Kindergarten **Program Wins Support**

TALLAHASSEE (AP)-Start ing a state - wide kindergarten program next year for some of the students who would attend first grade was supported by members of the Commission on Quality Education.

Members of the elementary and secondary education subcommittee agreed that the plan would reduce the number of pupils who have to repeat first grade-now at 10 per cent of the total students -and provide a low-cost way of getting people used to the idea of kindergar-

Present staff and existing classrooms can be used for the system at the start, said Thomas G. Ethredge Jr. of Melbourne, principal of an elementary school.

He said the plan is to enroll children who turn six years old between Sept. 1 and Jan. 1 who are now allowed to enter first grade-in the kindergarten

program. About one-third of the first graders fall into this age group, he said.

Five-year-olds would be enrolled in kindergartens in 1969 or as soon as possible after that,




BIG GROUP 7 cars zoom through the infield course during the American Road Race of Champions. ARRC is the highest racing spectacle in the world,


