Marshall's Appointment

The appointment of General Marshall to succeed James F. Byrnes as Secretary of State is being hailed with unusual enthusiasm on all sides. Throughout his long military career, the General has steered clear of politics, though his position as Chief of Staff during the past few years has brought him into close contact with members of Congress and virtually all important political figures.

In his dealings with the foreign members of the Allied General Staff, Marshall is reported to have shown all the skill, tact, and firmness of the most astute diplomat, and his patience as well as his perseverence in such dealings have repeatedly won him the respect of all concerned. He is virtually the one man in America of whom it might be said he has no enemies. Now that he has been thrown into politics, this

unanimity of opinion may be altered somewhat, and what unanimity of opinion may be altered somewhat, and what-ever his course may be in the State Department he can count on incurring some opposition from the ranks of which will arise those who will call him names. Never-theless, it appears likely that he will survive it all to emerge during the presidential year of 1948 as the out-standing Democratic political figure. For, it cannot be assumed that in naming Marshall as Secretary of State President Truman was entirely innocent of the political implications of this move He

innocent of the political implications of this move. H must know that his own chances of re-election are virtualindust know that his own chances of re-election are virtual-ily non-existent, and those of any ordinary Demócrat would be extremely alim. Only a man of Marshall's stature, willing to run, and properly groomed in the meantime, could overcome the obvious Republican surge. That Marshall is willing to run may be assumed from his acceptance of the number one cabinet position.
