EXECUTION OF KILLER STAYED BY HIGH COURT

Supreme Court Grants Writ To Attorney For Charles Brown, Volusia Killer, Who Was To Have Died Today

Attorney Indignant Over Martin's Action

Declares He Will Ask That Governor Be Held For Alleged Contempt Of Court

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Feb. 8.—(INS)—Upon motion of Attorney Walter G. Walker, of Daytona Beach, the State Supreme Court today granted a writ of habeas corpus and restraining order staying the execution of Charles Brown, who was to have been electrocuted at the state prison farm at Raiford this afternoon.

The writ was issued by the high court after Governor John W. Martin ordered the prison officials to proceed with Brown's electrocution in the face of a writ of habeas corpus issued by Judge A. Z. Adams of the United States circuit court.

Walker appeared before the supreme court today very indignant at the governor's action in the case and declared that the state chief executive was ignoring the highest writ in the United States and that he was guilty of contempt of court.

The writ of habeas corpus can only be suspended in cases of insurrection and I mean in the charges of contempt of court against Governor Martin," Walker stated.

A writ of habeas corpus takes all matters out of the hands of the executive department and places the case in the hands of the court issuing the writ," he said. "Walker last night appealed to the federal court at Jacksonville for a writ of habeas corpus but the court ruled it had no jurisdiction in the case, he said.

The Supreme Court granted the writ of habeas corpus on the ground that Brown was convicted in October of 1923 and that the legality at the time was questioned by being while he was sentenced to be electrocuted.

Peaceful Settlement Of Chinese Problem Desired By King George Of Britain

LONDON, Feb. 8.—King George today opened parliament with one of the shortest speeches on record for a like occasion.

Chief interest in the king's speech centered on his remarks concerning the Chinese situation. After declaring that he had not it necessary to dispatch armed forces to the far east to protect British residents in China, as a result of the recent rioting at Hankow and the anti-British agitation throughout China, the king said it was the desire of the British government and people to place their future relations with China on a basis of friendship and good will. He declared for a policy of non-interference in the internal affairs of China.

The continuous civil war in China and the anti-foreign and particularly the anti-British agitation throughout the country, with which it has been accompanied, have caused me grave anxiety," King George said.

As a consequence of such important matters as Hankow and at other places, my government has felt it necessary to dispatch to the far east a sufficient force to protect British and Indian subjects against mob violence and armed attack.

"But I earnestly desire a peaceful settlement of the difficulties which have arisen, and my government has valued proposals to be made on the Chinese authorities which would have the effect of restoring peace in China and throughout the world that it is the desire of the British people to remove all real grounds for cause and to place our future relations with the Chinese people on a footing of friendship and good will.

"My government will maintain our treaty of non-interference in the internal affairs of China.

Reports from Hankow, Jan. 27, indicated that Gen. Sun Chuan-fang had turned the scale of dispute against the "invaders." Gen. Sun's position was made public in a telegram to the north assembly district.

PARIS, Feb. 8.—Prince Carol of Roumania has announced his intention of never returning to Roumania or of re-establishing his rights to the throne, if this is made conditional upon his return to his wife, Princess Helen, it was learned authoritatively today.

The Prince has been in conference here for several days with emissaries of Queen Marie who have suggested to Prince Carol that he return to Bucharest in a private capacity, without conditions and without King Ferdinand, in his degrading days.

Prince Carol has said the suggestion of Queen Marie that he should return to his wife, Princess Helen, is a suggestion that he will not accept.

The prince has said he is not prepared to make any concessions to his parents or to his political enemies.

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Highway Opening Is Celebrated By Joint County Motorcade

New Road Between 2 Cities Is Formally Dedicated By Tour Ending In Sanford

Party Welcomed Here at 3 O'clock

Trip Through Celery Delta Made After Formal Reception

Seminole and Lake county citizens today joined hands in a mammoth celebration upon the opening of the Sanford-Mt. Dora highway. The celebration was in the form of a motorcade consisting of approximately 30 automobiles from this county and at least twice that number from Lake county.

Thirty automobiles bearing the banners "Sanford" and "Seminole county," left the office of the Chamber of Commerce in Sanford at 10 o'clock this morning. They were met at the Welva bridge by several scout cars from Lake county motorcade, already forming a line.

Proceeding to the latter city, the entire group was combined and after a number of brief speeches on the part of Lake County citizens, a luncheon was served to all participants in the tour.

Upon the completion of the luncheon the Sanford delegation took charge of the motorcade and the cars reached this city shortly after 3 o'clock.

Giving immediately to the boulevard in front of the Hotel Furrow Lake, the members of the party were welcomed by Mayor Forrest Lake, who, together with other city officials and members of the Board of County Commissioners, presented the heads of the various civic groups.

Great crowds of Lake Mary, spoke to the gathering on behalf of the County Commissioners. Owing to season of the Board this afternoon it was impossible for it to attend in a body and Mr. Evans was delegated to welcome the members of the visiting motorcade.

The local party was composed of a large number of Sanford merchants. Efforts to cement the good will between the two counties, Chamber of Commerce officials declared.

The arrangements for the Sanford part in the celebration were made by E. J. Trotter, secretary of the Chamber.

The celebration was held on the opening of the hard surfaced highway between Sanford and Mt. Dora, a project that has been under construction for several months.

William K. Vanderbilt Denies That He Will Seek Divorce in Paris Courts

Paris, France, Feb. 7.—The divorce thing is an old chestnut. It started 15 years ago and I am tired of denying it," said William K. Vanderbilt, then he disembarked from the S. S. France today, and was told of recurring reports in New York that he had come to France to secure a divorce in order that he might marry Mrs. Rosamond Lancaster Warburton. "My wife and I are not living together and haven't been for some time, but we are good friends," said Vanderbilt.

The story about an application having been made to the Rota Tribunal for annulment of mar-

riage was untrue. "I am not going to Paris to get a divorce. I am on my way to the south of France to see my mother, leaving my yacht within four days."

One New York paper had reported that Mrs. Vanderbilt was also a passenger on the France. If she was she succeeded in completely hiding her identity. Her name did not appear on the passenger list and none of the passengers had seen her during the voyage.

Vanderbilt landed here and motored to Paris. Prior to his landing he attempted to avoid detection by asking the purser to inform reporters that he had landed at Plymouth.

Changes In Prayer Book Of Church Of Announced Britan

LONDON, Feb. 7.—(INS)—The long-awaited changes in the Church of England prayer book were announced today. But the Archbishop of Canterbury in making the announcement stressed the fact the use of virtually all the changes is optional with the clergy and rector can not force his congregation to use the changes unless they consent.

The principal changes are these:

The word "obey" is dropped from the marriage ceremony.

The marriage ceremony is changed so the bridegroom says "All my world goods I with these share" instead of "I with the endow."

The reservation of the sacrament is authorized but only for the sick.

Archaic language is removed. Prayers for the dead are authorized.
