China.

The spokesman's declaration that he would put the proposal in writing followed a charge by a Nationalist government official that the armistice talk was just "propaganda."

However, the Red spokesman expressed surprise at this charge. He declared that the head of the Communist peace delegation in Chungking had requested formally that the proposal be forwarded to Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek. Said the spokesman: "We want an armistice. We considered our proposal as official and formal, but as the government wants it in writing, we are going to oblige."

As a result, a Nationalist government spokesman said today that the Communist offer to put their verbal proposal in writing put the matter in a different light.

Today, heavy snow storms and frigid weather east of the Rockies are hampering the home ward journey of returning lucky troops in the ship's hold to the east coast.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex.—K. L. Berry, a football player who was one of the greatest athletes Texas ever produced, he was known as versatile and had the spirit of a champion.

Busy Bankers

It is well understood that American banking has knuckled down to rules and regulations that would have seemed strange before the '30s. What with the vigilance of the U.S. Treasury, the Federal Reserve, the FDIC, the RFC, the Comptroller of the Currency and the Superintendents of Banks in the 48 states, bank officials have been toeing the line and doing a good job for themselves as public trustees of others' funds.

Not so well understood, however, is the fact, as may be observed in any urban or rural center, that bankers are pounding the pavements as do salesmen of industry, drumming up business. Bankers say little about this in their public utterances.

Nor have bankers boasted about the overhead expense incurred in getting America to buy war bonds, employing large forces to distribute these securities and to aid in redeeming them. This can be reckoned in millions of dollars of overhead expense, and without profit, except the normal requirements of bank facilities arising from the traffic. Banks were long the scapegoat for all economic sins. It is time credit was given where credit is due.

The Great Pogrom

One of the saddest and most terrible events of the recent World War has been the fate of the Jewish race, in so far as it came under the brutal fist of Hitler and his killers. Pogroms had been familiar in Russia in former times, but even at their worst they never approximated those introduced by the crazy Hitler and his gangsters.

Reports of the Nuernberg war crimes tribunal now in operation seem to indicate that the Nazis deliberately murdered no fewer than 6,000,000 Jews in the eastern areas alone, and some recent estimates suggest that the total number of the Jewish race now left in the world is not very much larger than that. The slaughter was worst of all in Poland and adjacent regions, while the terror lasted.

It seems incredible that such an episode could occur in modern times, and that such an able and gifted race, with so long a record of progress and attainment in so many nations, should come finally to near extinction at the hands of a crazed fanatic and his ruthless followers.

There is the story going around, for instance, of the Japanese-American in California who was a technical and maintenance engineer and had been shut up in a relocation camp for three years, and when he got free couldn't find anywhere to live. "Yes," replied the engineer, "Uncle Sam let me go from the relocation center."

"You O.K. with Uncle Sam sure now?" persisted the gardener.

"Yes, O.K. with Uncle Sam."

"Well, you O.K. with Uncle Sam, you O.K. with me," was the welcome reply, "You come live with me in my house." Which the seeker did with much pleasure.

Prosecutors Plan To Finish Cases Jan. 2

NUERNBERG, Dec. 21. (AP)—Allied prosecutors are planning to finish their cases against the Gestapo and the Nazi Security Police when the international military court reconvenes on Jan. 2. The prosecutors estimate that all the evidence against 21 war leaders and a half dozen Nazi organizations will be wound up at the end of January.

A few of the American prosecutors returned to the United States for the holidays after yesterday's adjournment for 13 days. For the Nazi defendants the Christmas recess will mean that they can have special opportunities to take part in religious services.

EXPORT CRILING REMOVAL

LAKELAND, Dec. 21. (AP)—Removal of price ceilings on canned citrus products looks imminent today. Spokesmen for the industry in Lakeland expect an announcement from Washington momentarily making the removal effective Monday. Canned prices for both oranges and grapefruit have weakened in the past week. Removal of ceilings is not expected to bolster these prices.



NEW YORK, Dec. 21. (AP)—The aircraft carrier Randolph is having trouble getting home with its cargo of 6,000 veterans of the Italian campaign in time for Christmas. Seventy-mile winds and high seas have cut the Randolph's speed as low as two knots. The carrier is due in New York Sunday but will be fortunate if it arrives by Christmas Day.

Minnesota Eleven Is Named Flop Of Year In Sports

By Associated Press Minnesota received a dubious distinction today. The grid team was named the flop-of-the-year in the annual Associated Press year-end poll.

The collapse was far and away the biggest disappointment singled out by sports writers. The Cardinals placed second in the flop-of-the-year balloting. The failure of the Chicago Bears in the National Football League

ranked third. The St. Louis Browns placed fourth.

Other disappointments in the first ten were Bill Nicholson of the Cubs, Gunter Haegz; the New York Yankees; Commissioner Happy Chandler; Mort Copper of the Braves and the Navy football team.

Rose Bowl football fans are pointing out that Alabama and Southern California have played in some of the most exciting contests held in the Pasadena Bowl on New Year's Day.

Alabama, for example, won a thrilling 20 to 19 victory over Washington in 1926. And in 1935, the Dixie Howell—Don Hutson combination gave Alabama a 29

to 13 decision over Stanford. Southern California engaged in a super-thriller in 1932, smashing Tulane, 21 to 12. And in 1939, the Trojans came from behind in the last minute to beat Duke, 7 to 3.

Alabama has won three, tied one and lost one in the Rose Bowl. Southern California never has been in the classic.

Western Reserve University of Cleveland will resume football in 1946. The team will be coached by Tom Davies, who will have the title of director of intercollegiate football. Davies was coach of the Western Reserve eleven when the school discontinued football. Davies was at one time a star

back at the University of Pittsburgh. He once led Pitt to a 27 to 21 victory over Pennsylvania, making touchdown runs of 95, 85 and 80 yards.

The University of Washington is seeking an intersectional opponent to open its 1946 football campaign. The school wants to schedule a game Sept. 28 in Seattle.

Owner George Halas of the Chicago Bears has indicated that he is not considering Dan Topping's offer for the Bears to meet the New York Yankees of the All-America Conference in an exhibition game in New York next fall. Topping offered Halas a \$25,000 guarantee to schedule

the game. Moose Krause is back at Notre Dame. But he won't resume his duties as head basketball coach until next season. Elmer Ripley, who is on leave of absence from Georgetown University, will remain as Irish cage coach for the current season. Krause spent 13 months in the Marine Corps.

The Swedish Athletic Association says that Frank Star Ennart Strand has declined an invitation to run in the United States during the coming indoor season. Strand, recently married, said that he could not leave his work as a typographer long enough to make the trip.

Eddie Miller of Cincinnati was the top fielding shortstop of the National League during the 1945 season. Miller topped Marty Marion of the Cardinals, .976 to .975, and annexed his fifth title in six years. The Cubs accounted for three individual fielding championships. Stan Hack led the third basemen. Andy Pafko topped the outfielders. And Claude Passeau in the pitching department. Passeau has not made a misplay since Sept. 1941. Babe Dahlgren, Pittsburgh, led the first-basemen in fielding and Verban of St. Louis topped the second-basemen. Ken O'Dea of St. Louis had the best catching record. Chicago's baseball teams are going to continue the war-time

practice of starting their afternoon games at an early hour. All Cub and White Sox games will begin at 1:30 P.M. The clubs say that the fans apparently favor the earlier opening over the 3 P.M. starting time.

President Rickey of the Dodgers has been elected a director of the Guardian Life Insurance Company. An announcement says that Rickey owns several hundred thousands of dollars in life insurance and is believed to be one of the first major lenders to become active in life insurance management.

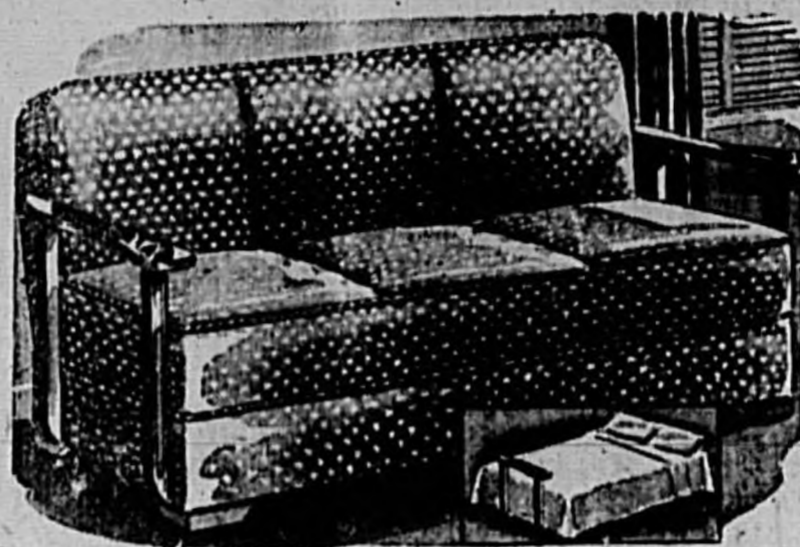

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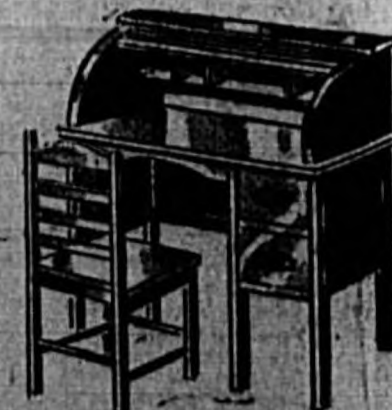
